

LOST HORIZON REVISITED

Our hero has reached his breaking point.

Either from a gradual accumulation of boredom, or disappointments, or from a single sudden catastrophic event, he finds himself on a third world passenger train high in the Himalayas. There are a few other interesting characters also sharing the

last car on a short line of coaches with spartan accommodations.

Suddenly an enormous avalanche roars down the mountain violently sweeping the train off the tracks and over a steep cliff. The entire train is now buried under a massive mound of snow at the bottom of an obscure ravine — except for the last car which been knocked loose from the rest of the train as so often happens in the movies. It is only partially covered with snow, but lands in a location obscured from any searchers.

As the survivors struggle to recover, and slowly succumb to hypothermia and their injuries, we see a group of Yeti sitting peacefully in a sophisticated ice structure. Suddenly they lift their heads as if listening to a distant call. A soft image of the distressed survivors forms above their heads. The Yeti immediately rise and prepare a rescue mission which includes plenty of warm, soothing broth and heavy fur blankets.

The Yeti arrive at the bottom of the ravine as the survivors are becoming desperate. Not wanting to scare the strangers, the Yeti sit at a respectful distance from the wreck displaying the food and blankets, and wait to be approached. The hero is the least injured and the most trusting, of course, so he is the first to gather the offered supplies for the others.

The Yeti croon to the hero with sounds similar to the song of whales. Once trust has been established and the survivors have had the













slightly doped broth, and seeing that they have little other chance of rescue, they allow themselves and their belongings to be picked up and carried off. They sleep in the arms of the Yeti while they spend hours crossing the vast and rugged terrain, which is completely devoid of any signs of habitation.

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We see an older woman (looking a lot like Ellen Burstyn) suddenly lift her head as if listening to a distant call. A soft image of the Yeti carrying the survivors appears over her head. She summons several men, and asks them to carry beds to the courtyard of their rustic compound before returning to their various duties. She alone waits for the Yeti's arrival as night falls.

There is a soft call of Yeti song, which she returns, as she opens the courtyard gates. Their conversation is translated for us by soft images over their heads. Once the Yeti depart with many gifts, men are again summoned to carry the survivors into the building where clean, sophisticated rooms are seen, and injuries are tended to.

When it is discovered that one of the survivors has sustained a leg injury more critical than the local people can heal, we see the older woman send out a silent request to the Yeti asking for help in transporting the injured woman to a distant village where there is an appropriate hospital and a safe friend to receive her.

The injured woman, an adventurous and sensitive soul on her own spiritual quest, is in too much pain to be tracking events too clearly, but realizes that this might be the place she was looking for all along, and spends a great deal of the rest of the movie trying to get back to this isolated and unknown destination.

Meanwhile, as the hero starts to recover, he sets out to discover where they are, and who their hosts might be. He finds that they are in some extremely remote area of the Tibetan Himalayas, and are

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


being cared for by a group of men and women of mixed nationalities and ages who are living serenely in a self sustained "spiritual retreat", content with having little contact with the outside world.

The older woman, the administrative head of the center, tells him that there is a small farming village in the valley below them next to a small river. There, a rough road leads to the next slightly larger village many miles away, but it is now the beginning of a long winter of deep snow, and they will all be isolated for the next 6-7 months. The village used to be called some obscure, made up Tibetan name, but in a bid to increase tourism, the villagers have changed its name to Shangri La. *Ta-da!!*

Six months, in which our survivors will have plenty of time to freak out, explore their options, learn a few things, discover their true selves, come to terms with their situation, evolve, and relax.

FILMING IN INDIA

SEEING IS BELIEVING


It has been suggested that filming take place in the Indian Himalayas, and research shows that the remote town of Kaza, India (population 3,231) is the highest town in the world (elevation 11,980 ft.) with year round access.

> Kaza is popular with tourists and adventure seekers because of its central location, which makes it an ideal base camp for trekking, mountaineering and tours of the valley. As such, they would likely welcome having the movie's structures remain to ultimately become rest stations on a scenic trail.

> The "Yeti House" (above) would be built as a rest stop at the 5-mile point with the "lamasery" built 5 miles farther on as a sheltered layover for the shorter 8-mile trip back to the starting point. Even at that altitude, it would be one-day trek each way.

The Yeti House would serve as an unofficial shrine to Lord Hanuman, a Yeti relative, and the lamasery would be an unofficial shrine to Lord Shiva, the Lord of Transformation. Making the trek even more attractive, both locations will have photos and memorabilia from the making of the movie.
