Central Artery Workshop To Discuss Ventilation Buildings And Local Streets

The first workshop meeting for the North Area/Central Artery will be held on Thursday afternoon, June 27, 1985. Representatives from the community North Area Task Force will attend these working sessions along with a representative from the Massachusetts Department of Public Works, the National Park Service, the Boston Redevelopment Authority, the Massachusetts

Port Authority, the Boston Traffic and Parking Department, and the Metropolitan District Commission.

The MBTA, Bunker Hill Community College, community business groups, and the City of Cambridge will be invited to future meetings when issues that affect them directly are being discussed.

These workshops are intended to be small working meetings. Issues discussed

will be brought to the larger monthly community North Area Task Force meetings. No Simple Answers To Concerns Regarding Old Charlestown High

Headache after headache. That's the situation surrounding the reconstruction of the former Charlestown High School on Monument Square into 44 apartments with an underground parking garage for 23 cars and an adjacent 17 car parking lot where the Spencer Building annex now stands.

First, there was the controversy concerning the improper removal of asbestos in the former school, followed by the debate of a Bartlett Street versus Monument Square garage entrance.

In an effort to alleviate concerns of the residents, the Graham Gund Associates and the residents have held two meetings to discuss these

topics. Lucy Ferullo from the Mayor's Office of Community Participation was the monitor for these heated and emotional meetings.

The first meeting, on Wednesday, June 5, dealt solely with the asbestos issue. The removal procedure was twice ordered

B.R.A. to Hold Public Meeting On Development Guidelines

The Boston Redevelopment Authority will sponsor an informal public session to discuss comments and suggestions on the draft development guidelines sent to Charlestown residents and organizations on May 13th. The meeting will be held on Thursday, June 20th, at 7:00

p.m. at the Charlestown High School cafeteria, 254 Medford Street.

B.R.A. staff will attend the meeting to discuss the land use and design guidelines for buildings 62, 96, 105 and 108 in the Navy Yard as well as parcels P-2,

R-23B, R-87A-E, R-59, D-2, P-16, X-41 and R-36 in the town. The session is part of a new process initiated by the B.R.A. to encourage community input into the design guidelines and disposition of various parcels in Charlestown.

stopped — once, for failure to allow the required 20 day advance notification regarding the removal; and the second stop order was issued due to the allegations that proper removal procedures were not being followed.

Since asbestos, the substance once used in many public facilities as a fire retardant, has been linked to cancer and lung disease, many residents fear they may have been exposed to asbestos dust. In an effort to alleviate concerns, the development team invited asbestosis specialist, Dr. Edward Gaensler, a professor of surgery and physiology at Boston University, to address the residents' concerns.

"Hysteria does not reflect fact," Gaensler told the audience, explaining asbestos related illness is dose-related not simply exposure-related.

The doctor compared the possible health hazard of the

asbestos exposure to that of receiving cyanide poisoning from eating almonds.

The doctor explained that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established a threshold limit considered to be safe for an individual working with asbestos. The EPA maximum level is two fiber per cubic centimeter which is considered safe exposure for a worker "for eight hours a day for forty years." According to the doctor, the fiber count at the high school is "less than one thousandth of the maximum allowance by the EPA."

The asbestos removal will resume at the school, but added precautions have been taken. John McAuley from the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering (DEQE) told the audience that the procedure will be closely monitored and air samples will be taken.

The building has been sealed and preparations

made for the asbestos removal. DEQE representatives will be inspecting the building on Thursday, June 20th and if the procedure meets the standards established by DEQE, the asbestos removal will commence.

The second issue surrounding the renovation, deals with the underground parking garage entrance. There are presently two suggested locations for the egress. On Tuesday, June 18, 1985 another meeting was held in the hopes of reaching a consensus of opinion. Peter McClure of Monument Square presented the argument in favor of the Bartlett Street location, while Dan Jaffe of Bartlett Street spoke in favor of the Monument Square entrance.

McClure outlined a plan, which called for leaving the entrance on the Bartlett Street and allowing two way traffic on Bartlett Street between Monument Square and Cross Street which would, according to McClure, direct traffic towards the Square.

Jaffe's plan, on the other hand, called for placing the entrance in the front of the former school.

Both sides argued the issues of public safety and minimal community impact. There was no consensus reached as neighbor fought neighbor.

Dick Loring from the City of Boston Traffic and Parking Department spoke from an engineering point of

view, stating it was his professional opinion using "some basic logic and engineering," that the Monument Square egress would prove to be the best location.

While those supporting the Monument Square egress proposal welcomed Loring's input, the opposing side, which supported the Bartlett Street side proposal, did not.

Monument Square is "already flooded as it is," stated one woman who referred not only to traffic generated by visitors to the Monument itself, but also by

those who using Concord Street and Monument Square in order to travel from on end of Charlestown to the other.

Phoebe Blake of Monument Square stated, "Everyone seems to feel we (Monument Square residents) have no rights. Well, we are impacted."

Peter Matson from Graham Gund Associates stated the development team is scheduled to appear before the Board of Appeal this coming Tuesday with a plan which represented the wishes of the neighborhood. "We

want at least one entrance. We are willing to do either (suggestion), but not to do neither," stated Matson. "There's a little of 'you're damned if you do, damned if you don't' here."

The problem, according to Matson, is "not an engineering answer to solve, it's a political bomb."

No solution was reached at the Tuesday night meeting. The Graham Gund Associates are scheduled to go before the BOA on Tuesday, June 25, 1985 at 11:00 a.m. in Room 801 at Boston City Hall.

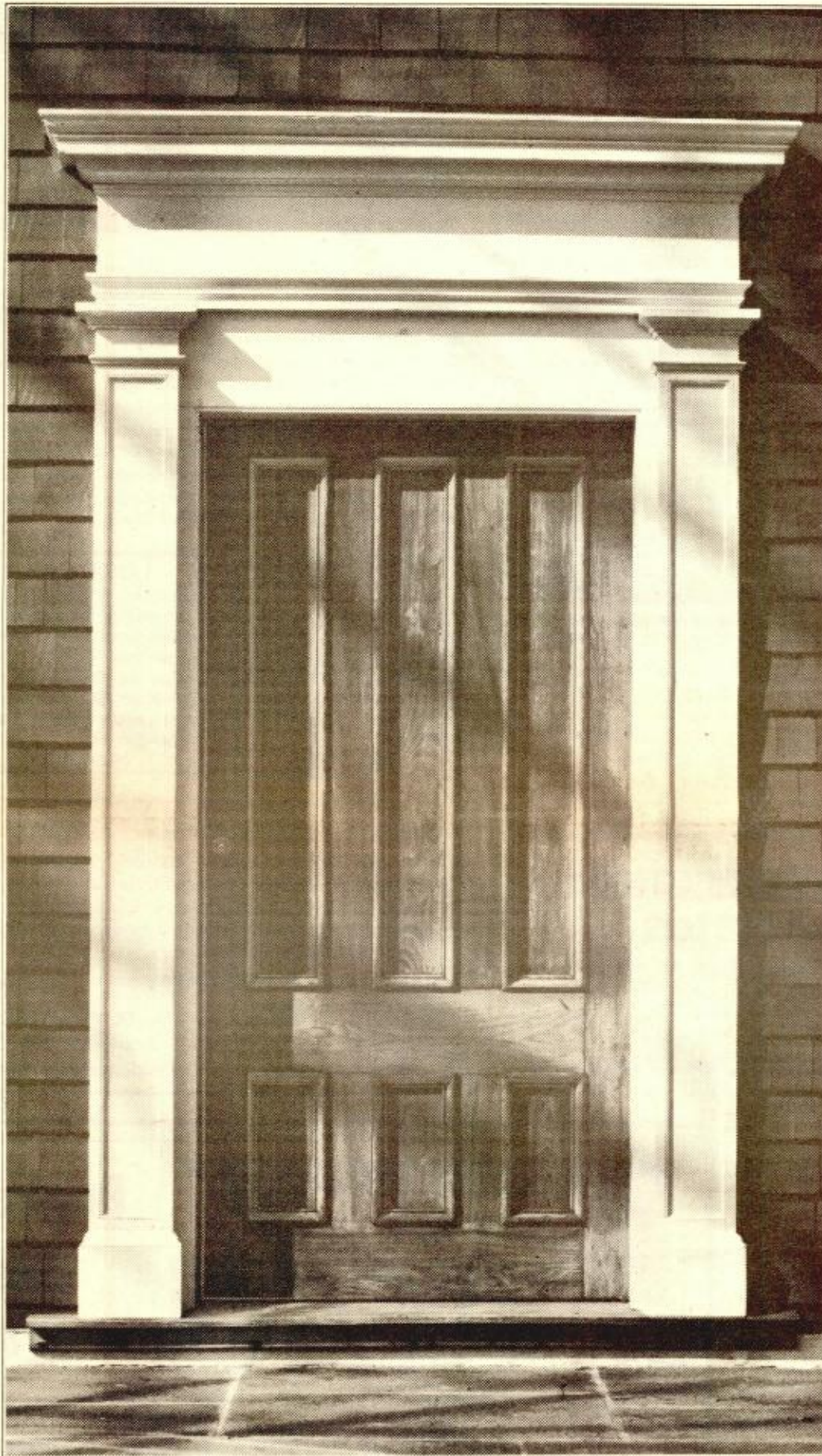

Central Artery Workshop To Discuss Ventilation Buildings And Local Streets

Local streets will be discussed at the workshops including Henley Street and minor adjustments to the surface street layout. The adjustments to the 1982 proposed design include such changes as sizes and shapes of the islands as well as a new left turn bay to Warren Street from Chelsea Street Southbound. Henley Street when submitted was to be closed to allow for the

development parcels on both sides to be combined into one parcel.

The other options that will be discussed at the request of the community will include leaving the existing northbound direction or reversing the direction to southbound which would provide a more direct connection from Main Street to Warren and Chelsea Streets without going into City Square. Closing Henley Street would allow for

pedestrian use and service to adjacent buildings. The impact on the overall street pattern and bus routes will also be discussed.

Ventilation building location options were discussed at the June 4th community meeting. Additional information on ventilation buildings will be given in future articles in *The Patriot*.

The North Area Task Force will be meeting on Tuesday, June 25th at 7:00 p.m. to choose delegates. The meeting will be held in the V.I.P. Room of the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street, Charlestown.

Construction Underway On North Washington Street Bridge

After years of inconvenience and reconstruction, all six lanes of the Charlestown - North Washington Street Bridge will reopen to traffic in one month's time. Joseph Massata of the City of Boston Department of Public Works reports the two outer inbound lanes, which

have been undergoing repair for over one year, will reopen in two weeks.

The bridge was restricted to two lanes inbound after engineers discovered functional defects in the structure. The lanes were closed to traffic shortly afterwards. Last month the bridge was

the site of an accident involving a truck which struck the steel beams of the center lane, causing extensive damage to the bridge and further adding to the inbound traffic congestion.

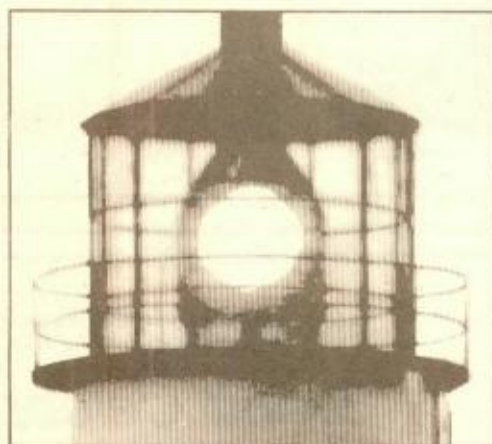

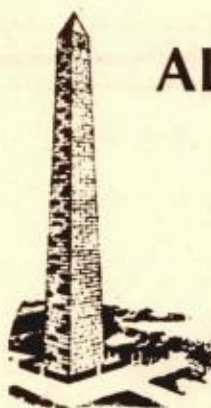

Sexual crimes are not as widespread in Charlestown as they may be in other areas of the city, but this does not mean Charlestown is immune from such crimes. The nature of sexual crimes is not location-related thus everyone is a potential victim — men, women, children, and the elderly.

Boston Police Department Detective Mary Evans from the Sexual Assault Unit was the guest speaker at the Police Community Relations Meeting held Tuesday, June 11, 1985. Evans addressed the nature of sexual crimes, the victims, and how the Sexual Assault Unit works to apprehend the sexual offender.

According to Evans, sexual crimes are not limited to the classic rape of a man jumping a woman walking down a dark street and raping her in the bushes. Rather

this type of rape accounts for only a small percentage of this crime. "We are finding more and more cases which prove otherwise," stated Evans, referring to instances where a group of men kidnap another man and make him perform sexual acts or have such acts performed on the man, or the case of a woman who receives a ride home from a man and invites him in for coffee and he rapes her.

In most sexual assault cases, the victim and the attacker somehow know each other, stated Evans. In fact, the Department of Social Services has submitted over 200 family-related abuse cases to the Sexual Assault Unit.

Located in Brighton, the twelve member detective unit is composed of six men and six women, one of whom is Spanish speaking. In the first month of ex-

istence, Evans stated over 600 sexual crimes were reported. The victims range in age from as young as two years to persons well into their seventies.

The Sexual Assault Unit is composing a master file of the offenders. Evans stated most rapists are repeat offenders who simply use the act of rape as a means "to have power over someone. Sexual gratification is not the reason for the act."

Evans referred to a study by Michael Gross entitled "Men Who Rape" which states there are two types of rapists. The first is anger or power motivated. The se-

cond is the sadistic rapist. The later, accounts for only a small percentage.

"Unfortunately, psychologists do not have a vaccine against rape," stated Evans.

Once an individual has been the victim of a rape, Evans states it is not unusual for the person to delay calling the police because of the emotional aspect of the crime, especially if they know the offender. "People think of the rape as a sex crime," stated Evans. "It's not. It is a crime acted out sexually."

The Sexual Assault Unit is operational 24 hours a day and has a "confidentiality

statute" which mandates that the victim's identity and relationship with the offender be held in the strictest of confidence.

The detectives in this unit investigate the crime and gather all possible evidence against the offender then they work with the area detectives in order to apprehend the person. "We build up evidence around the rape," stated Evans, "and area detectives back up investigations because they know the geography and characters in their area."

Evans told the audience if they were a victim of such a crime to place a call to 911

to receive immediate response. A member of the Sexual Assault Unit will be notified and assigned the case immediately.

Once sufficient evidence is obtained and the offender arrested, the detective stated it was important that the victim testify in court for the case to stick. "It's sad to say, but the burden is on the victim," stated Evans. "In this kind of case, for a conviction we must have the victim's testimony despite excellent evidence." As for the victim who testifies, Evans stated there was little danger. "Retaliation is 99% TV stuff."

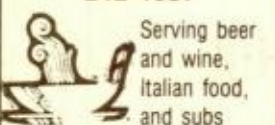

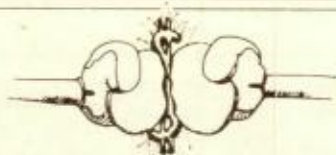

For a token fee of \$1.00, youngsters between ages 11 and 17 can sail every day all

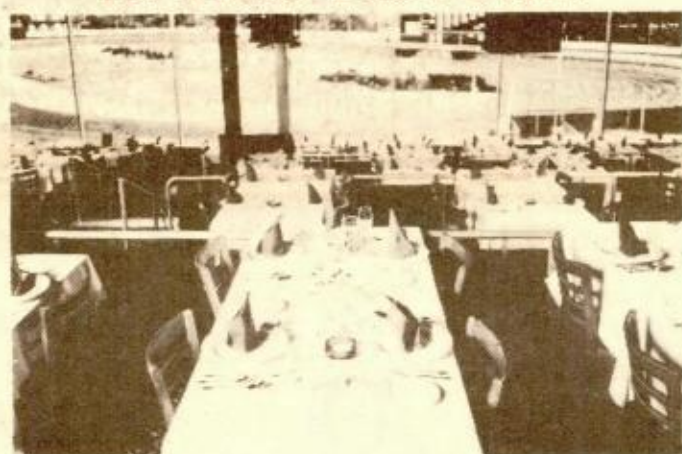

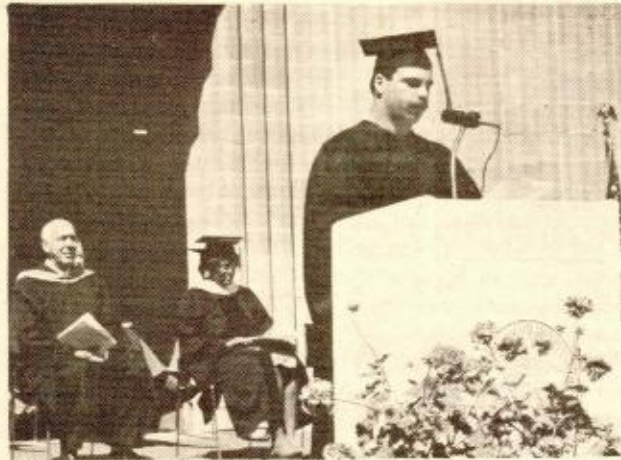
