<u>Day 1: Saturday, June 1, 2019 - Skyline Drive / Shenandoah National Park / Charlottesville (9 h 44 min / 515 miles of driving)</u>

3:00am - Depart with breakfast and lunch in tow!

7:00am - Coffee at Java Joint Drive Thru Coffee in Trexlertown, PA

Lehigh's Valley first-rate coffee and pastry joint, Java Joint Drive Thru Coffee is located in an old-fashioned diner kiosk and partners with a small-batch roaster out of Columbus, OH that uses the most elite coffee beans in the world to offer a variety of specialty coffees and pastries. Open Saturdays from 7am - 3pm. 3 h 21 min / 211 miles from Home.

10:45am - Drive through Shenandoah National Park along Skyline Drive

The famously scenic 105-mile Skyline Drive runs the entire length of Shenandoah National Park. The park entrance fee is \$30.00. The speed limit is 35 miles per hour, due to curves, wildlife and tourists. Skyline Drive is a two-lane road that has 75 overlooks and access to numerous trails, including the Appalachian Trail. Skyline Drive was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1997, became a National Scenic Byway in 2005, and was designated a National Historic Landmark in 2008.

3:00pm - Arrive in Charlottesville

Wine Tasting at the **Trump Winery**

Nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains along central Virginia's Monticello Wine Trail, Trump Winery's stunning 1,300-acre estate lies just a few miles from James Monroe's Highland and Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, the birthplace of American viticulture. We pride ourselves on creating the finest terroir-driven sparkling, white, and red wines, which have won numerous national and international medals and best-in-class designations. Planted with 227 acres of French vinifera varieties, Trump Winery is Virginia's largest vineyard and the largest vinifera vineyard on the East Coast. \$12/tasting. Open from 10am-4pm Wed-Mon.

Wine Tasting at **Blenheim Vineyards**

Established in 2000 by owner Dave Matthews, Blenheim Vineyards is a family-owned and operated winery located 20 minutes southeast of Charlottesville. With two vineyard sites growing Chardonnay, Viognier, Cabernet Franc, Petit Verdot and Cabernet Sauvignon, the goal at Blenheim is to make high quality wines that reflect the climate, soil, and beauty of the surrounding piedmont landscape. Come visit out timber frame tasting room, where you can gaze out over the vineyards to Jefferson's "sea view" beyond. Peer through paneled glass floors into the tank and barrel room below. Established in 2000 by owner Dave Matthews. \$10/tasting; open daily 11am-5:30pm. 1 min down the road from the Trump Winery.

Oysters at Public Fish and Oyster

From the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, Public Fish and Oyster selects only the finest oysters—the meaty gems of the ocean—to serve raw everyday. Order a martini with an orange twist alongside a plate of Oysters Rockefeller and you'll feel like a captain of industry from another era, all at a reasonable price point. The tasty little morsels also pop up in the oyster stew, oyster Lyonnaise, and the PFO pan roast. Open 7 days/week from 4pm - 9 or 10pm. 8 min walk from Fairfield Inn & Suites.

Dinner at Sultan Kebab

Authentic Turkish Cuisine - this relaxed restaurant is terrific for those wanting to eat well but who also desire a laid-back vibe. The platters of kebabs of kofte will satisfy several hungry people, and the sandwiches slammed into homemade pita bread are tasty American takes on Mediterranean favorites. Baklava and rice pudding are available with Turkish coffee—some of the strongest brew available. Open daily from 11am - 9 or 10pm. 10 min walk from Public Fish and Oyster.

Sake Flight at North American Sake Brewery

One of the nation's first sake breweries, North American Sake Brewery just had its grand opening in August 2018. The project is the brainchild of two Certified Sake Professionals: award-winning filmmaker Jeremy Goldstein and longtime home brewer Andrew Centofante after years of research and practice. The brewery has its own cedar-lined culinary laboratory for producing koji - a mold treasured for its transformative powers that is essential to making classic, umami-rich Japanese foods like soy and miso. The brewey uses koji not only for sake making, but also for its food experiments, like smoked duck marinated in shio koji. Our goal is to combine the ingredients and flavors of Japanese and Asian cuisine with down south smoky barbecue culture. Our on-site smoker slow roasts an assortment of meats to create savory dishes. We use sake as a key ingredient in most of our recipes to enhance our flavors. Sake also pairs wonderfully with an assortment of foods. We brew all of our sake on site, so come on by to try a tasting flight. Join us on a tour of our facility, learn a little history of sake, how it's made, and why it's the most exciting beverage in the craft alcohol space today. Tours available upon request daily and best of all they are FREE! The brewery is open from 12pm-10pm on Saturday. 5 min walk from Sultan Kebab.

Day 2: Sunday, June 2, 2019 - Upper Half of Blue Ridge Parkway to Bear Den Campground (approx. 8 h 37 min / 354 miles of driving)

6:00am - Depart Charlottesville

Ride along the Blue Ridge Parkway the entire way to Bear Den Campground & Creekside Cabins!

Breathtaking views. Plenty of easy curves. No stoplights, no billboards and no commercial vehicles. The Blue Ridge Parkway is one of the best motorcycle drives in America. The 469-mile, non-stop recreational motor road (part of the U.S. National Park Service) follows the ridge of the Blue Ridge Mountains, connecting Shenandoah and Great Smoky Mountains National Parks. It's not the drive for speed, with a 45-mph speed limit. There are plenty of overlooks to stop. You'll need to exit the Parkway to find food, gas and lodging. There is no admission fee and most of the things to do along the way are free. It's one of the most scenic routes in America.

9:30am - Coffee at Mill Mountain Coffee and Tea in Roanoke, VA

In the late 80's Dave Johnson, President and Founder of Mill Mountain Coffee and Tea, saw a void on the East Coast. That void was fresh, locally roasted coffee. The Virginia Tech alumni decided to leave Washington and start the journey to build a coffee empire. Since our start in 1990 we have dedicated countless hours to perfecting coffee to the taste of the Valley. Starting with our location in the heart of Downtown Roanoke we have grown to six distinct locations. In the endeavor of serving the best, most fresh product possible we roast coffee at 3 of our locations weekly. Alongside our artisan coffee we serve brewed teas from all over the world, fresh baked goods, and a full menu of breakfast and lunch items. There is a drive-through and abundant parking at their Starkey Road location, just off the Blue Ridge Parkway. Mon-Sat 6am-10pm; Sunday 7am - 10pm.

Noon - Lunch at **The Gap Deli** in Fancy Gap, VA

If you are traveling the Blue Ridge Parkway we are conveniently located just south of the Fancy Gap exit. From Delicious Sandwiches to Tempting Salads to our Homemade Desserts our menu has something for everyone. Love Hot Dogs? Build your own or try our General Lee or General Grant. Don't see quite the Sandwich you desire? Then build your own from our menu choices. We prepare all of our menu items with the freshest ingredients for taste and quality. Our sandwiches are known for their generous portions and their great taste! In the warmer months we offer outdoor dining where you can enjoy your meal while taking in the fresh air and cool breezes of

our mountains. Our beautiful gardens add a special charm. Open from 11am-5pm Mon-Thurs; 11am-7pm Fri-Sun.

4:30pm - Arrive at Bear Den Campground & Creekside Cabins

Nestled in the Pisgah National Forest, Bear Den Family Campground and Cabin adjoins the Blue Ridge Parkway at Milepost 324.8. For hikers, we have over 13 miles of trails and a 50 foot waterfall. We also have a lake/beach, basketball, volleyball, table tennis, shuffleboard, horse shoe courts, and a game room with pool tables, air hockey and arcade games. There is free WIFI hotspots at 3 locations throughout the resort. Bear Den's Trading Post has ice, drinks, firewood, souvenirs, and some food items. Reservation for Site D-23. \$35/night. 50% pre-payment made. Quiet time begins at 10pm and ends at 8am. No open display of alcoholic beverages. Check-in at 3pm. Check-out at noon.

Get groceries at Ingles Market in Spruce Pine, NC (17 min away / Open from 9am - 9pm Mon-Fri; 9am - 6pm Sat & Sun) and/or fruits & vegetables from The Produce Stand in Spruce Pine, NC (15 min away / Open from 9:30am-5:30pm Mon - Sat; closed Sundays) and/or meat from Foothills Butcher Bar in Black Mountain, NC (55 min away / small scale artisan butcher shop embracing a "whole animal philosophy" with a "browse and buy" butcher counter, featuring fresh local meats, including ground beef, pork chops, dry-aged steaks, house-made hot dogs, sliced deli meats, bacon beef or pork. Monday-Thursday: 8am-9pm, Friday: 8am-10pm, Saturday: 9am-10pm, Sunday: 9am-9pm) and/or Chop Shop Butchery in Asheville, NC (1 h 7 min away / "Bringing back the neighborhood butcher shop" - These animals live natural stress-free lives and are not treated with antibiotics, hormones or fed animal by-products and therefore produce healthy, great-tasting meat, including beef, pork, poultry, lamb, bison, other game, house made sausages and charcuterie, many of which are finished in our smokehouse located in our shop. Closed on Monday. Tues - Sat 10am-7pm. Sun 11am-3pm).

This ride would take 6 h / 340 miles via Highway 81 from the beginning.

This ride would take 7 h 39 min / 363 miles if we jump on highway after coffee stop in Roanoke.

Day 3: Monday, June 3, 2019 - The Diamondback / Boone / Mile High Swinging Bridge at Grandfather Mountain / Blowing Rock (4 h 32 min / 154 miles or 5 h 29 min / 164 miles of riding)

The Diamondback - NC 226A:

The Diamondback - NC 226A is a densely wooded trek, from Marion in McDowell County to Little Switzerland, on the edge of Mitchell County, NC at Milepost 334. An exciting and challenging drive, the two-lane route has smooth, well-marked pavement, flanked by rocky outcroppings, shear drop-offs and quick, tight hairpin curves. Just outside Marion, NC, The Diamondback - NC 226A - has more than 190 steep, climbing curves in just 12 miles. The temperatures cool as you climb the steep switchbacks looping almost 360 degrees. Runs of S-curves climb and twist sharply as they snake through lush green forest en route to the Blue Ridge Parkway just above Spruce Pine, North Carolina.

At its peak, The Diamondback joins the Parkway above Little Switzerland, NC. Expansive views of the mountain valley, shopping, dining and beverages, plus full-service accommodations and recreational amenities are available at Milepost 334.

Half the fun is getting there via The Diamondback - NC 226A. Sweeping curves, amazing scenery and cool mountain breezes make The Diamondback, NC 226A, a quick, fun route to North Carolina's Blue Ridge Parkway.

194 from Banner Elk to Valle Crucis:

This route makes one feel that they are in Switzerland. You will pass a beautiful stone Church that overlooks a valley with white cattle grazing the hillsides. You will encounter many stone structure and amazing views of the North Carolina mountains. The trees in many sections will canopy the road and give quite a show in the fall. What a road. If you love a few good hairpins and can negotiate a few off camber turns you're in for a treat. Road surface and markings are top notch and the road calls for high pegs and those who like to pull hard on the right grip. 194 E offers a good deal of elevation gain as you climb to Banner Elk.

The Mast General store in Valle Crucis has always been a popular local and tourist spot. It offers an old fashioned candy store for the kids and high quality outdoor clothing for the adventurer. You can grab a Blenheim Ginger ale and a Moon Pie and enjoy local bluegrass music on the front porch while relaxing in a rocking chair. Or you could grab an ice cream and set by the creek that runs along the store. There are service stations and restaurants once you reach Banner Elk, but who has time for that when you're on a crooked road.

Coffee at Hatchet Coffee Roasters in Boone, NC

Boone, North Carolina, named for pioneer Daniel Boone, is like a smaller version of nearby Asheville, tucked in the Appalachian Mountains. Here, the focus of nearly every business is local and sustainable. Boone's population is mostly students of Appalachian State University, and also includes some seasonal and year-round residents, all of whom lend the area a distinct funkiness. Every college town needs a coffee roaster to caffeinate its masses, but Hatchet isn't exactly what you'd expect. Located in an unassuming warehouse on the way to Rocky Knob Park, Hatchet shares space with Center 45, an indoor climbing gym. This is just one indicator of what type of customers Hatchet serves: lovers of adventure. Hatchet's menu is both expansive, with options like nitro cold brew, and approachable. Every drink is \$4 and under. The name Hatchet reflects a love of Boone's surroundings. "We very much wanted a brand that reflected the outdoors that we love. With that, we wanted a symbol that would be easily recognizable and relatable to those who also love the outdoors, and we felt that a hatchet truly embodied that." Like the tool itself, the roastery's ideal is to be simple in design and function. It represents hard work, independence, and quality. Hatchet is, after all, where you stop by before an adventure in the Blue Ridge Mountains. M-F 6am-8pm | Sat 7am-8pm | Sun 8am-6pm. 2 h 12 min from Bear Den Campground along The Diamondback, 19E and 194 from Banner Elk to Valle Crucis.

Visit the Mile High Swinging Bridge at Grandfather Mountain off of the Blue Ridge Parkway

One mile above sea level. A true landmark of a pioneering spirit, the Mile High Swinging Bridge welcomes all visitors to admire 360-degree panoramic views from Grandfather Mountain, a mountain estimated to be 300 million years old - with certain rock formations dating back 1.2 billion years. The bridge has been in place since 1952 — and for just as long it's excited the thousands who've walked across with the thrills of mile-high elevation. Whether you cross it to challenge yourself, for the scenery, or to admire this engineering masterpiece, the experience will make your trip to Grandfather complete. The Mile High Swinging Bridge, America's highest suspension footbridge, was built to give visitors easy access to the breathtaking view from Grandfather Mountain's Linville Peak. The 228-foot suspension bridge spans an 80-foot chasm at more than one mile in elevation. Erecting the bridge took three weeks, a process slowed by inclement weather created by a hurricane off the North Carolina coast, and cost \$15,000 in 1952. The bridge was rebuilt in 1999 using the original towers. The cables, floor boards and side rails were all replaced using galvanized steel. The cost of rebuilding was \$300,000. Hours: Daily from 9am - 6pm. \$22/adult. Ticket sales end one hour before the park closes. 47 min / 24.5 miles from Hatchet Coffee along the Blue Ridge Parkway.

Lunch at The Speckled Trout Restaurant and Bottle Shop in Blowing Rock, NC

Located in downtown Blowing Rock, The Speckled Trout explores the roots of Appalachian food and beverage culture, and re-create it by preserving and reviving ingredients of our local heritage. To accompany the celebration of our regional dishes, our beverage program focuses on terroir-driven libations. The term terroir evokes a sense of place, and in our shop this is evident in everything we do. The bottle shop emphasizes traditions of fermentation practices by offering some of the best "home-grown" beers and ciders around. In addition, our wines highlight small producers from old world to new.

In the 1950s, The Speckled Trout was a place to stop and fill up your gas tank. Now, you can fill up on fresh mountain trout, soup beans and hoecakes, and wash it down with local farm beer or fresh rosé. Open from 11am - 9 or 10pm Thursday through Monday; closed Tuesdays and Wednesdays. 41 min / 18.6 miles from Mile High Swinging Bridge along 221.

Ride 51 min along the *Blue Ridge Parkway* from The Speckled Trout back to Bear Den Campground or 1 h 48 min through Globe along some other crazy mountain roads.

<u>Day 4: Tuesday, June 4, 2019 - Roan Mountain / Johnson City / The Snake / Abingdon / Green Cove Station (7 h 14 min / 277 miles of riding)</u>

Roan Mountain:

The ride over 6,000 foot high Roan Mountain from Tennessee to North Carolina is a well known classic motorcycle route. Fantastic views from the overlook at the top of Roan Mountain at the NC/TN line. Rip roarin' curves. Many switchbacks and very few straights and very few cars. You basically climb Roan

Mountain on one side and back down the other. There is nothing on the mountain except an overlook and hiking area.

Coffee at **Dos Gatos Coffee Bar** in Johnson City, TN

A coffee bar in the heart of downtown Johnson City, TN. You won't find actual cats here, but you will find delicious coffee, friendly baristas, and a great little community. We also accept resources for cats. The Market Square parking lot leads to our back entrance, and there's plenty of street parking and other parking lots throughout downtown. Our hours are 7 am-6 pm Monday-Friday, 9 am-6 pm Saturday, and 10 am-5 pm Sunday. 1 h 43 min / 66.9 miles from Bear Den Campground along Roan Mountain.

If this trip is taken on Wednesday instead, visit the Johnson City Farmers Market in Johnson City, TN

The Johnson City Farmers Market has been around since 1976. It began as a cooperative effort between markets in Johnson City, Kingsport, and Bristol. As of 2016, the Johnson City Farmers Market is now located at The Pavilion at Founders Park. It is open mid-April through October on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 7 a.m. - 2 p.m. At the Johnson City Farmer's Market you will be able to enjoy fresh produce, baked and canned goods, arts and crafts, and community fellowship. 4 min ride / 6 min / 0.3 mile walk from Dos Gatos Coffee Bar.

The Snake:

This route takes you from Mountain City, TN to Holston Valley riding through the Cherokee National Forest. Riding through mountains and valleys with great vistas and ending with a view of South Holston Lake. The Snake is said to have "489 curves, 3 mountains, 1 valley packed into 33 miles!"

As you leave Mountain City, riding through the Cherokee National Forest, there are some great views as you ascend over the first mountain ridge on some of the best twisties in the area. The climb over the second ridge is as good as the first with more twisting/turning roads that will leave you feeling exhilarated. The ride ends up in Holston Valley after crossing Holston Lake. An Annual Rune Rally is held in nearby Erwin, TN and this ribbon of asphalt a definite favorite among the Rune riders.

Visit the **Shady Valley Country Store** in Shady Valley, TN

Right in the middle of **The Snake**, Shady Valley Country Store is a must stop for **The Snake** merchandise. Built in 1948, the store is a famous stop for bikers traveling through. Don't forget to leave a push pin on their map of the world to help them track their visitors. They also offer non-ethanol gas and fried bologna sandwiches. Open Mon-Sat 7am-8pm & Sun 9am-6pm. 39 min / 25.1 miles from Bonefire Smokehouse along **The Snake**.

Lunch at Bonefire Smokehouse & Musictorium in Abingdon, VA

We are a true Smokehouse offering delicious smoked meats and unique southern high country side dishes. We put no sauce on our meats. That's up to you. If you so choose, we have a variety

of tasty original recipe sauces. We are a true Musictorium dedicated to presenting exceptional live original music and bring to our stage some outstanding regional and national musicians. No cover bands. We will introduce you to some of the best live music offered in Southwest Virginia. We have been regionally and nationally recognized for our excellent smoked meats. In 2016, Bone Fire Smokehouse was the Regional Winner of Best BBQ by Virginia Living Magazine. In 2009, Bone Fire Smokehouse was awarded the honor of "Best Ribs in America" by Regis and Kelly. Sample menu items: Cornbread Fritters, Fried Pickled Okra, The Famous Smokehouse Wings (these jumbo wings are covered with our rib rub and then smoked for 2 hours before completing our 3 step cooking process), Bowl of Collard Greens, Mac Daddy Mac-n-Cheese, High Country Rueben, Baby Back Ribs, Cured Pork Loin. Open daily from 11am - 10/11pm. 50 min / 28.8 miles from Green Cove Station along Route 58.

Visit the Green Cove Station

Green Cove Station was built by the Norfolk and Western Railroad in 1914, and positioned on a stretch of track between Abingdon, Virginia and West Jefferson, North Carolina. The train and the line, became known as the Virginia Creeper because of its slow speed going up and over the mountains. Green Cove was a social center where folks gathered to get their mail, meet the train, and catch up on what was happening with their neighbors. Green Cove is the only original passenger station remaining on what was the Abingdon Branch. Green Cove Station and its contents were given to the Forest Service United States Department of Agriculture so that it might be restored and preserved. Today it serves as a gathering and resting spot for thousands of visitors to the Virginia Creeper Trail. No fee. Vault toilets. Open daily June - Oct 10am-4pm. 43 min / 25.6 miles from Boondocks Brewing Tap Room & Restaurant.

Maybe visit Boondocks Brewing Tap Room & Restaurant in West Jefferson, NC

Pub food with their own Brew Haus. Full service dining, two fully stocked bars with all ABC permits. Over 25 Craft Beers on Tap and a large bottle selection. Pet friendly covered outside dining and beer garden. Sample menu items: Chicken Wings (6, 12) with six choices of sauces/dry rubs, Cauliflower Zings, Fried Okra Salad, B.Y.O.Burger & Fries, Pot Roast Mac & Cheese, Shrimp & Grits, BBQ Pulled Pork Plate, Jalapeno Bottle Caps. Open from 11am - 9/11pm daily. 43 min, 25.6 miles from Green Cove Station.

Or stop for coffee at Bohemia in West Jefferson, NC

Small town coffee shop that surprises with quality and variety. Cozy atmosphere where you can sit on an assortment of comfortable chairs and couches, and take in the artwork or play board games. 1 min from Boondocks Brewing Tap Room & Restaurant.

Ride 2h 8 min / 80.7 miles back to Bear Den Campground along 88, 421, and the Blue Ridge Parkway.

This ride could be 5 h / 205 miles if we skip Johnson City, Green Cove Station, and West Jefferson.

<u>Day 5: Wednesday, June 5, 2019 - The Devil's Staircase / Lake James Loop / Chimney Rock / Black Mountain Rag / Asheville / Blue Ridge Parkway (5 h 42 min / 198 miles of riding)</u>

This could also be a rain day to be spent in Asheville. The Devil's Staircase can be squeezed in with one of the prior days. Black Mountain Rag and Chimney Rock can be squeezed in on a trip from the other campsite.

The Devil's Staircase:

The section from the Blue Ridge Parkway south on Route 80 is named The Devil's Staircase because of the steep grade and abundance of tight curves as you descend down off the Parkway. Get the feel of the road and go easy on the throttle, because this is a challenging road for about 6 miles. There is good pavement with a good guard rail system and plenty of turn offs if needed.

Lake James Loop:

Tucked into the rolling hill country at the base of mighty Linville Gorge is Lake James, a sprawling 6,812-acre reservoir with more than 150 miles of shoreline. This impressive waterway is the centerpiece of Lake James State Park, where nature offers scenic vistas of the Appalachian Mountain range. You will head towards Lake James on a hilly and winding road and then run along the north side of the Lake with some nice sweeping turns. There are plenty of places to stop and take in the Lake. The road will start to loosen up with some straight-aways where you will get some wider views of the distant mountains.

Coffee at Coffee on the Rocks in Chimney Rock, NC

Located along the Rocky Broad River in the heart of Chimney Rock Village, Coffee on the Rocks serves the best fresh roasted coffee, espresso, lattes, blended ice frappes and smoothies. We offer an assortment of snacks, protein bars, granola, and cold drinks for all the hikers and climbers. We will gladly assist you with information about the area, and be sure to see the Old Time Photo Saloon when you visit. Take a stroll along the Rocky Broad Riverwalk while you enjoy your coffee in beautiful surroundings and watch the kayakers or folks trout fishing. Mon-Sun: 8am-6pm. Wednesdays: close early at 12pm. 2 h 52 min / 104 miles from Bear Den Campground along The Blue Ridge Parkway, The Devil's Staircase, Lake James Loop (126), 70, 1001/1008, 64/74.

Black Mountain Rag:

Black Mountain Rag is a scenic route named for an old fiddle tune about the dark green Lauada Firs that give the Black Mountains their name. In musical terms, a "rag" is a tune with multiple twists and curves up and down the scales. This scenic route twists and turns through the mountains like the music itself. This is a gorgeous ride through the country on gorgeous mountain roads, flanked by running water and beginning at beautiful Lake Lure. Around every bend is another piece of landscape that just makes you stop and take pause. As you get nearer to downtown Chimney Rock, you are flanked on right by a

roaring river and beautiful rock formations. Chimney rock in and of itself is impressive and the downtown area has many offering for food, retail and even a Harley Davidson store. There are a lot of sweeping curves, but they not intense curves. Road quality is good, very even. Many opportunities to stop.

Lunch at Buxton Hall in Asheville, NC

All-wood, whole hog barbecue. So much of Buxton Hall Barbecue was inspired by the venue chosen for the job: the old Standard Paper Sales Company building at 32 Banks Ave in the South Slope. It's an enormous, historic space that once served as a wood-floored roller rink in the 1930s, a boat show room before that, and various auto shops that had witnessed history in the making. Buxton Hall Barbecue smokes its hogs Eastern NC style, low and slow for 18 hours over hardwood coals, infused with vinegar mop, a Moss family recipe.

We look for the good stuff from local farms: Vandele Farms, Hickory Nut Gap Farm, Gaining Ground Farm, Wild Turkey Farms, Ten Mile Farm, Paper Crane Farm, Farm and Sparrow, Farm to Home Milk, and many others. Small parking lot across street for customers. Parking on the street is free. Open daily from 11:30-3pm and 5:30pm-10pm. 1 h / 33.6 miles from Coffee on the Rocks along Black Mountain Rag / 70.

Ride 1 h 45 min / 60.5 miles along the Blue Ridge Parkway back to Bear Den Campground.

<u>Day 6: Thursday, June 6, 2019 - Switch Campgrounds / Black Mountain / Franklin (2 h 24 min / 120 miles of driving)</u>

Pack up and Drive 2 h 24 min, 120 miles to Rose Creek Campground & Cabins

Stop for Coffee at **Dynamite Roasting Co.** in Black Mountain, NC

<u>Day 7: Friday, June 7, 2019 - Mountain Meander / Hellbender / Deal's Gap / Cherohala Skyway (5 h 2 min / 200 miles of riding)</u>

Upper Slice of Route 28 ("Mountain Meander"):

This trip takes you from Franklin, NC to the intersection of US Highway 74. If you like turns, twisties, switch backs, nice black top, this is the road for you. Most people like the Dragons Tail or Deal's Gap, I like this road better. Less traffic and safer. It feels like a self propelled roller coaster. It's a nearly non-stop series of left and right handers with a seamless transition between them. Legal speed limit posted is 55 MPH. You will be lucky to do that. So many curves. Knee dragging curves. Fresh blacktop in August 2018.

There are no shopping, camping, restaurants. However, along US highway 74 there are plenty of amenities and if you continue on Route 28 south as it passes through Franklin and merges with Highway 64, you can take this into Cashiers where you will find gas stations, food stops, etc. Close to the bottom of Route 28 there is a Gem Store and they will give you a FREE MAP of all the waterfalls in the area. Stop in and get a FREE MAP.

Coffee at Cardinal Coffee in Bryson City, NC

Local coffee house focusing on responsibly sourced, high quality coffees from around the world. Full espresso menu, smoothies, treats and art. Closed on Monday. Tues - Fri 7am-3pm; Sat & Sun 8am-4pm. 35 min / 20.4 miles along Mountain Meander.

Hellbender 28:

Heading north on the Hellbender 28, you find a completely different road experience with sweeping curves and drop offs, all lakeside in the Great Smoky Mountains. There are few drives in America that can equal the views as you travel this beautiful byway along Fontana Lake in North Carolina. The 22 mile stretch is surrounded by water and dense, forested mountains. The 22 mile stretch ends at Deals Gap and begins what is then called the famous "Dragon."

These two lane mountain side roads are in great shape. There is little commercial traffic which leaves plenty of wide open space for the cycling public.

At the halfway point on this roadway, you come to Fontana Village at Fontana Dam, NC. The motorcycle friendly resort looks directly into the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and offers a lodge, cabins, camping and even houseboats for rent. They have a great selection of restaurants, retail outlets and amenities for the vacationing cycle enthusiast. Many cycle clubs use this resort to base their events out of because the Hellbender 28 intersects the famous Dragon at Deals Gap. In addition, the resort has a great roadside pitstop called "Hellbender 28 Pitstop" with food, gear and plenty of great tee shirts.

Deal's Gap ("The Tail of the Dragon"):

The *Tail of the Dragon*, or simply, *The Dragon*, on US-129, is known the world over as a biker destination. This eleven mile stretch of road has 318 curves, making it one of the most challenging and exciting motorcycle rides anywhere.

Thousands of motorcycle enthusiasts take their place in motorcycling lore by participating in the tradition of riding the *Tail of the Dragon* every year.

With all the talk of mountain vistas and great views, you may think you are missing out by focusing on the road. Don't worry, the views are not the point of the *Tail of the Dragon*. Take your eyes off the road and you and your bike will likely end up in the trees.

Cherohala Skyway:

The *Cherohala Skyway* gets its name from combining the names of the two national forests it passes through, the Cherokee National Forest and the Nantahala National Forest. NOTE: It is a good idea to top off your tank at the Shell station across from Harrah's Casino in Cherokee. According to many motorcycling enthusiasts, this route is one of the best motorcycle rides in the United States. Since the Skyway is a point to point ride, it really doesn't matter if you begin in Robbinsville and end in Tellico Plains or vice versa. Either way, the 51.8 miles of road in front of you are straight out of a dream.

The Santeetlah Overlook is a must stop for anyone wanting the complete experience. This overlook is located in North Carolina, about 7 miles from the Tennessee state line. The views from this overlook are amazing given that it sits at 5,390 feet, the highest elevation on the Cherohala Skyway.

Highlights: Two national forests, long curves, scenic views, leisurely ride, low traffic

<u>Day 8: Saturday, June 8, 2019 - Cherokee Run / Thunder Road / Wheels Through</u> <u>Time Motorcycle Museum / Waynesville (4 h 56 min / 184 miles of riding)</u>

Thunder Road:

Drive *Thunder Road* and you can spend most of the day on a relaxing ride. This course begins and ends in Maggie Valley, NC, taking a 140 mile lollipop-type route (to borrow a hiking trail term).

The back roads give you plenty of time to just enjoy your bike and take in the scenery. A large portion of this route is under the cover of trees and next to the Wayah Creek.

You will find several turnouts along the route where you may stop and enjoy the Nantahala River. You might even spot a few rafters having a good time in the water.

Don't relax too much though! Wayah Road, which makes up a large percentage of the route, provides plenty of twisties and switchbacks to challenge your driving skills. You will not forget that you are riding on mountain roads.

If you are looking for beautiful scenery with lakes, creeks, trees, switchbacks, twisties, elevation changes, open roads, and fewer riders, try the *Thunder Road* motorcycle route.

Coffee at Mountain Perks in Bryson City, NC

Cherokee Run:

The scenery along this route is some of the prettiest ever seen, with the road carved out of the mountain. The mountain is so close to the edge of the road if you have a passenger they could probably reach out and touch the rock. There is water at the bottom of the valley you are traveling through for most of the trip. For part of this road you will enter the Cherokee Nation's reservation. It carries you also through Maggie Valley which is worth the trip just by itself.

The road because of being cut through from the mountainside is narrow, and the top speed is about 40 at best. Some of the turns are difficult so if you are going through this route as a warm up to riding the Tail of the Dragon this would get you in the mood. Good twisties with large elevation changes along the way.

Cherokee itself offers a full up casino, and all the amenities that would involve. Getting gas along this route is chancy at best. If you have a thirsty bike it would be best to fill up at Lunaska Lake first. There is a gas station at Cherokee. Maggie Valley is a really nice tourist stop with camping, and food as well as shopping in a beautiful setting (Cherokee Run is a section of Thunder Road.)

Visit the Wheels Through Time Motorcycle Museum in Maggie Valley, NC

Day 9: Sunday, June 9, 2019 - Shiner's Run ("The Rattler") / Hot Springs (5 h 37 min / 214 miles of riding)

Shiner's Run ("The Rattler"):

You've ridden the Dragon, now ride the best. Ride 209 The Rattler. Located just outside of Hot Springs, NC, it twists and turns all the way to Lake Junaluska, NC. Traveling through the Pisgah National Forest and over the Great Smokey Mountains is Hwy 209 "The Rattler", some of the most attention demanding but beautiful riding you will ever experience. Once you've successfully ridden "The Rattler", you will understand why all the others were merely preparation rides. There are over 234 twists, turns and curves from Lake Junaluska to Hot Springs and another 30 from Hot Springs down to the Bobarosa Saloon.

We think the "Rattler" is better than the Dragon's Tail, Hellbender, The Snake or The Devil's Triangle for scenic beauty and for testing your riding skills. There are old farms, rock bed rivers, scenic mountain overlooks, old churches. Road is in good shape and provides riders with a bit of everything; twisties, high-speed sweepers, switchbacks, S-turns, elevation changes and a couple of scenic straightaways through farm land.

Shiner's Run (aka "The Rattler") starts at I-40 and ends in Hot Springs. About half way to Hot Springs is the Trust General Store and Cafe which is very biker friendly and serves a mean cheese steak. Hot Springs, at the end of the ride, is a great ending spot with a handful of restaurants and stores. Don't miss the Iron Horse restaurant/hotel!

Lunch at Trust General Store & Cafe in Hot Springs, NC

<u>Day 10: Monday, June 10, 2019 - Great Smoky Mountains National Park / Gatlinburg / Cades Cove Loop / Foothills Parkway / Dragon & Hellbender Revisited (6h 44 min / 227 miles of riding)</u>

Bring a picnic lunch to eat in Cades Cove.

Visit the Salt & Pepper Shaker Museum in Gatlinburg, TN

At the world's only salt and pepper shaker museum, you will see over 20,000 sets of salt and peppers shakers from around the world and a huge pepper mill collection. The \$3.00 Admission per Adult, goes towards any Salt and Pepper Shaker purchase in the gift shop. Open daily from 10am - 2pm. 1 h 42 min from Rose Creek Campground & Cabins the way the GPS goes.

Cades Cove Loop:

The entrance to Cades Cove is just 27 miles from Gatlinburg and a mere 9 miles from Townsend; it is an easy day ride. The route is a one-way, single lane, eleven mile, paved road, looping around a small mountain valley alongside an old logging railroad track described by many as "majestic".

Weather permitting, the loop is open from sunrise to sunset for most vehicles, except on Wednesday and Saturday mornings from May to September. On those two days of the week, only foot traffic and bicyclists are allowed to use the loop until 10:00 am. After 10:00 am, cars and motorcycles are allowed to enjoy the route. The scenic driving tour through the Cades Cove Loop takes approximately two to four hours depending on traffic.

Cades Cove is by far the most visited destination in Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Each year, more than two million people escape the rigors of daily life for the pastoral calm of Cades Cove.

Cades Cove is a former settlement with a population of 271 at its height in the early 1800's. As you wind through the cove, you can see churches, log cabins, barns, and other buildings original to the settlers, including a smokehouse and a blacksmith shop. The National Park Service maintains the buildings and allows visitors free access. The Cable Mill along the loop is the only working grist mill in the Smoky Mountains. The Cable Mill Visitors' Center is 41 min from The Artistic Bean.

Another highlight is the abundance of wildlife wandering around. Expect to see deer, rabbits, turkeys, coyotes, and even black bears roaming freely.

The Cades Cove Nature Trail is known for its blooming dogwoods in the spring. The trail is short and ideal for Cades Cove drivers who want to stretch their legs.

Foothills Parkway:

Highlights: Panoramic mountain vistas, foliage, easy ride, slight curves, straightaways, water

The Foothills Parkway travels along the western ridge of the Chilhowee Mountain with amazing views on both sides. As you drive along the Parkway, stop at any of the overlooks to enjoy the scenery. To the north is the Tennessee Valley and to the south, the Smokies. Don't worry about large trucks or other commercial vehicles getting in your way, they are banned from driving on the Parkway. In addition, you will not see billboards, homes or commercial buildings. The Foothills Parkway is as pristine as it gets. The only man-made thing you will see from the seat of your bike, is the road.

The highest point on Chilhowee Mountain is a knob called Look Rock. We suggest stopping and taking in the view it provides. To get to the Look Rock Observation Tower, follow the signage to the parking area just off the Parkway, then walk the half mile trail. The view from Look Rock provides the best vantage point on the Parkway to see Mount LeConte, Clingman's Dome, and other points of interest.

Ride 2 h 55 min, 106 miles back to Rose Creek Campground & Cabins along *Foothills Parkway, Deal's Gap ("The Tail of the Dragon"), Hellbender 28 and Mountain Meander.*

Day 11: Tuesday, June 11, 2019 - Waterfall Byway / Copperhead Loop (6 h 13 min / 257 miles of riding)

Waterfall Byway:

This road is a winding path through the Great Smokey Mountains. Along this road you will see a beautiful river gorge that has carved its way through some of the Smokey Mountains. The road passes by and through over ten beautiful waterfalls and is the reason it is known as the "Waterfall Byway". You'll be able to see the Cullasaja Falls that dive over 300 feet in elevation along about a half of a mile of river. It gives you a great view of the Cullasaja River and its gorge, Lake Sequoyah and as the huge Smokey Mountains.

It starts out pretty tame as it passes through some gentle rolling farm country but after a while it starts climbing into Higdon Mountain. The road parallels the path of the Cullasaja Gorge. As the road slithers around the mountains, it becomes more narrow and curving. However, keep in mind that, for those who like to have the road all to yourself, unfortunately crowds can be a problem in this popular North Carolina resort area.

The town of Franklin calls itself the "Gem Capital of the World" because of the local ruby, garnet and sapphire mines. The highlight of this road is Dry Falls. Here you can take a trail UNDER THE 75 FOOT WATERFALL. At Bridal Veil Falls dive 120 feet. Recently US 64 has been developed and rerouted to go around the falls. Yet a portion of the older US 64 remains and still travels under the falls themselves. The road ends in the town of Highlands North Carolina. This is the highest town in North Carolina sitting at 4,118 ft. It is has extremely lush and green surroundings due to the fact that it is also North Carolina's wettest town. In Highlands you will find tons of B&Bs, shops, and art galleries as well as restaurants. This town is a popular tourism center.

Coffee at The Daily Grind & Wine in Murphy, NC

Located in a historic building in quaint downtown Murphy, the Daily Grind & Wine is a full service coffee shop serving espresso, cappuccinos and lattes. We are the only retail wine shop in the area and include a Celtic themed wine and beer bar specializing in regionally crafted brews. Live music every Wednesday and Friday (5pm-7pm) and dart tournaments and an open jam session every Thursday starting at 5pm. Mon-Tues 8am-6pm or later; Wed-Fri 8am-8pm or later; Saturday 8am-4pm; Sunday closed. 1 h 5 min, 52.7 miles along Waterfall Byway.

Lunch at Mountain Fresh Grocery & Wine Market in Highlands, NC

Upscale grocery offering a butcher, bakery and award-winning wine market, plus a deli, grill & wood-fired pizza. Lunch 11am - 6pm on Sunday / until 9pm the rest of the week. 1 h 32 min, 74.9 miles back from The Daily Grind & Wine along Waterfall Byway.

Copperhead Loop:

Western North Carolina offers many excellent roads for the motorcycle or sports car enthusiast, but there is one loop that offers everything you could ever want for an enjoyable ride. This beautiful route has long been a secret among local riders, who appreciate its beauty and its easy access. This route, called the "Copperhead Loop", is a perfect combination of the characteristics that make a great road.

This isn't just a curvy road with tight twists and turns that requires expert technical skill to extract the maximum enjoyment of the ride and you won't have to drive hours out of your way to experience its magic. Instead, the Copperhead Loop offers a challenging ride, wonderful scenery, easy access from major roads as well as access from the Blue Ridge Parkway.

As with its namesake, the Copperhead demands respect. While you may not be facing a dragon, a rattler or a diamondback, the Copperhead can inflict a nasty bite if not given due caution. Compared to other popular roads in the area, The Copperhead offers many of the same thrills yet so much more. This loop offers technical curves to test even the most experienced rider, as well as relaxing sweeping turns and rapid elevation changes. As an added plus, the road has posted speed limits that allow you to enjoy a spirited ride without fear of breaking the law.

There truly isn't a better combination of roads for a motorcyclist or sports car enthusiast to enjoy. We recommend that you start the Copperhead Loop in Pisgah Forest traveling north on US 276. Doing so allows you to be facing Looking Glass Falls and Sliding Rock as you ride north and when you turn onto NC 215 you will also be facing the creek and waterfalls as you climb toward the Blue Ridge Parkway there.

The route has switchbacks, sweepers, and elevation grade changes both up and down. There are gas stations and restaurants in Pisgah Forest and in the Cruso section of the loop.

Ride 3 h 41 min / 137 miles back to Rose Creek Campground & Cabins along *Waterfall Byway* and *Copperhead Loop*.

This route could be 4 h 27 min / 161 miles if we skip going out to Murphy.

The menu is curated around convenience to cater to commuters and includes drip coffees, espressos, cappuccinos, lattes, nitro cold-brew on draft, Lenny Boy Brewing Co. kombucha and pastries. The name "CupLux" hints at the luxury that goes into craft coffee making — and drinking. It's short for "cupping luxury." Bonus: If you pull up with your dog in the car, there should be a pup treat waiting. 11:30am - Lunch at Brewery Bhavana in Raleigh, NC

Brewery, dim sum, book and flower shop: Brewery Bhavana is a modern-day urban bazaar in the heart of Raleigh. Dim sum—and then some. Brewery Bhavana excels at dim sum—the seafood dumplings, peking duck and Xiao Long Bao soup dumplings are absolutely can't-miss—but where this unique and highly lauded Raleigh newcomer shines is in its multi-faceted concept. With a bookstore, flower shop, restaurant and brewery all under one beautiful, airy roof, the project is as ambitious as it is exceptional. Marvel at the white granite tap wall, featuring an impressive 40 house and local brews, and relax under the skylight in the garden area with a good book from the in-house library. (Bida Manda, the next door sister Laotian restaurant, is also worth a visit.)

Growing up in Luang Prabang, some of our earliest memories are of morning steam rising from bao baskets and the busyness of dim sum restaurants. Once the capitol of the kingdom, Luang Prabang sits at the heart of Laos, along the Mekong River. As the river stretches from the Tibetan Plateau, through China's Yunnan Province, and travels south, it carries travelers, cultures, ideas, and cuisines. This is how Chinese cooking and dim sum came to Laos and arrived in our lives. Literally translated as "touch the heart," dim sum began as welcoming bites served at teahouses along the Silk Road in China. For us, at Bhavana, dim sum means more than humbly touching the heart; it also means discipline and finesse: a mastery of our hands and their gentle but firm relationship with flour and water. Dim sum represents a moment at the crossroads: an encounter between people and their stories. We hope the connections made at our tables are as nourishing and bright as they might have been for those ancient travelers. Open for lunch Weds - Sun 11:30am - 2pm. Owner Sunny Baweja, arguably the most gracious, engaging host in all of Richmond. Don't be surprised if, even on the busiest night, he swings by your table. Richmond is rife with brunches, but none quite like this one: \$20 brings three courses, including a witty, rewarding take on chicken and waffles. This is where to take that friend who professes not to like Indian food. Because, as Baweja's restaurant exuberantly demonstrates, there's so much more to Indian food than just curries. Sample menu items: coconut curry scallops; Lahori lamb shank; duck Pondicherry; tamatar coconut soup, malvani rassa goat, surf & turf curry (grassfed domestic lamb, wild salmon, prawns, tamarind-garam masala). Monday - Thursday 04:30 PM till 10:00 PM; Friday 04:30 PM till 10:30 PM; Saturday 03:00 PM till 10:30 PM; Sunday 03:30 PM till 09:00 PM. 2 h 46 min from Brewery Bhavana.

And/Or Dinner at Shagbark in Richmond, VA

The pristine bounty of the waterways, farms and fields of the region, served up by Chef Walter Bundy (ex-Lemaire), who sings most sweetly with careful and loving preparations of fish and shellfish. Take a ski lodge out west and cross it with a warm, cozily appointed bistro, and you have this splashy arrival in a nutshell. You'll love being connected to the terroir of this abundantly rich region and the many artisans who make up the larger culinary culture. Sample menu items: hand-cut rosemary pappardelle & Seven Hills short rib; Chincoteague clam chowder; lemon & mint grilled Atlantic swordfish; Eastern Shore seafood bouillabaisse; hotsmoked salmon "Indian Candy" & cellared apple salad; slow-braised & crispy fried Autumn Olive Farms pork belly; spiced Virginia-grown carrot cake, Early Mountain Vineyards rosé crème brûlée. And/Or Dinner at **L'Opossum** in Richmond, VA

James Beard-nominated food that is as joyous as it is elevated. From the caviar-bedazzled "Fabergé" egg to "Darth Grouper," this is serious whimsy on a plate. The decor is a bordello-like riot of velvet and gold leaf, with all manner of nerdy "Star Wars" kitsch as well as a few naughty bits. Warning if you suffer from coulrophobia — a fear of clowns. Sample drink: The Laura Palmer — gin, muddled cherries with dry vermouth and Luxardo. Yes, the glass is wrapped in plastic. Sample menu items: Tangier Island oysters rock in a green fairy fog of absinthe mist; Fabergé egg with caviar and dill-cured salmon; seared Hudson Valley foie gras; and filet mignon of beef "Swellington" — a filet stuffed with truffled duxelles and duck butter. Stroll through **Downtown Asheville**

You feel it the moment you begin strolling through Asheville's vibrant city center – it's an unmistakable mountain vibe that has beckoned visitors to this region time and again. Lining the streets of this walkable neighborhood you'll find a wide array of independent shops, craft breweries, lively street performances, and some of the best dining options in the southeast.

Check out Asheville's Beer Scene

Asheville, North Carolina's beer scene is an amazing array of micro breweries, full scale breweries, cideries, and fine dining. Being voted Beer City USA 4 years in a row, Asheville takes extreme pride in being home to over 20 local craft brewers. As a result, Asheville, per capita has one of the highest rates of craft brew consumption in the South. Many of the breweries are located within walking distance of one another, with new businesses opening on a yearly basis. Asheville's South Slope is an up and coming area in the heart of downtown, boasting Green Man, Catawba Brewing, Twin Leaf, Burial Beer, Wicked Weed Funkatorium, and more.

Visit The Biltmore

Billed as America's largest home, George Vanderbilt's 250-room chateau is as impressive today as it was more than a century ago. Biltmore House was a collaborative effort between George Vanderbilt, architect Richard Morris Hunt, and landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted. Completed in 1895, the home contains over four acres of floor space, including 35 bedrooms, 45 bathrooms, and 65 fireplaces. Your self-guided house visit spans three floors and the basement. You'll see displays of vintage clothing, accessories, art, furniture, and more that tell stories and illustrate the lives of the Vanderbilt family, their guests, and employees. The Biltmore's stunning gardens have been included in the Top Ten Botanical Gardens of the World by Travel + Leisure. Your self-guided visit is included in estate admission. Stroll through America's Largest Home® on a marked route, assisted by knowledgeable guides along the way. This tour takes 1.5 to 2 hours, depending on your pace. You'll drink in all the amazing sights of architecture, artwork, and much more from the Gilded Age. Also includes your free visit to Antler Hill Village and Winery, with free winery tastings. Admission: prices vary based upon the day of the week and the season of the year: \$60 - \$85/adult.

Visit the **Asheville Pinball Museum**
