

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The Charlestown Boys Club A Brief History — Part 1

Over the next few weeks, and in conjunction with the second annual Charlestown Boys Club Alumni Reunion to be held on Saturday evening, Jan. 20 in the High Street building of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, a brief history of the organization will be presented here.

The Executive Board of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club would like to thank Gloria Conway for the continuing cooperation it has received from her and The Charlestown Patriot for almost 25 years. Without Gloria's valued assistance, many of our endeavors would be made much more difficult, if not impossible.

Much of the information which will appear here comes directly from a piece of literature uncovered at the club entitled "A Brief History of the Boys Clubs of Boston Inc." April, 1962. Although credit for the publication should be afforded the author, no name is mentioned in the literature, but we are, nonetheless, grate-

The Charlestown Boys Club — A Beginning

In earlier times Charlestown had been one of Boston's most attractive suburbs, but with the growth of shipping interests, residential deterioration began to take away from the area. Better homes were being replaced by overcrowded tenements at a rapid rate, and by the mid 1890s, hard times began to grip the entire city of Boston. Soup kitchens and bread lines became a way of life for many, and thousands faced the winters without adequate clothing and housing. With no measure of relief being established on any level, most foresaw nothing but even bleaker times ahead.

It was in this type of environment that the early idea of a boys club in Char-

The founding of a boys club in Charlestown can be directly related to a group of men who, even in their own adversity, were able to look ahead and envision such problems as gangs, rampant crime, and increased costs to the state in its efforts to combat these problems.

For many boys of the era, membership in street gangs became a common refuge. In some ways the boys were able to satisfy their needs for sociability in the gangs, but because they lived by their own self-prescribed rules, they became a major factor toward rising juvenile delinquency rates.

This was the situation as seen by Frank S. Mason in 1893. Mason was a young Charlestown businessman who became interested in the swelling gang problems and, recalling his membership in a group he had helped to form in his own younger days, the Agassiz Club, he set out to establish an organization based on the premise that youngsters engaging in wholesome activities while under the supervision of men particularly sympathetic to boys' problems would progress socially in a positive manner.

With the aid of several other men who shared his feelings, Mason made a survey of the youth situation in other cities facing similar problems with youth gangs. In the course of his studies, Mason came across an article which appeared in Scribner's Magazine and described a boys club which had been founded on New York's East Side. The club, its leadership and its activities seemed to directly

parallel his own idea. The New York club would become the pattern for what would be known as the Bunker Hill Boys Club of Charlestown.



THE HOLIDAY BLUES

The holiday season can be a tough time for all of us. Sometimes we find ourselves feeling blue or down, and we're puzzled because we don't understand why we should feel that way at such a happy time of year. These holiday blues can have several sources.

During the holidays we are all bombarded with pictures of how good and perfect life is supposed to be. We are all presented with scenes of people frolicking and enjoying each other's company in television programs, movies, and in radio, television and magazine advertisements. Families are portrayed in blissful harmony. Young couples cavort romantically without a hint of disagreement. Children are shown receiving expensive gifts, which their parents afford with no strain on their pocketbooks. In countless ways we are all given the message that the holiday season is a time when everyone is happy, when disagreements don't exist, and when we all love each other perfectly and without mixed feelings.

In the privacy of our own thoughts, few of us can avoid comparing these images of the way life is portrayed for us during the holidays with what we actually are experiencing. In very few cases does the reality of our lives measure up to the pictures that the media gives us of what we ought to have at this time of year. Our families sometimes fight. Our spouses sometimes grumble and bicker. Our children often request gifts beyond what we can possibly afford. It is this difference between the perfect images of the holidays and our own imperfect experiences of the season that can cause us to feel down.

There are other reasons for feeling blah too. Often the holidays stir memories of loved ones who have died, or those who are alive but far away and unavailable. Often the holidays stir memories from childhood when life seemed simpler and when our parents, at least in memory, were there to take care of everything and to make things right. Few of us can escape an occasional, or more than occasional, wish that we could be children again, that our parents were still there to take care of us, and that our biggest problem was which present to open first. For most of us, childhood was never as wonderful as it seems in our memories. But even those who are able to recall some of the frustrations of growing up may wish for a kind of childhood they never had and feel depressed by the knowledge that the opportunity for such an experience is forever lost.

For most of us, the blahs remain just that - the blahs. We are struck by a momentary blue moment or mood, but it passes relatively quickly as we appreciate the real rewards and pleasures which the holiday season does offer us. For some, however, the blahs don't go away so quickly. They take hold and don't let go. Anyone who finds himself seriously unhappy for a substantial portion of the holiday period should consider getting some professional help. This is particularly true when a person is bothered by thoughts of doing harm to himself or to someone else. For most of us the holiday blahs will be perhaps a minor annoyance at an otherwise happy time, but for those who are unable to shake free of that down feeling, the Health Center, and in particular, the Community Mental Health Unit, is available to offer help and hope. All you have to do is to call 242-5760 to make an appointment or come up to the third floor of the Health Center. We will take good care of you.

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

Charlestown Residents To Take Part In Senior Dental Health Study

The Harvard School of Dental Medicine in Boston and The New England Research Institute in Watertown are currently conducting a dental health study in New England. A group of Charlestown residents age 70 and over have been selected for participation in the study.

The goal of the study is to learn more about the dental health of people as they grow older. Very little is known about the dental health and dental care needs of older adults, especially those over age 85. Many people in this age group wear dentures or are ill and do not receive dental care. It is important that this population participates in the study so that health planners and providers of dental services can better understand their needs.

The Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs and the Massachusetts Dental Society have endorsed the study and encourage all eligible persons who are selected to participate.

Residents who have been selected for participation will receive a letter describing the study. A member of the staff will then call to ask questions about their dental health. Following the interview, some people will be offered a free in-home dental examination conducted by dentists from the Harvard School of Dental Medicine. This examination is not intended to replace the usual care by their dentist.

The study is funded by the National Institute on Aging of the National Institutes of Health in Washington, D.C.

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


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

What Most People Don't Realize About The Black Watch

To The Editor,

An advertisement in the Patriot for several weeks featured a promotion of the Black Watch/Argyle & Sutherland Highlanders performing at the Boston Garden. What most people may not realize (Charlestown being a predominantly Irish section of Boston) is that these so-called musicians are in fact soldiers in the British Army.

The Black Watch and Argyle & Sutherland Regiment have served 19 tours of duty in Ireland since June 28, 1970. They are no ceremonial unit. Their sole purpose in Northeast Ireland is the subjugation of the nationalist (predominantly Catholic minority) by means of intimidation, harassment, torture and murder, all documented and proven in world court forums (see Shoot To Kill by the International Lawyers Inquiry). Also, the methods used by the British Army to maintain control of Northeast Ireland have been investigated and condemned by Amnesty International, the European Commission on Human Rights, and most recently Britian's own Stalkee Report.

The British Army occupies six counties of Ireland against the will of the majority of Irish people.

The purpose of this letter is to remind those in Charlestown, who believe in and work for the cause of a united, free Ireland that this performance is not a ceremonial music show. It is a propaganda play by the British government, a public relations exercise produced by British military

As for the entertainment value, let the record speak for itself: 18 civilians murdered by these, again, so-called musi-

My condemnation could never be overstated. Only until Ireland is free shall we continue to resist British colonialism in Ireland.
