





Voke Bill To Aid Handicapped Young Adults

Representative Richard A. Voke is pleased to report that a bill he filed. and had redrafted in a special Health Care Subcommittee to address the care of multiplehandicapped young adults. has been received warmly by numerous members of both the House and the Senate. Legislators have been flocking to Voke's Health Care Committee office to have their signatures attached to his landmark bill.

Representative Voke perceived early on in his term as Chairman of the Legislature's Health Care Committee that corrections were needed in the laws currently affecting the care of multiplehandicapped individuals. He questioned the treatment of individuals over twenty-one years of age were receiving, and its appropriateness in determination of placement.

Voke's bill would require certification for all admissions to pediatric nursing homes for persons up to the age of 21. This would allow the Department of Public Health to determine the appropriateness of each placement within a pediatric nursing home. To address the needs of individuals who are too old for pediatric facilities and too young for regular nursing homes, the Executive Office of Human Services would be authorized to set up a program for individuals over 21. living in pediatric nursing homes. A final provision would require the Human Services Office to report to Representative Voke's committee as to the results of the pilot program.

The proposed work consists of full depth reconstruction of roadway areas, new sidewalks; installation of utilities including: lighting, water, drainage systems, and landscaping amenities. All the improvements will be made without any additional right-of-way. Construction easements may be necessary in a few areas to allow the construction of the

Minor adjustments will be made in the alignment along Main Street to produce a uniform 44 feet of pavement width - two 12 foot travel lanes with parking allowed and variable width sidewalks along both sides. The one-way circulation pattern of Main Street and Warren Street will be retained between Thompson Square and City Square. Mishawum Street will be relocated from its present location to approximately 100 feet to the north.

A portion of the project is located within the Town Hill District, an area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and the focus of recent improvements to several historic and neighborhood structures. Urban design elements proposed for this area consist of brick sidewalks. gas lamp fixtures and new trees to enhance the historic character of the area.

The total project is expected to cost \$3,000,000.00. Funding for the project will be shared by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works and the Boston Redevelopment Authority

A group of residents have been working with the Boston Redevelopment Authority to secure brick sidewalks and gas lamps on Warren and Main Streets between Thompson Square and City Square. Ken Stone presented petitions to



the DPW signed by some 300 Charlestown residents supporting this aspect of the design planning

A spokesman stated that the project is in the 75% design phase and if these plans are approved, the DPW could possibly have the final design completed and advertise for construction bids by late fall 1984. If the contractor is on board by the end of 1984, the project could possibly start in April 1985. The time frame for reconstruction is approximately one full construction season (April through November).

Free Hearing Screenings

Hearing is critical to good speech and language development. Young children learn to speak by listening to those around them and to themselves. Therefore, it is important to check children's hearing ability periodically.

Later in life, hearing remains important to social, occupational, and recreational pursuits. Adults who experience hearing loss, (which can be gradual as well as sudden) often also experience a sense of isolation as it becomes difficult to carry on conversations with family, friends, and co-workers. Sometimes compensating for the hearing loss, for example, turning up volume on the TV, may cause family members to become irritable. Sometimes hobbies, such as listening to music, are no longer the source on enjoyment they once were

So much can be done these days to treat hearing impairment and prevent or minimize the unpleasant effects. But the first step is identifying the problem.

As part of the Speech-Language Pathology Department's recognition of May as Better Speech and Hearing Month, the Bunker Hill Health Center at 73 High Street is offering free hearing screenings, open to all ages, on Monday, May 21 from 12:00 to 1:00 p.m. and on Wednesday, May 23 also from 12:00 to 1:00 p.m.

A hearing screening will determine whether hearing levels are normal or whether some hearing loss is present. When hearing loss is detected, the person is referred to Audiology Services for further tests to determine the type and extent of loss as well as the best type of treatment.

If someone you know has a hearing loss, here are some suggestions which may aid in effective com-


- 1) Don't expect the individual to do as well in group conversations or with background noise as in a one to one situation. Competing noise makes conversation
- 2) Don't try to overarticulate. Do speak clearly but don't exaggerate-and distort-mouth movements.
- 3) Remember that hearing loss doesn't always only make things quieter; it can make speech less clear too. Requests for repetitions may not mean the person's not listening; speech may simply sound too unclear to be readily understood.
- 4) Especially with older persons, try to slow down a bit rather than simply talking louder.
- 5) Try to include the hearing impaired person in conversations and family decision making, remembering that it's twice as much work for them, but that it's worth preventing feelings of isolation and rejection that can come from exclusion.





City Gardens: Planting Your Window Box

by Barbara Maheigan

Once your window box is ready and waiting, you can enjoy choosing plants to compliment your home. You can create many different effects; consider using one type of plant in one color. like cascading white petunias, for an elegant entrance, or mix a variety of plants in many colors for a cheerful country-like setting. If you need further encouragement to begin, remember the window box contest! Gardens for Charlestown plans to sponsor the second annual contest in late summer, and two of last year's winners were first-time gardeners. Here are a few hints to help you begin

Before planting, the box must be filled with a growing medium. First, to keep the drainage holes open and the soil in the box. place a curved piece from a broken flower pot over the holes. Next, fill the box will a lightweight soil or soiless mix. If garden loam is available, you can make your own potting soil by mixing loam and at least one quart of peat moss, then fertilizing in accordance with the package directions. This mixture should stand one week before

Summer plants should be chosen with care, as the amount of sunshine your box will receive determines which plants can flourish. Plants in window boxes are often

placed in rows, with the tallest plants in the rear, and trailing plants over the front. Stagger the plants, and allow room for growth. For example, a 30 inch x 8 inch box might contain 3 tall. 2 medium. and 3 trailing plants.

If your window box is in full sun, you might consider lowgrowing ageratum, alyssum, lobelia, marigold; trailing petunias, nasturtiums, morning glory, lantana; and tall

geraniums, heliotrope verbena, or zinnia. Herbs like parsley, rosemary, sage or chives and vegetables like radishes or cherry tomatoes can add flavor to your box Fragrant miniature roses or cactus are also suitable.

If your box has mostly morning sun, consider mid-sized bedding begonias, impatiens, nicotiania; trailing fuschia or thunbergia. Ageratum. alyssum. geraniums, lantana lobelia, and marigolds will also flourish. Foliage plants like colcus, caladium, ivy and vinca will grow well in moderate light

Even if your window box receives little or no sun. ferns philodendron, tuberous begonias, bedding begonias, coleus impatiens, thumbergia, and English ivy will thrive and provide an attractive display.

Care of your window box isn't difficult, but does require regular watering as a window box tends to dry out quickly. Keep the plants attractive by removing the dead leaves and taded flowers, and pinch back the young plants to encourage bushiness. Fertilize the plants about every two weeks. Wash or spray the plants with clean water to remove soot and small pests as necessary

With these few guidelines, your window box can remain a colorful and cheery additionato your home through fall.





ON CHECKING OLDER PLUMBING

Houses built since World War II are more or less modern. You can pretty much count on copper plumbing. Houses older than 40 years require extra-careful inspection of the plumbing system.

Why is plumbing such an important consideration? Faulty plumbing is more expensive to remedy than inadequate wiring. You hope to find all the old galvanized pipes replaced with copper ones. Galvanized pipes suffer from corrosion. They eventually develop "hardening of the arteries". Deposits narrow the inside until flow is impeded. You don't want to see a patch job where a single emergency was solved by putting a length of copper pipe into old, galvanized tubing. Such a joint signals a serious chemical reaction ahead. Eventually, someone will have to rip out the whole line and replace it with copper. That someone might be you.

If the house has a modernized kitchen and baths, it's likely that the whole plumbing system was updated at the time they were installed. If you're in doubt, check it out.
