## Landfill Transfer Will Bring 400 Truck Trips Daily To Charlestown

Charlestown Neighborhood Council members and residents who live near the former Domino Sugar Refinery on Medford Street were outraged when informed of the plans by J.M. Cashman Inc., a marine and general contractor, to use the site to transport landfill from Deer Island as part of the Boston Harbor clean-up project.

News of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) contract calling for Cashman to unload hundreds of thousands of cubic feet of clay fill from the Winthrop island and barge it to the Charlestown shoreline hit the community hard.

Years of mitigation discussions between the city of Boston, the MWRA and the Neighborhood Council had clearly outlined Charlestown's demands to eliminate such an occurrence. Through that process, the council had reluctantly agreed to accept a MWRA plan to use the adjacent site, the former Revere Sugar Refinery, to transfer personnel to the island. Though opposed to the increase in vehicular traffic it would create, the council believed it would be less of an impact than the original truck off-loading plan. Now faced with the prospect of living with both cars and trucks traveling through Charlestown, residents and council members are formulating a battle plan to fight the contractor's proposal.

The Neighborhood Council brought the information to the community at its Sept. 1 monthly meeting. Cashman Contracts

Administrator Alan Perrault was present to outline the scope of the contract and MWRA Senior Construction Manager David Reilly spoke on the authority's responsibility. No one representing the property owner Harold Brown was in attendance, although an invitation had been extended for them to attend.

Council members present included: Chairman Peter Looney, First Vice Chairman Tom Cunha, Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, Kevin Roche, Bill Galvin, Jim Conway, Ed Callahan, Kay Whelan, Marty O'Brien, Jeanne Davis, Tom Pitts, Judy Brennan, Ken Stone and Bob Wallace.

Perrault stated that the MWRA contract awarded to his firm specified that the contractor was responsible for locating the site to off-load the landfill. Representatives from the land owner contacted Cashman, he said, and a lease was signed for use of the site. No reference to the community's opposition to heavy truck traffic was expressed by Harold Brown, his agents or the MWRA, Perrault stated.

He explained that the clay fill moved from Deer Island would be "natural virgin material" used as landfill for its "capping quality." A total of 750,000 cubic yards of material will be transported over a six-month period at the beginning of the project, and 400,000 cubic yards will be moved in the duration of the three-year contract.

In order to move that amount of landfill, Perrault

admitted that 200 trucks, creating 400 trips, would be used daily. That number equates to a truck entering and/or leaving the site every two-to-three minutes during a 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. work day. After six months, he added, the number of truck trips would decrease with the reduction in the amount of landfill being transported.

Perrault stated that his firm searched for another shoreline site, but, he said: "Believe me, there isn't one in Massachusetts."

Charlestown is acceptable to Cashman because of its close proximity to major highways. "It is only 1,500 feet from I-93 north," he said, "and has water access with the 30-foot depth needed."

After being questioned further on the truck traffic, Perrault stated that the trucks would exit the site onto Medford Street, take a right-hand turn and enter Sullivan Square. Trucks traveling north would go around the rotary to gain access to I-93. Trucks entering Route 1 or I-93 south would be forced to travel on Main Street or Rutherford Avenue to City Square for the appropriate connections.

Residents and council members expressed their concerns with the scenario of a truck leaving the sugar refinery every two minutes, using Medford and Main streets and Rutherford Avenue, not only for 16 hours a day, but especially during the morning and afternoon rush hours when the roadways are already a bottleneck due to the Central

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## Mahoney Walks Off Charlestown Street Reconstruction Project

After weeks of difficulties with the street reconstruction project, the John Mahoney Construction Co. (JMCC) has left the streets of Charlestown and has been found to be in default of its contract with the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA).

Construction crews were first pulled off the job on Thursday, Aug. 20 by the contractor, only to return on Monday, Aug. 24. On Friday, Aug. 28, construction crews once again did not report to the reconstruction project. Unofficial reports

are that Mahoney claimed to have "financial difficulties," but the word bankruptcy has been denied.

According to Ralph Cunningham, Bryant Associates engineer: "Bryant Associates called JMCC's main office. Tim Sullivan, JMCC vice president, advised Bryant that JMCC was in a 'shutdown' mode and that JMCC will not be providing emergency crew as required by the contract and the BRA should make provisions to provide emergency work forces by others."

BRA Assistant Director of Engineering and Design

Paul Reavis stated that the bonding company, St. Paul Mercury Insurance Company, "is in control of the job." Reavis explained that the bonding company will be responsible for hiring a replacement contractor to fulfill Mahoney's obligations. At the present time, he said, four contractors are being interviewed by the bonding company.

Reavis added that claims made against JMCC by Charlestown homeowners will be honored by the bonding company.

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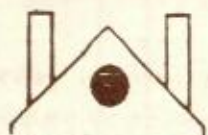
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## Kelly Retires From 43-Year Career With Massachusetts State Police

Edward F. Kelly of Charlestown, acting commissioner of Public Safety for the Commonwealth, has announced his separation from the Massachusetts State Police, closing out a career that spanned 43 years.

During this period, Kelly held the rank or commission of every title in the Department of Public Safety with the exception of Colonel in the State Police. He will affectionately be remembered as "The Deputy," a name his fellow workers called him for the past 13 years.

Upon graduation from the State Police Academy in December 1949, Trooper Kelly was assigned to the Bureau of Field Operations and patrolled out of the Northampton and Framingham headquarters.

In 1959, Kelly was promoted to the grade of corporal and was stationed at the Framingham headquarters on administrative assignment. In 1964 he was promoted to sergeant and assumed additional duties and responsibilities in Eastern Massachusetts.

Promoted to the grade of staff sergeant in 1965, Kelly was transferred to the general headquarters in Boston as second in com-

mand of the fiscal section. In 1967, he achieved the rank of lieutenant and was assigned as the supply officer in Framingham.

Kelly was commissioned captain in 1972 and was assigned to the State Police Academy as the commandant. He went to the office of Internal Affairs and then returned to general headquarters as the chief fiscal officer.

Promoted to the rank of

major in command of the Bureau of Administrative Services in 1974, Kelly was responsible for the operation of the academy, personnel, the fiscal section and the supply depot.

In 1976, he achieved the rank of lieutenant colonel and was placed in charge of the staff operations within the Division of the State Police.

Kelly was appointed as Deputy Commissioner and

the second in command of the Department of Public Safety in 1979. He has served on many administrative boards and commissions, most notably as the executive secretary of the Mass. Boxing Commission, a member of the Architectural Access Board and a member of the Mass. Medical-Legal Commission.

Kelly is a graduate of the Dale Carnegie School of Public Speaking and Effective Communication, the Dale Carnegie School of Management and the New England Police Institute at Babson.

Deputy Commissioner Kelly earned the trust and respect of everybody in the Department of Public Safety. He carried himself with that certain "command presence." His cadre of friends extended throughout the department. It mattered not what level of authority or

## Landfill Transfer Will Bring 400 Truck Trips Daily To Charlestown

Artery/North Area (CANA) project in City Square along with the reconstruction of the Alford Street Bridge at the Everett line. There were questions as to whether the North Washington Street Bridge that must be used to gain access to I-93 south could handle the weight of these trucks.

Pollutants are also of great concern to the community. In addition to the fumes created by this truck traffic, automobile emissions from approximately 350 cars will fill the air when the personnel transfer site is in operation. Noise and vibrations would also impair the quality of life of the neighborhood.

Other neighborhoods will share the impact of these trucks when they are forced to endure their presence on Main Street or Rutherford Avenue. The additional traffic on these already gridlocked streets during rush hours will spread the pollutants, noise and structural vibrations throughout two-thirds of Charlestown.

Although Perrault stated that his firm had received all necessary permits to operate the transfer site, no notification was received by abutting residents, council members or city commissioners from the state regulating authorities. Perrault said that Cashman is ready to start operations "within a few days." On Sept. 2, he notified Looney that his firm would delay the start-up date in an attempt to resolve the situation.

Conway stated: "It's a travesty," adding, "It's ridiculous to impact us with this and the personnel transfer site two blocks away." He vowed to personally picket the site when it begins operation.

Cunha informed Perrault that not only was he an abutter, but he represented this neighborhood on the council. He said: "This isn't going to happen. If you think it is, you're in the wrong community." He informed Perrault that not only would the heavy truck traffic affect the homes in the immediate area, but would also impair the use of

the Ryan Playground at Sullivan Square and add to the traffic with the buses transporting students to nearby Charlestown High School.

Cunha added: "Don't tell me that there's not another pier out there. Piers are going hungry. Why not look to Fan Pier? There's no houses there." He angrily stated: "This may be the best-priced pier, but not the best pier for Cashman." He added that he was "more appalled on your thinking you can use this as a storage facility. No way can you store there."

Mansfield expressed outrage at the lack of community input. He said: "I blame the Boston Conservation Commission and MWRA." He stated that Boston Transportation Department Commissioner Richard Dimino was "not happy." He told the council that Dimino and Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Director Paul Barrett were joining their departments to stop the contract through possible zoning language in the MER Zone that regulates water-related usage.

Whelan asked Perrault how he would like 200 trucks going by his door each day. "This would be most harmful to our kids and would cause damage to these houses," she said.

O'Brien stated that Charlestown's problem with all these construction projects is its close proximity to major highways.

Wallace added that he intended to contact the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) to inform them of the contract and its lack of employment of ILA members. "Every job is an ILA job," he stated. "We want ILA men."

Roche said that ultimately the MWRA was responsible for this contract coming to Charlestown. "Somebody orchestrated this perfectly," he said, adding, "MWRA has been our eyes and ears on this site. There seems to be too much high-handed behavior." Roche stated: "This is the greatest slap in the face since the proposed asphalt plant in City Square." He closed by stating: "We're going to hold MWRA's feet to the

fire and find out if Brown can do this."

Looney called for a committee-of-the-whole meeting with representatives of Cashman Inc., MWRA, Boston Transportation Department, Boston Conservation Commission, Harold Brown and community residents. He urged residents to notify their elected officials and garner their support.

A meeting date had not yet been scheduled at press time.

Looney also advised residents to attend a hearing on Wednesday, Sept. 9 at 9:30 a.m. by the city of Boston Public Safety Commission in the fourth floor meeting room at 1010 Massachusetts Ave. in Boston. Brown proposes to get permits to store fuel and garage and repair trucks on the site.

Other council business included a request from Mt. Vernon Street resident Zelma Lacey to find an appropriate site in Charlestown to construct a nursing home. Looney referred the matter to Whelan, who, along with Cunha, Mansfield and Looney,

will schedule a meeting on the subject.

O'Brien was asked to chair a Basic Services Committee meeting on traffic problems on Old Rutherford Avenue and Washington Street. No date has been set for this meeting.

BRA Zoning representative Jim Sullivan requested that the council Planning and Zoning Committee meet to begin the process of rezoning Charlestown. Cunha has set Sept. 21 as the date for this meeting which will be held from 6:30 to 9 p.m. in the third-floor conference room, Building 34 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The council Executive Board reported on a voted it had taken to approve a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Armed Services YMCA, outlining community benefits which include: jobs, job training, housing, related business activity, membership, parking and Charlestown community involvement. After reading the document, the council voted to endorse the MOU as approved by the Executive Board. The YMCA is scheduled to open in the Charlestown Navy Yard later this month.

The Neighborhood Council will hold an election on Saturday, Oct. 24 for seven at-large seats on the council. Cunha was appointed chairman of the election. Further details and nomination requirements will be prepared and announced in an upcoming edition of the Patriot.

The meeting closed with the introduction of the newly appointed BRA Director Paul Barrett. He stood and addressed the council, stating: "I chose this to be the first community meeting to attend since being appointed, to thank you personally for your support."

He informed the council that agenda items important to him, the BRA and Charlestown are moving forward. In particular, he mentioned the Whydah Pirate Museum, the haul road and future development of the Yard's End section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

In closing, Barrett admitted: "One reason for my being chosen as director was my ability to work with people in the neighborhoods. Charlestown gave me that experience."

The next monthly meeting of the council will be at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 6 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

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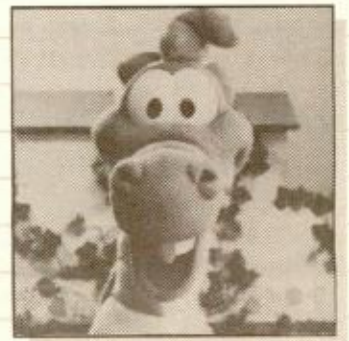

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## Mahoney Walks Off Charlestown Street Reconstruction Project

fixed schedule has been established as yet as to when construction crews will be back to the streets. Once a new contractor has been hired, these schedules will be made available at a community meeting, he stated.

At the present time, Bryant Associates is documenting the extent of work done by Mahoney for the bonding company.

After inspecting the streets, Cunningham filed the following report: "The streets presently paved with base and binder have had castings (manholes) raised and are ready to get a top course of paving. These streets include: Nearen Row, Essex, Chestnut, Adams, Concord and Devens streets, Rutherford Avenue and 99 percent of Washington Street. Present plans are to try to get these streets paved this fall.

"Monument Court has to be prepared for paving. Sidewalks have to be put in and a base and binder poured this year.

"Putnam, Ellwood, Lyndeboro and Middlesex streets are substantially ready to be paved with base and binder. A couple of minor alterations will have to be done on Putnam and Ellwood streets.

"Monument Court, Washington, Putnam, Ell-

wood, Middlesex and Lyndeboro streets all have to get sidewalks by the end of the construction season."

Cunningham also stated that the opening of new streets will probably be secondary. "The main concern remains that everything already under construction is in good shape for the winter," he said, adding, "plans are not to leave any street and/or sidewalk without pavement over the

winter."

Reavis said that Bryant Associates engineers and the community liaison will remain on the project throughout its duration, regardless of which new contractor is chosen by the bonding company. In the interim, details are being worked out between the bonding company and Middlesex Paving Co., the contractor currently working on the Mead Street Stairs

project, to handle emergency situations.

Cunningham stated that immediately after JMCC was put on a "shutdown" mode, the BRA was notified. After consulting its attorneys, the BRA notified JMCC that its contract was in default. The bonding company was then put on notice to begin preparations to secure a replacement contractor.

Cunningham added:

"The BRA is attempting to expedite the selection process on behalf of the Charlestown residents. Bryant Associates is providing the BRA with the necessary engineering services to effect a smooth transition of control to the bonding company and the new contractor."

responsibility a person had, if he was your friend, he was a friend forever.

Of all the qualities he possesses, pride and loyalty are at the top. On many occasions, he would bring in a copy of **The Charlestown Patriot** and point out photographs of his wife Edna, Commissioner Bill McCabe or his nieces and ne-

phews. The staff used to count to ascertain whose photograph appeared most often, the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner.

While he was mild mannered most of the time, he could make ice from water with a glare or a stare. He was a stern disciplinarian when the situation warranted action.

A few years back, he was

asked to describe his 10 best cases. He replied that he only had three, and they were: the Brinks robbery case in the early 50s when Kelly spent many months guarding the suspects in jail before they were brought to trial; the glorious days of President John F. Kennedy; and the infamous riot of the prisoners at the State Prison in Charlestown.

Kelly is a U.S. Navy veteran of World War II. He is a member of the Bunker Hill Associates, has served on the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee for many years and was the parade's Chief Marshal in 1985.

Kelly and his wife Edna reside on Monument Square.
