Lackluster Election Reflected In Charlestown Vote

The 1986 Massachusetts State Election on Tuesday, November 4th will probably go down in the record books as the most lackluster election in recent history. The Republican candidates offered no real challenge to the strong Democratic party in this state. Even the eight ballot questions failed to pull voters from the warmth of their homes.

Charlestown recorded a 48% voter turnout, with 4331 of the total of 8941 registered voters in this ward, Ward Two, casting their ballots. This was some 12 percentage points lower then the 1982 election, which saw a 60% voter turnout.

Suffolk County District Attorney Newman Flanagan, well known locally for his involvement with the Knights of Columbus, was the top vote-getter in Charlestown with 73% of the vote cast. He was unopposed in his quest for re-election. Representative Richard A. Voke also captured 73% of the vote, followed by Robert Rufo for Sheriff of Suffolk County with 72%

Joseph Kennedy will replace retiring Con-gressman Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill in the Eighth Congressional District. Kennedy took 67% of the vote cast for that office in Ward Two, with Republican challenger

Clark Abt receiving only 25%.

There were a considerable number of blanks in the vote on the eight ballot questions, ranging from 308 blanks on Question Two (state aid to non-public schools) to 1088 blanks on Question Eight (requesting the Federal Government to enact a national acid rain control program).

Even though the total vote in 1982 was 471 more than in 1986, a precinct by precinct comparison of the ballot question on state aid to non-public schools points out some of the changes in the make-up of the precincts over the past four years. The precinct comparison is as follows:

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BOA Votes To Delay Action On Sheafe And Sackville Streets Proposal

by Rebecca Nevers The Boston Zoning Board of Appeals voted on Thursday, October 30th to delay action on a proposal to develop a lot between Sackville and Sheafe Streets, requesting the developer and area residents

Developer Joe Fidler, along with Sheafeville Realty Trust, is proposing to convert the existing house at 17 Sackville Street from a two-family unit to a three-family unit.

to resolve their differences.

Also proposed is the construction of a two-family unit at 19 Sackville Street and a two-family unit at 11-13 Sheafe Street.

However, neighboring residents claim that the proposal is too ambitious.

Stan Leonard of 21 Sackville Street, said he is concerned about the effect the new homes will have on an already severe parking situation in the area.

Leonard told board members, "If they put up this building, they're taking away parking. They add parking and they take away parking.

Mark Landsberg, architect for the developer, said six off-street parking spaces will be provided for the new homes.

Law requires developers to provide one off-street parking space for each new unit. Five new units are

But John Agri of 15 Sheafe Street, disagreed, saying that the number of on-street parking spaces will be reduced after construction is completed.

"Five spaces people use to park now on Cook Street Court and Sheafe Street would be gone," Agri claimed.

The owners of the new homes are allowed by law to use Sheafe Street and



Cook Street Court, both private ways, to access their property. Cook Street Court, currently a dead end, is used by some residents for parking.

Paul Wedge of 9 Cook Street Court, said he parks where the planned entrance will be and three cars park in front of the proposed Sheafe Street units.

"It's overcrowded now," Wedge added.

Concerns also were raised about safety.

Wedge said the distance from the sidewalk to the street is approximately 18 inches. "Where they want to use Cook Street Court, coming up, it's blind," he said. "My kids can't see cars."

Residents contend the fire hazard would be increased by crowding an already dense area.

Paul Goodwin of 14 Sackville Street, said two fires could have been less damaging had fire engines been able to reach the sites more easily.

A fire in July 1985 des-

troyed five homes on Sheafe Street, and another fire on Wall Street destroyed seven homes. In both cases, fire engines had difficulty reaching the fires.

Landsberg said sprinkler systems will be installed in the homes to reduce the fire hazard. He also said the proposed construction does not block fire lanes, nor will the cars block the street because they will be parked on the property.

Fidler said the fire on Sheafe Street was severe because fire fighters had to run a hose from 300 feet away, to the nearest working fire hydrant. He said his property is 130 feet away from that fire hydrant.

The developers are basing their proposal on the fact that the lot did accommodate two three-family houses at one time.

"We are replicating what was on the site previously," Landsberg said.

In response to complaints that residents were not notified of meetings, Fidler

said he attempted to meet with them. "We tried to show our revisions," Fidler said. "We were willing to listen, but they were saying not to do anything."

Fidler said he went doorto-door trying to notify residents of meetings, and he made phone calls to discuss the proposal. "But they wanted to wait until the meeting (Neighborhood Council)," he said. "We wanted to make a compromise and nobody wanted to compromise.'

He said his plans have been scaled down from a total of nine units to seven units, and parking was increased from four to six units as a result of resident

"Our new proposal has changed considerably from our original proposal," Fidler added.

Despite concessions made by the developer, Councillor Robert Travaglini urged the board to reject the proposal.

"All communications that have come into my office on this matter have come via opposition," Travaglini said. "My instincts on this matter tell me they're trying to do too much too fast on too little space.

Councillor-at-Large Albert "Dapper" O'Neil also urged the board to reject the proposal.

"They've had the meet-ings," O'Neil said. "The


community is aware of what's going on.

"Now they're waking up and realizing that every inch of land is being invaded," he added. "Let's not jam in everything we can in Charlestown."

Board member Chiu Ming-Sze requested Fidler draft plans and show the landscaping and adjacent properties.

"All I can see is car space (on the current plan)," Sze said. Board Secretary James Farmer suggested the vote be delayed. "I would rather defer it so they can discuss it," Farmer said.

The next meeting is scheduled for December 11th at 10:00 a.m.

Charlestown Working Theater To Visit Melbourne In Performing Arts Exchange

Four actors representing the Charlestown Working Theater will leave for Melbourne, Australia this next week as part of a cultural arts exchange. The Charlestown troupe will be part of a 30-member artistic group from Boston, who will perform in the Australian city for a week.

As part of United Airlines' Royal Pacific Cultural Exchange, this event is being sponsored by United Airlines and Sister Cities International to celebrate the airline's expanded service to the Pacific Basin. During October, seven groups from Melbourne performed throughout the City of Boston.

Representing the Charlestown Working Theater will be Mary Curtin-Stevenson and Don Stevenson, both residents of Charlestown; Susan McGinnis; and Roger Curtis.

The Charlestown troupe has selected "Seachange" for their performances during the Australian visit.

'Seachange'' is Performance Art that combines aspects of dance, mime, and theatre without being any of those. It is a unique form, structured and developed like a musical composition, with stories and images kaleidoscopically twisting, fragmenting, turning and doubling back on themselves. Like a jam session in jazz, the performers never know exactly where they will end or exactly how they will get there. As they proceed, idea leaps from idea, image from image, multiplying, extending and transforming into totally new areas. The effect is

"Seachange," with additional pieces written by Marty Kingsbury, is directed by Roger Curtis. Curtis began the Seachange Series in Washington, DC in 1972. Major early influences were the work of Robert Wilson and the event works of modern artists in New York. The work grew during Curtis' period of study at the California Institute of the Arts, where he received his M.F.A. He brought the work to Boston in 1976, producing five pieces at the Boston Arts Group. He received a citation for "Excellence in Directing" for his 1976 Seachange pieces, from Don Shewey of the Boston Phoenix. His other directing work includes Elizabeth Swados' "Nightclub Cantata." which won Best Director and Best Production awards from the Boston Theatre Critic's Circle. He is currently directing the Charlestown Working Theater's production of "Look Back In Anger."

About the rest of the cast: Mary Curtin-Stevenson is the Artistic Director of the Charlestown Working Theater (CWT). She is also the Producing Director, a Board Member and an Acting Teacher at CWT. Besides her CWT administrative work, Mary is a frequent performer/musician in the following companies: Seachange, The Domestic Resurrection Circus of the Bread and Puppet Theatre, The Festival of Light and Song, The Northeast Kingdom Puppet Theatre, and Mirror House Productions. Mary has studied acting privately with Roger Curtis, Tim McDonough and Vinnie Murphy - and she also holds an M.A. in Theatre Research from

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





A proposed residential development project for Chestnut Street was approved on Thursday, October 30th by the Boston Zoning Board of Appeals, giving developer Bruce Daniel a green light to build a 34-unit condominium complex on the site, which includes the former Buckley parking lot and the Legion property.

Half the land currently is owned by Daniel. The other half belongs to Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion Building Associa-

However, Daniel has entered into a purchase and sales agreement with the Legion for its property which will be finalized prior to the beginning of construction.

The stipulation attached to the sale requires Daniel provide a new home for the Legion.

Daniel said the Legion will be provided with a new hall in the basement of the building that will be entered from street level and will be relatively smaller than the existing hall.

Despite the decrease in hall size, Building Association President James W. Conway said the agreement is beneficial to the Legion.

'The building has been vandalized (over the years)," Conway said. "We don't have enough income" to properly renovate the building.

Conway said it would cost \$300,000 to \$400,000 to restore the building.

We see this as a new life." he said. "It's good for us. it's good for the community.

Conway also said that he wanted to be recorded in favor of the development and asked the Board to approve the plans.

Legion leaders had sought proposals from other developers on the project, but accepted Daniel's as the best for the Legion and the community as it had less density. Conway

Daniel also agreed to establish a \$100,000 community fund to be administered by the Legion. The money will be used for scholarships, charitable donations, community services and assistance to veterans.

However, several residents expressed their disagreement with the project, saying it is too dense for the area and that parking will be a problem.

Daniel said he addressed those concerns by reducing the original four-story structure to three stories and by planning for an underground garage.

He also altered the design of the building to "match the architecture of the neighborhood as closely as possible."

Daniel also increased the parking capacity from 38 spaces on the surface to incorporate an underground garage with 50 spaces and nine spaces on the surface.

City Announces Fall Crack-Down On Vacant Lot Owners

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn has announced a "Fall Crackdown" on the owners of vacant lots throughout the neighborhoods of the city of Boston.

The crackdown call for:

- Inspectional Services Department (ISD) inspectors to inspect vacant lots that have been brought to the attention of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services as particular trouble spots;
- · Owners of these lots to be cited for violations of city and state sanitary codes and required to clean them up; and
- Owners who don't comply to be taken to court, with the city cleaning the worst lots and placing municipal liens on the property to recover the cost.

Mayor Flynn said, "Over the past year the city has worked with over 70 neighborhood groups and organizations in holding spring and summer clean-ups of vacant lots. The city has also been aggressively cleaning, securing and baiting for rodents publicly-owned lots, most recently in East Boston, Roxbury, and Mattapan.

Thanks to our improved financial position as a result of good fiscal practices and a healthy city economy," continued the Mayor, "we have increased the resources at our disposal to allow us to improve our own maintenance."

'But just as the city is accepting its responsibility," stated the Mayor, "we must make sure that private individuals who own the majority of vacant land in Boston accept theirs." The Mayor added that a private consultant is being hired to review the maintenance of all vacant land in the city and will make recommendations to improve it by next spring.

Mayor Flynn said, "Working closely with residents, we have targeted a number of lots on which the taxes are being paid. We intend to ensure that not only do the owners pay their taxes on these lots, but that they maintain their property as well."

Mayor Flynn asked residents who observe illegal dumping on vacant lots to call 725-DUMP, the city's illegal dumping hotline. The city has also won approval to increase dumping fines up to \$1,000 for illegal dumpers and is working to have the Boston Housing Court make owners secure their vacant lots to prevent further dumping.

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



Sean O'Connor, 25, of Winthrop Street, pleaded innocent Monday in Charlestown District Court. He was released on \$2,000 cash bail after being arraigned before Judge Mary Brennan.

O'Connor admitted to police that he and the woman he was with, Carol Mahan, 19, of Tremont Street, had smoked "angel dust," a powerful drug.

O'Connor was not in the car when his 1978 Buick Century rolled into the water off Pier 11 at Charlestown Navy Yard. He said he got out of the car and passed out on the pier, and woke to see the car roll off the pier.

Attempts to revive Mahan failed. She was taken to Boston City Hospital where doctors tried to save her before she was pronounced dead at 4:31 a.m.


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
