Kenney Development Company "A Good Neighbor"

When the Boston Re development Authority (BRA) approached Bob Kenney, president of the Kenney Development Company and former Director of the BRA, to contribute to the Charlestown Headstart Program Fire Fund, a check for $\$ 1,000$ was sent right out. But after hearing more about the overwhelming problems and total devastation that the December blaze caused to the program's building in Hayes Square, Kenney decided that his company could and would do a lot more to help set the school back on its feet.
A call was made to Kate McDonough, executive director of the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, and an offer of the services and experience of Kenney Development Company was made to oversee the total reconstruction of the burnt out building that once housed and provided once housed and provided
care for over 160 children on a daily basis. The BRA supplied a $\$ 20,000$ grant for architect David Kelly of The Architectural Team (TAT) to design the renovations that would be needed, and the coordination of the and the coordination of

Macomber Construction Company was hired as the general constractor and labor unions were contacted for carpenters, plumbers, painters and electricians. painters and electricians.
Local trades people have expressed their desire to donate their time and expertise to the reconstruction project.
The total cost to refurbish the building is estimated at a whopping $\$ 1,011,000$ which will include demoliwhich will include demoir-
tion of burnt out floors, asbestos removal, masonry work, plumbing, electrical work and, in some areas, total reconstruction of windows, floors, doors, the roof, plus other needed roof, plus other needed
work. The total contribu-

tion that will be donated by the Kenney Development Company will amount to approximately $\$ 80,000$ when the reconstruction is completed.
The Kenney Development Company is currently developing four historic buildings in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Their experience in historic restoration comes from their work in and around the metropolitan Boston area that has litan Boston area that has
included work on buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Buildings. They have worked closely with the National Park Service and various preservation societies at each site. They are the developer of They Buildings $33,34,38$ and 39 , between First and Third Avenues, in the Navy Yard. Buildings 33 and 34 are completed and house the offices of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority, the Boston Redevelopment Authority and National Life of Vermont as their major tenants and lease space to the Constitution Commissary, Blossoms Cafe, the Bank of Boston and Boston Waterfront Realty.

Building 39 will be ready for occupancy by mid-summer to accommodate both commercial and retail spaces. By January of 1989 , Building 38 will also be ready for new tenants. A mixture of offices, stores and restaurants, with even the possibility that a child care facility will be included, are the development plans of what will be called "Navy Yard Plaza." Future plans for a Faneuil Hall type of atmosphere are under discussion for the area.

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Preservation Society Moves Closer To Realization Of Thompson Square Park

The Charlestown Preseration Society moved closer to having their plans for a park in Thompson Square become a reality this week with two separate an nouncements, one from the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the second from the Boston Water and Sewer Commission.
In action taken on May 12, the BRA Board voted to appropriate $\$ 10,000$ from the Community Fund for the Permanent Maintenance Fund for Thompson Square Park. The Society had requested this contribution in order that the fund reach $\$ 20,000$ before the construction project began. Some $\$ 10,000$ has been raised by the Society for the Maintenance Fund.

Also, the Boston Water and Sewer Commission has granted permission to the Preservation Society to proide water for the decorative and drinking fountain in the Thompson Square Park. The water usage will be metered and paid for by the Preservation Society. David L. Conlin, acting director of the Commission said that he was pleased to respond favorably to the Preservation Society's request.
According to Commission spokesman Ron Cantena, the usual procedure in connecting a fountain is to recirculate the water. He said that since this proposed fountain will be both ornamental as well as a source of drinking water, an
exception has been made in his case as the water has to e potable. He said the fountain will automatically discharge water ten minutes per hour
Cantena said that Annette Tecce, trustee of the Preseration Society, told the Commission that the members of the Society were very excited regarding the decision that drinking water e available for this site She said that a fountain with drinking water is an integral part of their plans for Thompson Square and they are delighted the Commission agreed with their proposal
Tecce said that the Thompson Square Park which has been in the planning stages for four years
is being developed with a $\$ 175,000$ grant from the Browne Fund, a $\$ 45,000$ NDEA grant and $\$ 55,000$ in monies from the BRA allocated from the Main Street reconstruction project for the Thompson Square Park.
The first draft of the construction drawings should be in the hands of the committee this week, said Tecce. If approved, the contract for the construction should go out to bid next week with completion of the Park planned within this construction season.

Hero Square Dedicated In Honor Of Former Charlestown Resident
The Boston Chinatown Post 328 of The American Legion and the City of Boston dedicated a Hero Square in honor of Private First Class George Oi on May 15 at the corner of Beech and Hudson Streets in the Chinatown section of Boston.
Oi died in Germany on March 11, 1945 during the Battle of Remagen Bridge. This dedication marked the first time a Chinese-American received such an honor in the New England area.
Oi was born in Charlestown and lived with his family at 11 Austin Street in a house which has since been torn down. He attend
ed the Harvard Elementary School. His family subsequently moved to Chinatown where he spent most of his youth. He joined the United States Army at the age of 18 and was sent to Europe in November, 1944 Oi voluntecred to serve as the "Point Man" to scout for his unit during the Battle of Remagen Bridge. He was killed instantly by the was killed instantly by the direct hit of a German morar shell.
A Bronze Star and a Purple Heart were presented to Oi's family for his show of bravery.

Help Them Learn A New Way To Live Dear Editor,
I am writing in response to Lynn Peters' article in the May 12 edition of the Charlestown Patriot about the excellent drug abuse prevention done by the SPECDA Program. Programs like SPECDA and the work of individuals like Officer Dashner cannot be appreciated too much.
My concern is with quotes att-ibuted to Officer Dashner that I believe could be taken out of context. These were "Rehabilitation and additional drug units are high cost programs. And they tend to be somewhat inefficient in dealing with the problem." It is true that prevention of illness is the most cost effective way to deal with any disease. Prevention is certainly preferable to waiting until an illness is in full swing and requiring treatment. Unfortunately, the City of Boston has a major health problem with abuse/dependency . Drug dependence is a treatable disease requiring treatment. This means that rehabilitation and additional drug units are needed along with prevention curricula if we are to have a significant impact on this problem.
The costs of addicted parents to their children is immeasurable. The terror felt by parents whose children are drug dependent and/or dealers is also costly. We will all be somewhat richer and better off if we help them to learn a new way to live. A comprehensive substance abuse treatment and prevention system in each community can go a long way toward that goal.
