Meeting On Formation Of Charlestown Neighborhood Council Set For Tuesday

The Mayor's Office of Community Participation is in the process of drafting a Neighborhood Council which would allow community people direct access to City Hall decisions.

Thomas A. "Alex" Bledsoe, Director of the

Mayor's Office of Community Participation stated communities "simply respond to things thrown on them. They have never been given a chance to talk to city planners." The Neighborhood Council would allow neighborhoods a channel into City Hall.

At present, Bledsoe stated his office will hold a total of 18 neighborhood meetings this summer to obtain community input on the proposal. "We are going to see what people would like to see and then we will come up with a recommendation for the Mayor," stated Bledsoe.

The council, which Bledsoe hopes to be established in the late fall to begin operation in January 1985,

at first, will only serve in an advisory capacity. As the council develops expertise and credibility, Bledsoe states it may be given more responsibility.

No final decisions have been made in terms of size, role and responsibilities, and selection process.

Bledsoe stated that there are over 20 cities in the country with neighborhood councils. "We are looking at them," stated Bledsoe, "to see strengths and weaknesses. What we have seen so far is that in most of these cities who have them (the neighborhood councils), their impact is taken seriously."

The Neighborhood Council will differ from the City

Council in that neighborhoods will not share representatives with other neighborhoods.

For example, Charlestown residents will focus solely on issues that effect Charlestown.

Councils, on the whole, will basically concentrate their efforts on two areas, community services and land use.

As seen in the Neighborhood Clean-up Campaign, Bledsoe stated, "Residents are able to sit down with the Department of Public Works and talk about the service back and forth. The Neighborhood Council will be able to monitor services and meet with people from other city

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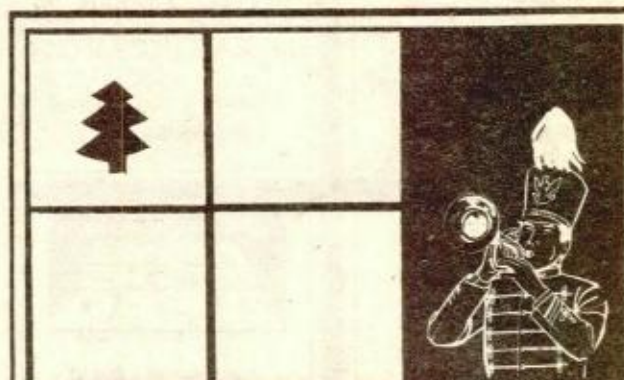


Children's Films

Proposal For Chestnut Street Housing To Be Heard By Board Of Appeal



PROPOSED HOUSING UNITS FOR 35-39 CHESTNUT STREET

The proposal to turn the vacant lot at 35-39 Chestnut Street into three-four story row houses will go before the Board of Appeal on Tuesday, June 26, 1984 at 9:30 a.m. in Room 801 in Boston City Hall.

Originally, the proposal called for 11 units of condominiums on the 8,118 square foot land parcel. However, in an effort to compromise with the area residents, Allen Kueny, developer for the project, has reduced this number to ten units. Kueny has also decided to remove the cupola which was planned for the roof of the structure since many residents of this area did not favor the idea.

Area residents have expressed concern that the building will be too large for the area of land. Many cited density of the neighborhood as their main concern.

Kueny disagrees. The developer states that he feels many residents have misinterpreted the building to be larger than is actually proposed. The lot, according to Kueny, is wide enough for four buildings even though the plan only calls for three.

The proposal also, calls for a four story Victorian style building, which according to Kueny, is in character with the neighborhood.

Despite the changes made in design, the proposal must be granted four variances by the Board of Appeal in order to be built. These variances include an extension of the minimum lot size, front yard minimum depth, floor area ratio, and set back of parapet.

The land parcel does not meet zoning specifications for these four variances being sought, however, it is adequate as far as required lot width, height of building, useable open space, side yard, and rear yard space.

Another change in the original design is that of lotted off street parking which will be provided. Immediate side abutters have already been promised two spaces planned in the original proposal. Kueny states that since there is a reduction in the number of units, there is also a reduc-

tion of one parking space, thus allowing for the ten units one space each and two for the abutters.

Still residents are con-

cerned. They are not opposed to a building on the land. In fact, one resident stated that the building "is

the Democratic State Convention on June 8 and 9, 1984 in Worcester.

On Friday evening, June 8, the delegates from the

Suffolk, Essex and Middlesex District, which include Charlestown, Chelsea, Everett, Revere, and Saugus, were asked to

determine whether the "15% Rule" should be retained or amended to 5%. Like most other districts, the delegates sup-

ported the current 15% threshold by an overwhelming majority. The delegates in this district voted to defeat the amendment by a vote of 9 yes and 42 no.

ercises, delivered the Commencement Address. The King was joined in his visit to Cambridge by Queen Sophia.

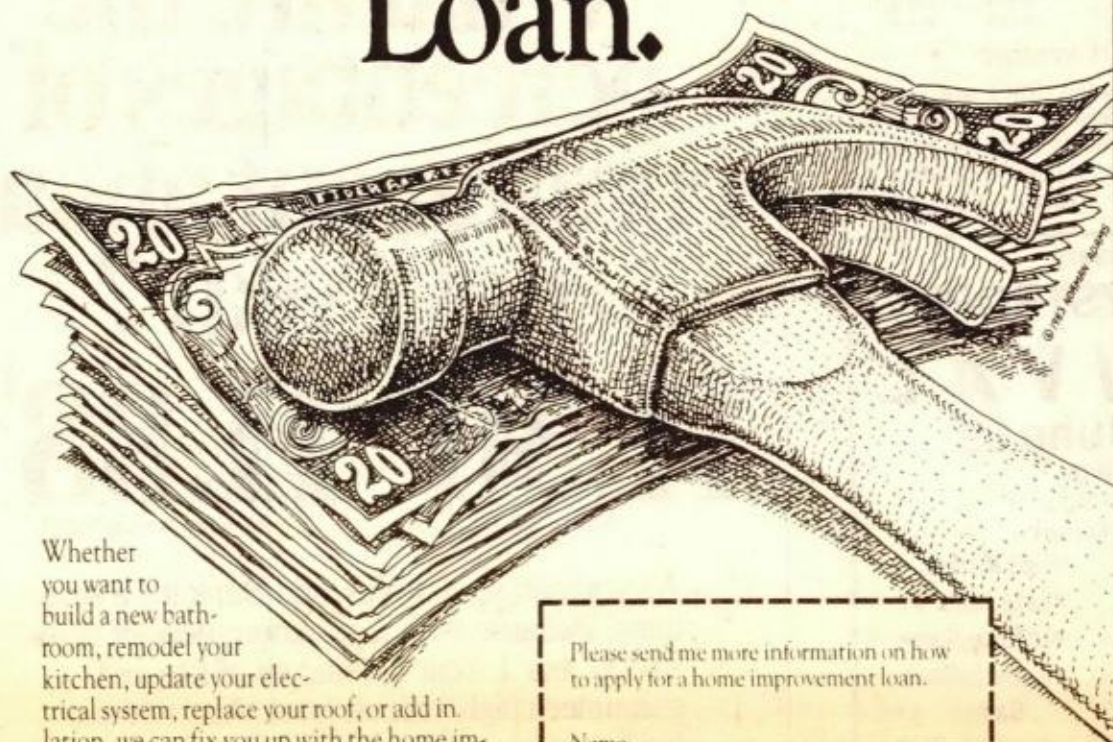

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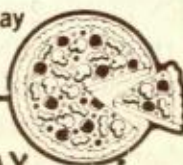

What residents are opposed to is the actual size of the building. "It's just too much for such a small lot of land," stated one neighbor.

Many of the residents interviewed wished not to be identified because they "really like the owners."

One resident summarized the neighborhood opinion, "I'm not in opposition to the project in concept, and I really don't think anyone is. But collectively, I think that we're all concerned about the density issue."

The developers, besides Kueny, include Victoria

Olken of One Adams Street, Charlestown; Virginia Richardson of Lexington, an investor; and Barry Koretz of 20 Chestnut Street, Charlestown, the project architect.

- Last five (5) pay stubs (or what you can find) of working members of the household
- Social Security/Pension/Annuity check or statement
- Unemployment compensation/other income documentation
- Bank book or current bank statement
- Proof of citizenship or alien status (if not born in U.S.)
- Utility bills (if you wish to deduct them)
- Receipts for care of child or other dependents
- Medical bills (only if sixty (60) years of age or over, or disabled)

departments on ways to improve their services."

The second area of concern of the Neighborhood Councils is that of land use and planning for community revitalization. This includes moving, zoning, licensing, and disposition of surplus property.

"This will be a big concern, particularly in Charlestown, where there are a lot of controversial issues, i.e. zoning, condo conversion, etc.," stated Bledsoe. "The Neighborhood Council can meet with developers and work on solutions."

The council would also

voice opposition or support on developments, representing on the neighborhood to various boards.

"There is more weight in a Neighborhood Council rather than people going before a board as individuals," said Bledsoe. "A Neighborhood Council could save a lot of time by flagging down problems early on."

According to Bledsoe, "There are a lot of decisions made without community involvement, and sometimes, these decisions aren't always best for the neighborhood."

Another grey area which must be settled, is the

selection process for those who will serve on the Neighborhood Councils.

The two extreme alternatives are appointment by the Mayor and a democratic vote by the community.

Bledsoe states both methods have advantages and disadvantages. A selection process by means of mayoral appointment may limit the independence of a council, while an election may become political, thus not allowing adequate representation of the entire community.

Bledsoe would like to see a combination of the two methods, but stated this was not definite.

Another "hot question" according to Bledsoe was should area institutions be allowed a seat on the council, or should the Board of Trade send a representative to the council?

"None of this is set in stone," assured Bledsoe, "community people are supplying input to us as to the set up of council and making sure the council meets their needs."

The Office of Community Participation has scheduled a Charlestown neighborhood meeting on Tuesday, June 26, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria of Charlestown High School, 240 Medford Street. All those interested are encouraged to attend.

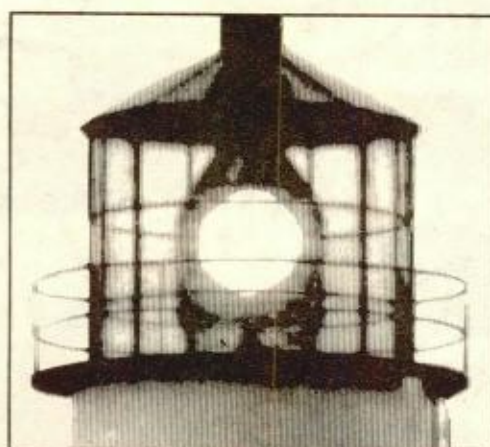

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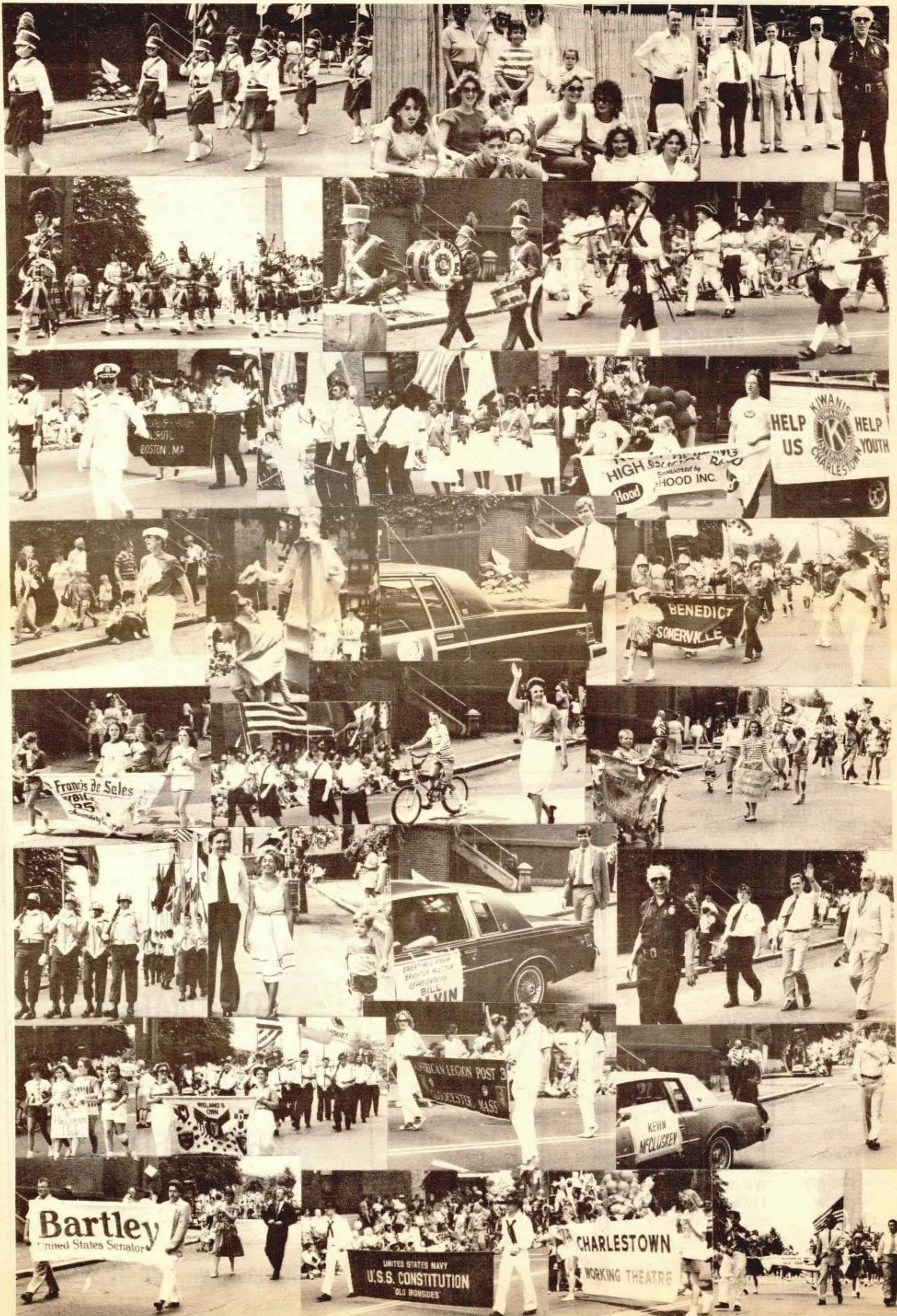

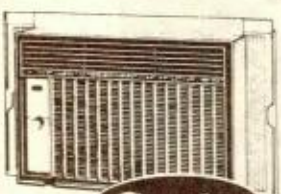

Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

Last week I talked about roles children begin to play growing up in a chemically dependent home. Most of the roles - being the **responsible child**, with one who adjusts, or the **family comforter** are not seen as destructive. But in adulthood, these ways of surviving often lead to unhealthy extremes. These young adults have more than average chance of being drawn into problem drinking, marrying someone who becomes alcoholic or having an unusual number of problems in their adult years.

If drinking is a problem with the adult child, the drinking must be dealt with first. The single greatest problem with all adult children is their inability to ask others for what they need or for help. Adult children are generally fearful of feelings because they don't understand them. Since childhood the message "don't feel" has caused the bottling up of all their feelings. Getting help in Al-Anon meetings, Adult Children of Alcoholics meetings and Alateen (call Al-Anon for places and times), or in therapy with someone who understands chemical dependency, is very helpful.

For the **responsible one**, it is important that he/she recognize the need he/she has to control. If you are a controlling person, think about some area you might try to give up control in. Experiment. And begin to experiment in playing, doing something just for having fun.

For the **adjuster**, who thinks "life is easier if you don't draw attention to yourself," try making choices for yourself and sticking to them. This is to help you to recognize your power to choose what happens in your life.

For the **placator** who cares for everyone, it is important to recognize the word "selfish". My needs are important. You need not feel guilty when you don't help someone in need. Try to accept the compliments you get.

Many people will welcome your new behavior, but others will not. But keep in mind that you have a right to make choices, that make you feel good.

Most of this information came from **It Will Never Happen to Me** by Claudia Black (M.A.C. Publications, Denver, CO) and I recommend this book as a resource if you are involved with or have a family member who is chemically dependent.

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Flatley Company To Purchase Schrafft's Plant

The Schrafft's Candy Company plant, which was forced to close its doors two weeks ago, is in the process of being sold to the Flatley Company of Braintree. The facility will be converted into a multi-use high technology research and development center.

Mayor Ray Flynn and Thomas Flatley, the owner of the company, announced the sale on Friday, June 8, 1984 at a press conference at City Hall.

The 16 acre property will become home to as many as 15 companies and provide between 800 and

1,000 jobs for Boston residents. The facility, which will be the first high tech center of its kind and size, will cost the Flatley Company \$6 million to purchase. The company will, in addition, invest an additional \$15 million for renovations that will take 18 months to complete.

According to Flatley, the plant will employ about 70% semi-skilled laborers who will earn between \$5 and \$6 an hour. The remaining 30% employed at the center will be office workers and technical personnel in research and development.

Approximately 800

employees lost their jobs when the Schrafft's Candy Company, owned by American Safety Razor, was forced to close its doors as a result of declining candy sales.

Dinah Vaprin, Deputy Press Secretary for the

Mayor, stated that there is hope that the former Schrafft workers will be hired by the new firms.

Flatley stated, "I am also hopeful that my company can contribute to the job training for Boston

residents, particularly Charlestown residents who may wish to work here."

Mayor Flynn stated that the project is "an exciting new venture" and should provide the "much needed jobs for residents of the

city." The Mayor also stressed jobs for Charlestown residents.

The new technical center will retain the famous Schrafft's sign and clock which have long been Charlestown landmarks.
