


# It's Child's Play For Logano At The Rock

ROCKINGHAM, N.C. — On a historic day for Rockingham Speedway and the ARCA RE/MAX Series, it was an up-and-coming young gun who put on the show during Sunday's inaugural Carolina 500.

In his first ARCA RE/MAX Series start, 17-year-old Joey Logano drove

like a veteran, beating Ken Schrader to the checkered flag by 4.164 sec-

onds. Driving the Venturini Motorsports-prepared No. 25 Joe Venturini Gibbs Racing Oil-Gresham & Associates Chevrolet, Logano led 257 of 312 circuits around the 1.017-mile

At one point, Logano had all but the second-place machine of Michael Annett lapped and was clearly the class of the field from the drop of the green flag. But two late-race cautions nearly changed the complexion of the race for the Middletown, Conn.,

When a caution flag waved on lap 273, Logano's crew gambled and stayed on track while the other leaders pitted for fresh tires. At the restart, Logano fell into the clutches of Annett and Schrader, only to stalk Schrader around the abrasive speedway to regain the lead on lap 291. But when Tim Mitchell spun in turn three to bring out the caution with 10 laps to go, Logano pitted for fresh tires and

lined up behind Schrader, Matt Hawkins and Annett.

At the restart, Logano stuck his Chevrolet into turns one and two to regain second place. From there, he overtook Schrader's No. 52 Four Winds Motorhomes Dodge in turns three and four to retake the lead less than one lap after the restart. From there, it was smooth sailing for the Joe Gibbs Racing developmental driv-

"I have to thank the Joe Gibbs crew for pitting me," Logano said of the group made up of members from Gibbs's No. 11

Sprint Cup and No. 20 Nationwide series teams. "They kept me out front. We're going to get a shot at Dover coming up, and hopefully we'll see victory lane there, too. I wasn't running flat out the whole race. You've got to pace yourself. That's a really big deal here at The Rock.

Even though it was his first trip to Rockingham, Logano knew the importance of having fresh rubber, especially in the closing laps when Schrader had new tires.

"I couldn't really pull a lot more out

# What Will Happen To Former Champ Car Venues?

As recently as early February, the Champ Car World Series looked set to run a 14-race championship spanning three continents and seven countries

Behind the scenes (and apparently behind the backs of his partners), Champ Car co-principal Kevin Kalkhoven was negotiating with Indy Racing

Car World Series — with immediate effect. Six teams managed to make the transition to the IRL's IndyCar Series, but only three of the 14 scheduled Champ Car races landed on the expanded IndvCar schedule.

The Long Beach Grand Prix was run April 20 as the final race, using Champ Car's Panoz DP01 chassis 2.65-liter turbocharged Cosworth engines. The Grand Prix of Edmonton (July 26) and the Gold Coast Indy 300 in Surfers Paradise, Australia (Oct. 22) will be run using IndyCar's Dallara-Honda package.

Meanwhile, organizers of the other 11 events are trying to determine if they want to be a part of American open-wheel racing's unified future. If so, they'll be vying for a limited number of potential available dates, because the IndvCar schedule, currently at 19 races, is unlikely to grow

beyond 20 to 22 races.

IRL leaders say they will approach the schedule for 2009 and beyond with an open mind.

"2009 represents the opportunity for us to really look at where the series' best opportunities for growth are," said George. "I think it's likely we'll see more of a balance between ovals and road circuits than we have

"We're really taking much more of a clean-sheet approach for '09," added Terry Angstadt, president of the IndyCar Series' commercial division. "We've already had a couple of groups in talking about '09 and are very optimistic that we will have a very entertaining and possibly more international schedule. We just haven't made those decisions yet."


While it is possible that some existing IndyCar Series venues might be dropped to make room for ex-Champ Car races, the likelihood is that most former Champ Car events will not make the cut. Here is how the future might stack up for those tracks or

RICHMOND, Va. — Heartbreak was the order of the day at Richmond Int'l Raceway on Saturday, for any number of people.

Denny Hamlin, who led 381 of the first 382 laps, cut down a tire with just eight laps remaining to end his chance at a "blowout" victory and a hometown sweep...and then the real action started.

ting Earnhardt into the fence, much to the dismay of another packed house. While Busch was trying to get off Earnhardt, Clint Bowyer sneaked past on the inside to grab the lead and ultimately the victo-

Busch finished second, fending off a last-lap challenge from Mark Martin, while Tony Stewart and Martin Truex, Jr. rounded out the top five.

They were just racing so hard there and you knew it was going to happen," Bowyer said. "I just took advantage of a misfortune there.'

Misfortune struck Hamlin hard, and then compounded itself when Hamlin stopped his car at the top of turn four with the right front down. The caution waved, and Hamlin took off, prompting NASCAR to hold him in the pits for two laps for intentionally bringing out the yellow

# 'Hard Racing' Draws Ire Of Junior Nation

RICHMOND, Va. — Denny Hamlin came 18 laps from a perfect weekend at Richmond Int'l Raceway.

Kyle Busch was left looking for a police escort out of the track and

just might need one for the rest of the year. Busch and Dale Earnhardt, Jr. battled for the lead over the final 17 laps until the two made contact in turn three with two to go. Earnhardt took a trip to the outside wall, and Busch drew the ire of Junior Nation, which erupted in rage when Earnhardt spun.

"For some reason, they [Earnhardt's legion of fans] are awfully

confused," Busch said after the race. "They were giving me the No. 1 sign the last 10 laps of the race and I was in second place still. I don't know if that's too many Dale, Jr. Budweisers or they're

AMPed up or what.

Busch made light of the fact that he's now No. 1 on the Junior-Nation hit list, even though it was in all fairness a "racing deal.

"Junior and I were just racing hard, and from the front-end replay, it looked like he came down a little bit," Busch said. "It's just a part of racing. I probably could have moved down a little bit lower in the corner and he could have moved up higher in the corner. It's just the product of good, hard racing."

Earnhardt was a little more pointed.

"Whether it's fair or not, he [Busch] is going to need some security," said Earnhardt, who looked absolutely drained. "Tony [Eury, Jr.] said it looked like Kyle got loose underneath me. That happens.

"He got a great run off turn two and nearly got by me. He gave me room off on the outside of turn two, so I wouldn't say that was intentional going into three. If he had wanted to, he could have just thrown me in the fence off two.

'We had been racing each other earlier and had no problems. I have done that before, and that is what happens if he got loose under-




### **Toledo Memories**

President and CEO William McMichael, is in a mountainous section of Sullivan Country famed for such gigantic weekend hotel havens as The Concord and Grossinger's. In the years surrounding WWII this area was very popular with Jewish visitors from New York City and its environs. Sullivan

County, however, has changed in recent years and its largest city Monticello, with its sizeable airport, is no longer viewed as predominantly Jewish. The new Monticello motorsport facility and its New Jersey sidekick follow the trend of new road courses being looked at as more than auto-race tracks, but rather vehicular playgrounds for moneyed car lovers. The Monticello track itself, a road course with significant elevation changes, is located 90 minutes from New York City. The success of Virginia Int'l Raceway as a dual-purpose facility prompted its New York City-based businessman owner **Harvey Siegel** to embark on a similar project, New Jersey Motorsports Park, near Millville, which is convenient to the Philadelphia metropolis and is nearly complete. The grand opening of the all-new NJMP is this summer with a Grand-Am road race. With Monticello now joining the group, lovers of fine performance cars will soon have three Eastern locations to choose from.

Back in the days when Ye Ed was learning the auto-racing trade as a helper on a racing car, there was no one lower on racing's social scale than such a helper. "Stooge" was the degrading term used to describe we race track low-lifes. How things have changed! Crew chief is today's term for the graduate stooge of yesterday. Watching skilled Larry McReynolds as host analyzing racing car problems and on-track tactics with crew chiefs Chad Knaus and Bootie Barker recently, one quickly recognizes the broad talents of these skilled individuals. The detailed explanation by Knaus of his efforts that led to victory by his driver **Jimmie Johnson**, which ended Hendrick Racing's 2008 win drought, was a true revelation. Knaus analyzed the ongoing race in 10-lap segments as to fuel usage and, unlike rival crew chiefs, skipped a final fuel stop and wound up winning. # Rahal Hopes To Become Indianapolis' Youngest Winner

INDIANAPOLIS

ver since Graham Rahal made history as the youngest driver to win a major auto race when the 19-year-old won the Honda Grand Prix of St. Petersburg, he has become the face of the "unified" IndyCar

He has the famous last name of a winning driver of the Indianapolis 500. Although he wasn't around when his father, Bobby, drove to victory in the 1986 Indy 500, he recalls the day when Buddy Rice drove his father's car to victory in the 2004 500-Mile Race.

Young Rahal wasn't at Indianapolis Motor Speedway that day because he was competing in a sports-car race at Lime Rock, Conn. He would one day race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, but on the road course, not the famous 2.5-mile oval that has been in operation since 1909.

Rahal, who finished second in the 2006 Liberty Challenge Indy Pro Series race as part of the United States Grand Prix week end, had never raced on an oval until the April 27 IndyCar Series race at Kansas Speedway.

On Sunday, he got his first experience at the most famous oval in the world as the rookie prepared for his first Indy 500.

"It's tough; it's fast," Rahal said. "The speed at which the walls come up on you is unlike any other place. It's a one-lane race track, which we're not used to in this series. It is tough to be pushing it hard but not over the limit. It's a tough place. There is a lot of learning left.'

Rahal was one of 13 new drivers that participated in Sunday's Rookie Orientation Program for the 92nd Indianapolis 500 May 25. He hit the track shortly after 1 p.m., passed all four phases of ROP by 2:14 p.m. and was allowed to practice at any speed.

He completed 51 laps with a fast lap of 218.619 miles per hour. "The car was good and I felt confident out there," young Rahal said. "It's day one of a lot of days here at the track. I don't think it has hit me yet. It's going to take some time. It's cool to be here as a participant, it's cool to see all the fans, but I still have a ways to go.

"I think it is important to have ROP. If somebody doesn't pass it, they shouldn't be allowed to race. This is a daunting place and it's important that they do stuff like this."

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# Youthful Challengers Stalk Posse's Veteran Shoes

MECHANICSBURG, PA.

hen glancing over the Central Pennsylvania sprint-car results, familiar names like Fred Rahmer and Greg Hodnett dot the top 10.

However, there are some young Pa. Posse drivers beginning to make an impact on sprint-car racing in the Keystone State.

One of the most promising young racers is 18-year-old Cody Darrah. He's the nephew of World of Outlaws late-model driver Rick Eckert and has veteran mechanic Lee Stauffer turning the wrenches.

Darrah, a high school senior, has had plenty of bad luck this season, although he does have an impressive third-place finish at Williams Grove Speedway and a fast time against the World of Outlaws at Volusia Speedway Park in Florida.

This is Darrah's third season in a sprint car, but he missed half of last season recovering from a broken arm. In his rook-

ie season, he focused on racing at one track per week.
"I'm learning now

"I'm learning new things each night I go out," said Darrah.
"I'm struggling to get my first win. I think when I get past that, it might come a little easier. I feel more confident in the car and I'm getting better, but I

have a long way to go.

"Lee has been a big mentor, and he's like a brother to me off the track. Even if I feel like I'm doing all I can, he's telling me what I need to do better.

Many of the young Posse drivers, including Darrah, race sprinters that are owned by their families, and in most cases have sponsors that are family-owned businesses.

As Darrah's father, Joe, points out, these young drivers usually would not be given the chance to learn the 410 sprints from one of the established car owners, so the families must step up to give them that chance.

Several other young drivers have been able to crack the top 10 against the Pa. Posse veterans.

Ryan Taylor, 19, held off World of Outlaws regular Craig Dollansky to finish third at Lincoln Speedway in March. Taylor is in his second season and has focused mostly on Lincoln. Taylor said he hopes to get some experience at other tracks this season.

A.J. Michael, 21, finished sixth at Lincoln after leading 17 laps. It was Michael's best performance so far as he begins his second season. Maybe more impressive than the finish was Michael's move to retake the lead for a few extra laps from veteran Stevie Smith before losing the lead for good on a restart.

Michael Carber, 20, is in his fourth season and has four victories to his credit, including two last season at Williams Grove. Carber is one of the younger drivers racing for a car owner who is not family.

Although he's 29, Pat Cannon is a rookie in the 410 class and scored a victory at the Grove in March. Cannon will run 410s part-time this season with a focus on 358s. He won the 358-sprint-car opener at the Grove.

The most recent young driver with a good finish was 18-year-old Nick Schlauch, Jr., who finished fifth at Lincoln.

Something all these young drivers must prove is the ability to pass cars to score victories and top-five finishes. Starting up front and gassing it around the speedways is one thing, but starting outside the top six and getting to the front is another. We'll watch their progression throughout the season.

Rahmer turned 50 years old in March and is off to a great start with three wins at Lincoln and one at Williams Grove. He leads the point standings at both tracks.

Chad Layton is also off to a good start with six top-five finishes in nine races. He's yet to win, but it won't be long.

# Applause For The Move To Ethanol Racing Fuel

want to applaud the Indy Racing League for its decision two years ago to implement a plan to run its Honda engines on a 100-percent, Ethanol-based fuel, reducing the need for oilbased fuels in its now-very-popular racing series.

Ditto for the American Le Mans Series, where not only Ethanol is being promoted, the organization is encouraging teams to experiment with other forms of non-oil/gas-related fuels for competition consumption.

Indeed, this is progress...except for one thing.

Currently, the national media is frowning upon the use of corn for the production of fuels to run automobiles because of the current and/or coming food crisis. There's already been a rationing of rice at Wal-Mart, a first in this writer's recollection of life events. As for commodity prices, corn and rice have gone through the roof.

Thus, the old adages "you can't see the forest for the trees" or "no matter what you do, it's wrong" fits well in our current Ethanol plight, where daily barrages of "news" now point to the fact that America may be "doing wrong" using its corn for people to drive cars and trucks instead of feeding the

world

OK, I'll buy that argument to a degree if it weren't for one big issue...government farm subsidies. Specifically, a "government farm subsidy" pays farmers to either grow or NOT grow a crop.

According to the *Washington Post*, which conducted a nineyear investigation, the federal government has paid at least \$1.3 billion in subsidies for rice and other crops since 2000 to individuals who do no farming at all, according to the newspaper's analysis of government records. Can you imagine if the government gave even a paltry \$10 million to the IRL and ALMS to help in its study, use and implementation of alternative fucls?

Additionally, instead of paying more to farmers in need, larger subsidy payments have gone to millionaire landowners, foreign speculators and absentee landlords, as well as real farmers.

Granted, most of the money goes to real farmers who grow crops on their land, the *Post* said. Furthermore, farms are under no obligation to grow a crop that might be subsidized for "growing." (Yes, it works both ways). Farmers can switch to a different crop, raise cattle or even grow Christmas trees — and still receive the government payments. The *Post* goes on to say that cash comes with so few restrictions that subdivision developers who buy farmland advertise that homeowners can collect farm subsidies on their new backyards.

These subsidy payments account for half of the nation's expanding agricultural-subsidy system, a complex web that the *Washington Post* says has little basis in fairness or efficiency. What began in the 1930s as a limited safety net for working farmers has swollen into a far-flung infrastructure of entitlements that has cost \$172 billion over the past decade. Efforts to overhaul the farm subsidy network have been repeatedly thwarted by powerful farm-state lawmakers in Congress allied with agricultural interests, the *Post* reported.

So, before the IRL or ALMS gets an unfair bashing for using corn to run its race cars, let's have a better understanding of what's really going on. If it ever gets to the point where people in the U.S. are dying because we're growing corn to drive cars on the street and track, I'll be the first in line to support stopping the practice.

However, now is NOT the time to criticize auto racing and those who buy Ethanol for their highway vehicles to improve our current dependence on foreign oil.

Schatz knows the history of Knoxville Raceway very well and he added his name to that history Saturday night.

He put himself in the elite company of drivers that have won on opening night at the famed half-mile oval.

On top of that, the two-time defending Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series champiand two-time defending Knoxville Nationals winner, picked up his first series victory since joining team owner Tony Stewart.

We can now breath a sigh of relief and go on to next weekend and try to win races again.

Schatz lined up third for the 25-lap event, which took three full starts to get going due to a yellow flag and a red flag for a Tim Shaffer flip. On the third start, Schatz quickly challenged Jac Haudenschild for the runner-up spot, passing him a couple of times coming off the fourth corner, only to have Haudenschild win a drag race down the frontstretch. This allowed Kinser to open a sizeable lead. Schatz ran third for the first five laps, before getting around Haudenschild and setting his sights on Kinser. He used lapped traffic to his advantage as he chased down the 20-time series champion as the laps wound down.

"You always have to be patient, but tonight I was not," Schatz said. "I kept pushing and pushing and pushing. When you are as hungry to win a race as we have been, you just have to go and I went. It could have cost.



# Sucker Car Brought Ground Effects To Auto Racing

Air is free. Horsepower costs money.

That phrase was coined in the 1960s when race-car design was much less restricted than it is today, and when race-car aerodynamics were not well understood.

The greatest innovator in sports-car racing was Jim Hall, who built his Chaparrals in Midland, Texas, with an open line to General Motors in Detroit. His 1966 CanAm series entry, the Chaparral 2E, featured the first adjustable, suspension-mounted wing. Similar wings became universal in CanAm and Formula One before being banned in 1969 after several F-1 wings collapsed at speed.

Just about the time the high wings went away, GM engineers Don Cox and Don Gates turned their attention from the air above the car to the air under it. Gates went to work for Hall in 1969 and brought the basic hardware with him that would be developed into the Chaparral 2J, the Sucker Car, which introduced ground effects to race car design.

Its racing record was unimpressive. It appeared for only four CanAm

races during the 1970 season and never led a lap. But it won three pole positions by almost ridiculous margins and generated world-class levels of both interest and controversy.

The 2J wasn't handsome. It was plain white, blunt-nosed and slabsided. Its secret was in the rear-engine bay, which contained not only a big-block aluminum Chevy, but a modified Rockwell JLO snowmobile engine driving two exhaust fans by belts. The underside was sealed by sliding Lexan skirts, so the exhaust fans literally sucked the air out from under the car, creating far more downforce than a wing, at any speed, and without the drag penalty.


After a spring full of rumors, the car appeared at the July 1970 Watkins Glen CanAm, with world champion Jackie Stewart driving on a one-race deal. Stewart qualified third and ran there for 15 laps, but the track was breaking up on several corners and the debris sucked up damaged the fan motor and the drive belts.


The Sucker Car made three more appearances, each with Vic Elford driving. It won all three poles, each by a margin of one full second or more, but suffered fan motor trouble at Road Atlanta and Riverside and blew its main engine in race morning warm-up at Laguna Seca.

The exhaust fans were ruled to be illegal "movable aerodynamic devices" and the Chaparral 2J was never to race again.

Almost a decade later, that other great innovator, Colin Chapman, achieved ground effects legally and more simply by using underbody venturi tunnels on the Lotus 78 driven by Mario Andretti. One of the first to adopt Chapman's system was Jim Hall on his Chaparral 2K Indy car — the last of the Chaparrals, which Johnny Rutherford drove to victory in the 1980 Indianapolis 500.

### **MIKE MOSLEY**

Mike Mosley was a mainstay in American Indy- car racing during the 1970s.

The Oklahoma City-born driver made his Indianapolis Motor Speedway debut at age 20, failing to qualify. But he returned the following year and made the first of 15 starts in the Memorial Day

classic.

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Mosley's best finish at Indianapolis was third in 1979. He also had a pair of front-row starts at Indianapolis.

Overall, Mosley made 170 Indy car starts and won five times, including

three victories at The Milwaukee Mile. He posted 80 top-10 finishes during his Indy-car career.

Mosley was killed in an off-road vehicle accident near Riverside, Calif., in December 1984. He was 38 years old. 



**P** ole Day at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway has long produced some of the most dramatic, memorable moments in racing. And for good reason.

The Indianapolis 500 being one of the most historic, revered races in the world, earning

the pole there has often been second only to winning the race itself in status and recognition. There are drivers who never won the 500, yet became legendary for their Pole Day accomplishments. Rex Mays, Duke Nalon, Walt Faulkner, Fred Agabashian, Jack McGrath, Pat O'Connor and Eddie Sachs fall into this category.

That high-level shot at immortality, combined with a demanding qualifying format, four-consecutive laps on a high-speed, 2.5-mile oval where even the slightest bobble can cost several starting positions, creates unparalleled intensity, competition and drama.

Six-time pole winner Rick Mears states that he held his breath for the entire four-lap run. Mario Andretti insists that qualifying at Indianapolis demands more concentration, focus and bravery than anything else he's done in racing.

Like everything associated with the nearly 100-year-old Speedway, the high drama of Pole Day stretches far back into its history, although, interestingly, not to the very beginning. Starting order for the first four 500s was determined either by the order of entry or by a pre-race draw-

The first pole winner determined by a timed run was Howdy Wilcox in 1915 at 98.90 miles per hour in a Stutz. Prior to his run, Wilcox was so confident he would win the pole that he made Harry Stutz agree to award him his diamond lapel pin if he did. Wilcox got the pin, an indicator, even then, of the importance of being the pole winner at Indianapolis.

That importance only increased with time. In recent years its status, perhaps, has diminished somewhat. Yet, when Pole Day is mentioned, motorsports aficionados all over the world understand that it's the first day of qualifying at Indianapolis. At no other race do the pre-race events carry that impact.

### The Lengthy Run for the Pole

Howdy Wilcox's (right) pole-winning run in 1915 was a single timed lap. That remained the procedure until 1920, when the four-consecutive lap run, with the average speed determining starting position, was introduced. The first pole winner under that format was racing immortal and 1915 500 winner Ralph De

The four-lap format has been a mainstay at the Speedway for 70 years, but for a time qualifying was a 10-lap affair. From 1933 through 1938, Speedway management attempted to use endurance as a drama element. It certainly created that. At 25 miles and taking nearly 12 minutes to complete, runs for the pole produced blown engines, exploding tires and, with only a three-gallon fuel allotment, cars coughing to a stop in the middle of a potential pole-winning effort.



### What to Expect This Pole Day

Unification will add great excitement to this year's Pole Day contest. Both of Newman/Haas/Lanigan's drivers, 19-year-old phenom Graham Rahal and Justin Wilson,

have the talent to make their presence felt. They lack oval-track experience but have a week of practice to get acclimated to the Speedway. Their team, which has won fourconsecutive Champ Car championships, certainly knows how to prepare a race car.

A couple of other former Champers that will have their act together by May include Will Power and Paul Tracy, if Tracy can land a decent ride by that time. If he does, look out! The other prime pole contenders will come from the IRL's big three teams — Penske, Andretti Green and Ganassi.

Penske is always primed for Indy, and Helio Castoneves (right) could easily repeat his

pole win of 2007. Marco Andretti has shown a new aggressiveness this season that very well could spill over to a legitimate run for the pole. Of course, Andretti's AGR teammates Tony Kanaan and Danica Patrick also have to be considered.

Patrick has always taken easily to the Brickyard and now has the confidence of a winner. Dan Wheldon, of the Ganassi duo that includes Scott Dixon, is hungry to rectify what he considers a disappointing 2007. Few can drive a loose race car better than Wheldon, and at Indy loose is fast.

Pole Day 2008 might not immediately be a return to an era when crowds rivaled raceday turnouts, but it very well could be a corner turner on the way to a renewed renown or a great racing tradition.

### moments, but here are a few that should rank near the top: **1953** — On a drizzly, overcast day, Bill Vukovich finally took to the track. A light drizzle

turned to a downpour in the middle of turn four on his last lap. The car sideways, rooster tails of water flung high off the tires, Vuky never backed off and flashed under the checkered flag the pole winner.

**1954** — The 140 mph barrier fell, as Jack McGrath grabbed the pole with a 141.287

**1962**— 150 mph is finally achieved when Parnelli Jones slipped through that mystical barrier with a four-lap average of 150.370 mph.

**1963** — The new Lotus Fords — not speed — was the draw. The outpouring of fans stunned Speedway officials and Indiana State Police. The crowd was estimated at 250,000, many still trying to get into the track after qualifying had already started. It was the first of the massive Pole Day crowds.

1964 — For the first time in Indianapolis history, the entire front row was made up of rear-engine cars. Jim Clark took the pole, flanked by Bobby Marshman and Roger Ward. The Golden Era of the front-engine roadster at Indianapolis had ended.

**1970** — From out of nowhere, Johnny Rutherford in a 3-year-old Eagle nearly snatched the pole from favorite and provisional pole holder Al Unser. Rutherford fell just three thousandths of a second short as he flashed under the checkered flag to the thunderous approval of the huge crowd.

**1971** — From out of nowhere II: In a run reminiscent of Rutherford's 1970 challenge, unheralded Peter Revson successfully bumped pole favorite Mark Donohue out of the top spot with a dramatic, crowd-pleasing run.

**1978** — Another and perhaps the most significant speed barrier falls when Tom Snev becomes the first driver to break 200 mph. 1991 — Rick Mears (left) breaks his own most number of poles record with his sixth. No one has come close since.

### It's a New Track Record

<u>1974 A.J. Foyt</u>

The primary appeal for Pole Day fans was always the exhilarating possibility of new track records. Despite 100 years of trying to slow the cars down, the track record has been established on Pole Day 36 times. That does not include, however, the multiple times throughout the day that records were set and re-broken before the final one was in the books. That considered, track records have actually been set 72 times during runs for

Because of aggressive efforts to slow the cars down, it's been 13 years since fans have heard the goose-bump raising call made famous by Tom Carnegie, the legendary Speedway announcer from 1946 through 2006, "It's a neeew traaaack record!"

No doubt one reason for diminished Pole Day crowds.

"You don't have days like this. Dominating days like this just don't happen. Usually, when it does, you have an issue at the end. To me, it almost wasn't that surprising. I've had these issues before at Bristol and some other race tracks.3

Hamlin ran over something on the track, which tore a V-shaped puncture in the right front. He immediate-

ly radioed his team with the news. "I definitely felt it," he said. "I was in complete ride mode all race long. Letting guys get close to me and then just pulling back away from them at leisure. You know, we had the car to beat still after that last pit stop. It was everything we needed. I was just out there riding and I knew right away. I went in one corner and it fell down in the right front, and I knew we had a tire going down. They said the tires looked good, but I knew that we had an issue and it just kept getting worse and worse. There's nothing we could do there. Hopefully, it was going to last to the end and it didn't.'



Busch bristled a bit when asked if the move was intentional.

"If I wanted to take him out, I probably would have done it on the last lap where I still could have won the race. Busch said. "It was the product of good, hard racing. I hate that it happened, but we just didn't give each other enough room.'

Compounding the incident was the fact that Earnhardt was two laps away from breaking a 71-race winless streak — two years ago Saturday, as a matter of fact.

Up to that point, Hamlin was untouchable. Over the first 300 laps, only A.J. Allmendinger crossed the start/finish line before Hamlin, and that was because he staved out under caution. Hamlin broke the record for laps led at Richmond with his performance. Bobby Allison formerly held the mark since 1979.

Busch, who ran second to Hamlin much of the night, said there wasn't any catching his teammate.

"It's just a bummer deal for him," Busch said. "He had the field covered. He drove a flawless race and had spectacular pit stops. No mistakes on his part and no mistakes in the pits. Those guys deserved it.'

Bowyer was understandably pleased with his second-career NASCAR Sprint Cup Series victory.

You know, the fastest car does not always win, and that was the case with the BB&T Chevrolet tonight," Bowyer said. "We were fast all night, and once we were up there, we were able to run a lot better. You know, you've got to be able to be there for the taking at least, and we were close enough to do just that. It was pretty wild out there. I think it was bound to happen. I think, you know, I was watching it and Richard (Childress, team owner) was on the radio saying, 'It's going to happen,' and sure enough, it did happen."

Bowyer said he thought the top two

got together in a racing incident.

"They were putting on a show for a while; I thought so, anyway," Bowyer said. "They were racing hard. That's what racing at Richmond is all about in my opinion. It just didn't work out.

"I told the cops I didn't know why they were escorting me in here. I told them, they better get on and escort Kyle Busch out of here. It was meant to be, I guess."

"Sometimes I make mistakes, and other people have to pay for them. Tonight it was the 88 bunch, unfortunately," Busch said. "If I apologized up and down to them [Junior Nation], it wouldn't make a difference.

For Earnhardt, it was a heartbreaking end to what might have been his first victory for Hendrick Motorsports. For Busch, it's a headache he didn't need.

'The worst part about it is that I have been priding myself on running good all year and I was in a position for a win," Earnhardt said. "I ran hard and got wrecked. I had a topthree car and should have finished in the top three. I was going for the win today and just ended up on the hook.

Busch was between a rock and a hard place. "I feel like it's like that," Busch said.

"Everybody probably is racing around the track just scared to death of wrecking Dale, Jr., so why should I be different? You know, that was just a product of good, hard racing. I apologize that it happened and I hate that it

There's an added element to this tangle: Junior is driving the car that Busch was removed from at the end of last season. Rick Pigeon, who has been with Hendrick Motorsports for many years, came down to Busch's pit after the race and confronted him.

"If you know Rick Pigeon, you know Rick Pigeon," Busch said. "He was a friend of mine and has always been a good friend of Dale, Jr.'s, but for him to come down here like that was a little uncalled for. It's not all about him all the time, and he'll know what I mean by that.

ichmond Int'l Raceway and Bristol (Tenn.) Motor Speedway have always been popular stops on the NASCAR Sprint Cup tour.

The waiting list at Bristol is a couple of years long, and Richmond tickets were hot sellers no matter what. The track sold out Saturday's race, but the sell-out did not come until race day.

Gas prices, the increasing cost of attending a NASCAR race and the allure of not fighting traffic, rowdy rednecks and the hustle and bustle are all factors.

It is going to be interesting to watch how the average NASCAR fan weathers the economic slowdown this summer. With gas reaching toward \$4 a gallon, it doesn't make much sense to fill the RV with

high-cost high-test and motor to the track, as NASCAR fans have done for nigh on a half-centurv.

Even if you don't have an RV or access to one, it's expensive. Hotels engage in the timehonored, free-market principle of raising prices to what the market will bear, and with-

in 40 miles of the track, that market pays around \$160 a night on average for the meanest of digs.

Camping fees are probably the cheapest way to get to a NASCAR race and stay without busting the bank, but you still have the problem of getting there, so it's a wash, really.

The cost of tickets is open to debate. You'll pay as much or more to attend any major sporting event, so NASCAR is competitive with other sports in that regard.

The average NASCAR fan is a rugged individualist to begin with, and passionate to boot. He or she will find a way to get to as many races as makes sense, and if they can't go, they don't. They'll watch

on TV, listen to the radio or, in increasing numbers, watch on the

All of this is nothing new to NASCAR. We've been through boom and bust on the economy, and NASCAR is perhaps more susceptible to market forces than the NFL or baseball.

TV ratings are, on average, better than they were last year, and that is a reflection of economy more than the exciting races, although last week's race at Talladega was pretty good in that regard.

The gateway to a long, hot summer awaits, and by the time September

rolls around, we'll see how NASCAR weathered the storm. Scheduling, at least as far as California and Atlanta are concerned, remains a key indicator of how NASCAR feels about the overall health of the sport.

Nobody goes to the first California race, comparatively, and the heat of the Labor Day event

makes Darlington look temperate. Swapping the Atlanta and California or Talladega dates could be a winner. Atlanta has its own troubles attendance-wise, even though the racing is pretty good and the market is a good one, or at least has been traditionally.

NASCAR has to juggle the twin pillars of business and competition, and for the most part they do so as a matter of course. But when one of those pillars is on the verge of hitting the ground, adjustments must be made.

This summer — the Summer of '08 will go a long way toward determining if the sanctioning body can keep both in the air on a consistent

# Wilkerson Keeps Chugging

MADISON, Ill. — Tim Wilkerson denied John Force Racing's Mike Neff his first career win on the same day Neff's boss made history at the 12th annual O'Reilly NHRA Midwest Nationals presented by Castrol.

Wilkerson earned his first win at his hometown track, his second of the season and seventh of his career when he drove his Levi, Ray & Shoup Chevy Impala SS to a 4.874-second finish at 317.27 miles per hour to Neff's 4.886 at 321.58 in his Old Spice Ford Mustang.

Early in the day, Force cemented his position as the most prolific Funny Car driver in NHRA history when he reached 1,000 round wins, the first driver to do so, in a first-round match-up with Ron Capps.

The win marked Wilkerson's second victory over a JFR entry this year — he defeated team owner and driver John Force's daughter Ashley in Las Vegas. He enters the season's next event in Bristol leading the NHRA POWERade Series points for the first time in his 11-year career after qualifying No. 1 at the event.

"The emotions are out of control," Wilkerson said. "It was all I could do at the other end of the track just to get out of the car...It'll get the mon-key off our back. We ended up qualifying No. 1 a couple of times this year and couldn't even get out of the first round. We're pretty proud. My guys are just doing a terrific job working on my car, and the track was good all day.'

After watching new teammate and Pro Stock Motorcycle transplant Antron Brown win two of the season's first six events, 2007 title contender Rod Fuller has his own reason to celebrate. Fuller piloted his Caterpillar dragster to a 4.525 at 328.70 around Tony Schumacher's 4.583 at 325.45 in his U.S. Armybacked dragster.

'I kind of had a chip on my shoulder from what happened to me last year, leading the points all year long and losing to him (Schumacher, the reigning POWERade Series world champion)," Fuller said. "It's gratifying when you beat him. What else can I say about David Powers Motorsports? Four finals in a row for

us and three wins. It just tells you how strong this organization is.

"I take a lot of pride in (Brown's) success because we're really close to each other. He gives me a lot of compliments by saying how much I helped him, and I have helped him a lot. It's almost like we're brothers and it's like watching my little brother Tony racing. If I can't win, I want him to win. I always say drag racing is like a merry-go-round. You just have to wait for your time to get on.'

Kurt Johnson earned his first victory since Phoenix of last year when he drove his ACDelco Chevy Cobalt to a 6.631 at 209.30 for a win over Dave Connolly's 6.651 at 208.78 in his Charter Communications Chevy Cobalt. It is his 37th-career victory and third at Gateway (2005, 1998).

"It was pretty tough out there," Johnson said. "There was a lot of tire shake...I think everybody just kind of underestimated the race track. It was exceptional for me. We ran a .58 this morning and it's hard to touch it after that, but we knew we

had to make some changes. We changed the gears around; we changed the clutch around. The whole ACDelco crew just came together and we did what we needed

Andrew Hines turned in his 16thconsecutive run in the six-second range to earn his second-consecutive and 15th-career win on his Screamin' Eagle Vance & Hines Harley-Davidson.

'The V-Rod's just going straight, making good runs," Hines said. "It's the same engine we ran in Atlanta. We tried a different engine on Friday and it just didn't seem to have as many ponies as this one. We wanted to get back the No. 1 qualifying spot, and we put the engine back in yesterday and just couldn't find the set-up because it was making so much horsepower here in St. Louis.

"It was throwing us for a loop...but winning from the No. 3 spot, that still means a lot. Four races in three finals and two wins, it's just a tribute to how good my team is.

# *Imagine Force* Still Winning At Age 89

ohn Force posed after his firstround victory in Sunday's O'Reilly Midwest Nationals at Gateway Int'l Raceway with four fat Goodyear slicks cleverly arranged to

spell out "1,000."
The Funny Car icon and 14-time champion had just recorded his unprecedented 1,000th elimination round-win in National Hot Rod Ass'n competition. After a week that lauded daughter Ashley for beating him at Atlanta and becoming the first woman to win a Funny Car final, he reveled in his 59th birthday cheer in the shadow of the St. Louis Arch. He received a crystal trophy commemorating his achievement, kissed wife Laurie, kissed Senior Vice President of Racing Operations Graham Light, and turned his attention back to a race that saw his rookie driver, Mike Neff, reach the finals.

John Force Racing cranked out the stats of his 30-year career, including such esoteric tidbits as "Force has won 111 rounds against drivers with surnames beginning with the letter B" and "263 of Force's 1,000 roundwins have come without facial hair."

Perhaps the fun of this moment, though, came in Force's remarks the week before, when he was preparing for his 500th race, at Atlanta, and Top Fuel dominator Tony Schumacher was set to notch his 250th.

Said Force then, "Well, he ain't going to catch me til I drop dead, because I'm going to drive this old thing until I drop. I've just fallen in love with it all over again.'

Schumacher paid his respects, then joined in the kidding: "He told the media that unless he croaked that I was never going to catch him. He said he's never going to quit. Well, unless he wants to run his Funny Car on Geritol, he may not have a choice.

Force has proven that he does have a choice. As he lay in a hospital bed in Dallas last fall, battered badly by a racing accident that inspired sweeping safety measures. Force made the decision to race again.

Many wagged their heads that he wasn't ready. Some feared he would

hurt himself worse. But John Force knew John Force better than anyone, and he worked like a man possessed to regain his strength. His stubbornness carried him through days of painful and grueling physical therapy that made him cry and made him angry. But he never lost sight of his goal: to be back in a Funny Car. So hmmm...Fast-forward to 2038...

John Force is amazing everybody. Imagine — 89 years old...28 championships...and reaching that 2,000round-win plateau. Finally he did it, but he had to beat granddaughter Autumn Hight, oldest child of 10time champion Robert Hight, to do it. He and daughter Ashley always have raced together, it seems, for at age 55, she just captured round win No.

1,000, beating young Bob Tasca VII.

Forgive me — I'm an old man, reminiscing..

"It's just so different now," Force said. "We didn't know what we were going to do when nitro got outlawed 20 years ago. But who knew these ole hot rods would run on hydrogen power laced with a compost mixture of potato peels, grass clippings and stale beer?

'Now I'll shut up," Force said. "I see Caden Capps is standing here, waiting to talk." Capps, Senior VicePresident of Racing Operations once NHRA and IHRA merged and purchased a financially struggling NASCAR operation, started to take the microphone and congratulate Force. But Force had something else left to say.

"Just one more thing. Caden Capps, I beat your old man — Ron Capps to get that 1,000th round-win, back there in St. Louis in 2008. Never will forget it. He left on me, but I ran him

# **Hamlin Hurries At Home**

RICHMOND, Va. — Friday was a good day for Denny Hamlin.

First, he earned the pole for Saturday's Crown Royal Presents the Dan Lowry 400 NASCAR Sprint Cup Series race at Richmond Int'l Raceway, and then he out-smarted Kevin Harvick to win the Lipton Tea 250 for the NASCAR Nationwide Series.

"When those guys (Harvick, Carl Edwards and third-place Mike Bliss) stayed out, I knew this was our race to lose," Hamlin gushed. "It was our race. I told them (his crew) that, that I knew it. Kevin had a hard decision to make, and I knew that one of these days, circumstances were going to come out in our favor.

"That's the way it happened tonight."

Hamlin, born and raised about 15 minutes up the road from RIR in Chesterfield, led a parade of cars onto pit road with 22 laps to go, taking four tires and fuel in 15.35 seconds. The first three cars, driven by Harvick, Edwards and Bliss, stayed out for track position.

Crew chief Dave Rogers ordered the stop, saying it was a no-brainer.

"We knew the only way we could steal this one was to come in and put four tires on it," Rogers said. "We were a third-place car all day. Track position is so important, and you can't fault Kevin and those guys. They were in a hard place, and I've been in that situation before.

"We were third, and we knew we couldn't pass them if we didn't come to pit road."

Hamlin, who restarted fourth, made Rogers look like a wizard, arcing high in turn one with 10 laps left to grab third, and getting Edwards off turn four on the same lap for second.

With nine laps remaining in the scheduled 250-lap event, Hamlin powered his No. 20 Z-Line Designs Toyota Camry to the inside and passed Harvick for the lead. Despite waiting through another caution for Bryan Clauson's spin, Hamlin calmly drove away for the victory under the greenwhite-checkered format.

"This means more to me to win at Richmond than any trophy I could ever have," Hamlin said. "I can hear the fans here, even over all the noise

here in victory lane, and that means a lot to me."

It was Hamlin's sixth career NASCAR Nationwide Series victory and his first here at Richmond. The victory was also Toyota's fifth-straight NNS victory and seventh in 11 races so far this season.

Edwards led 126 laps and Harvick paced 98, as they had the two best cars all night. It just didn't work out for either of them. Harvick held on to finish second, followed by Hamlin's Toyota teammate Kyle Busch, David Ragan and Steven Wallace. Edwards was sixth at the end.

Harvick said he was darned if he did and darned if he didn't.

"Fifteen laps to go, what do you do?," he asked. "I've been caught on both sides of that, but it only cost us one spot. I was pitting, until I saw the 60 (Edwards) and the 1 (Bliss) behind him stay up. I figured more cars would stay out."

Edwards was pragmatic about it.

"Harvick and I were up there leading and we just didn't pit and everybody else did," Edwards said. "That was it. But they had like 10 cars between us and the guy behind us, so they all got time to think about what they were gonna do. By watching the leaders stay out, it's an easy decision then. I should have pitted. It's just a mistake."

For Rogers, it was his third-straight victory, with three different drivers, in the Nationwide Series. Asked what he was doing up on the box that had led to such success, Rogers cracked,

"Asking for a raise."

It was a rough night for Busch, who fell down a lap in the early going and needed the free pass on lap 146 to get back in it.

He got back in the top 10 at lap 200, and was sixth and closing on lap 218 when Derrike Cope triggered an accident on the front stretch. That caution set up Hamlin's victory.

Busch restarted sixth and gained one spot on lap 234 when another caution waved for Ryan Hackett's spin on the frontstretch.

He pitted with Hamlin and the two leap-frogged the cars on older tires to the finish.

Busch might have gotten second had he not been hit by the onrushing Wallace off turn two on the final lap. Wallace got Busch sideways, but the youngster saved it and got back in it, chasing Wallace up the track and out of third place.

"He's a boy playing in a man's sport, and I don't have to play those kinds of games," a clearly vexed Busch said of Wallace after the race. "If he wants to play like that, then we'll do that."

Busch walked back to Wallace's car after the race was over, leaned into the car to talk to Wallace and had Wallace grab his helmet. "I told him that if he messes with the bull, he's gonna get the horns," Busch said.

Edwards gained on point-leader Clint Bowyer, trailing by just nine points heading to Darlington. Busch, winner of three races so far this season, is 21 points back.

# Will Power On Top On Opening Day

INDIANAPOLIS — As Indianapolis Motor Speedway opened Sunday for the 92nd Indianapolis 500, it was a day for rookie drivers to get the attention.

Before any new driver is cleared to compete in practice and qualifications for the May 25 Indy 500, they must first go through the Rookie Orientation Program. Each driver must run a set number of laps in four phases with each phase increasing in speed. Once they pass ROP, they are no longer under speed restrictions and can begin building up speed for Saturday's Pole Day qualifications.

In recent years, there have been a few talented rookies that usually pass through ROP with ease, but it's much different in the unified era of the IndyCar Series.

With so many of the drivers coming over from the Champ Car Series after unification, one-third of this year's Indy 500 starting lineup could be drivers making their first start in the biggest race of the year.

There were 13 drivers that took to the 2.5-mile oval Sunday, with former Champ Car star Will Power the fastest of the newcomers at 220.694 miles per hour. After breezing through all four phases of his rookie test, this year's Toyota Grand Prix of Long Beach winner ran 93 laps, just one lap short of Oriol Servia, who was third quick at 220.102 mph.

"We were first out and last in," Power said. "Initially, when I went out I thought, 'How the hell do you go flat here?" But we crept up through it.

"We had a pretty safe car there at the end. It was pretty solid. I was happy to get flat all the way around because that takes you to the next level and now we start trimming the car out (for speed)."

E.J. Viso was second fastest at 220.445 mph.

The initial phase of ROP is five laps with consistent speeds of 200-205 mph followed by subsequent five-lap phases of 205-210 mph, 210-215 mph and 215-plus mph.

Ten of the 13 drivers passed ROP on Sunday. Power, Jaime Camara, Jay Howard, Ryan Hunter-Reay, Alex Lloyd, Hideki Mutoh, Graham Rahal, Oriol Servia, Viso and Justin Wilson passed all four phases. Enrique Bernoldi completed three phases and may complete the fourth phase at any point later in the month.

Mario Moraes completed three laps late in the day, while Mario Dominguez did not take the track. Both drivers must complete the first three phases of ROP Monday to remain eligible to compete in the Indianapolis 500.

In addition to the 13 drivers that had to pass ROP, Davey Hamilton of Vision Racing and Max Papis of Rubicon Racing/Sam Schmidt Motorsports were required to complete the refresher test, which consists of the final phase of ROP because, although they are veterans, they have not driven an IndyCar in competition in at least one year.

While the first three drivers on Sunday were transition teams new to IndyCar, rookie driver Alex Lloyd was the fourth fastest at 219.964 mph.

Lloyd won the Indy Pro Series (now known as Firestone Indy Lights) title in 2007. That championship got him a contract from team-owner Chip Ganassi to be the team's developmental driver in 2008.

Ganassi has loaned Lloyd to Rahal Letterman Racing for the Indy 500 where he teams up with fellow rookie driver Hunter-Reay.

"It's strange the way it is working because if you look at my timing stand I have my engineers from Target Chip Ganassi Racing and a couple of the Rahal Letterman guys," Lloyd said. "I've got two great teams that have won this race before, and many other races and championships before, and I've got their expertise on both sides working with me. That's great for a first timer here because all of that experience goes a long way."

Lloyd also has two-time Indy 500 winner Arie Luyendyk working with him to help serve as a driving coach throughout the month.

With Sunday and Monday set aside for ROP, it is a huge benefit for the new drivers in this year's race to slowly learn how to drive the demanding Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

They better learn quickly, however, as the full field of veterans take to the race course beginning May 6 with four full days of practice leading up to Saturday's Pole Day.

# **Curry Gets Walking Papers**

INDIANAPOLIS — **Larry Curry** has been released as team manager of Vision Racing.

Curry held that position since the team's inception in 2005 and oversaw the rapid growth of the operation, but was let go in the aftermath of a rules violation for both Vision cars in the Miami-Homestead Speedway opener.

That disallowed the speeds posted by **Ed Carpenter** and **A.J. Foyt IV** after a rear wing violation was discovered in post-qualification technical inspection.

Former crew chief **Keven Kukuliwicz** (a.k.a. Keven Kaye) has been named to the post of team manager, taking on the additional responsibility for the operation of the race team.

Curry was one of the first employees of Vision Racing when team owners **Tony** and **Laura George** formed the team from assets purchased through the sale of Kelley Racing in 2005.

"Larry has been an asset to the growth and building of Vision Racing," George said. "However, after full review of the facts surrounding the disallowance of the

teams qualifying runs at Homestead-Miami Speedway, Larry and I agreed that a breach of what amounts to the

teams code of conduct had occurred, and as team manager he was expected to uphold a very high standard, but in this instance fell short."

Kukuliwicz has also been with the team since its inception.

■ Dario Franchitti made an appearance at Indianapolis Motor Speedway on Monday. Franchitti won the 2007 Indianapolis 500 and the IndyCar Series championship before moving on to the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series as a rookie for Target Chip Ganassi Racing this season.

"It seems really strange to be here and not be driving," Franchitti said. "This is always a very special place. We knew all month last year that we had a very fast car. Both Tony Kanan and I worked well together, but we got into a rhythm where both cars were feeding off each other. We knew we had a great car.

"But during the race we had a problem with one of the dampers on the car and worked on that with understeer. But after that was corrected, I thought we had one of the strongest cars in the race here. Last year we were in the right place at the right time."

Franchitti called his move to NASCAR "the right move at the right time." He also said he has "no remorse whatsoever" in leaving IndyCar because he was ready for a new challenge.

"I'm totally consumed by what I'm doing right now," Franchitti said. "NASCAR takes up all of your time. I don't wake up in the morning thinking 'I wish I was back at Indy,' but I'm sure on race day that will change. It was great when the series unified and there is one IndyCar Series. That is going to be great for the future."

Franchitti continues to recover

from a broken left ankle that he suffered in a crash in the Nationwide Series race at Talladega Superspeedway two weeks ago. He was reevaluated by Indianapolis orthopedic surgeon **Dr. Terry Trammell** on Monday.

Franchitti even quipped that he won a bet with Ganassi on how soon **Danica Patrick** would win a race.

"I told Chip at the Christmas party she was going to win at least one race," Ganassi said. "He said, 'I'm not so sure.' So I made a bet with Chip, team President **Steve Lauletta**, and then **Felix Sabates** wanted to get in on it so I ended up coming out pretty good on that.

"I won \$300."

While Justin Wilson is an Indianapolis 500 rookie, he competed in the 2003 United States Grand Prix, which meant he went the opposite way around the track than on the oval.

"It was cool, I really enjoyed my time going out on Sunday and getting the feel of the circuit," said Wilson, a native of Sheffield, England. "It's four corners, but they are four very cool, fast corners. That is what people said to me before I came here. that this place is like a road circuit with four quick corners unlike an oval with the constant G-force loading in the banking. It's a matter of getting into the flow so when you go into turn one and the car is releasing well and then you go into turn two and look down that long backstraight and you are going 225 miles per hour, it's a really cool feeling.

"The road course you only get a taste of that on the pit straight before going into the infield for this really tight road circuit, it's quite frustrating. Coming here and doing the proper circuit, it feels like it should feel."

■ Jaime Camara was the first driver to hit the wall this year at Indy. The

rookie driver for Conquest Racing lost control early in Monday afternoon's practice in the first turn. His car looped around and crashed into the SAFER Barrier. Camara complained of back pain and was transported to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis for further evaluation.

Alex Lloyd turned the fastest lap in May 5's practice session, with a 223.033 mph circuit.

■ Davey Hamilton is back for another attempt at the Indianapolis 500 and will drive a third car for Vision Racing for the second year in a row.

"You know, I love this place," Hamilton said. "It's hard to, as a racing driver, get this particular race out of your system. There are a handful of races I love: This is one of them, the Oswego Classic, which I participated in last year and I'll do again, the Copper Classic, which unfortunately is no longer there. They always just stood out as the thrills of my career and I love to do.

"I'm just fortunate that Hewlett-Packard and Kingdom (Racing) came aboard to allow me to negotiate with Tony (George) to put together a third entry for Vision Racing. It was down to the last minute, it has worked out, we'll be in the car Monday and the car looks fantastic."

Hamilton made a triumphant return to last year's Indy 500 finishing ninth for Vision Racing. It was his first IndyCar race after suffering horrifying leg injuries in a crash at Texas Motor Speedway in 2001.

■ Despite published reports, Larry Foyt will not compete in this year's Indianapolis 500. He is listed on the official entry blank, but that was done to get additional garage stalls for A.J. Foyt Enterprises, which currently plans on running Darren Manning in this year's race.

My first race, at Kyalami [South Africa], seems like yesterday. I must thank my family and friends for their unwavering support through the years. I was lucky enough to start my career in F-1 at a young age and I love racing as much as ever and, importantly, I still

"While people will look back at my 16-year career in Turkey, I'm still looking forward and the next race is the one that matters the most.

■ May 1 and April 30 marked the 14th anniversary of the deaths of Ayrton Senna and Roland Ratzenberger during the San Marino Grand Prix weekend. The fact that Heikki Kovalainen escaped virtually unharmed from his huge accident in Spain shows how far F-

1 safety has advanced since

■ Heikki Kovalainen is undaunted by the crash that briefly knocked him unconscious after he wedged into a tire-lined barrier at 125 miles per hour in Spain. But he will have to wait until a final medical exam on the Thursday prior to the Turkish Grand Prix before he is cleared to race.

"None whatsoever," he said when asked if he had any doubts about getting back into a F-1 car. "I want to get back racing as soon as possible; the accident Barcelona it has been my only focus.

"Everyone involved in the sport, the FIA in particular, is always working on improving safety for the drivers, but F-1 is a risky business. You know that as a driver, but you don't think about it. If you worry about things like that, you lose focus. I guess it is just not in my psyche."

■ Mark Webber says the runoff area in the corner where Kovalainen crashed in Spain must be improved.

'Sebastien Bourdais had a crash there in testing," he said. "The runoff on the exit of the corner is good, but if you have a problem on the way in, there is not enough runoff.'

■ Many drivers and teams would like to see the safety-car rules changed soon. Currently, the pit lane remains closed until all the cars are lined up behind the safety car. This is done to prevent cars racing back to the pits past the scene of an accident.

Cars running out of fuel, however, have to pit before the pit lane is officially declared open and that results in a 10 second stop-and-go penalty.

"It's a lottery, you cannot plan for it," BMW Sauber's Mario Theissen said after the Spanish Grand Prix where his driver **Nick Heidfeld** lost a topsix finish because of just such a penalty.

While there is a strong push to get the rule modified before Monaco and Montreal, races that traditionally feature several safety-car periods, it is doubtful that any changes will happen by then.

you have 30 races, there are going to be some casualties and unfortunately. (Cleveland) is part of the carnage. There's a lot of rich history here that I'd like to keep going and I'm going to try my best to get something for 2009. But I don't have anything right now."

■ LAGUNA SECA: When the San Jose Grand Prix folded after a threeyear run. Champ Car decided to maintain a northern California presence with an event at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca that was added to an existing Grand Am Rolex Series date. Champ Car pulled out of the bill, but the Grand Am event will continue as planned May 18.

The IRL has run at Infineon Raceway in Sonoma since 2005, and "We're real Laguna Seca may find itself in compe-

tition with that track for a date on the '09 schedule.

ZOLDER JEREZ, ASSEN: There seems to be

little interest at present from the IRL in terms of expansion into Europe.

"The international reference was not necessarily Europe at this stage of our development," Angstadt said. 'We're open to ideas, but that was more in reference to probably more of a North American strategy, maybe a Mexico, maybe another event in Canada, along those lines.

Last year's race at the TT Circuit Assen in the Netherlands was a commercial and artistic success and would merit the most consideration. Given its oval heritage, the IndyCar Series may also explore racing at EuroSpeedway Lausitz in Germany and Rockingham Speedway in England; both hosted CART-sanctioned races from 2001-03

■ CIRCUIT MONT-TREMBLANT: Of the two Canadian Champ Car events in limbo, this road course in remote Quebec has less chance of landing in the 2009 rotation. Champ Car's one-off 2007 event drew a modest crowd of about 20,000.

If IndyCar racing begins to grow again, a more likely eastern Canadian venue is the Circuit Gilles Villeneuve in Montreal, which hosted Champ Car races from 2002 to 2006.

■ TORONTO: Once considered a formality for the future schedule, the established Toronto race is on thin ice. Andretti Green Promotions, which also runs the successful IndyCar event in St. Petersburg, will make a decision imminently about whether to pursue taking over what was a very successful event when Molson Breweries supported it from 1986 to 2005.

Interest in the event declined dramatically over the last couple of years and a recent audit reportedly concluded that the race was losing approximately \$2 million annually in that period. AGR is looking for support from local and provincial government to keep a race in Toronto, possibly moving it from the Exhibition Place street circuit.

 $\blacksquare$  **PORTLAND:** This is viewed by many as a key market for open-

wheel racing, with a park-like natural road course just 10 minutes from the city center. CART and Champ Car raced there since 1984, and a little TLC for the venue and a serious title sponsor could revive the event.

"There are two big markets that we have circled — the Pacific Northwest and New England," Angstadt said. "We've had some very interesting early conversations in Portland, but the last thing you want to do is go to a market and not have a successful

■ **ROAD AMERICA:** A sentimental favorite with the road-racing set and a serious contender for a slot on the 2009 schedule.

■ MEXICO CITY: With the Mexico Tourism Board sponsoring driver Mario Dominguez's entry into the IndyCar Series with Pacific Coast Motorsports, it's a safe bet that Mexico City is on the short list for 2009. CART and Champ Car raced at the Autodromo Hermanos Rodriguez since 2002.

"If there's interest from cities or venues in Mexico that warrant our consideration, we'd be happy to do that," said George.

"We're really taking much more of a cleansheet approach for '09."

competition in 1946, '47, '48, '49 and into the early 1950s. Both tracks would battle each other for a little supremacy with Raceway promoters having a plane fly over Soldier Field on race nights with a banner proclaiming, "Raceway Park, No Parading Here...It's Real Racing!"

Hot-rod racing, introduced by Andy Granatelli, would make a brief, but successful run at Soldier Field, starting with three events in 1947. Big crowds would watch the midgets and the hot rods there from 1947-49. The big program of the year at Soldier Field was the Chicago Park District Police Benevolent race with tens of thousands of fans witnessing these

Gill Stadium on 87th Street on Chicago's southeast side was the site of the very first short-track stock-car racing program held in the Chicagoland area late in 1948. Being nothing more than an added attraction to the weekly United Auto Racing Ass'n midget programs, the stock cars were no more than some older, used cars that Chuck Scharf and Eddy Anderson had brought in from a used-car lot.

The stock cars got their own program on Labor Day evening in '48 with UARA midget racer Larry Johnson winning the first feature race. Another five stock car races were held at Gill in 1948 with other early stock events taking place at Raceway and at Harry Molenaar's dirt half-mile in Schererville, Ind.

One of Raceway's early contests was a 300-lap battle with midget ace Danny Kladis piloting a four-wheeldrive Jeep to the win.

Fans liked it and stock-car racing became more prominent in the "Windy City" area, eventually pushing the midgets out of the weekly venues just like in other parts of the country. Raceway Park and Soldier Field were the most active weekly tracks as racing moved into the 1950s. After a couple of idle years, Gill, renamed 87th Street Speedway, began to host weekly racing (stock cars) again in 1951.

An area mainstay through 2000, the now-payed Raceway Park would get the nickname "The World's Busiest Track" as the speedway hosted 80 events, both midgets and stock cars. in 1951. Bud Koehler, who would capture 11 stock car titles during his career at the track, was the speedway's stock car champ in 1949 and 1952 and the midget champ also in '49 and 1951.

Back in the day, the Chicago area was a busy place for racing.
