Council Holds Development Hostage

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council, admitting past mistakes, agreed not to endorse any further development parcels until a written document, signed by all parties involved, comes before them for approval. This major step toward assuring that the community receives all benefits promised them by a development team came forward at last Thursday's Housing and Development Committeeof-the-Whole meeting when a vote was expected on The

Raymond Group's proposal to develop Parcels 4 and 7 at the Yard's End section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Council members did appear ready to send The Raymond Group forward to the Boston Redevelopment Authority Board of Directors for a public presentation of its plans to build a 400room hotel on Parcel 4 and a biomedial research center on Parcel 7, but held the developer at bay until a "commitment in principle" was signed. This signed document would include a list of community benefits that would be derived from the multimillion-dollar pro-

With The Raymond Group's written agreement in hand, which includes the community's requests to keep all monetary benefits for housing and jobs in Charlestown, Chairman Dennis McLaughlin set out to obtain the same type of document from the city of Boston, the BRA, the Job Linkage Trust and the Hou-(continued on page 4)

Voke Says CANA Job To Be Posted

During their continuing dialogue on Charlestown's needs, Rep. Richard Voke was informed this past week by Department of Public Works Commissioner Jane Garvey that the process to fill the vacant Central Artery North Area (CANA) Liaison would begin immediately. Voke hailed the news as another major victory for the residents of Charlestown.

"Elected officials and residents alike have been in agreement that the position of Charlestown CANA Liaison is one that should exist and be filled by someone in our community. I am elated that Commissioner Garvey has heeded my calls for the posting of this vacancy because I truly believe local residents need to have direct input on those decisions that will forever affect life in Charlestown," said Voke.

According to Voke, both The Charlestown Patriot and The Boston Globe will run vacancy notices during the coming week. "I would expect to see something in the Globe this Sunday and the Patriot next Thursday,"

An important change in the responsibilities of the position will be the inclusion of the Central Artery work in the job description. "While David Flanagan did a tremendous job in representing Charlestown's best interests, he was not involved in the 'other big project,'

that being the Central Artery/Tunnel Project. The newly hired liaison, however, will take on this additional role, thereby assuring Charlestown's strong voice is also heard by those now planning that massive project," stressed Voke.

Voke noted that this issue to enhance the duties of the liaison was one of the last points needing to be resolved before the posting could be announced. "Both Garvey and I felt it was important to make sure that the new person coming on board could serve effectively in the dual position. Fortunately, the Commissioner and her staff were able to rewrite the administrative (continued on page 5)



Council Holds Development Hostage

(continued from page one) sing Linkage Trust.

The July 19 meeting was chaired by Housing and Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha. Other council members present were McLaughlin, Jim Mansfield, Mel Stillman, Jim Conway, Ellen D'Ambrosio, Ed Callahan, Stephen Collins, Moe Gillen, Nancy Keyes, Dan Kovacevic, Bob Wallace, Bill Galvin, Kate McDonough, Ken Stone, Peter Looney, Bud Coleman and Kevin Roche.

Much had been gained since the development team first presented its plans to the council. Among the community benefits that have come forward from The Raymond Group are 25 parking spaces for the residents of the Bricklayers affordable housing complex in the Navy Yard and the hiring of a community resident in a position as job monitor for all future development projects in the Navy Yard to assure that Charlestown residents receive a percentage of positions that will be made available. Also, at the suggestion of the developer, a subcommittee will be established with abutters, BRA personnel, council members and a representative from The Raymond Group overseeing the proposals from tentative to final designation.

A memorandum of understanding (MOU) has yet to be agreed upon between the council and the developer, but strides are being made to tighten up the preliminary draft benefits package presented to the community last week by The Raymond Group. Issues such as parking, building heights, percentage of jobs for Charlestown residents, affordable housing linkage money, other design possibilities for the hotel, job training opportunities, and the inclusion of the construction of the Haul Road north of Medford Street to help alleviate traffic congestion on neighborhood streets, are all weighing heavily on the minds of the council members.

Cunha stated: "Our job now is to vote to allow the developer to go forward into the process for design. We have been asked to help jumpstart the city's economy with the approval of this development proposal, but I'll be damned to do it and have the money generated by this project go elsewhere in the city. A document should be produced before designation stating that the money has to remain in Charlestown." He added,, "We have to make sure abutters have their say before the key goes into the door."

Stone addressed his remarks to The Raymond Group saying, "Our responsibility to the community is tremendous. What we decide will affect Charlestown for years to come. We must get the best we can for the town." He added, "We don't mean to hold you up, but you'll have to be patient with us."

Coleman summed up the sentiments of the council when he stated, "I would like to see the proposal as a formal contract. I propose this be tabled until a more detailed, tightened up document comes back to the committee."

The 17 to 1 council vote stated that "until such time that the city of Boston, Jobs Linkage Trust, Housing Linkage Trust and BRA agree in principal to the recomendation of The Raymond Group that linkage money for jobs and housing remain in Charlestown and a formal signed document be prepared, the council will delay a vote."

No longer will verbal agreements or hand shakes, a "Townie" trademark, hold water with the Neighborhood Council. Written documentation will be required for all further development proposals within the town's boundaries. The future of Parcels 4 and 7 is being held hostage by a group of townspeople who have learned the hard way that "if it ain't in writing, it just ain't so,"

The Housing and Development Committee is hopeful that the written document they seek will be presented to them before the end of July so that they will be able to vote on The Raymond Group's proposals before the council takes a vacation for the month of August.

The Housing and Development Committee-of-the Whole will meet on these parcels on Tuesday, July 31 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill St.

Carrs Receive Approval For Mini-Mart At Gasoline Station

Francis and Donna Carr, along with Bob Emeott, territorial manager of the Shell Oil Co., met with neighbors on July 23 to outline plans for their Rutherford Avenue facility. The Carrs and the oil company had filed with the city of Boston Board of Appeal to change the designation of the property from a gasoline service station to a gasoline service station and 24-hour convenience store.

The potential impact of changes in the operation brought nearly 20 persons to the Mary Colbert Apartments to review the plans and ask questions of the owners. Ken Stone chaired the meeting.

Emeott told the residents that there has been a trend throughout the industry to add services to existing stations in order to provide the dealer with more money and added service for the customers. He said that the Shell Oil Co. has been adding small stores to its stations, calling it a mini-mart. He added that it is getting tougher for station owners to meet the increased cost of insurance and overhead without an ancillary source of money, and the minimart would provide such a source. He emphasized that it would not be a full convenience store.

Donna Carr stated that presently the vending company profits from the machines on the premises and pays only a small fee to the station owners. She added that the profit from the sale of gasoline is only 3- to 4cents per gallon.

Fran Carr said that the existing vending machines will be replaced with coolers and, in addition to the tonic and snacks already on sale, they will offer milk, bread, newspapers and coffee. He added that nothing will be cooked on the premises. Donna Carr said that it is possible that they might sell prepackaged sandwiches, similar to those found on a canteen truck.

When questioned by Stone as to an increase in time at the station for customers making purchases, Fran Carr said that the time should be diminished as now the attendant has to take change from the customers or make change and get the item from the machine. With the new coolers, he will be able to just reach in.

Fran Carr said that during the day, when there are two attendants on duty, customers will be able to enter the store area as they do now and pick out the items they wish to purchase. After 9 p.m. when only one attendant is on duty, the door will be locked and customers will be served through the change window. He added that present security measures would continue to be in operation.

When asked about the station's hours of operation,

Fran Carr stated that they have been open continuously, 24-hours a day, for just over a year, and with a short break, for nine months prior to that time. He said that when the station closed at midnight, it was frequently the target of vandalism. Emeott added that an operator can sell 400 to 600 gallons of gasoline during the night, noting that this is a service to customers and, in addition it provides a safe haven for someone in trou-

Another concern of area residents was that the station and area be kept clean. Emeott stated that Carr has had an excellent record on regular and unannounced inspections by the company. He said that with the minimart, the station falls under a more extensive inspection routine that includes, besides general cleanliness, rotation of stock and currently dated packaging.

As to the cleanliness, Donna Carr stated that she presently cleans on a daily basis and they plan on a professional cleaner when the work is completed.

Concerning the renovations, the Carrs stated that there will be no changes in building size. Fran Carr related that the exterior concrete walk will be widened by two feet and a ramp added for handicapped accessibility. There will be a handicapped accessible bathroom installed and the entrance will be moved toward the center of the building with the installation of a double door to allow for wheelchair access. The change window will be moved to accommodate the new door. Donna Carr added that the exterior will be brightened by painting it soft grey and yellow, the new Shell colors.

Answering a question on landscaping, Emeott said that Shell is a big supporter of landscaping. Donna Carr added that the existing trees will remain.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, related a rumor that the station would be changing ownership. Assured by the Carrs that they have every intention of remaining on the site, Evers stated that she felt that it gave the residents more security knowing that the station is staying in the Carr family and that they would be available if there was a problem.

The general concensus was that the neighbors left the meeting satisfied with the presentation by the Carrs.

The request for a change in zoning went before the

Board of Appeal on July 24. The plans were presented to the board, and testimony was heard.

Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini testified in favor of the change, noting the the size of the structure would not be altered. He asked for approval from the board based on the integrity of the Carr family.

The Boston Redevelopment Authority asked the board to approve the petition, subject to design review.

Evers reported to the board on Tuesday night's community meeting. She asked for approval after reviewing the plans for the station's renovations, adding that relief should be given only to the present owners, and any change in ownership would require coming back to the community and the board.

The decision of the board was to approve the plans for the gas station at One Rutherford Ave. for the appellant only, subject to design review by the BRA.

Two-Alarm Fire Hits Pearl Street Houses

The first alarm was struck at 10:46 p.m. last Saturday night for a fire on Pearl Street. After the second alarm was sounded at 10:54 p.m., seven engine companies and five ladder trucks were on the scene fighting the blaze.

According to Fire Department personnel, the July 21 fire was the work of an arsonist. The origin of the fires is believed to have been in the basements of 16 and 18 Pearl St. where two separate fires were found to have been set. Witnesses at the scene reported seeing a suspicious person on the roof of one of the fourstory brick houses just before the blaze began.

The main fire originated in an overstuffed chair located under the basement staircase in 18 Pearl St., quickly spreading up the stairwell from the cellar to the penthouse.

The second fire began in the cellar laundry room at 16 Pearl St. Metal-clad doors at the entrance to each of the units prevented heavy damage to the apartments, other than smoke and water damage, according to an Arson Squad member. The Fire Department has estimated the cost of damaged to both buildings at \$125,000.

A tenant of one of the buildings reported that she heard someone trying to enter her apartment from a rear door just before the fire was discovered. After calling out to the person, she heard footsteps running up onto the roof and disappearing. The arson squad is investigating the witness re-

Seven residents of the six apartments were forced out onto the street, but no injuries were reported. Fire apparatus from Somerville and Cambridge assisted the Boston Fire Department in quelling the blaze.

Hundreds of area residents, hearing the continuous wail of sirens and spotting the billowing white smoke overhead, appeared at the scene.

The area of Pearl and Bartlett streets has been the scene of two other suspicious fires within the last few months. Two separate fires on Bartlett Street are still under investigation. The Arson Squad is trying to determine if all three fires are connected.



Dunbar Makes Mark On Boston Park League

In a Charlestown connection that dates back to Navy Yard teams in the Boston Park League, a former Townie today continues to make his mark in the venerable baseball league.

He's John Dunbar, the veteran third baseman for the Simonelli Oilers which is currently making a strong bid for a spot in the Park League's upcoming play-

A rugged hard-nose in semipro baseball ranks, Dunbar was honored by league managers voting him to the Park League All-Star squad that recently bested Intercity League's All-Stars in Melrose, 6-3.

Son of John and Rita Dunbar of 73 School St. in Charlestown, the 25-yearold Dunbar with the cheery outlook and great nature, married the former Jill Flaherty of South Weymouth and the newlyweds now live in Dorchester.

Dunbar went to St. Francis at the top of Bunker Hill Street for eight years, then to Boston College High for four years, before Northeastern where he graduated as an electrical engineer. His brother Joe lives in Beverly, and two sisters, Kara and Patty, both live at home with their parents.

Young Dunbar speaks with feeling of the close friendships that develop from participation in the fast-paced Park League.

"These are mostly college kids, doing a good job and choosing to play ball in the summers. For me, I just enjoy playing, figuring perhaps I can continue another couple years," Dunbar explained.

Going back, he had played third at B.C. High, but did not play at Northeastern. Norman Walsh, his former high school coach, suggested to Roland Gariepy he might be able to use Dunbar to good advantage. So, he joined Gariepy's Millstreams in 1985, and also played two years for Great Scott in 1987 and 1988.

After a year away from

the game, he returned to play for George Simonelli's team now engaged in a knock-down fight for fourth place or better in the Park League's 61st season of hectic competition.

When he married this past spring, Dunbar's intention was not to play ball in consideration of its possible impact on his marriage.

"But my wife was in favor of my continuing, and it's worked out well. We honeymooned in late April through early May, just in time for me to get in shape for the league's start in mid-May," he said.

A long-ball basher, as well as a timely singles hitter, Dunbar currently is off his homerun pace of nine hits in 1987 for Great Scott. He's hit three homers so far this season for Simonelli under its new coach Joe Walsh, who is baseball coach at Suffolk University.

Funny thing about Dunbar's homerun wallops, in his 1985 season with Roland AC, he whacked six in the first six games of the season.

"Then I did nothing in homeruns for the rest of the season," he recalls ruefully.

But the effervescent Dunbar doesn't let rue long rule his outlook. He's enjoying his league-wide friendships developed over the last six years, and continues to take a charged-up approach to the game as one of Charlestown's boys of summer in the highly-competitive Boston Park League.



Ramblings Of A Townie

This past week, after coffee and my favorite doughnuts at Bunker Hill Street, this "Townie" drove up over Lexington Street, crossed the square and continued down Winthrop Street. On the left, 67 was still with a red door and across the way another door had a fresh coat of paint - red.

For an old Townie reflecting on earlier times and the painting of a door red, he can still hear people in the square quietly say, "that just doesn't happen in Char-les-town." Being a G.I. just returned from WWII in Germany and a college freshman at Massachusetts College of Art, he finished the door and continued taking the abuse.

It is 1990, the young G.I. is now retired from the faculty of Rochester Institute of Technology in upstate New York and living in a home he designed for his WWII war bride in Woburn. The years have passed since the death of his wife Else at Lourdes, and with the coming of summer, he prepares for the long journey to the place of her death and the place where he has volunteered as a helper since 1968.

Wipe those tears away, these ramblings of a Townie have a happy ending. The college freshman who dared to paint a door red is one of a handful of Americans who have been invited to be part of the permanent collection of the Biblioteque Nationale de Paree (print collection). A selection of his images are in the collection of prints at Oxford University, the University of New Castle, the University of Glasgow and the print archives of the Vatican Library. This journey began at 67 Winthrop Street in Char-les-town, Massa-
