September 25th was Troy Howard Middle School's day joining the Maine Coastal Clean-up Week. The 7th grade (110 students), teachers, parents, and 12 volunteers from the BBWC scoured the Belfast shoreline from the Little River on the Northport line eastward almost to the Searsport line.

Teams worked the shoreline clean-up and glued storm drain markers on nearly 100 storm drains in town to educate people that storm drains connect directly to the bay and anything except rainwater is harmful down a storm drain.

Bag lunches and nature observations filled out the day's activities before the students returned to school, carrying trash bags to inventory type and source of debris, weight, and counts. These figures were turned in to the state analysis of Coastal Clean-up week.

Students expressed pride in helping their community and their place.

Water Research in the Belfast Bay Watershed... and Beyond

BBWC engages in five forms of research to understand the science and nature of Belfast Bay and its watershed. The bay is part of North Penobscot Bay influenced by the 4 watersheds draining into Belfast Bay and also the entire Penobscot River watershed coming into North Penobscot Bay.

Records show that Maine's precipitation has increased considerably in the recent two decades, changing water chemistry in the Gulf of Maine. Climate change is also affecting river and gulf temperatures, sea level rise, and harsher storm wave action. BBWC is engaged in initiatives to assess and understand all these changes.

BBWC has joined the Maine Coastal Observing Alliance (MCOA). By working together the goal is to provide a regional perspective of estuarine water quality through sharing of resources and expertise and implementation of coordinated water sampling program.

The second regional water sampling program BBWC participated in was "Shell Day." This one day data collection blitz sought to determine acidification patterns in near-coastal waters.

The third research program is monitoring storm surge sensors monthly, year round, as part of a UMaine study of two bays, of which North Penobscot is one. With our data and others, UMaine is able to understand the physics and changes in storm surge heights.

Fourth progarm is BBWC volunteers testing water quality in Belfast Bay each week, at both high tide and low tide. Data is reported to the DEP to establish a baseline which did not exist before.

Finally BBWC pays for a professional water quality evaluation every three years in the Passagassawakeag River and Wescot Stream.
