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
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McMenimen Elected Vice President Of Boston College Alumni Association








Let me start off by thanking the voters of Boston for the wonderful vote that I received in the recent Primary. God love you all.

Now, let's get right into it. When you pay for these ads, you can say anything you want, and I intend to do just that. I want to do this ad by numbers and you will see why:

- Do you remember when Nikita Khrushchev said, "We shall destroy the United States without firing one shot." I do, and it is actually happening to this great country. Look at the education the kids are getting — NOTHING. Look at the drug problems we are having. They are all caused by the social planning do-gooders.
- 2. In 1973, I was one of three councillors at large who voted against the Sewer and Water Commission because I predicted that your water bills would increase five times. It happened.
- 3. Now we have the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority, and it too is going to raise the state water and sewer rates another five times. Get ready for the increase. They are giving out 2,000 more jobs, and that is why Mr. Paul Levy is getting away with what he is doing. When will it all stop? God only knows.
- 4. I know that you don't want to vote, and I can honestly say that I don't blame you for not wanting to vote. But I ask you in all honesty to PLEASE vote.
- 5. I have been a full-time councillor at large, and have NEVER had another income. I attend all the hearings before the Zoning Board of Appeal, the Boston Licensing Board, the Consumer Affairs Commission, the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and most of all the various community meetings. As for the committee hearings, forget it. One or two of us show up because that is what we are being paid for. The attendance is disgraceful.
- 6. I get a big kick out of the phony literature that the other candidates put out saying, "I did this, and I did that." Well, for their information, nothing is done here without the consent and vote of the other councillors.
- 7. We had an appropriation of \$221,000 for the Gay Rights Commission here in City Hall, and I was the only councillor that voted NO because it was the taxpayer's money. If somebody wants to be gay, or somebody wants to be a lesbian, they have that right, but I am not going to spend the taxpayer's money on that.
- 8. I voted against the School Department budget, and was the only one who did because: In 1974, we had 93,000 youngsters in our school system, and the budget was \$107 million. Forced busing came along, and we dropped to 40,000 youngsters. Now they want over \$400 million. For what? The kids are the victims. We closed 87 schools, we laid off thousands of teachers, but they hung on to 400 non-certified teachers. Last year, 500 seniors could not graduate because they could not read or write. Fifth-, sixth- and seventh-grade kids were not promoted because they could not read or write. How did they get to be seniors, if they could not read or write? We have 557 administrators, which is unheard of. In one class of the Boston Police Department training classes, it was discovered that 22 of them could not read or write, but NO, they were sent to Northeastern University to learn how to read and write. How did they pass the exam to become police officers? They were at Northeastern for three months, and came back to be police officers. What the hell are we doing in this city?
- 9. We had 65 public hearings on the city budget, and I voted against that also because I had some serious cuts to be made, and was out-voted 12-1. Imagine a \$1.3 billion budget. Folks, you should be here to see what goes on you would be in a state of shock.
- 10. People have asked me what I think of Affirmative Action, and my answer is this: If I sat down with any minority to take any kind of an examination, and the minority got a better mark than me, then I say that is his or her job, and I would be the first to shake their hand. But if I got the higher mark, that job is mine. This is first-class discrimination and I don't think it is right. What the hell do we take exams for, if that stuff is going to be pulled on the person with the highest mark?
- 11. This is the greatest country in the world, and the sooner we start taking care of our own and stop playing Santa Claus for the whole world, the better off we will be.

- 12. I am against the handouts that are given all over this country for people who can work, but won't work. Andreotti Paintings To Be Exhibited At Newbury Street Gallery





Ironside Nautilus -A Great Place To Visit


As more and more new businesses open in Charlestown, it seems important to let people know about them and encourage their patronage. I'd like your readers to know about Ironside Nautilus.
