Cable TV Update And Training Sign-Up To Be Offered At Kent School

Charlestown residents and organizations will have the opportunity to be updated in cable television activity in the community and to sign up for video production training at a public meeting on Thursday, March 31st, at 7:00 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill Street, Charlestown. The Boston Community Access and Programming

Foundation (BCAPF), sponsors of the event, will detail plans for workshops and access programming on the cable system. A representative of Cablevision Systems Boston, the company operating cable TV in Boston, will detail construction and

marketing plans for Charlestown. Guest speaker for the event will be Richard (Rick) DiMino, Chairperson of the East Boston Cable Council. DiMino will relate Eastie's experience with Cable training in the last two months and show videotapes produced by East Boston trainees.

The Foundation's role in cable training and programming will be explained by Ann McIntosh, Outreach and Planning Coordinator, who will outline the respective responsibilities of the cable company, the Foundation, the City, and Charlestown residents and organizations. The Foundation's primary goal is to provide training, production and technical support to community cable programmers free of charge.

Deborah Hill, Training Director for the Foundation, will specify training

Charlestown Resident Wins \$1000 In "That's My House" Contest

Newworld Bank has announced that James Circo is the Charlestown winner in the bank's second annual "That's My House" home-improvement awards program. For completely gutting his 1850's townhouse and transforming it into a comfortable, energy-efficient home, Circo received \$1,000 from Newworld Bank. The program, which reflects the bank's commitment to inner-city revitalization, provided a total of \$36,000 in cash prizes to innovative home improvers from Boston's 16 neighborhoods and 45 nearby towns.

"Circo's project, which involved friends, family and neighbors, resulted in an outstanding home

improvement that served as a model for the entire neighborhood," said Robert Garver, president of Newworld Bank.

Circo, a prison psychologist, was experiencing some professional "burn out" from a job that offered little in the way of immediate, tangible results. From last March through October, he decided to take a break by turning his hobby of carpentry into a full-time home-improvement effort.

"The neighbors came and watched the progress of the house," said Circo. "Some brought wine and cheese and the neighborhood kids helped build the fence out back with scrap wood."

"My house was once probably the worst house on the street and now it is somewhat of an inspiration to others, who have since begun their own home improvements," he added. Completing his home renovation provided Circo with some very practical and satisfying results. He now feels refreshed and ready to return to work.

Newworld Bank received two national awards for last year's "That's My House!" program: the Bank Marketing Association and the Women in Communications awards. Media coverage included television and radio programming, newspaper

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Public Invited To View Charlestown Artifacts

Commissioner Robert T. Tierney of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works in conjunction with the Harvard University's Institute for Conservation Archaeology (ICA) at the Peabody Museum has scheduled a public viewing of significant archaeological artifacts unearthed in the Charlestown section of downtown Boston. The public viewing is scheduled for Wednesday, March 30, 1983 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., with a slide presentation at 2:00 p.m. in the Isaac Hull Room, Building 5, Charlestown Navy Yard.

In excavating five sites in the Chelsea and Water Streets area of Charlestown the ICA archaeologists unearthed artifacts, structural remains and features representing 5000 years of human occupation. In addition to prehistoric American Indian artifacts, remains left by the earliest European settlers and those of the British bombing of Charlestown in 1775 were excavated. Much information not included in the old documents describing this area have been unearthed, including knowledge about the lifeways of the early inhabitants of the Charlestown area.

The archaeological remains are being salvaged because they are in the path of road construction scheduled to begin shortly in the vicinity of Chelsea and Water Streets, alongside the Charlestown Navy Yard. The project is being funded by the Mass. DPW and the Federal Highway Administration.

The USS Constitution Museum will present the 1925 silent film classic "Old Ironsides" April 6 at 7:30 p.m. in the Museum. Live piano accompaniment

will be provided by the incomparable Bob Winter. This Paramount production stars Wallace Beery, Esther Ralston and a fleet of converted whaling ships dressed as frigates!

The USS Constitution Museum is located in the Charlestown Navy Yard. A small donation will be requested at the door.

curriculum, time commitments, and show examples of local access programming from East Boston and other communities nationwide.

At press time, workshop sessions are scheduled as follows: Tuesdays, beginning April 12, from 6 - 9 p.m. Residential Training Workshop Sessions, Thursdays, beginning April 14, from 6 - 9 p.m. classes for staff of Charlestown organizations. These initial classes, which will include instruction in small, lightweight portable equipment and simple editing, will be held for eight consecutive weeks, and lab time will be required in addition to in class attendance.

The March 31st event marks the second Charlestown public meeting on cable TV. The first, held December 7, 1982, drew more than fifty Charlestown residents, many of whom signed up for training programs at that time. These individuals have been given priority in the first-come, first-served registration policy of the Foundation. Each class will be limited to twelve participants; however all interested persons should sign up March 31st, as this will initiate the priority list for the second Charlestown training cycle, scheduled for mid-June.

Bobbie Harden and Mike Griffin, both members of the Mayor's Charlestown Cable Task Force which completed its report in December of last year, will be on hand to entertain suggestions and discussion pertaining to the formation of a permanent Charlestown community-based group to facilitate, monitor, and guide the cable programming needs of the community. Kindergarteners Wanted In Charlestown

School officials in Boston are looking for five-year olders to attend the kindergartens of the public schools system during the next school year. Kindergarten enrollment for children born in 1978 or earlier will take place between March 29th and April 8th. A parent can visit any public elementary school in the city or a district office or school headquarters at 26 Court Street in downtown Boston. A copy of the child's birth certificate and two proofs of address must be brought by the parent enrolling her or his child.

Extended Day Kindergartens are available to children in the Blackstone School in South End, the Eliot School in North End, and the Warren-Prescott School in Charlestown. Children also can apply for the citywide magnet schools such as the Hale and Trotter Schools in Roxbury, the Hennigan School in Jamaica Plain and the multicultural Hernandez School on Columbia Road in Dorchester. 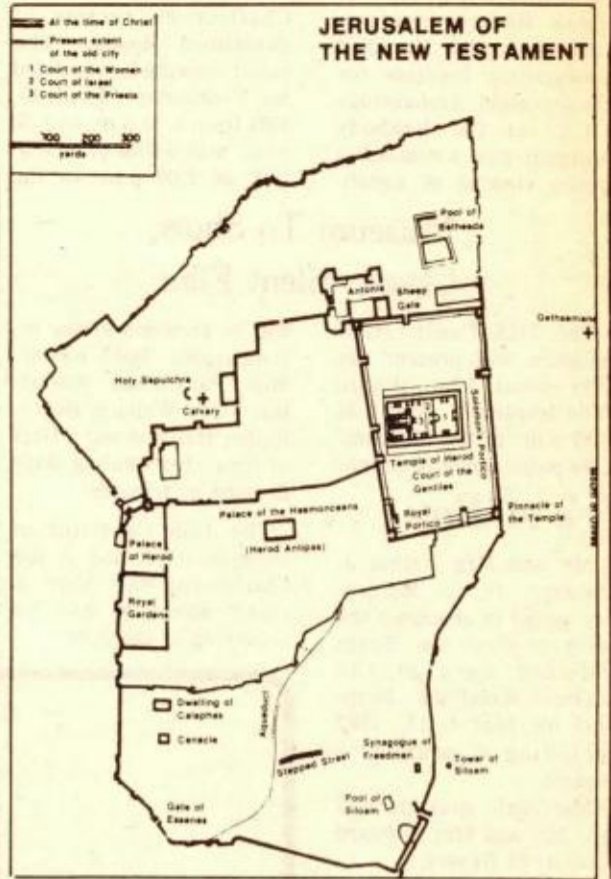

Journey To Jerusalem: It's Just The Beginning

Editor's Note: Rev. Thomas F. Conway pastor of St. Catherine's Church in Charlestown and the author of several books on religious education, has written a series of Lenten messages. This is the last in that series.

Journey to Jerusalem

"Behold we go up to Jerusalem." (Mark 10:33)

Palm Sunday celebrates the triumphal entrance of Jesus into the city of peace — Jerusalem. Through our lenten journeys we arrive in Jerusalem. Hopefully, we are prepared through penance, self denial, sacrifice, inspection of our personal spiritual lives. Our journeys of conversion, reconciliation, healing make us ready to celebrate the Sacred Triduum (three Sacred Days) of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

We tour this ancient holy city to capture the religious spirit that has permeated Jerusalem for centuries. Walk with Jesus and his disciples.

See and experience the Jewish heritage of Jesus, as he enters the city, as he celebrates the Passover, as he is arrested and taken from place to place. Do the trials before Pilate and Herod cause us fear? Witness the condemnation to death. Ask why: To Calvary? To the crucifixion? To death? To burial?

In the Tomb

Is it over?

Is that all there is?

Waiting in silence, in prayer, in reflection, each of us feels the emptiness, the loss. But there is a stirring We keep watching On Vigil The Easter Vigil. "He is Risen"

The announcement is made — "Heaven rejoice, Earth rejoice Let nothing in the universe be exempt from joy Christ, King, Jesus rises." (Variation of Exultet)

Jesus, brings a new dawn, a new light, new life. Christians celebrate the newness, Easter. Do you believe that Jesus is risen? Then profess your faith, renew your baptism. Glory to God — Alleluia Jesus, the Risen Christ invites us to follow him on a new journey.

Thomas, the Apostle, said: "Lord we don't know where you are going. How can we know the way?"

Jesus told him, "I am the way." (John 14) a) The Symbol of Visual for this week is the map of Jerusalem. Keep the map in a prominent place to study and for reference. (e.g. the refrigerator door). As you are reminded of events of Holy Week, see if you can locate on the map the place of the event.

- b) Discussion:
 1. Trace the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem.
 2. Where was the Passover celebrated by Jesus? In the Cenacle?
 3. Locate the Gardens of Gethsemane.
 4. Calvary and the Holy Sepulchre are outside the city walls.

Do you know why? Is this the end of our journeys? or Is this the beginning of a New Journey?

Voke's Committee OK's "Right-To-Know Legislation"

Representative Richard A. Voke has announced that the Committee on Health Care of which Rep. Voke is Chairman, has given a favorable report to the important legislation commonly known as the "Workers Right-to-Know." This legislation would entitle Massachusetts workers and community residents to know what, if any, toxic and hazards chemicals are present in the workplace and what potential risks these substances pose to worker's health and safety.

Rep. Voke stated that under the "Right-to-Know" legislation as approved by

the Committee, safety data sheets and summary notification forms would be made accessible to workers during normal working hours. Containers of toxic substances, one-gallon or five pounds or larger would have to be labelled with the chemical name or trade secret code of the substance and within the National Fire Protection Association's Code which identifies its substance properties and employers would be required to provide annual training for workers exposed to toxic substances on their nature and loca-

tion in addition to keeping records of worker exposure for forty years and making them accessible to a variety of officials.

Further, Rep. Voke stated that the need for a bill of this type was evident because a growing body of research has indicated that workers exposed to certain chemicals over a period of time are at considerable risk because the toxicity of the substances with which they worked was not known until several years had passed and the effects of such exposure became apparent in the high incidences of fatal illnesses, such as cancer.

Views On Dental Health

"HIGH—SPEED" TO THE RESCUE
Tremendous improvements have been made in the efficiency of dental services. An example is the equipment used to prepare the teeth for fillings and crowns. For years dentists have used rotary tools (drills) for this purpose. These cutting instruments rotated at a top speed of 5,000 rpm. Discomfort was often felt from the vibration, pressure and heat that developed in the use of these instruments.
Today, improvements in the drill motors and the use of the turbine principle permit speeds of up to 300,000 revolutions per minute. Only a very light touch is required to cut enamel and dentin at these high speeds. The rotations are so rapid that the sense of vibration is eliminated. Of course heat is generated by such rapid cutting, but the instruments are devised so that a spray of water and air is directed at the area being prepared, keeping the temperature comfortable.
The advent of the high speed drill and new types of superior cutting tools add up to less drilling time and more comfort in dental procedures.

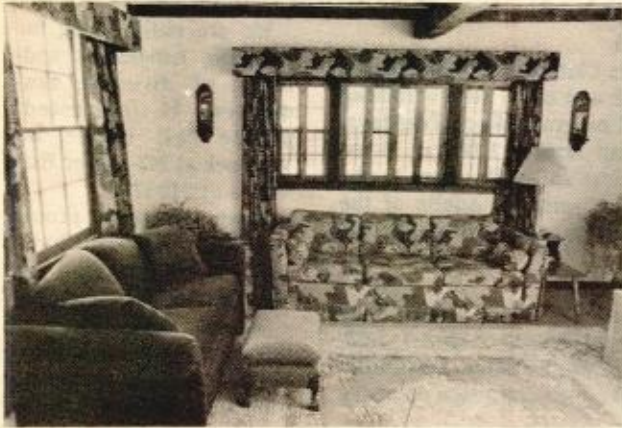

Fuel Assistance Available

If paying heating bills has made this winter hard on your budget, the ABCD Fuel Assistance Program can make March and April easier.

Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) will still be accepting applications for fuel assistance through April 30. In this program, low-income households may be eligible for help in paying heating bills, and in some cases, renters can receive assistance if heat is included in the rent. Households in Boston, Brookline and Newton qualify according to gross household income and size of household. They may also be eligible for ABCD's weatherization program, and for a free kit of weatherization materials.

Fuel intake office in Charlestown is at the Neighborhood Employment Center, 27 Winthrop Street, telephone 241-8866.

When visiting an intake office, applicants must bring proof of income for the

household, including income from all members: years of age and older.

Verification workers will check your total gross household income against current poverty guidelines. For example, one person cannot exceed a total income of \$8,505 in order to be eligible. In the same way, a family of two cannot make more than \$11,445 per year; a family of three, \$12,330; a family of four, \$14,850; and so on. Intake workers will calculate the level for larger households.

You will also need a copy of an unpaid heating bill, dated after October 1, 1982, to be considered for payment. Without these documents, an application cannot be processed.

Renters applying for assistance should bring three current rent receipts with them. Intake workers will give you a copy of a Landlord-Tenant Agreement. You will be asked to have this signed by your landlord and return it to the intake office.

Income Tax Prepared At BHCC

Business students of Bunker Hill Community College have prepared more than 1500 income tax returns of people in the area this year and are ready to complete the forms of all who are interested in their free services between now and April 15.

The VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) students are especially helpful to senior citizens, the poor

or persons with language problems.

Taxpayers may call 241-8600, ext. 561 to find out the hours of the service at the campus center.

They should bring their W-2 forms from employers, 1099 forms for interest and dividends, tax forms mailed by the Federal and State and copies of last year's returns.

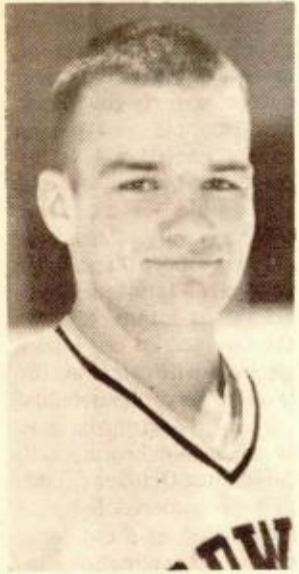

Charlestown Girls Capture Three New England Age Division Swimming Titles

After six long, hard months of tough practices, Charlestown's young female swimmers can hold their heads high and give themselves a well deserved pat on the back. During the month of February, a combined team of girls from the Charlestown Boys and Girls Club and the Townies Swim Team, which trains at the Charlestown High School Pool, competed in the Northeast New England Area Sectional Swimming Championships and captured the Girls' 10 and Under, 11 and 12, and 13 and 14 year old Age Division Championships.

The story begins at the Waltham Boys and Girls Club on Friday, February 11th with the 13 and 14 year old girls' team. In this particular age division, the Charlestown girls put together what had to be their finest performance of the season to out-distance arch rival Watertown by one point. The meet was a two team battle between Watertown and Charlestown from beginning to end. Watertown jumped out to an early lead by taking first place in every single event. However, Charlestown remained within striking distance by consistently placing two swimmers among the top five finishers in each event, thus enabling Charlestown to remain in contention. Going into the final event, Watertown had built itself an eleven point lead. Charlestown was now in a position to capture the Championship. All Charlestown had to do was finish in first place in the 200 yard freestyle relay — second place, however, would not be good enough. As had been the case throughout the entire meet, the Charlestown swimmers did what they had to do. With Watertown sitting on the sidelines watching, due to the fact that they didn't have a freestyle relay, Charlestown captured first place and 12 points to win the 13 and 14 year old Championship by a score of 55 to 54. When the going got tough....

The results of the meet were as follows: 1. Charlestown 55; 2. Watertown 54; 3. South Boston 25; 4. Billerica 14; 5. Woburn 11; and 6. Waltham 7.

On Saturday, February 19th, the Charlestown girls traveled to the Roxbury Boys and Girls Club to compete in the 10 and Under and 11 and 12 Age Division of the Northeast New England Area Championships. From start to finish, there was no question who the superior team was. Charlestown consistently placed two and sometimes three swimmers in the top five finishers in each event.

In the 10 and Under Age Division, Charlestown captured first place in the 100 yard medley relay by swimming away from the rest of the field. Charlestown's 10 and Under girls finished fourth and fifth in the 100 yard freestyle, second and third in the 50 yard butterfly, first and second in the 50 yard backstroke, second and third in the 50 yard breaststroke, first and second in the 100 yard individual medley and second in the 100 yard freestyle relay. The 10 and Under girls totally dominated.

The results of the 10 and Under Championship were: 1. Charlestown 57; 2. Waltham 37; 3. Watertown 30; 4. South Boston 29; 5. Woburn 13; 6. Billerica 8; and 7. Roxbury 6.

In the 11 and 12 year old Age Division, Charlestown was the only team to score points in every single swimming event. Charlestown placed first in the 200 yard medley relay, once again swimming away from the rest of the field; fourth in the 100 yard freestyle; first and fourth in the 50 yard butterfly; fifth in the 50 yard backstroke; second and fourth in the 50 yard freestyle; second and third in the 50 yard breast-stroke; first and second in the 100 yard individual medley; and second in the 200 yard freestyle relay.

The results of the 11 and 12 Age Division Championship were: 1. Charlestown 54; 2. Waltham 41; 3. Woburn 21; 4. Watertown 13; 5. Salem, N.H. 12; 6. Billerica 5; 7. South Boston 1; and 8. Roxbury 0.

During the past seven years, beginning in 1976-77, the Charlestown Girls' Swim Team has captured 17 out of a possible 24 Age Division Championships in the Northeast New England Sectional Championships. It has twice swept the championships in all four age divisions, 1979-80 and 1980-81, giving Charlestown the distinction as the only team ever to sweep all four age divisions and the only team that has ever accomplished this two years in a row. This is a fine tribute to a fine group of quality young female athletes. Charlestown can take great pride in this entire group.

A tip of the hat to the coaching staff of Ann Connolly and Jim Houlihan of the Townies Swim Team and Patty McGrath of the Charlestown Boys and Girls Club for a "job well done."

Once again, Charlestown proves the cream rises to the top!
