

## OvertimePolitics.com Michigan Democratic Primary Poll - Dec 28-31, 2015

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Hillary Clinton has a 7 point lead in Michigan over Bernie Sanders, 47-40%

Both Clinton and Sanders are well over the 15% threshold for Michigan delegates, but the state may see some interest from the campaigns right before the primary. Michigan's primary is held March 8th, one week between the Super Tuesday primaries, and the March 15th slate of big winner-take-all states.

Clinton out-performs Sanders across the board by varying degrees, losing to Sanders only with likely primary voters between 18-30 years old, and those making between \$25k-45k annually. Still, the race is close enough that many demographics are in a statistical tie.

10% of likely voters are still undecided, which could end up playing a major role in the way the delegates are allocated.

This poll was conducted by telephone to include 405 likely Democratic Primary voters, with a margin of error of 4.9%. Phone numbers were selected at random through public phone records and cell phone lists.

Likely Democratic Primary voters were asked the following questions:

1. Who do you plan on selecting in the 2016 Democratic Primary? Hillary Clinton, Martin O'Malley, Bernie Sanders, or are you undecided?
2. Are you male or female?
3. How old are you?
4. What ethnic identity best describes you: White/Caucasian, Black/African-American, Hispanic/Latino, Asian, Native American/Other?
5. What is your yearly personal income before taxes: Under \$10,000, \$10,001-\$25,000, \$25,001-\$45,000, \$45,001-\$65,000, above \$65,000?

Results:

Hillary Clinton- 191 - **47%**  
Bernie Sanders - 163 - 40%  
Martin O'Malley - 10 - 2%  
Undecided - 41 - 10%
