

Moran Terminal: A Victim Of Time

Times change and it's not always easy to flow with those changes. The union problems at Moran Terminal are heart wrenching evidence of that with not-so-rosy solutions hanging in the wings.

It is unfortunate that Christmas time has also become the season for dispute between the Massachusetts Port Authority (MassPort) and the Boston Steamship Clerk's Union, Local 1066 of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA). Last year this time, they faced a similar problem as today, but were able to negotiate to their benefit.

Last month, 19 clerks were laid off because MassPort said they were experiencing a decrease in cargo. According to the clerk's contract, this action complies with an agreement made between the two. However, Local 1066 President James R. Watson says that there is an increase, not a decrease in cargo volume and he

sees MassPort as utilizing union busting tactics.

The Boston daily newspapers report that the union has precipitated a increase shipments of Christmas goods has led to an automatic slowdown because there is not enough men to handle the cargoes

Lines, Inc. (TFL) moved to Providence, Rhode Island. While that city celebrated, the clerks accused Mass-Port of setting a trap. "That was a planned operation," said Watson, "I went down there and that ship had to be down there three weeks before the crux of this problem was seen." TFL says they will not come back to Boston until the union probelms are solved.

The Boston Shipping Association, Inc. (BSA) who represents shippers in union negotiations, shook a finger at the clerk's union in a letter circulated to all members of the ILA Locals.

"TFL has left Boston ... The bottom dropped out of

this port. The men of the BSA and of the waterfront ILA locals better wake up and take back control from our dissident minority or Boston is gone," wrote BSA President Arthur

The dissident minority is seen as Watson's local who has refused to enter into the same contract as the other Longshoremen's unions in which they agreed to a workforce reduction.

One has to admire Watson for taking his local under a protective wing and fighting for every scrap left of a once mighty seaport. And one can

"I have a daughter who is 51/2 years old. I know she's young, but what should I tell her about drugs?"

There are some general principals that parents can

- 1. take a look at your own chemical use and be honest about it with your children
 - 2. tell the truth
- 3. answer all questions

4. know your facts (no "scare techniques")


Most kids learn about patterns of drug use in their homes. They see people drink and they notice how their parents change. If, for example, drunkedness is considered funny or "o.k." the kids will get those messages. If a family only drinks on holidays or with religious ceremonies, the message is there. Kids absorb these things, usually without talking about it. Therefore, it is important for parents to talk about what they do - "I like to drink wine with dinner. It makes me feel relaxed and the meal tastes better.' always have beer before dinner. I like the taste and it relaxes me." "Uncle Mike always drinks too much, and we don't like the way he behaves."

Tell the truth. Tell it like it is. Kids know when parents are lying and it confuses them.

Questions like: "Why was Uncle Bill so mad last night?" Should be answered, especially if the behavior is caused by chemical use. Give the facts and how you, as parents, feel about it.

Learn the facts. Marijuana does not necessarily lead to heroin. Know about alcoholism as different from social drinking. The Charlestown library has many books on the subject of chemical use, and the Charlestown Boys and Girls Club has a Drug Education program this year! Watch for articles in the Charlestown Patriot. Talk to people who know and learn all you can. Chemical use is here and everywhere and an informed parent is a powerful influence.

Seventh Annual Intensive Nursery Reunion At St. Margaret's Is A Celebration Of Life

Margaret and Andrew Dabilis and their daughter Catherine Anne Dabilis of 112 Baldwin Street, Charlestown, were among a thousand people attending the seventh Annual Intensive Care Nursery Reunion at St. Margaret's Hospital for Women.

The event turned out to be a veritable celebration of life that might never have happened had it not been for the Intensive Care Nursery at St. Margaret's Hospital which operates one of two perinatal and neonatal high-risk transfer centers in Boston.

Most parents see their children who have "graduated" from the Intensive Care Nursery at St. Margaret's Hospital as living miracles. In a way, they are right.

At the time of birth, these tiny patients are likely to have been either premature, or affected by some birth defect. Then, there are a number of cases involving disorders that sometimes accompany multiple births.

Just 15 years ago, for example, not very much could be done for hyaline membrane disease babies. Today, some 90% of these babies are saved and can look forward to a normal life. This is largely due to the utilization of new techniques and the highly specialized care at centers such as the Intensive Care Nursery (ICN) at St. Margaret's Hospital.

It was in 1969 that the ICN at St. Margaret's Hospital for Women was established by Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., M.D. Dr. Kennedy has remained Director ever since and is credited as being one of the central causes for the progress of this center for life. Today, the 35 crib Intensive Care Nursery at St. Margaret's Hospital is one of the largest in Massachusetts.

Immediately after delivery, premature newborns (sometimes weighing only a pound and a few ounces) or sick infants are taken - or transferred in from other area hospitals - to the Intensive Care Nursery where a skilled team of neonatal specialists are on hand.

In certain cases with some high risk mothers, these specialists are called upon even earlier to help manage the final weeks of pregnancy.

'In situations where we anticipate the mother will deliver early." Dr. Kennedy pointed out, "we can intervene to try to gain a day or two to improve the baby's condition.

While prematurity remains a major threat to newborns, babies born nearly three months before full term can often

Still, there remain dangers which some of these infants must overcome. One of the more common hazards is apnea





which occurs when these babies are so immature that they"forget" to breathe. They are then placed on electronically fitted mattresses so that if the baby stops breathing for as short a time as five seconds, an alarm

To Dr. Kennedy and his associate, Marguerite Herschel, M.D., a major advantage of the Intensive Care Nursery team is the individualized attention. "The physicians and the nurses are able to zero in on each problem individually and in a style that features personalized care," said Dr. Kennedy.

Hundreds of grateful parents - and their miracle children are living testimony to professional excellence. They know St. Margaret's as a center for life. 

CAN CHILDREN GET PERIODONTAL (GUM) DISEASE?

Although periodontal (gum) disease primarily affects adults, children even as young as pre-school age can develop—some forms of gum problems.

The signs of periodontal disease in children usually are puffiness of the gums or a tendency to bleed easily. Your family dentist can recommend an appropriate treatment as well as preventive measures.

Another form of periodontal disease is sometimes seen in teenagers who may not be getting sufficent rest or adequate nutrition, or who may be under excessive stress. It is characterized by extremely sore and tender gums which may bleed just by being touched or brushed. In this case, treatment must be coordinated with a careful evaluation of the teenagers life style in order to achieve complete success.

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

On Friday, November 25, a Detective from the Auto Squad observed a man in a vehicle selling a rolled substance to occupants of various motor vehicles on Main Street. The Detective then identified himself to the operator, and ordered the suspect to pull his vehicle over to the curb. When the Detective attempted to reach into the vehicle to remove a glassine bag containing 40-50 rolled packets, believed to contain cocaine, the suspect sped away, knocking the Detective to the ground. The Detective was not seriously injured during the incident. The Detective obtained the license plate of the vehicle, and recognized the suspect. The suspect, a Charlestown man, now has a warrant for his arrest, charging him with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, to wit a motor vehicle, on a police officer.

On Sunday, November 27, Officers responded to 31 Old Ironsides Way on a report of threats. Upon arrival, the

Officers spoke to the victim who stated that an unknown white male had pulled a knife and put it to the victim's throat. The victim further states that the suspect told the victim to stay away from the above location. Upon further investigation, it was learned that the victim had been reportedly causing a problem to a resident of 31 Old Ironsides Way. The Detective Unit at Area A has been informed of this incident and is now conducting an investigation.

On Monday, November 28, A resident of Bunker Hill Street reported to police that a group of local youths were causing damage to the home he owns at that location. The Officers of Area A were made aware of this incident and they will disperse groups of youth gathering in the area.

On Wednesday, November 30, Officers from Chelsea, Everett, and Boston Police Departments, were involved in a high speed chase which originated in Chelsea and made its way through Everett, before ending in Boston. The chase ended in Charlestown, at the corner of Monument Street and Medford Street where the vehicle collided with a wall. Two occupants then fled the vehicle. The first suspect was arrested. The second suspect made good his escape, however the Officers recognized him and there will be a

warrant out for his arrest for larceny of a motor vehicle The suspect vehicle had been reported stolen from Dollar Rent-A-car in East Boston the same day. The suspect was turned over to the custody of the Chelsea Police Department, where he will be charged with larceny of a motor vehicle and several moving violations

On Wednesday, November 30, after a three week intensive investigation by Sgt. Det. Gottschalk, Det. Donahue, and Det. Gleason, of Area A, the four female juveniles responsible for the assault and battery of two elderly residents of the Mary Colbert Housing Apartments, will appear in the Charlestown District Court on charges of assault and battery.

The community should be aware that the Police Department will not stand for such senseless acts of violence against the elderly.

Joint Effort To Crack Down On Auto Theft

Commissioner Joseph M. Jordan has announced that the Boston Police Department has formed a new unit within the Office of Informational Services called "Theft Patrol" to act as a liaison with the media and the general public over the issue of stolen motor vehicles. The new unit has also been assigned the responsibility of coordinating the Department's collaborative efforts with WBZ Radio's 'Maynard in the Morning' program and its existing "Theft Patrol" program.

Since the fall of 1980 the Boston Police Department has been providing WBZ's Dave Maynard with a description of a motor vehicle that had been recently stolen within the city of Boston. Maynard, in turn, would broadcast the description over the air and ask listeners to call a special "Theft Patrol" hotline (254-1030) if they spotted the car or if they had any other information on stolen motor vehicles within the city that would be useful to the Police.

All information obtained from the hotline was turned over to the Police Department and since the program's inception more than five hundred motor vehicles were recovered. In cases where the recovery was due directly to the information phoned in by a WBZ Radio listener the station presented that listener with a one year membership in the ALA Auto Club.

Under the terms of the expanded collaborative effort Police Officer John F. Nolen of the Department's Theft Patrol Unit will fly in the WBZ Radio helicopter during the morning and afternoon traffic reporting periods. He will give daily updates on the number of vehicles stolen in the city as well as the number of vehicles recovered and returned to their owners. He will also take reports of vehicles that are thought to be abandoned or stolen and will coordinate the response of Officers on the ground and he will follow up on each call to establish a Police link with each individual who took the time to call.

In making the announcement Commissioner Jordan said, auto reft is one of the most serious problems facing the

And as part of the collaborative effort WBZ Radio has also agreed to make its helicopter available to Police personnel in emergency situations on a twenty-four hour a day

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
