# Stories Conflict On Scheduling Of Kennedy Center Meeting

The Patriot has learned that an executive board meeting will be held tonight (Thursday) at the Kennedy Center, at 6:30 p.m. to discuss "financial matters."

The meeting comes as a surprise to this reporter who, after talking to Kennedy Center Business Manager James Stone on two separate days and inquiring into future board meetings, was told on both occasions that there were no meetings scheduled. However, three board members stated they knew about this meeting through Stone.

It is not clear whether the meeting will be held in executive session, (closed to the public) as board members not part of the executive committee were told by Stone that they could sit in on the meeting.

To close a meeting on finances to the public would be in violation of Massachusetts' Open Meeting Law which does not include financial matters as a reason to close a meeting.

According to Chapter 30A, sections 11A to 11B, a meeting may only be closed to the public if:

- 1) it discusses the reputation, character, physical condition or mental health rather than professional competence of an individual;
- 2) it is considering the discipline, dismissal or complaints against an employee;
- 3) it discusses strategy of collective bargaining or litigation and an open meeting may have a detrimental effect on the

bargaining or litigation position;

4) it discusses the deployment of security personnel or devices;

5) it is investigating charges of criminal misconduct or discussing the filing of criminal complaints;

6) it is considering the purchase, exchange, lease or value of real property, if such discussions may have

a detrimental effect on the negotiating position;

7) it is complying with the provisions of any general or special law or federal requirement.

The holding of the executive board meeting falls in the midst of heated controversy regarding recent board conduct. To date, the



## Views On Dental Health

### WHY DENTAL FLOSS?

Dental plaque is the primary cause of tooth decay and gum disease. A tooth brush can help remove plaque from visible surfaces but cannot remove it from between the teeth and beneath the gum line. Unwaxed floss is most often recommended to remove plaque from these hidden areas. Here's how to use it:

Cut off about 18 inches of floss and wrap the ends around the middle fingers, leaving about 2 inches between the hands. Guide it with thumbs for the top teeth and index fingers for lowers. Pass the floss gently between two teeth, sliding several times to the gum and back along the side of one tooth. Repeat the scraping on the side of the adjacent tooth and move on until all teeth are flossed.

A word of caution: Always control the floss. Try never to snap the floss suddenly between two teeth as the gums may be sensitive. Use a gentle, sawing motion. If gums bleed, you may be flossing too hard, or they may be in poor health. It makes sense to have your dentist or hygienist demonstrate the flossing method to you. It will help insure the future health of your teeth and gums.

# Condos Planned For Old Boston Filter Site

Plans for the building of approximately 68 condominiums on the site of the old Boston Filter Company and surrounding property owned by that company, were revealed recently at a Charlestown Preservation Meeting.

Boston Filter President Elisha G. Pierce III presented the plans to about 75 residents, showing how he would rehabilitate the outside of the Old Harvard Hill School (formerly occupied by Boston Filter), the Austin Block House and construct new buildings on property owned by Boston Filter lying within the boundaries of Main Street, Harvard Street and the Harvard Mall.

With Pierce's corporation now located in Somerville, a decision had to be made on whether to develop or sell the Charlestown property. "I thought about selling and letting someone else develop," said Pierce, "but I decided on developing it myself with a team." Employing Ad Inc., Pierce developed a plan for 68 one and two bedroom condo units that would be constructed in a style similar to the historical buildings surrounding the property. In addition, a two level parking lot would be built below the condos.

Pierce said he felt a personal interest in what happened to the property because of long family ties the Boston Filter Corporation has had with Charlestown. He said his family began their business in 1912 with Pierce's mother, Marion Dow Pierce, running the business 30 years before turning it over to her son, Elisha.

Two of the lots in the triangular land plot are not owned by Boston Filter, thus will not be developed. However, the Austin Block, presently a shell of a 1822 stone building, will be renovated into a first floor office and condominiums on the second and third floors.

The new condominiums, which will include the old Harvard Hill School, will have interior court yards, a view of the Monument, parking, security, and plenty of greenery. Prices will range between \$140 to \$160 thousand for a two-bedroom and less for studios and one-bedrooms. Parking would be computed in the final price.

Plans for the condominiums are not yet final and have not been approved by the Boston Redevelopment Authority. However, Pierce said he has financial commitments to begin construction and anticipates breaking ground in the fall, completing the project within nine months. If all is kept within the desired schedule, Pierce will market his condos toward

the end of 1983. The first phase of construction, however, will center on the

Austin Block Stone House. Pierce's plans were well received by residents at

the Preservation Society meeting. Obviously, Pierce is proud of his plans and

thinks the construction will boost the sprucing up of surrounding properties. "I

think this is very exciting for Charlestown," said Pierce.

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


## Paul Revere's Rides

Paul Revere, a city-dwelling silversmith whose shop was a short walk from his North Square home, probably never owned a horse during those turbulent years leading up to Lexington and Concord. Yet he was one of the busiest riders for the

Boston Committee of Correspondence. In fact, by the time Revere made his Midnight Ride, he had already traveled thousands of miles as an express.

"American Express," an exhibit on colonial express riders, focusing on Revere's several rides as a

courier, opens, naturally enough, on April 18 at the Paul Revere House. The exhibit, which includes Revere artifacts (saddlebags owned by Revere, for example), items used by 18th-century riders, maps, documents, pictures and letters, runs through May 31. Educational activities for children will take place during the entire run of the exhibit.

Revere's first known ride took place in November, 1773 when he was 38 years old. A month later, after participating in the Boston Tea Party himself, Revere carried news of that event to New York and Philadelphia.

Revere carried so many messages to the Continental Congress in





Philadelphia that one Tory observer called Revere "the Ambassador from the Committee of Correspondence of Boston to the Congress at Philadelphia."

There is no documentation of Revere owning a horse or using his own horse on any of these rides. There is substantial documentation of Revere borrowing horses for his assignments.

Revere even borrowed a horse for his famous Midnight Ride in 1775. He wrote of that ride, "I got a

Horse from Deacon Larkin." John Larkin was a deacon in Charlestown, the starting point of Revere's Midnight Ride.

Revere was selected as a courier not because of any particular show of horsemanship, but because he could be trusted and was knowledgeable about the political situation in Boston. Many of his rides took him away from home for days or weeks at a time — away from silver-smithing, his principal means of support. Revere was paid for most of his

rides to compensate for the loss of work revenue. He was not, however, paid for his Midnight Ride.

When in Boston, Revere acted as an intelligence gatherer for the Sons of Liberty and the Committee of Correspondence. His many rides were intelligence missions. On the night of April 18, Revere and fellow-rider William Dawes would never have shouted "The British are coming," for fear of warning British patrols and Loyalist residents of Middlesex County.

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

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# A Tribute To Nellie Hamilton

Ellen Christine Hamilton (Nellie Burke) was one of the oldest parishioners of St. Mary's Parish, Charlestown - a parish member for more than seventy-six years!

She emigrated to Boston from the Village of Clannmire, Cork, Ireland, in 1905, shortly after her late sister, Mary Burke Burns.

She worked as a salesgirl in a dry goods store at 74 Main Street owned by Mrs. Mary McCusker, a sister of Dr. Thomas Broderick who had a medical practice at 114 Main Street (later taken over by Dr. Magurn) for whom her sister Mary Burke worked. The dry goods business was later sold to a Mr. Modell; Nellie continued to work for him.

She was married in June, 1917, to James J. Hamilton, a native of Mission Hill, Roxbury, who died in October, 1940. Her son James J. Hamilton, Jr., "Hammie" was born on Bunker Hill Day, 1919.

She began to work for Mr. Abraham Mazow "Abe" about 1920 in a store at 21 Main Street. Mr. Mazow had a tailoring and men's clothing shop and expanded to take in women's and children's clothing. He needed a salesgirl; Nellie applied for the job and thus started her long career of dedicated service to the Mazow Family - spanning 58 years and three generations of Mazow's!

Mr. Mazow's only son Barnett "Ben" opened a law practice during the 30's in the rear of the dry goods store at 73 Main Street. The dry goods business expanded—a toy store was opened next door at 75 Main Street. Mr. Abraham Mazow died in 1944; Ben carried on the business.

When the buildings at 73 and 75 Main Street were sold after Mrs. Rose Mazow's death, Ben moved to 1 Monument Avenue and conducted a law, insurance, and income tax business there. Nellie continued to work there. Ben's only son Richard followed in his father's profession and joined his father at 1 Monument Avenue.

A few years after Ben Mazow retired from the business to Florida, Richard bought a building on Dexter Row, formerly owned by the Leen Family. Nellie

continued working for Richard; she retired in 1978 at the age of eighty-nine!

As a young woman she experienced great tragedy in losing an 18-year old brother Jeremiah Burke and a first cousin Nora Hegarty on the S.S. Titanic on April 14, 1912—both emigrating to Boston to make their home with Mary Burke Burns and Nellie.

She was very active in the Irish Freedom Movement in the Boston area. She was Secretary of the John Mitchell Council (in Charlestown) of the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic (AARIR) sixty-two years ago. She was a member of Cumann namBan, the Irish Women's underground freedom movement spearheaded by Countess Markievicz, the Irish-born wife of the Polish nobleman.

She maintained very close ties with her family in Cork over all the years. She made three return trips "home" to Ireland - in 1907 and in 1913 with her sister Mary and in 1926 with her husband, son, and niece.

She is survived by a 95-year old sister Catherine Burke Hegarty and thirteen nieces and nephews in Ireland and three nieces, two granddaughters, and three great grandchildren here.

Her only child "Hammie" had a distinguished record of military service in the United States Army in World War II attaining the rank of Staff Sergeant. He passed away at the age of sixty-two just three weeks and a day before her.

We shall not see her like again!  
May she rest in Peace!

May the road rise to meet you. May the wind be always at your back. May the sun shine warm upon your face, the rains fall soft upon your fields and, until we meet again, may God hold you in the palm of His Hand. Amen.

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# Stories Conflict On Scheduling Of Board Meeting

board has failed to act on a motion which calls for the examination of Kennedy Center charge slips to determine whether mispending of funds has been made by Director John Gardiner. In addition, the March board meeting was abruptly recessed by Board President James Cushman after board member Robert Wallace made a Point or Order, challenging the legitimacy of an amended motion calling for the deletion of identifying those whose names appear on the back of these charge slips, thus being the guest of Gardiner at the time the credit charges were made.

At press time, Cushman did not know when he would reconvene the recessed meeting nor did he know how he would rule upon Wallace's point of

order.

Meanwhile, the Kennedy Center has formally stated that Gardiner has been absent from the Center for at least two weeks due to a doctor's order that he take time off from work, according to Virginia Chiampa. However, she stated she did not know why the doctor had ordered the time off.

Although Gardiner has remained home, Stone said he was still making decisions for the Center and engaged in raising funds from Permanent Charities and others.

The recent non-compliance with board motions has caused board member Anne Considine to draw up and circulate a petition asking for the intervention of the Attorney General to determine the rights of public access to

the information requested by the board. In her petition, Considine claims the Center has illegally blocked inquiry and adjourned a scheduled meeting to "withhold pertinent information from community elected representatives." She has received approximately one hundred signatures.

"A lot of the older people said they wouldn't sign it; that they want their dirty linen cleaned instead of aired. I can understand that but we've been trying to get answers all year and we haven't gotten anything," stated Considine.

Considine said she has numerous questions she would like answered. These questions regard the true number of employees hired by the Kennedy Center. "Do they have 173 or 130?" asked Considine. She also questioned the way pay raises were given last year to Center employees, saying that larger raises percentage-wise, were given to some but not others. "I asked them, then, if we had enough money to give these raises and they told me yes. Now they're saying they'll have to lay employees off."

"I feel someone's pocket is being padded," said Considine. "I don't know if it's money, political power, favors or what. What I know is the only way we will regain our policy-making power is through issues, like this, being brought out in the open."

Board member Brian Hickey also has doubts on how the board is conducting itself. "In the past I thought that opening

those files would have a negative impact. But now I see not opening them is more harmful." Hickey said that if the motion to examine the slips was not resolved shortly, he would then vote to open the files completely.

On the recessed meeting, Hickey somewhat agreed with Cushman's action saying, "Closing the meeting too early is the worse thing you can do but you can't continue without order."

State Representative Richard Voke was not sure on what procedure should have been followed with Wallace's Point of Order. However, Voke did say the meeting should be reconvened as soon as possible and that an executive session meeting held before then would be detrimental to the Center's already failing reputation.

# Store 24 Denied Video Games

The city-appointed Licensing Division denied a video machine application for Store 24 in Thompson Square at a Monday public hearing at Boston City Hall.

A small delegation from Charlestown attended the hearing at which City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn appeared and testified in opposition to the application stating, "there have been repeated instances of marked increases in school absenteeism, theft, vandalism and drug selling directly related to the operation of these machines."


Boston City Council members have received numerous calls from neighborhood people upset with video proliferation in neighborhood locations.

This situation has led Flynn to introduce an ordinance regulating video game applications. Under the ordinance, jurisdictional control of video games would be placed with the state-appointed Licensing Board. The ordinance has received favorable comment across the city and many Charlestown residents have stated their support for it.

The Charlestown Republican Ward Committee has suggested a complete moratorium on new video licenses until more stringent regulations are in place.
