## Coppinger Calls For Necessary Council Staff

Francis X. Coppinger, a candidate for the Boston City Council, recently cited the need for independent staff to serve the Council. At the present time, the Council does not have a legal officer or a budget analyst.

"When the Boston City Council needs a legal opinion concerning its powers or duties or obligations under the law, the Council must rely on the City's Corporation Counsel staff, almost all of

whom are appointed by the Mayor and are beholden to him. When the Boston City Council needs an explanation or review of budgetary items and the use of transferred funds, it must rely on the City's Budget Analyst, who is appointed by the Mayor, as is his staff," Coppinger explained.

"I think this is an awkward situation that could lead to less than objective opinions or ex-

planations. This is not to say that erroneous or dishonest answers are given but they may not be as complete as they could be. I feel that a legal officer or budget analyst whose primary duty is to the City Council would be much more objective and incisive in the answers or opinions provided," Coppinger continued.

"Now, perhaps more than ever, the financial situation in Boston is of paramount concern, and will become even more so as the second and third years of Proposition 2 1/2 come along. How best to use the City's tax dollars will be the most important decisions that the Council will have to make. The exact limits of the City Council's powers have taken on increasing importance, as the last seven or eight months have shown in one court action after another," Coppinger said.

"I believe that the City Council will be much better informed as to financial matters, and, therefore, more qualified to make the necessary decisions, and the high cost of outside legal representation will be greatly diminished if these two positions are added to the Council staff," stated Coppinger.

## Libraries Supported In March

A rally and march to support Boston's neighborhood library system on a professional basis will be held Saturday, September 19 at 11 a.m. at the Main Library, Copley Square, Boston.

Adults, young people, children, senior citizens, and all concerned readers are urged by the Save the Library Committee to attend and participate in this event. "Come, carry a book, carry a poster, show your support for your neighborhood libraries," the committee statement declared.

"Your children are already being short-changed by the quality of the education given in the public schools. Don't let the

Boston Public Library administration rob your children of additional support, instruction and direction that your professional librarians give. Reading rooms without professional librarians would take this away," stated Berthe Gaines, member of the Save The Library Committee.

The Library Rally is in response to the library administrations proposed downgrading of 13 of the system's 24 branches to reading rooms. This would result in no professional staff, no programs, no assistance in finding information and no informed book ordering or counseling.

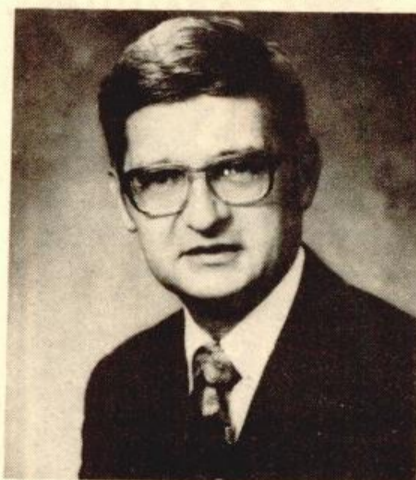

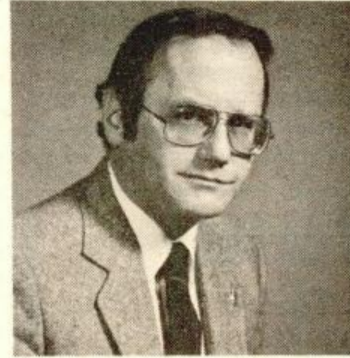

#### DIRTY STREETS

#### EXCESSIVE SCHOOL SPENDING

For seven years the School Department has used inflated enrollment figures and have consistently overspent their budget. Jim Kelly will establish a committee to audit the school budget is an effort to reduce spending to \$180M (a savings of \$55M over last year).

## Registry Streamlines Driving Tests

Motor Vehicles Registrar Richard E. McLaughlin announced a new driver licensing procedure which eliminates much of the paperwork involved in licensing new drivers and, he said, will drastically reduce the waiting time for tests. At some Registry Branches the waiting period is up to 10 weeks because of a shortage of Registry Examiners.

The new system went into effect on Tuesday, September 15.

Basically, the written Learner's Permit test will be eliminated and replaced by an oral quiz administered as part of the actual road test.

The Learner's Permit itself will be issued to all applicants displaying proof that they have attained 16 years of age.

Then, at age 16 1/2, (provided the applicant has satisfactorily completed a Driver Education

course) or age 17, (without certificate) the individual will make an appointment for the combined road test and oral quiz.

Upon satisfactory completion of the test, the applicant will be immediately issued the photographic driver's license.

This system, McLaughlin said, is essentially the same as the Registry employed from its inception in 1903 until 1964. He added, "The written test was good, but it is now far too costly in time, money and manpower for our reduced circumstances."

The revised system covers the ordinary regular passenger and light vehicle operators, the so-called Class 3 licenses and motor-cycle applicants. Heavy vehicle license applicants, Classes 1 and 2, will continue to complete the written Learner's Permit test, as will foreign language applicants.

Additional advantages of the new system will be elimination of repeat trips to the Registry, paper shuffling and reduced postage costs, the Registrar said.

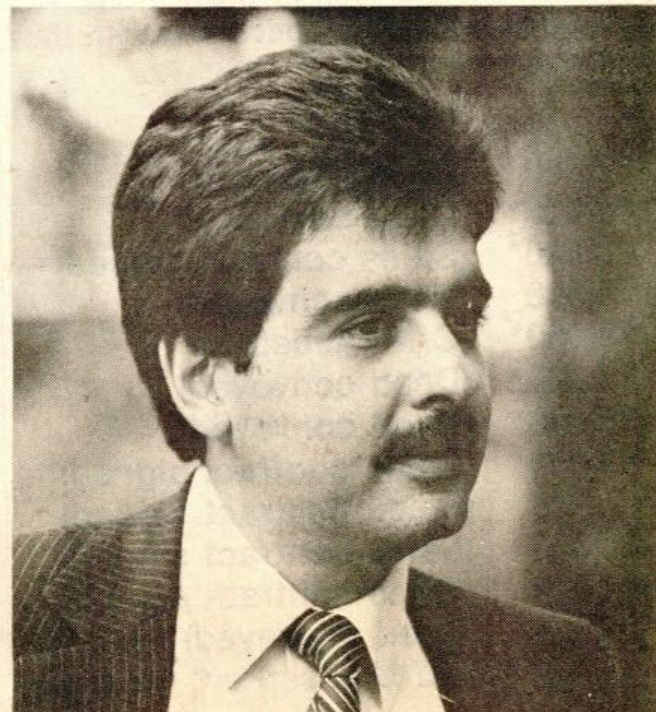

## Hood's Decision Important To Boston

by Mayor Kevin H. White  
 It's no secret that one of my administration's top priorities is now, and always has been, the job of attracting new business and industry to Boston. When we have succeeded in doing this, we have not been shy about broadcasting the news, which is logical because part of the city's strategy is good promotion. Generally less publicized,

though, is the continuing effort Boston makes to keep the business and industry the city already has. We value our old friends in the business world. We depend upon them for jobs for Bostonians, as well as for tax revenues. So it is with special satisfaction that I write this week about H.P. Hood's decision to stay in Boston—not only to stay, but to

renovate its present facilities and to expand.

If it had not been for efforts of Boston and some vital help from House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, this column would be about "the big one that got away."

H.P. Hood, Inc., was thinking seriously of relocating its plant in Marlboro.

I cannot emphasize enough what a grave loss this would have been to the Boston economy, especially in Charlestown where the Hood property is located...and has been situated since 1900. Almost 1,000 jobs would have been lost. Boston would have been virtually wiped out of the dairy industry, because Hood, the largest dairy in New England, makes up 90 percent of this industry in our city.

Also not to be overlooked is the psychological impact of such a loss. Boston is on an economic rise, a steep one spurred by a billion-dollar-a-year business boom. Frankly, we didn't want this picture dimmed by having one of our large employers, which accounts for one-third of the employment in Charlestown, move away.

With the help of Speaker O'Neill, we took the steps to induce H.P. Hood to stay.

Basically what we did was have the Economic Development and Industrial Corporation of Boston sit down with Hood and point out ways the city could help the firm, owned by Agway, Inc.,

a farm and food marketing cooperative owned by 123,000 farmers.

EDIC demonstrated to Hood the city's concern and how the city could help the firm with its financial planning. This was important because, at its Charlestown facility, Hood will be investing \$19.5 million in renovations and expansion.

With some use of federal Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) funds, Hood will be able to take advantage of low-interest loans for its construction program. This is a prime example of how UDAG funds can be used to directly help the people—with jobs.

As I have noted, this development is especially satisfying to

me. When I first heard that Hood was thinking of relocating, I was, to put it mildly, concerned. Now we can relax a bit, knowing that H.P. Hood will continue as part of the Boston community.

This, from a historical point of view, is as it should be. The company's roots are in Boston, and we've come a long way since H.P. Hood himself delivered the milk from a horse-drawn wagon.

It isn't just the sentimental factor, though; it's an economic factor that will pay off for Hood in the long run. This city is in the midst of an economic boom that will sustain it well into the next century, and H.P. Hood will be part of that prosperity, as it has been for the past century.

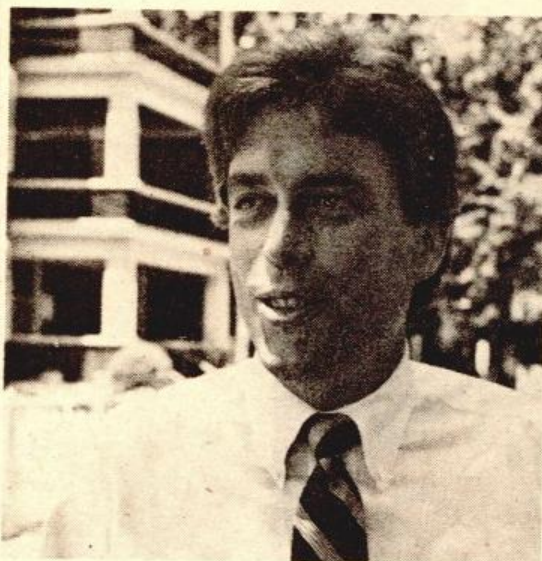

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## CTC Meeting Discusses Variety Of Issues

Public safety, public access to cable television and the North Area Task Force were topics discussed at last week's Charlestown Town Council Meeting.

Moderator Bobby Wallace began the meeting telling the small gathering, "The Charlestown Town Council will not endorse any candidate for city council or school committee ... not in the primary or general election."

This opening statement was made as a result of continued rumors to the contrary. The CTC in its nine months of existence has remained non-partisan and non-political. And intends to remain so, according to Wallace.

### PUBLIC SAFETY

First on the agenda was Night Deputy Supt. Norman Ebsary of Area A who substituted for Deputy Supt. Joseph Saia.

He told residents, during the Day Tour, had three cars and two cycles as well as two undercover officers in the Project.

He told residents that because of Proposition 2½, industrial accidents and vacations, Area A is down 36 officers and Charlestown during the day time has one less car. The Town has also lost the mounted patrolman up at the Monument due to his reassignment back to regular duty. According to Ebsary, the Day Tour originally had three cars.

Ebsary could also not guarantee anything on the re-opening of Station 15 even if the so-called "Tregor Package" was signed by the governor. At one point he stated that Charlestown even with its "problems" has the "lowest crime rate in the whole city."

The audience took this statement with a bit of skepticism. One person asked if Charlestown was safer for the people or for the criminal element. Another wanted to know if the Town's low crime rate was done on the basis of our small area or by per capita basis. However, Ebsary could not answer these questions.

The consensus at the meeting supported the reopening of Station 15 despite assurances that Charlestown has not been hurt with its closing.

### MISHAWUM SECURITY

Billy McClellan, representing the Mishawum Housing management, stated that due to increased trouble at this private housing development, a paid Boston Police detail has been hired on Friday and Saturday nights to walk a beat between 8 p.m. and 2 a.m. According to McClellan, the next step will be arrest procedures. Mishawum is a private development and arrests for trespassing and/or public drinking can and will be made if the situation does not improve.

### PUBLIC ACCESS/CABLE TV

Topic 2 for the night was public access and cable television in Boston. If neighborhoods groups are to have an impact on how Cable TV in the City of Boston is run, they must organize now. This was the opinion of Jack Bernstein and Margaret Harkins from the Public Access Coalition and Boston Community Television.

It was explained that the purpose of BCTV was "to stimulate interest and education of public access in Cable TV...using cable to communicate ideas within and between communities."

A meeting is going to be held at the Trinity Church in Copley Square on October 9 for community organizations to set strategy for a grassroots movement for public access on cable television.

### CHARLESTOWN CABLE COMMITTEE?

Widespread interest in getting involved in public access/cable led CTC Steering Committee member Billy McClellan to suggest that since the Town Council couldn't join the coalition that a group of interested Townies meet at the Community Center on Green Street at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 22 to discuss forming a committee apart from the CTC to attend the Trinity Church Meeting. The name for such a group was suggested-The Charlestown Town Cable Committee.

### NORTH AREA TASK FORCE

The North Area/Central Artery issue was the final and most brief topic discussed with the only new information being DPW's (Department of Public Works) reconsideration of the O-1 plan, suggested by CBT (Childs, Bertrand & Tseckares) and the L-2 plan, preferred by the resident task force, according to task force member Don Jackson.

The news follows the resignation of former DPW Commissioner Dean Amidon and his replacement by Acting Commissioner Sandino J. Tersigni.

"We've been told to hold on the interim report," said a representative of CBT (designers for the artery). "The strong position of July is no longer in existence."

The representative was referring to DPW Project Manager Ed

Fitzgerald's July announcement that the O-1 scheme had been chosen over the L-2 or L-1 traffic scheme.

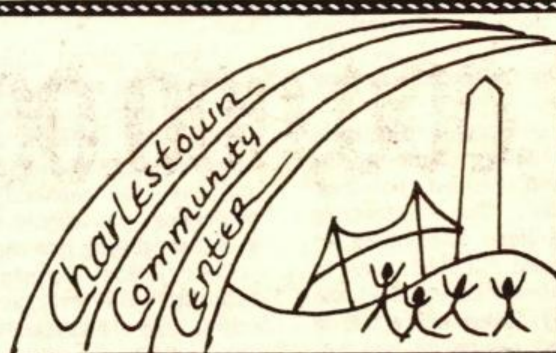
At that time members of the task force were shocked because no mention of an "O-1" scheme had ever been made prior to the announcement. The announcement threw members of the task force into actions finding alter-

native plans and seeking support in opposition to the O-1 scheme.

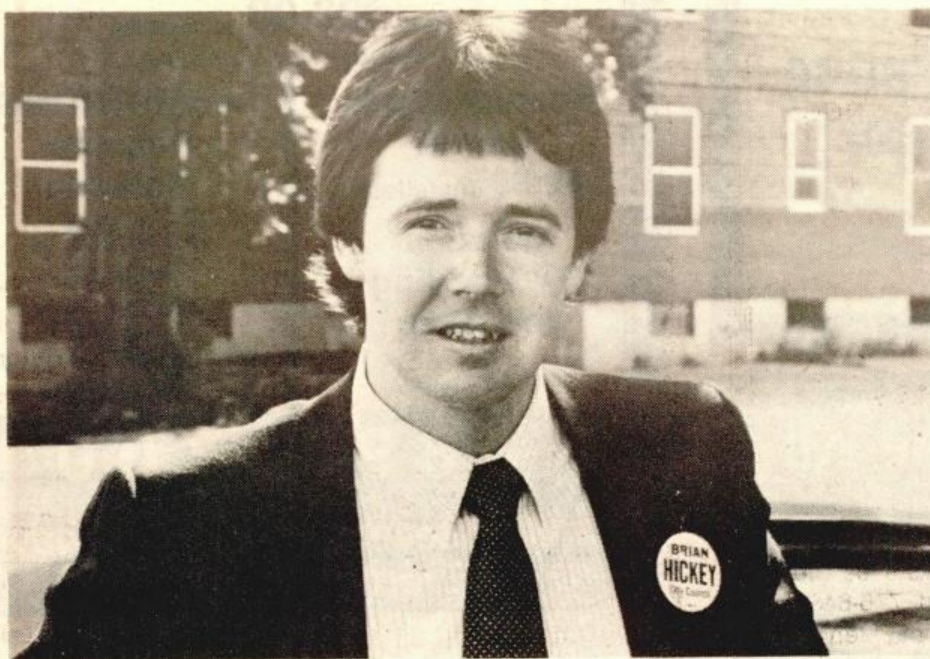

## Women Succeed In Computer Technology Course

Two young mothers — one from Charlestown and the other from Dorchester — are discovering a new career in computer technology. They're among 23 students who have completed a 7 1/2 month course in computer technology at the Boston Technical Center. Friday evening, September 11 at 7 p.m. the students graduated from the BTC, located at 660 Summer Street.

Cheryl Gordon, a Charlestown mother of two, said the BTC program has been a turning point in her life.

Before enrolling in the computer technology course at the BTC, Cheryl attended a hairdressers' school. "The hairdressing profession didn't do anything for me," she said. "It didn't seem to go anywhere." Cheryl said she had always been interested in mechanical equipment and her

mother encouraged her to enroll in the BTC course. According to Cheryl, her mother pushed her to "just do your best, be the best that you can."

It hasn't been easy. The responsibilities of being a full-time student and mother give Cheryl little free time, but she said her family has been very supportive. One of her sons even meets her at the corner every day after school and carries her books.

At times, Cheryl said she has worried about training and working in a male dominated field. "But," she added, "I'm not afraid to take the step. I think if you have the capability to do something, you should have no problems getting into the field."

Cheryl has maintained a "capable" B+ average in the course, and is confident she'll be able to find a job in her field.

Another BTC graduate, Gloria Riley of Dorchester agreed that ability is the key factor in breaking into the computer technology field.

Gloria has maintained a 3.8 average at BTC despite starting the course two weeks late, working part-time and caring for her young daughter. For Gloria Riley, the number one priority is "to succeed — so we can have the good things."

Like other computer technology students at BTC,

Gloria and Cheryl study electrical and electronic theory, math and digital concepts during the 960 course hours. Half of the work is spent in the lab with computers and electric circuits. Both women praised the course instructors, who are provided by the Franklin Institute in Boston.

"The course is difficult," said Gloria, "but the way I look at it, you can make a lifetime career out of what you learn here. I have too much drive," she continued, "to sit around and do

nothing. This course is the best thing that has ever happened to me."

Since its inception in 1977, the Boston Technical Center has trained more than 200 men and women. Over 90 percent have been placed, many at some of the top industrial firms in New England — firms like Westinghouse, IBM, Honeywell, Bethlehem Steel, General Electric, Teradyne, Wang, General Ship, LFE Corporation, and P.X. Engineering. The Boston Technical Center was established by the Economic Development and Industrial Corporation of Boston (EDIC/Boston) for the purpose of providing skilled local labor for Boston industries. The Center also offers counseling and job development services to assist students in the difficult process of finding a satisfying career.

## McNamara Sues Mayor And City Officials

Former Boston Police Commissioner and City Council Candidate Edmund L. McNamara has filed a complaint in United States District Court in Boston seeking to have his former title of Boston Police Commissioner placed next to his name on the ballot in the upcoming Boston City Council Election. McNamara has charged that the Mayor and City officials are violating his right to recognition of his ten years of public service as Police Commissioner. The former Commissioner is seeking equal treatment under the law that is currently enjoyed by elected officials.

The complaint alleges that the current City of Boston code violates his Fourteenth Amendment right to equal protection and his First Amendment right to Freedom of Speech.

McNamara stated, "During my ten year term as Boston Police Commissioner the City made real progress in the area of providing security to the average citizen. I want the people to have the right to know that I was the Police Commissioner who worked so hard to improve public safety. With the advent of District Representation it will become more important than ever that candidates for City election be able to represent themselves on the ballot in a suitable manner."

### Misconceptions About Marijuana Use Still Prevalent

After more than two decades of substantial marijuana use in this country, few people seem to know that an individual smoking even one marijuana cigarette a week is never free of the drug, according to William J. McCue, executive director of The Third Nail, Inc., a drug-free Boston-based drug abuse treatment, education and prevention program.

In the wake of stories about

boatloads of marijuana drifting in the Atlantic off the Bay State, McCue notes his concern about the easy availability of marijuana that is far more potent than the substance that was coming onto the streets a few years ago.

"The public shouldn't be lulled into complacency by reports that marijuana use in the high schools is leveling off, and actually decreased in 1980 over the

previous year," says McCue, citing a University of Michigan survey of high school seniors throughout the U.S. "The same survey shows that while daily use of alcohol by high school seniors remained fairly constant at 6% of the students, daily marijuana use moved from 6% of seniors in 1975 to 9.1% in 1980 ... telling us that marijuana has rapidly become even more popular than alcohol among adolescents.

McCue says that although all the research about marijuana's effects on mind and body is not in yet, it is now known that cannabinoids are not "washed out" of the body shortly after consumption the way alcohol is, that they tend to stay in the fatty tissues for a week or more, and accumulate with repeated exposure.

"Kids who smoke one or two joints a week think they're light smokers," says McCue, "and they don't realize that they're never off the stuff. When they wonder why their outlook seems dull and life seems uninteresting, their marijuana habit is probably the answer."

According to McCue, there is mounting evidence that chronic marijuana use can lead to learning and memory impairment as well as possible changes in the cellular structure of the brain. Other adverse effects include impairment of lung function, aggravation of heart conditions, effects on glands and reproductive system, higher risk of fatal highway accidents, and interference with psychological functioning and personality development, especially in childhood and adolescence.

"In general, marijuana-smoking teenagers have lower academic achievement," says McCue, "get involved in more deviant behavior, and have more difficulties in their homes lives."

Teenagers who stay off drugs have the edge in our competitive society. He asserts, and indicates the need for a massive education effort aimed at adolescents and their parents.

# Groundbreaking Ceremony Sunday For New Holy Cross Chapel Mausoleum

The Archdiocese of Boston will hold groundbreaking ceremonies for the first phase of its new Holy Cross Chapel Mausoleum on Sunday, September 20, 1981 at 9:30 a.m. in Holy Cross Cemetery,

Malden. His Eminence Humberto Cardinal Medeiros, Archbishop of Boston, will preside. The public is invited to attend.

The new Holy Cross Chapel

Mausoleum will be the first major mausoleum complex built in a Boston Archdiocesan Cemetery. The building is designed for further expansion to slightly more than 22,000 crypt spaces.

The Archdiocese of Boston chose Acme Marble & Granite Co., Inc., of New Orleans to undertake the staged development of the chapel mausoleum.

The firm is the nation's largest developer of mausoleums and cemeteries and has a solid reputation as management consultants, designers and builders for the cemetery industry.

In addition to the indoor chapel and mausoleum crypts planned for the facility at Holy Cross Cemetery, Acme will construct modern office space within the complex to house the Archdiocesan Office of Cemeteries.

The traditional, two-story mausoleum will be constructed of poured-in-place steel-reinforced concrete. Exterior veneers will be brick and polished granite. The interior will feature polished marble,

wood paneling and carpeting.

The Archdiocese's pre-need program will offer Catholic families the option of choosing from a wide variety of burial locations within the mausoleum. For instance, there will be single and companion crypts offered within the chapel, interior corridors and along the exterior balconies and patios in varying price ranges.

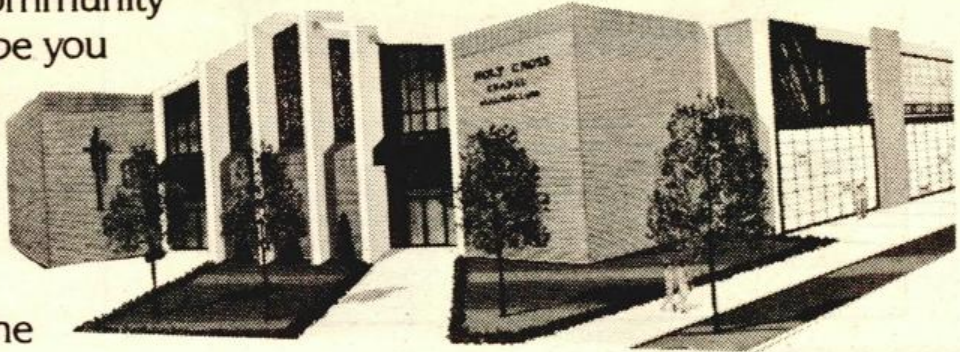

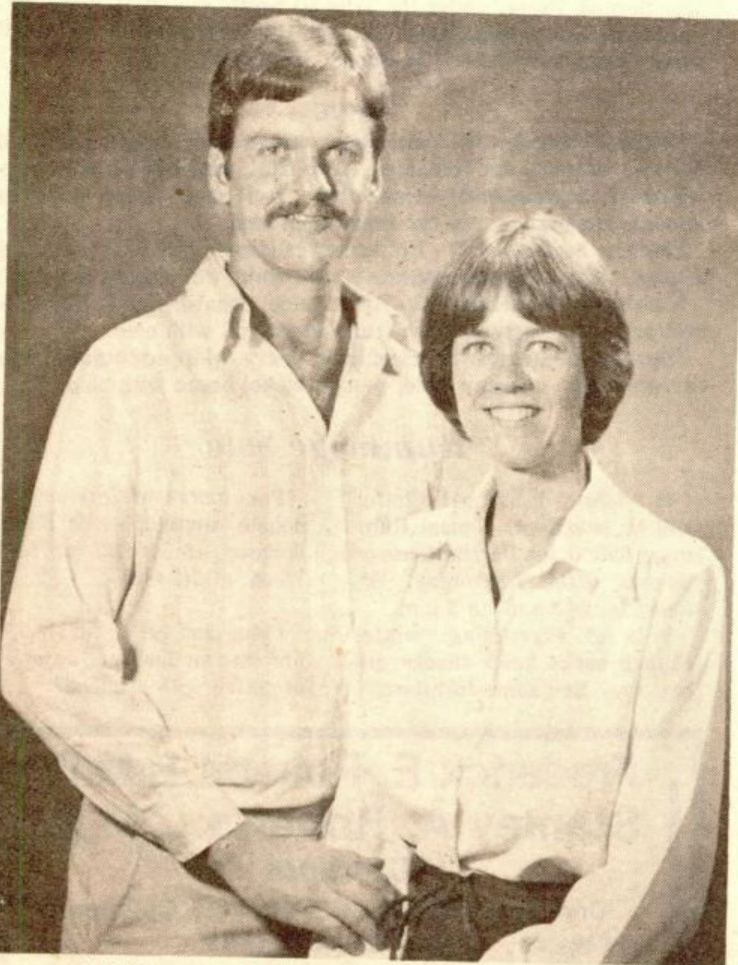

Following numerous complaints from Charlestown parents and students from Mount Saint Joseph Academy, Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn has received assurances from the M.B.T.A. that direct bus service from Haymarket will continue in operation. According to a letter received by Flynn from the MBTA's Chief Spokesman Paul DiNatale the lack of bus service at Haymarket

on Monday, September 14 was due to the breakdown of the regularly scheduled bus.

Flynn explained that the problem of bus service to Boston Latin Academy has still not been resolved. The MBTA claimed that they were not notified by the School Department of the change in location from Codman Square to Ipswich Street prior to the setting of the fall bus schedules. Flynn has urged the MBTA to

reinstitute the service for Boston Latin Academy students. "The disruption of bus service for Latin Academy students is creating a great deal of hardship. Students must leave their homes at unreasonably early hours, make several MBTA changes and pay increased fares on top of it all," he stated.
