★ **City Square . . .** As you can see, the removal of the elevated roadway over City Square is well underway. The next phases include removing the structure over Rutherford Avenue, opening Chelsea Street from Terminal Street to Rutherford Avenue and finishing sidewalks, pedestrian underpasses and landscaping.

In order to minimize disruption, the Mass. Highway Department (MHD) will remove the structure that passes over Rutherford Avenue during the evenings of Friday, Oct. 21 and Saturday, Oct. 22. The work will take place between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.

As traffic volumes are lightest during this time, Rutherford Avenue traffic in the vicinity of the Charlestown Bridge will be restricted to one lane in each direction. Police details will be stationed to help

direct traffic.

If you have any questions, please call Central Artery Liaison Stephen Collins at 342-1146. He will also be on call during the hours that this work will be performed in order to address any concerns.

★ **City Square Cleanup . . .** The Friends of the City Square Park are planning a clean up for the CANA area on Saturday, Oct. 15 from 9 to 11 a.m.

According to Chairman Ken Stone, after several unsuccessful attempts by residents to have MHD, owner of the land in the City Square area, weed the open space and sweep the sidewalks and streets, the Friends have taken it upon themselves to organize a clean up.

The area to be cleaned will include the brick planters at both tunnel entrances. In addition, the thin strip of land along the

tunnel wall on the closed section of Chelsea Street will also be weeded. The MHD has been asked to supply tools, gloves and trash bags for the project.

Any resident wishing to participate is urged to come and help with this worthwhile project, and any amount of time you can give will be appreciated.

NOW IS THE TIME TO RE-EXAMINE YOUR TAX RETURN

Each year thousands of Americans burn the midnight oil on April 15 scurrying to get their tax returns in the mail. Such last-minute action, however, often results in mistake-prone returns. Therefore, after the April filing deadline has passed, you should dig out the copy of your return and re-examine it closely in a more relaxed setting.

As you worked on your 1993 return, perhaps you were reminded of a break you overlooked on an earlier return. That's okay. Now's the perfect time to amend a previously filed return. If you made a mistake or forgot a deduction, you generally have three years from the due date of your return in which to file an amended version. Most people have until April 1995, therefore, to amend a return for the 1991 tax year.

Filing an amended return can save you money in another way - by stopping the penalty clock. If you overlooked some income that should have been declared on your return, or wrongly claimed a deduction that you shouldn't have, clearing up the error as soon as possible will reduce the interest or penalty you will owe if the Internal Revenue Service discovers your mistake at a later date.

You may also be able to save money by taking your last two or three tax returns to a professional preparer to review. Getting a second opinion can often turn up a mistake and enable you to receive a refund by simply filing an amended return. Taxpayers most likely to benefit are those who are entitled to lots of deductions.

To correct a previously filed federal tax return, complete Form 1040X. Be sure to fully document the changed figures on your amended return. And, attach receipts and other documentation to the amended return even though you were not required to do so on your regular return. Blank tax forms for prior years may be secured by calling the IRS at its toll-free number, 1-800-829-FORM.

Mansfield To Receive ABCD Community Service Award

James Mansfield will be the recipient of the Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) Community Award representing Charlestown. It will be presented at the 20th annual Community Awards Dinner beginning at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 21 at the Sheraton Boston Hotel and Towers, 39 Dalton St. in the Back Bay.

The keynote speaker will be Henry G. Cisneros, U.S. Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Cisneros and ABCD President Robert M. Coard will recognize and congratulate 17 volunteers from all of Boston's neighborhoods, including Mansfield. The recipients are nominated by ABCD Area Planning Action Councils and the Neighborhood Service Centers and Program Directors based on their individual contributions which serve to benefit the lives of Boston's poor and low-income people.

Mansfield is a public servant and community activist. For over six years he has served as a board member with the Kennedy Center serving as president from 1991 to 1994. As a Charlestown resident, his involvement with various community organizations ensures that he knows exactly what's going on and what each group is doing to make a difference.

For 11 years, Mansfield has worked with the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) in various

capacities. He began as an administrative assistant in the commissioner's office. After spending some time in the Public Affairs division as a research analyst, he was promoted in 1991 to director of Community Affairs. Recently his responsibilities have expanded and he currently was named as acting director of transportation.

In line with his professional experience, Mansfield has a number of community groups he volunteers with in Charlestown. He is a board member of the Charlestown Community Centers, secretary for the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and serves on the board of directors for the Boston Community Centers.

Other groups he shares his expertise with include:

Charlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), the Dennis McLaughlin House, Charlestown Pride Week Committee and the Charlestown Appreciation Awards Committee.

With his interests in politics and community development, Mansfield is a delegate for the Mass. Democratic Committee.

When he isn't volunteering for one cause or

another, he enjoys listening to music.

Also slated for special recognition will be ABCD's Friends Committee Chairman John Hamill, president of Fleet Bank of Mass. Special awards will be presented to Larry Moulter, chairman of the New Boston Garden Corp.; Charles Titus, director of Athletic Services at U-Mass Boston; and U.S. Senator Edward "Ted" Kennedy. Also, ABCD will honor four employees: Georgette Johnson, Jack Sheehan, May Burgis and Pierre Richeme.

World renown pop artist Livingston Taylor is this year's featured performer and Boston's own Silver Lining Gospel Singers will also perform. WBZ-TV anchors Liz Walker and Jack Williams will serve as mistress and master of ceremonies for the evenings.

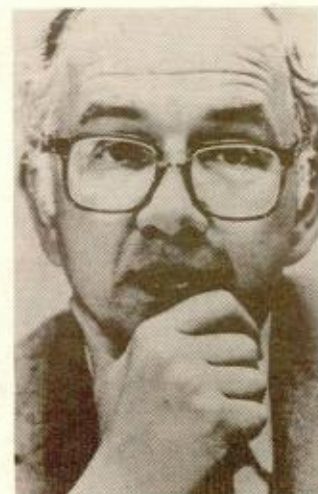

Harvard University To Help Restore John Harvard Obelisk

Andrew Hunter, Harvard class of 1951, first brought the Harvard obelisk to the attention of the university. The John Harvard obelisk which stands atop a rolling hill in Phipps Street Burying Ground (1630) in Charlestown, is missing one of its original bronze plaques. Realizing the importance of the monument, the university generously agreed to fund the replacement of the plaque.

The Rev. Mr. John Harvard arrived at the Mass.

Bay Colony in 1637. A resident of Charlestown, he was a well-educated clergyman who had a solid reputation of being a sage scholar. Shortly after his arrival in the New World, Harvard died. He bequeathed his estate, including his 300 volume library, to Harvard University. By raising subscriptions in 1828, the graduates of the university erected the granite obelisk in his memory.

There were two plaques installed, one in Eng-

lish on the eastern side, and one in Latin on the western side. The plaque in English is missing. It was inscribed, "On the 26th of September, A.D. 1828, this stone was erected by the graduates of the University at Cambridge, in honor of its founder, who died in Charlestown on the 26th of September, 1638."

The work is to be completed by nationally-known conservator Robert Shure of Skyline Studios in Woburn.

Program For Boston Public School Students At BHCC

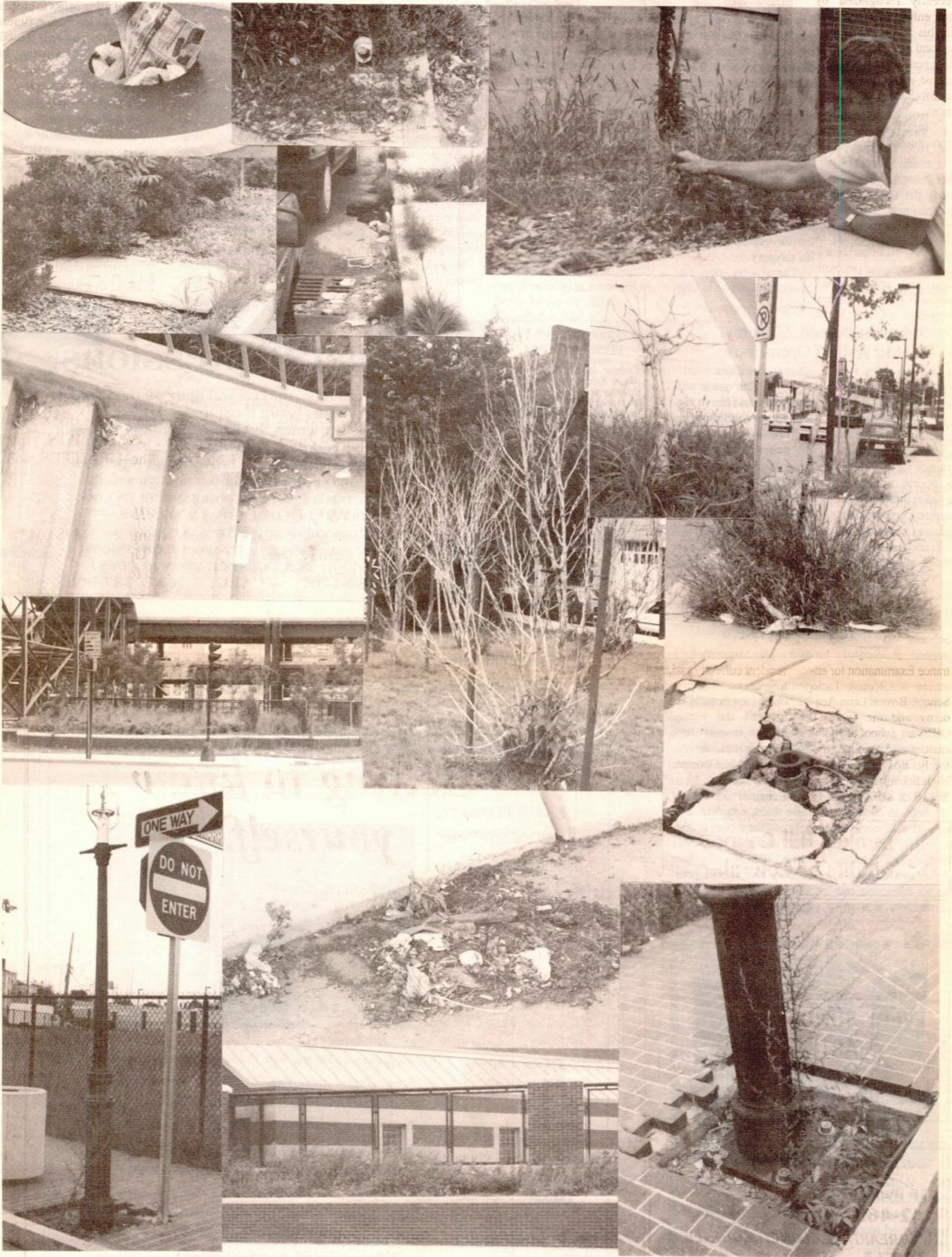

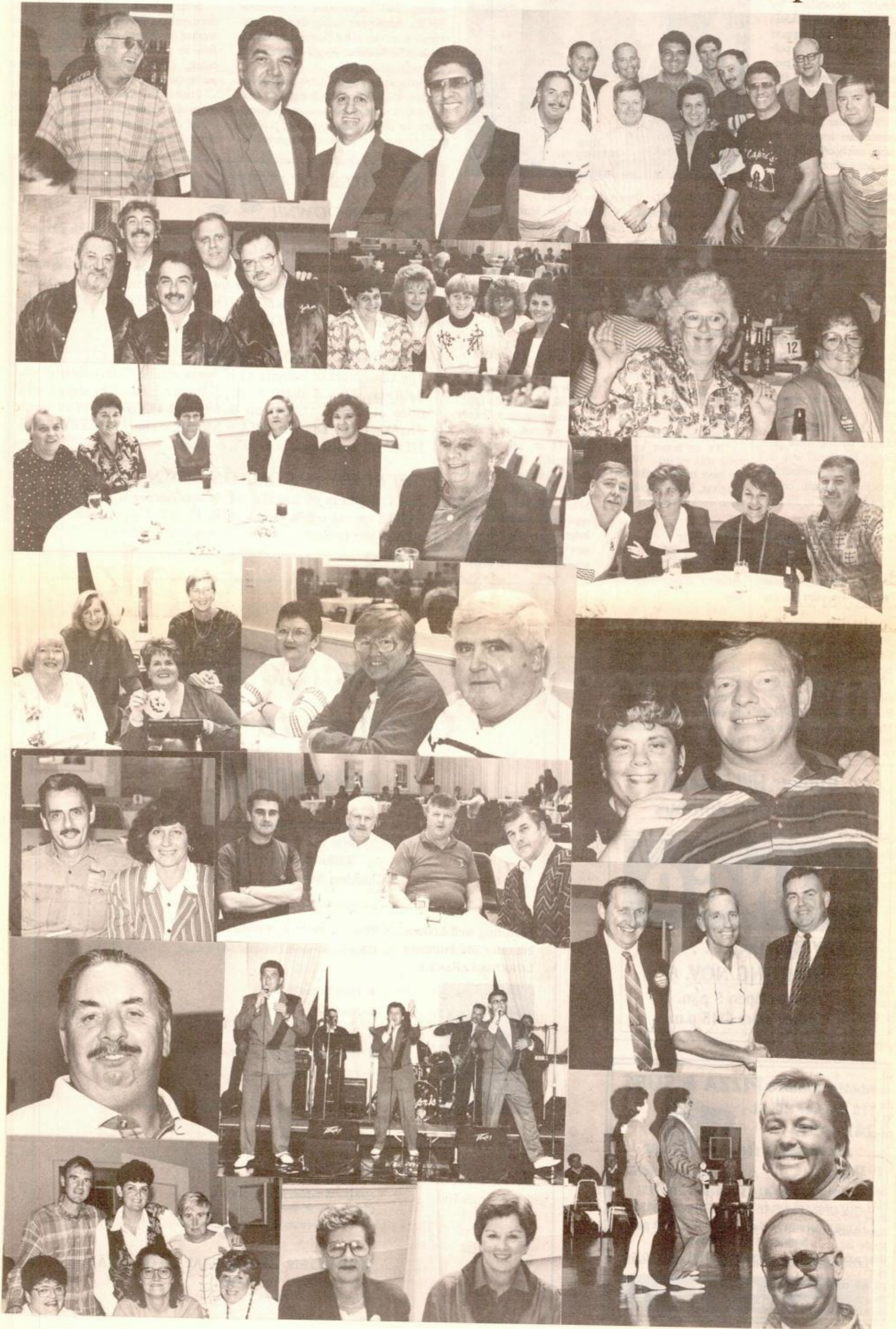

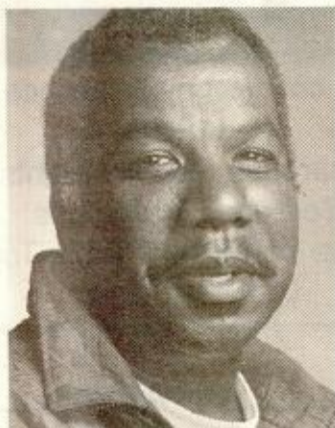

Questions Public Safety In 'Hot Pursuit'

Dear Gloria,

I would appreciate your printing all or part of this letter as I feel the people of Charlestown need to address the matter of public safety with the State Police.

On Tuesday, Oct. 4 at approximately 8 p.m., two Mass. State Police vehicles were involved in a high speed police chase of an allegedly stolen vehicle containing two youths. I feel the State Police endangered myself and my family as well as other citizens by continuing this pursuit into a heavily populated section of town.

I witnessed this chase as the stolen vehicle was chased down West School Street and onto Lawrence Street. At the corner of Phipps Street, the vehicle went up a wheel-

chair ramp and onto the sidewalk of Mishawum Park Development. The State Police vehicle, which was directly behind the stolen vehicle, also raced across an area generally reserved for pedestrians.

I believe the trooper who continued this "hot pursuit" made a gross error in judgement and endangered many innocent citizens, including children.

I hope other people who witnessed this incident, will write to: State Police Headquarters, 470 Worcester Road, Framingham, Mass. 01701, to express their outrage at this trooper's actions.

I'd like to note that the second trooper involved in this chase, did not enter Mishawum Park, but rather continued down Phipps Street and onto Main Street. This trooper should be commended for his/her actions.

**ADOLESCENT / YOUNG ADULT
PRIMARY CARE PROGRAM**

The health care professionals at MGH-BHHC who care for the children, adolescents and adults of Charlestown are concerned about the adolescents and young adults going through this vulnerable developmental time period. We are piloting a program on Monday afternoons to deliver primary care that is developmentally appropriate for adolescents and young adults. It is based on the principles of comprehensive primary care within a developmental framework. Confidentiality of the doctor-patient relationship is a cornerstone of this primary care relationship as it is in Adult Medicine. In order for an adolescent to grow and take on responsibility for their own health, a trusting and confidential relationship can be key. But the role of the adolescent within the family is always addressed and the values of the family and the community are included in the discussions as well as the consequences of any activities with health implications.

The major causes of adolescent morbidity and mortality are related to behaviors. Motor vehicle accidents, homicide and suicide lead the list of causes of death with substance abuse, gynecologic problems and infections causing most of the illnesses. These problems are multifactorial in their cause and require a multidisciplinary team to address.

The team that is involved in developing the Adolescent / Young Adult program includes: Dr. Mariette Murphy, a pediatrician and Director of Adolescent Medicine at MGH, who provides both medical and gynecologic care. Dr. Michael Garrity from Adult Medicine provides comprehensive primary care with a strong interest in sports medicine. Dr. Linda Forsythe, a child psychiatrist and psychopharmacologist, provides expert consultation for behavioral and psychiatric issues. Supported by nursing and secretarial staff who will be specifically trained for this age group, MGH-BHHC will be piloting the Adolescent / Young Adult Primary Care Program on Monday afternoons over the next year to clarify the health needs of our developing young adults and design health care that developmentally meets their needs. **Boston Plan Access Program
Awards Scholarship Grants**

The Boston Plan for Excellence in the Public Schools has awarded \$111,715 in scholarships to 160 college-bound high school graduates from 14 high schools city-wide. These "last-dollar" grants represent the amount of financial assistance each student needs after exhausting all other financial aid sources.
