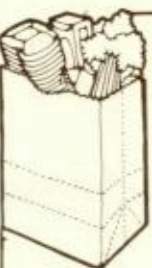

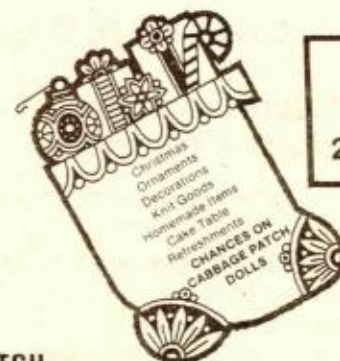

## Plans For Renovation Of Old High School Presented At Community Meeting

and he continued to say, "it is known if you wish to move to Charlestown, you ought not have a car" because of the density.

Many residents stated they were concerned that since there were a great number of children in the immediate area of the school, the increased traffic could pose a treat to public safety.

Jan Brodie, Real Estate Developer of Graham Gund Associates, stated "I can't believe that a building that is being rehabbed with controlled parking isn't better" than the deteriorating vacant building.

Another problem the plan may present to the area, stated one resident, is the planned egress of the underground parking. As it stands, the egress is located on Bartlett Street, which is a one way street.

Mr. Daniel Jaffe of Bartlett Street suggested to the development team

the possibility of moving of the egress from the suggested Bartlett Street side of the building to the corner of Bartlett Street and Monument Square.

Jaffe stated that since Monument Square was not a one way street and Bartlett Street was one way, cars exiting the garage would, with his suggestion, have a choice of routes to take rather than the Bartlett Street exit which being one way, affords the driver no choice in direction.

The change from the Bartlett Street egress to the corner, according to Jaffe, would reduce the additional traffic to the area by a quarter.

"I'm happy that you're doing this," stated Jaffe. "The high school needed a face life, but do it without effecting our lives."

Matson told Jaffe while his suggestion may be architecturally feasible, the Massachusetts Historical Commission

may not agree to the plan, since the commission is reviewing the possibility of recommending the facility be named to the National Historical Register.

Jan Brodie explained that if the facility is named to the historic register, the developer receives from the federal government a tax credit of 25% on all monies invested into the rehabilitation of an old building.

In order to receive the awarding of the register, the Massachusetts Historic Commission must make a recommendation to the National Register Trust for Historic Places. Brodie explained that the final decision is made by the National Parks Department.

"This is a way to get old buildings recycled," explained Brodie since rehabilitation of such buildings is an expensive procedure. Without the tax credit incentive, Brodie stated that many developers would shy away from rehabbing old buildings.

Peter McClure of Monument Square stated he felt Jaffe's suggestion was a "positive idea."

McClure stated, "These things are open to interpretation and if this (change in the egress) could elevate a number of

community concerns," McClure continued, "It would seem to me, if both the developer and the community were in agreement, why not do it?"

McClure told the development team that since the commission was made up of people, changes could always be negotiated.

Jaffe stated, if necessary, he would "go to Washington and stampede" in order to change the egress.

McClure asked should the development team not receive the register listing would they still go forth with their proposal?

Gund stated that he would in fact proceed since the development team had already invested "a lot of money" into the project.

"We'll just have to wait longer for our return on the investment," stated Matson.

Tentative construction is planned for the spring of 1985. The project will take approximately one year to complete and when finished the structure will according to Gund "look exactly as it does now."

The exterior of the building will be cleaned, but the developers stated that sandblasting will not be used. The bricks will be repointed and windows

replaced.

The interior lobby will remain intact, as will the staircase. There will be ten units per floor, ranging between one, two, and three bedroom apartments. The average unit size will be 11,000 square feet.

According to the developer, the rent will be market rate with the one bedroom units starting at \$750 per month. The parking space rental will be \$45 for underground and \$25 for the outdoor spaces.

While one resident stated that she could not believe that Mayor Ray Flynn "who campaigned for rent control is going along with rent like this," Laurie Golden, attorney for Public Facilities, stated that while she was

in no position to speak for the Mayor, her expertise in the area told her that the rent for the proposed units was compatible with the market rates already present in Charlestown.

Many of the residents stated that they felt the meeting was fruitless, in that the plans were final. Jane Noonan of Public Facilities stated this was not true.

"We are going to do everything we, the City of Boston Public Facilities Department can, to make sure that everything that can be done will be done," stated Noonan and while the Public Facilities Department would review all suggestions made at the meeting, there would be no final decision made which will satisfy everyone.

## John Dillon — Turns Hobby Into Full Time Career As Photographer

Last month, Charlestown resident John Dillon decided to turn his weekend hobby of taking pictures into a full time career of professional photography.

Upon graduation from Boston Trades School, where he learned graphic arts, Dillon began working for the Raytheon Corporation as a printer. Fortunately for Dillon, Raytheon housed the printing department with the photography department. As John Dillon's curiosity led him to spend more and more time in photography than printing, he began to master the skills of a darkroom technician.

With the purchase of a second-hand camera, Dillon turned his curiosity

into his favorite past-time activity. Before he knew it, John Dillon became the owner of a full range of photographic equipment. "Little by little," stated Dillon, "I began buying equipment and cameras, a piece of equipment here and there."

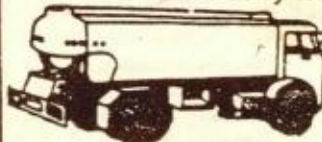

## Funding Sought To Continue Back To School Program

Unfortunately, there is a misconception about today's high school drop out. Many people feel that individuals drop out of school because they are lazy or simply do not care. This may be true for some, but for others financial reasons sometimes make the idea of working seem like a more productive use of time.

School on a full time basis, for a number of personal reasons, may not be for everyone. However without proper education or skills, the job market can be somewhat limiting and intimidating.

Last year, the Life Focus Center saw the need to provide programming for the high school drop out, which would not only reinforce fundamental learning skills but also provide vocational training. Hence, the Back to School program was established for high school drop outs, ages 14 and older.

The program which has

been successful in that about 80% of the individuals involved with the program have either returned to school, taken the GED (the high school diploma equivalency test), or found better jobs.

However, effective January 15, 1985, the Back to School Program will cease to exist unless adequate funding is made available.

According to Jack Millerick, the Executive Director of the Life Focus Center, official notification from the state arrived a month and a half ago informing them that funds for the program would be cut.

In an effort to maintain the program, which has proven to be not only necessary but successful, Millerick has begun working with Michael Griffin, the Director of the Charlestown Community Schools, to investigate the possibility of combining the Back to School Program with the City of Boston's City Roots program, a

program started this year to provide services to high school drop outs.

Both programs were established for the purpose of providing the high school career counseling and vocational training as well as teaching and refining fundamental learning skills such as reading and mathematics. One of the differences between the two programs is the age groups serviced. The City Roots program is budgeted to provide services to those 16 years and older, while Back to School which is for those 14 years and older, presently services a population between 14 and 16 years of age.

Once the funding is cut, the 16 year olds involved in Back to School will be able to enroll in City Roots, while the population of 14 and 15 year olds will be without programming unless an alternative solution is developed.

Both Directors stated that it is crucial that programming for this age

group in particular be provided since this group is not old enough to secure jobs.

Griffin stated he could easily model a program similar to City Roots for the 14 and 15 year olds if in fact, funds are secured. Griffin stated that he would like to see such programming established within the Community Schools since the natural progression for those in-

dividuals involved in both City Roots and Back to School is to enter the GED, high school diploma equivalency test program offered through the Community Schools.

Millerick stated that while he does not want to see the Back to School program end, the merging of the Back to School program with City Roots would allow the Life Focus Center to concentrate all

their energies on their area of expertise - programming for the retarded and special needs individuals.

Both Millerick and Griffin stated that programming for the 14 and 15 year olds will have a better survival chance if the Community Schools adopts the group since the merging of the two populations is not only "natural" but will prove to be most cost-effective.

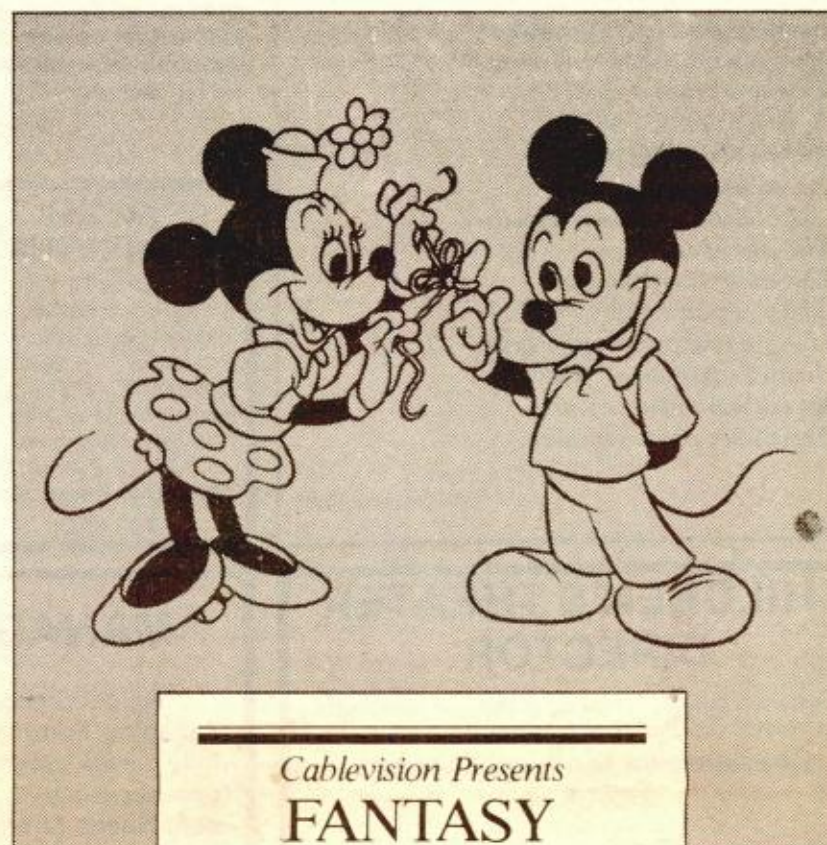

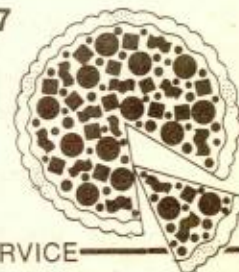

# Charlestown Police Line

On November 23, 1984 at 10:00 a.m., Detectives of Area A arrived at a residence on Prospect Street. On arrival the Detectives arrested a 24 year old Charlestown man, in his home, on a Charlestown District Court Warrant for assault and battery with a dangerous weapon. The suspect was taken to Area A, and booked on the above charge.

On November 24, 1984 at 3:15 a.m., police officers observed a 22 year old resident of Charlestown operating a motor vehicle near 33 McNulty Court. The operator of this vehicle struck another vehicle and then fled through 41 McNulty Court, with the officers in pursuit. The suspect was apprehended at Medford and Corey Streets. A search of the vehicle revealed a screwdriver inside a popped ignition. The suspect was transported to Area A, and booked for larceny of a motor vehicle, and possession of burglarious

tools.

On November 24, 1984 at 2:00 p.m., Detectives, while at the corner of Lexington and Bunker Hill Streets, observed a 24 year old Charlestown man who was known to be wanted on warrant issued from Charlestown District Court for larceny. The suspect was placed under arrest, and conveyed to Area A for booking.

On November 24, 1984 at 8:15 p.m., Police Officers observed two male suspects attempting to steal two motor vehicles from the parking lot of the Bunker Hill Mall. The suspects were found to have various burglarious tools in their possession. The first suspect, a 17 year old of Charlestown, was arrested at the scene, and booked at Area A for attempted larceny of a motor vehicle, and possession of burglarious tools. The second suspect, also from Charlestown, fled on foot. The escape was made, but rather futile, since his identity is known to the officers. A warrant for his arrest will be sought at Charlestown District Court.

An investigation by the officer revealed that the suspect was not a resident of the building. Further investigation revealed that this same suspect was the same person who had committed a breaking and entering in this same building, earlier, on this same date. The suspect, a 23 year old resident of Charlestown, was placed under arrest for breaking and entering, with complaints to be sought for the earlier breaking and entering.

On November 27, 1984 at 8:20 p.m., as a result of citizens' complaints in the Main Street area, officers and detectives

of Area A responded to the front of 277 Main Street. On arrival they arrested two Charlestown males, and charged them with loitering. Both suspects were transported to Area A for booking.

On November 27, 1984 at 8:25 p.m., Detectives responded to 276 Main Street on citizens' complaints. Two male suspects were placed under arrest, taken to Area A, and booked for loitering. One of the suspects was also charged with possession of a Class D Substance.
