

Kenney Development Company — "A Good Neighbor"

When the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) approached Bob Kenney, president of the Kenney Development Company and former Director of the BRA, to contribute to the Charlestown Headstart Program Fire Fund, a check for \$1,000 was sent right out. But after hearing more about the overwhelming problems and total devastation that the December blaze caused to the program's building in Haves Square, Kenney decided that his company could and would do a lot more to help set the school back on its feet.

A call was made to Kate McDonough, executive director of the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, and an offer of the services and experience of Kenney Development Company was made to oversee the total reconstruction of the burnt out building that once housed and provided care for over 160 children on a daily basis. The BRA supplied a \$20,000 grant for architect David Kelly of The Architectural Team (TAT) to design the renovations that would be needed, and the coordination of the development began.

Macomber Construction Company was hired as the general constractor and labor unions were contacted for carpenters, plumbers, painters and electricians. Local trades people have expressed their desire to donate their time and expertise to the reconstruction project.

The total cost to refurbish the building is estimated at a whopping \$1,011,000 which will include demolition of burnt out floors, asbestos removal, masonry work, plumbing, electrical work and, in some areas, total reconstruction of windows, floors, doors, the roof, plus other needed work. tion that will be donated by the Kenney Development Company will amount to approximately \$80,000 when the reconstruction is completed.

The Kenney Development Company is currently developing four historic buildings in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Their experience in historic restoration comes from their work in and around the metropolitan Boston area that has included work on buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Buildings. They have worked closely with the National Park Service and various preservation societies at each site.

They are the developer of Buildings 33, 34, 38 and 39, between First and Third Avenues, in the Navy Yard. Buildings 33 and 34 are completed and house the offices of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority, the Boston Redevelopment Authority and National Life of Vermont as their major tenants and lease space to the Constitution Commissary, Blossoms Cafe, the Bank of Boston and Boston Waterfront Realty.



Preservation Society Moves Closer To Realization Of Thompson Square Park

The Charlestown Preservation Society moved closer to having their plans for a park in Thompson Square become a reality this week with two separate announcements, one from the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the second from the Boston Water and Sewer Commission.

In action taken on May 12, the BRA Board voted to appropriate \$10,000 from the Community Fund for the Permanent Maintenance Fund for Thompson Square Park. The Society had requested this contribution in order that the fund reach \$20,000 before the construction project began. Some \$10,000 has been raised by the Society for the Maintenance Fund.

Also, the Boston Water and Sewer Commission has granted permission to the Preservation Society to provide water for the decorative and drinking fountain in the Thompson Square Park. The water usage will be metered and paid for by the Preservation Society.

David L. Conlin, acting director of the Commission said that he was pleased to respond favorably to the Preservation Society's request

According to Commission spokesman Ron Cantena, the usual procedure in connecting a fountain is to recirculate the water. He said that since this proposed fountain will be both ornamental as well as a source of drinking water, an

exception has been made in this case as the water has to be potable. He said the fountain will automatically discharge water ten minutes per hour.

Cantena said that Annette Tecce, trustee of the Preservation Society, told the Commission that the members of the Society were very excited regarding the decision that drinking water be available for this site. She said that a fountain with drinking water is an integral part of their plans for Thompson Square and they are delighted the Commission agreed with their proposal.

Tecce said that the Thompson Square Park, which has been in the planning stages for four years, is being developed with a \$175,000 grant from the Browne Fund, a \$45,000 NDEA grant and \$55,000 in monies from the BRA allocated from the Main Street reconstruction project for the Thompson Square Park.

The first draft of the construction drawings should be in the hands of the committee this week, said Tecce. If approved, the contract for the construction should go out to bid next week with completion of the Park planned within this construction season.

(continued from page one) got a much needed start last December when Representative Voke secured a state commitment to fund the plan and design process for this project. While he has been working on obtaining the needed capital for construction, local community figures have been working with the Department of Environmental Management on the details of the study.

"The success we have enjoyed to date on this project is largely the result of the great community interest and support that has been channeled through the North Area Task Force," stated Voke. "Our joint efforts have certainly borne positive results, as evidenced by our funding announcement here today.'

North Area Task Force co-chairman Rich Johnston stated, "Today is a great day for Charlestown, especially for City Square. The state's commitment finally assures that a magnificent park will be built in City Square, restoring the

Square to its nineteenth century grandeur. We owe this day to the persistence of Charlestown residents in convincing the State Department of Public Works, DPW's consultants, and city officials that steps should be taken to create a park during construction of the CANA project, rather than waiting until after the highway project is over to decide the fate of City Square.

"But, we also owe the park to the tireless efforts of Representative Voke. His vision for City Square has been exemplary, his support unwavering. Once again, Voke has demonstrated his effectiveness in making the state responsive to the needs of our community and translating our hopes into realities. We cannot say enough about his support," concluded Johnston.

Although happy to have delivered on this issue, Voke notes that his work, and the work of community activists, must continue. "While we have accom-

plished much together, there is still much more to be accomplished to better provide for local needs," Voke said. Johnston reiterated Voke's statement by saying, "The North Area Task Force, along with other interested Charlestown residents, will now begin to coordinate the planning and design process for the park with the state, city and other relevant agencies. We ask all residents to join the Task Force in this most exciting project, the establishing of a park at the most important entrance into Charlestown from Boston. We look forward to a joint venture between residents who have known and enjoyed this area of Charlestown for many, many years and new residents who have made Charlestown their new home," stated Johnston.



Hero Square Dedicated In Honor Of Former Charlestown Resident

The Boston Chinatown Post 328 of The American Legion and the City of Boston dedicated a Hero Square in honor of Private First Class George Oi on May 15 at the corner of Beech and Hudson Streets in the Chinatown section of

Oi died in Germany on March 11, 1945 during the Battle of Remagen Bridge. This dedication marked the first time a Chinese-American received such an honor in the New England area.

Oi was born in Charlestown and lived with his family at 11 Austin Street in a house which has since been torn down. He attend-

ed the Harvard Elementary School. His family subsequently moved to Chinatown where he spent most of his youth. He joined the United States Army at the age of 18 and was sent to Europe in November, 1944.

Oi volunteered to serve as the "Point Man" to scout for his unit during the Battle of Remagen Bridge. He was killed instantly by the direct hit of a German mortar shell.

A Bronze Star and a Purple Heart were presented to Oi's family for his show of bravery.

Members of the Oi family were on hand for Sunday's dedication including his brother Henry Oi of Canton and his sister Rhonda Wong Lee of New York City.

Taking part in the ceremony were Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, Boston City Councillors Albert "Dapper" O'Neil and James Kelly, and representatives of The American Legion including Past National Historian and Past Department Commander James W. Conway of Charlestown.




Not For Nothin' . . . But Have You Heard . .



(continued from page one) Redevelopment Authority (BRA), Boston Housing Authority (BHA) and Mayor's Office representatives.

Unconfirmed reports seem to indicate that the neighborhood's input is needed prior to a scheduled Thursday, May 26 review of the proposal by the BRA Board.

Other rumors suggest that the plans for the parcel to be presented will include two four-bedroom units of special needs (689) housing to be developed by the BHA as well as the proposed construction of 20 townhouses on that site, 10 of which would be affordable.

Those concerned about young people looking for their first housing opportunities in Charlestown should be present to have impact on final redevelopment decisions for the parcel.

Also at this meeting, the Housing and Development Committee will consider the two submitted proposals for Parcel R-107,253-261A Main Street and 3 Lawnwood Place.

Help Them Learn A New Way To Live

I am writing in response to Lynn Peters' article in the May 12 edition of the Charlestown Patriot about the excellent drug abuse prevention done by the SPECDA Program. Programs like SPECDA and the work of individuals like Officer Dashner cannot be appreciated too much.

My concern is with quotes attributed to Officer Dashner that I believe could be taken out of context. These were, "Rehabilitation and additional drug units are high cost programs. And they tend to be somewhat inefficient in dealing with the problem." It is true that prevention of illness is the most cost effective way to deal with any disease. Prevention is certainly preferable to waiting until an illness is in full swing and requiring treatment. Unfortunately, the City of Boston has a major health problem with abuse/dependency. Drug dependence is a treatable disease requiring treatment. This means that rehabilitation and additional drug units are needed along with prevention curricula if we are to have a significant impact on this problem.

The costs of addicted parents to their children is immeasurable. The terror felt by parents whose children are drug dependent and/or dealers is also costly. We will all be somewhat richer and better off if we help them to learn a new way to live. A comprehensive substance abuse treatment and prevention system in each community can go a long way toward that goal.





As someone active in the anti-forced busing movement of the mid-1970s, I say end Boston's school busing program as its continued use is now without any value because Boston's schools have seen the white students shrink from 52 percent in 1974 to 26 percent today. Minority students are now being bused past public schools in their own neighborhoods to predominantly minority schools miles away in white neighborhoods. School integration is now a demographic impossibility given the numbers showing non-white students representing 74 percent of the student body. In 1974, that number was only 48 percent.

It is time to let kids go back to schools nearer home and the monies spent on transportation put back into the classrooms where it's really needed.






