Beijing—Pearl Lam Galleries congratulates its artist Zhu Jinshi on his first solo museum show in China, to take place at Beijing's Inside-Out Art Museum from 14 November, 2015 to 31 January, 2016. The museum invited Melissa Chiu, the director of the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden in Washington, D.C., to curate the exhibition. This three-month solo exhibition will showcase over 20 paintings and installations created by the artist over the past 30 years.

Zhu Jinshi, born in 1954 in Beijing, is one of the pioneers of Chinese abstract and installation art. He began to create abstract paintings in the early 1980s and moved to Berlin in 1986, where he began to experiment with performance, installation, and conceptual art. In 1994, Zhu returned to China, dividing his time between Berlin and Beijing until 2010. Currently, he lives and works in Beijing.

The curator and artist have integrated the museum space in their conception of the exhibition; the three-level space enables Zhu's thick paintings to be recreated in the given space. The third level will feature Zhu Jinshi's representative abstract paintings from the early 80s (1983–86), which have never been shown to the public. Not only are these the earliest testimonies of Zhu's self-expression before he was influenced by Western art, but they are also examples of early Chinese abstract art. The first floor will showcase 10 selected works by Zhu Jinshi from 2005 until the present. The thickness of oil paint, folding of layers, and challenges against gravity are all part of his personal pursuit of and enquiry into the evolution of Chinese contemporary painting in the past decade.

To emphasise the relevance between painting and architecture and to question the traditional viewing experience, curator Melissa Chiu proposed that Zhu only show one work on the second floor. Building on that concept, the artist intends for the installation piece to represent painting and space at the same time—an embodiment of oneness. This redefinition of how audiences view paintings, combined with Zhu's installation work and explorations based on creative thinking all indicate the artist's aptitude for working with space, materials, and media. With a simple but non-minimalist presentation, the exhibition expresses a majestic and vigorous energy from the artworks themselves.

Drawing inspiration from both Chinese and Western cultures, Zhu Jinshi's works are not confined to any particular cultural system or nation; rather, they have taken on a contemporary identity. While the influence of traditional Chinese culture is present in his works, these contemporary abstract paintings and Zhu's continuous exploration of the art form over the past 40 years are a unique and enriching contribution to the history of abstract art.

About Zhu Jinshi

Zhu Jinshi was born in Beijing in 1954. His selected exhibitions include the special installation project *Boat* (2015), Pearl Lam Galleries in collaboration with Hongkong Land at Exchange Square, Hong Kong, China; *Simplicity* (2014) at Pearl Lam Galleries, Singapore; *Thick Paint: Jean Fautrier, Franz West, Zhu Jinshi* (2014) at Luxembourg & Dayan Gallery, New York, USA; *Zhu Jinshi: The Reality of Paint* (2013) at Pearl Lam Galleries, Hong Kong; *Zhu Jinshi* (2012) at Blum & Poe, Los Angeles, USA; *Power and Territory* (2008) at Arario Gallery, Beijing, China; *Orient/Ation*, 4th International Istanbul Biennial in Turkey (1995); *Fang* (1990) at DAAD gallery, Berlin, Germany; and The 1st Xing Xing (Stars Group) Exhibition (1979) at Gallery in Beihai Park, Beijing, China. His works have been collected internationally by notable public and private collections.

Dr. Melissa Chiu is currently Director of the Smithsonian's Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden. Previously, she was Director of the Asia Society Museum in New York. As a leading authority on Asian contemporary art, she guided a number of major initiatives at the Asia Society Museum, including the launch of a contemporary art collection to complement the museum's outstanding Rockefeller Collection of traditional Asian art. Chiu has curated more than 30 exhibitions of international art. Chiu has been an executive committee and board member of the Association of Art Museum Directors (2008–2012), a board member of The American Alliance of Museums (2010–2013) and sat on numerous committees, including the Academic Committee for the Shanghai Biennale and Bellagio Creative Arts Fellowship for the Rockefeller Foundation. Chiu has lectured at the Museum of Modern Art, Harvard, Columbia, Yale, and other universities and museums.
