★ City Square . . . As you can see, the removal of the elevated roadway over City Square is well underway. The next phases include removing the structure over Rutherford Avenue, opening Chelsea Street from Terminal Street to Rutherford Avenue and finishing sidewalks, pedestrian underpasses and land-

In order to minimize disruption, the Mass. Highway Department (MHD) will remove the structure that passes over Rutherford Avenue during the evenings of Friday, Oct. 21 and Saturday, Oct. 22. The work will take place between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.

As traffic volumes are lightest during this time, Rutherford Avenue traffic in the vicinity of the Charlestown Bridge will be restricted to one lane in each direction. Police details will be stationed to help direct traffic.

If you have any questions, please call Central Artery Liaison Stephen Collins at 342-1146. He will also be on call during the hours that this work will be performed in order to address any concerns.

★ City Square Cleanup ... The Friends of the City Square Park are planning a clean up for the CANA area on Saturday, Oct. 15 from 9 to 11 a.m.

According to Chairman Ken Stone, after several unsuccessful attempts by residents to have MHD, owner of the land in the City Square area, weed the open space and sweep the sidewalks and streets, the Friends have taken it upon themselves to organize a clean up.

The area to be cleaned will include the brick planters at both tunnel entrances. In addition, the thin strip of land along the tunnel wall on the closed section of Chelsea Street will also be weeded. The MHD has been asked to supply tools, gloves and trash bags for the project.

Any resident wishing to participate is urged to come and help with this worth-while project, and any amount of time you can give will be appreciated.

NOW IS THE TIME TO RE-EXAMINE YOUR TAX RETURN

Each year thousands of Americans burn the midnight oil on April 15 scurrying to get their tax returns in the mail. Such last-minute action, however, often results in mistake-prone returns. Therefore, after the April filing deadline has passed, you should dig out the copy of your return and re-examine it closely in a more relaxed setting.

As you worked on your 1993 return, perhaps you were reminded of a break you overlooked on an earlier return. That's okay. Now's the perfect time to amend a previously filed return. If you made a mistake or forgot a deduction, you generally have three years from the due date of your return in which to file an amended version. Most people have until April 1995, therefore, to amend a return for the 1991 tax year.

Filing an amended return can save you money in another way - by stopping the penalty clock. If you overlooked some income that should have been declared on your return, or wrongly claimed a deduction that you shouldn't have, clearing up the error as soon as possible will reduce the interest or penalty you will owe if the Internal Revenue Service discovers your mistake at a later date.

You may also be able to save money by taking your last two or three tax returns to a professional preparer to review. Getting a second opinion can often turn up a mistake and enable you to receive a refund by simply filing an amended return. Taxpayers most likely to benefit are those who are entitled to lots of deductions.

To correct a previously filed federal tax return, complete Form 1040X. Be sure to fully document the changed figures on your amended return. And, attach receipts and other documentation to the amended return even though you were not required to do so on your regular return. Blank tax forms for prior years may be secured by calling the IRS at its toll-free number, 1-800-829-FORM.

Harvard University To Help Restore John Harvard Obelisk

Andrew Hunter, Harvard class of 1951, first brought the Harvard obelisk to the attention of the university. The John Harvard obelisk which stands atop a rolling hill in Phipps Street Burying Ground (1630) in Charlestown, is missing one of its original bronze plaques. Realizing the importance of the monument, the university generously agreed to fund the replacement of the plaque.

The Rev. Mr. John Harvard arrived at the Mass. Bay Colony in 1637. A resident of Charlestown, he was a well-educated clergyman who had a solid reputation of being a sage scholar. Shortly after his arrival in the New World, Harvard died. He bequeathed his estate, including his 300 volume library, to Harvard University. By raising subscriptions in 1828, the graduates of the university erected the granite obelisk in his memory.

There were two plaques installed, one in English on the eastern side, and one in Latin on the western side. The plaque in English is missing. It was inscribed, "On the 26th of September, A.D. 1828, this stone was erected by the graduates of the University at Cambridge, in honor of its founder, who died in Charlestown on the 26th of September, 1638."

The work is to be completed by nationallyknown conservator Robert Shure of Skyline Studios in Woburn.

Program For Boston Public School Students At BHCC

Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) is participating in Compact for College Success which at BHCC is called The Guided Student Program, a project to improve the retention and graduation rates of Boston Public School students.

I don't have to make an appointment," and "My faculty mentor spoke Spanish, my native language. 

Boston Plan Access Program Awards Scholarship Grants

The Boston Plan for Excellence in the Public Schools has awarded \$111,715 in scholarships to 160 college-bound high school graduates from 14 high schools city-wide. These "last-dollar" grants represent the amount of financial assistance each student needs after exhausting all other financial aid sources.

"For these students an Access grant makes the crucial difference," explains Access Program Director, Dawn Sinclair-Dixon. "It attempts to close the gap between tuition costs and other financial aid providing the critical last dollars they need to pay their tuition bill."

Since 1985, Access has awarded over \$2 million in new and continuing awards. The program is supported by endowment gifts from over 70 Bostonbased businesses and foundations including The New England, The Boston Foundation and The American Student Assistance Corporation.

The 1994 Access Scholars from Charlestown are Lisa Bilodeau and Phuong Tran. Bilodeau, a graduate of Boston Latin who is attending George Washington University, received \$1,000. Tran, a graduate of John D. O'Bryant High School who is attending Regis College, received \$910.
