In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, the Center for Latino Studies welcomed such as oral history to document injus-Dr. Yolanda Chávez Leyva, a Chicana historian and writer, specializing in border history, public history, and Chicana history as the First Annual Distinguished Scholar in Latino Studies. Mary Helen Cavazos, in empowering her to achieve academic success and pursue graduate studies in social work and law.

This Fall, President Juan Sánchez Muñoz recognized the program as a core pillar of University of Houston-Downtown's commitment to inclusive excellence. In fact, UHD received *Insight into Diversity*'s prestigious Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Award based on an application that featured several of the Center for Latino Studies' Signature Programs. Among the featured programs were Latinas Achieve, and Emerging Scholars of Color, an initiative launched by the Center for Latino Studies in collabora-

tion with the Center for Critical Race Studies.

Latinas Achieve is a mentorship experience specially designed to empower Latina students at the University of Houston-Downtown. The Center for Latino Studies, in collaboration with the Office of Alumni Relations, launched the program in Fall 2018 to cultivate the talents of

(Cont. from Pg. 9) largely neglecting the cultural heritages of the majority of its students. Only eight courses in our entire university curriculum directly engage Latino perspectives, making it nearly impossible for students to complete our Latino Studies Concentration.

However, the institution is working to address this challenge. Over the last three years, UHD has made two key investments in diversifying our curriculum: the creation of the Center for Latino Studies, a humanities-focused academic unit whose mission is to create learning experiences inclusive of Latino students; and the approval of a new Latino Studies Concentration of our Bachelor's Degree in Humanities, after which Latino student enrollment in the Humanities major nearly doubled from 26% in 2016 to 48% in 2018. This initiative to develop the Latino Studies curriculum builds on these institutional investments that to fulfill a mandate that Puerto Rican, Mexican-American, and African American students made over a half century ago, when they mobilized to demand a more inclusive curriculum. By bringing our curriculum into line with the identities of our student population, these new courses will provide culturally-

relevant content that supports their retention and graduation, thereby advancing our mission as a Hispanic-serving and Minority-serving institution.
