## **Voter Apathy Evidenced** In City Election

Approximately 42.5% of eligible Charlestown voters went to the polls on Tuesday, November 3, 1981, electing nine members of the Boston City Council and five members of the Boston School Committee to serve in those offices for the next two years.

A relatively lack-luster campaign, teamed with enormous voter apathy, was evidenced in a low city-wide turnout-a figure of only slightly over 35% citywide. The voters returned five out of the six incumbents running for the Council back to office -Raymond Flynn, Christopher Iannella, Albert "Dapper" O'Neil, Frederick Langone and Joseph Tierney — who will serve along with Michael McCormack, Terence McDermott, Maura Hennigan and Bruce Bolling. Incumbent Patrick McDonough finished 12th, some 1200 votes from the cut-off.

Incumbent Ray Flynn topped the ticket in Charlestown and throughout the city, some 8000 votes ahead of the second place finisher. Taking second place in the Charlestown tally was James M. Jim Kelly who finished tenth city-wide, less than 800 votes behind ninth place Bruce Bolling.

Two new faces will be taking

their seats on the Boston School Committee come January. They are Rita Walsh-Tomasini and Jean McGuire who will serve with incumbents John O'Bryant, Jean Sullivan McKeigue, and Kevin McCluskey

Incumbent Elvira Pixie Palladino, who has served on the Committee four years, topped the ticket in Charlestown but went down to defeat city-wide, finishing ninth. Incumbent John McDonough finished sixth citywide, almost 7000 votes behind fifth-place Kevin McCluskey.

In Charlestown, some 3255 votes were cast (unofficial tally) out of a possible voting population of 7663 (as of 1/1/81).

On Ballot Questions 1 and 2, which would allow for district representation on the Boston City Council and Boston School Committee respectively, Charlestown voiced a "No" on both questions by better than a two to one margin. The unofficial vote in Charlestown was: Question 1 -Yes 811 and No 1783 (661 blanks) and Question 2 - Yes 794 and No 1756 (705 blanks).

Questions 1 and 2 were passed city-wide and this expanded City Council and School Committee will go into effect with the 1983

#### New Job Program For Charlestown Youth

The Charlestown Board of Trade and The Boston Committee are co-sponsoring a new job program for Charlestown students. This program is geared towards training students already in a school program in a job that will give them some experience for the future. We worked with the members of The Boston Committee on the Charlestown Pool Project and are grateful to them for approaching The Charlestown Board of Trade with a new project that is essentially an offspring of our success with The Bunker Hill Pool last summer. This program would not be at all

possible without the faith and trust that The Boston Committee has in The Charlestown Board of Trade

The new job program will fund approximately twenty-five jobs for students this year and will also pay for our student coordinator, Helen Myers. The program will be run on a strictly business level with time cards and minimum wages. The local merchants who are involved are giving a great deal of their time and effort to make this work.

This program begins on December 1, 1981 and will continue until June 1, 1982.

The only prerequisites for this

program is that the youth be currently enrolled in a school program and willing to work for a Charlestown merchant for minimum wages. Each student will be interviewed by Helen Myers and will be matched with a job that is relevant to his or her courses or interests.

Each business that applies for a student will be required to give the student a minimum of fifteen hours of work a week. For the first ten weeks of the program The Charlestown Board of Tade will pay 50% of each student's weekly wages to the merchants involved. Each merchant will be



## DiCara And Langone Address Columbus Students

Boston City Councillors Fred Langone and Larry DiCara spoke to the Political Science classes at Columbus High School October 26 on the powers and responsibilities of the City Council as it was chartered in 1954 and on the "Boston Bail-Out Bill" (Tregor Bill) which would aid Boston in its current fiscal crisis.

Councillor DiCara presented an outline of the proposed redistricting plan of the Boston School Committee and City Council. He said, "Boston's legislative branch of government will become stronger and now will represent all of Boston's neighborhoods." Roslindale and Back Bay. Some of Boston's neighborhoods have never been represented under the current charter."

Councillor Langone stated, "Mayor Kevin White, after 14 years in office has become arrogant." He added, "All departments in the city are 'top heavy'," referring to White's cutbacks in teaching, fire and police personnel. "Department heads in the fire and police departments are all buddies of Mayor White," he added. up for rent once the windows are completed and other major repairs made. All this is being made possible through federal monies in excess of \$5 million dollars, allotted for modernization of the 40 year old project. "Now we're making visible repairs," said Project Manager Joseph McNamara. New roofs, heating systems, and safety doors are major repairs made to the project but not visible to the community or tenants.

The new windows replace the wood frame and steel frame that have either rotted or pulled away from the casings. These windows will have thermo-pane sashes and double windows with screens. Besides giving residents more heat retention, the new windows provide a face lift for the buildings. "You'd be surprise what people are saying," said Ed Sweeney, Tenants Task Force Chairman. "Now that they have their new windows, they're thinking about what they're going to do for their lawns."

Along with the new windows


come "color walls," a combination of steel panels, painted various bright colors, and glass panes. The color walls allow light to filter into the hallways of buildings but provide less glass for vandals to break.

While the BHA has been able to allot \$5 million for improvements to the housing project, it is not enough money to take care of all the buildings and therefore, six buildings around the Polk Street area are being, temporarily "mothballed", according to Mc-Namara. "Those buildings have suffered such extensive damage. that to repair them, would take up the five million and then we still wouldn't be ahead of the

But McNamara emphasized that the project is not being sold. According to him and Sweeney, rumors have run rampant in the project that it was to be sold to a developer and turned into condominiums, "I tell people to look around and ask themselves if they would be spending all this money if they were going to sell it or tear it down," said Sweeney.
