opportunity to speak directly to the School Committee and other school officials on the school.

It has been rumored that the Edwards has been slated for closure and parents have related that they will ask the School Committee members for a yes or no answer on this issue.

Parents of students at the Edwards are asking residents to join them at this meeting in support of the school, the only Middle School in the area.



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them to strain against their ribbon tethers, only to bounce back down again as the wind subsided. Large bows decorated handrails of St. Catherine of Siena Church in Hayes Square, inviting all to enter. ★ Ryan Park Field House . . . Attendees at the Charlestown Little League Jamboree on Sunday were met with the stench of sewage eminating from the field house at the Ryan Park.

This week, James "Stretch" Walsh, regional administrator for the Boston Parks and Recreation Department, sent the department's chief engineer, Stanley Ivan, out to the site with a contractor and a plumber to evaluate the problem in order to determine whether the repairs can be done "in house." If not, he said, the repairs would have to be put out to bid. Walsh said the problems apparently stem from a cracked water meter and cracked pipes.

Walsh stated that if the problem cannot be corrected in a short period of time, he will see that portable toilets are installed at the field. He said that the field house will be cleaned and ready for the concession stand. Walsh added that new construction of the field house will begin at the conclusion of the Little League season.

★ Medford Street Fire . . . A fire at a 514 Medford St. home on April 24 resulted in an estimated \$75,000 in damage to the property. According to Lt. Richard Powers, spokesperson for the Boston Fire Department, Charlestown's Engines 50 and 32 and Ladder 9 were joined by Engine 8 and Ladder 1 from the North End, Ladder 2 from Cambridge along with the Rescue and Tower Companies in fighting the one-alarm fire. The alarm came in at 3:38 p.m. and the all-out was sounded at 4:27 p.m.

The Boston Police report notes that a 69-year-old resident of the dwelling suffered burns to his hands and face and was transported to Mass. General Hospital for treatment.

Powers stated that the cause of the fire is listed as "undetermined" and is under investigation.

★ Gas Pressure Lost In Charlestown . . . Shortly after 9 a.m. on April 27, a gas regulator malfunctioned at Arlington and Beacham streets in the Sullivan Square area of Charlestown. According to Frank Arricale, spokesperson for Boston Gas, the malfunction resulted in a momentary increase in pressure, followed by a pressure loss. Several persons who had their stoves on at that time reported a flare up and others related that they found the pilot lights out in their gas appliances.

According to Arricale, the only possible danger was in the initial flare up of the pilot, adding that as soon as the pressure decreased, the danger passed leaving the problem of inconvenience especially on an unusally cold day. He said that the company had corrected the problem and was looking into the cause.

Arricale stated that persons finding their gas off should call Boston Gas to relight their pilot and the company stationed crews on standby in City Square on Tuesday afternoon to respond immediately to calls from residents returning home from work and finding their gas off. He related that approximately 70 calls from residents had been received by mid-afternoon and calls came in during the evening to which the company responded to relight the pilots.


If anyone believes that damage to his or her appliances resulted from the malfunction, Arricale advises them to contact the legal department at Boston Gas.

★ State Fails To Act On Billboard Permit . . . The state Outdoor Advertising Board (OAB) met on April 22 to act on a petition by Rite Media Inc. to erect a two-sided billboard on top of 50 Brighton St. John Devereau of the city of Boston Legal Department represented the city at the hearing. The hearing officer recommended denial of the petition due to its proximity to the park on Caldwell Street, but despite a lengthy hearing, the state board did not make a decision.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, stated: "The state board did not make a decision — they are not listening to the city. Even though city representatives have presented overwhelming evidence of the proposed park on Caldwell Street, with the groundbreaking scheduled for next week, the state has decided to ignore the city and residents of Charlestown. They have ignored the Boston Zoning Code as well," she added.

Ken Stone, chairman of the Neighborhood Council Billboard Committee, stated: "It was good that the hearing officer for the OAB ruled in favor of the community in recommending denial of the application by Rite Media. Because of its proximity to the park, that billboard is inappropriate and illegal." He added: "I am disappointed in Rite Media wanting to pursue the matter further. That doesn't say much for a relationship between a community and a billboard company."

Hundreds Join In Candlelight Vigil In Memory Of Charlestown Victims Of Murder



(continued from page one) in 1991, and Pam Enos, whose son Adam was killed in 1991, served as cochairpersons of the Vigil.

As persons of the Vigil.

As persons climbed the stairs into the church, they were greeted and presented with a scroll containing a copy of the poem, "Hi, Mom" by Maureen Mc-Callum, encircling a green carnation. On a bench in front of the altar and on the railings rested the photographs of the young people who have lost their lives to violence in Charlestown.

Music and scripture readings, poems and prayers carried the several hundred people in the church through personal thoughts and memories.

Enos told how the organization helps people who feel so alone after the violent death of a loved one, and she welcomed the gathering.

King spoke that there should be justice and said that persons have no idea what families of murdered children go through. She invited anyone whose family member was a victim of violence to add their name to CH.A.M.P.'s memorial list.

Everyone was asked to join in singing "Heal The World." The choir, with Judy Burton, Debbie Rogers, Alice Verrill and Maureen McCallum, accompanied by organist Anne Marie McGourty, sang "Be Not Afraid." Throughout the service, several solos were rendered by Rogers, and her daughter Kendra sang a solo, "The Girl I Meant To Be."

Father Ron Coyne, pastor of St. Catherine's Parish, stated that he was happy to have been in Charlestown almost three years and is proud that St. Catherine's is home to CH.A.M.P. He asked that the people whose lives were taken by violence to be remembered and that a commitment be made to preserve and protect life and to seek justice.

Father William McConnell of St. Francis de Sales read from the book of Genesis, and Jennifer Johnson delivered Psalm 23.

Tears flowed as Joe Glynn sang "My Son," accompanying himself on the guitar. McCallum recited her poem "Hi, Mom," and Marilyn Abromofsky, aunt of the slain Kenny Claudio,

read the poem "Wake Up, Charlestown," dedicating it to all the mothers.

Jim Walsh spoke, representing Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy. Walsh said that the Congressman has gotten to know the members of CH.A.M.P. over the past two years, and they have gotten to know him. Walsh stated that he is trying to raise a family here in Charlestown in peace and stability and, most importantly, in security. He added that if there is a problem in the community it is part of his problem.

Walsh went on to say that when violence hasn't affected people personally, they tend to throw up a wall saying that it is not their problem. He added that it is their problem and all should strive for security in the community by joining hands and working together.

A letter from Kennedy was read by Walsh which referred to his own personal experience with violence when his father was assasinated. Kennedy pledged his continuing support and his gratitude to CH.A.M.P.

As the service drew to a close, Father Coyne delivered a blessing and Trudi Brennan and Courtney Maher approached the altar to light candles carried by each person at the Vigil from the Easter candle as the participants filed to the front of the church.

The gathering, which included Boston Police Commissioner Francis "Mickey" Roache and a delegation from the Boston Police Homicide Unit including its

commanding officer Capt. Edward McNelley, proceeded to the church steps with their candle in hand and stood in silence as the list of residents of Charlestown who were victims of murder were read by Brennan, Kristin Johnson and Jennifer Johnson. As each name was spoken, Matthew King tolled a handbell in his or her memory and white and green balloons bearing the name of each victim were released into the afternoon sky.

Yes, there were many tears shed on Sunday, but it was a time for caring — caring about the true victims of murder, those who are left behind.

Charlestown Produces Spirit And Honor

We, the Chicago Four, were vindicated this past January, but there is far more.

According to Chicago FBI insiders, ever since some of its agents were subverted by the British government, the agents have been doing Britain's dirty work here in America, paid for by U.S. taxpayers.

We, the Chicago Four have paid some \$75,000 in legal fees to escape the trap set for us by FBI government criminals doing Britain's dirty work, but we are grateful we are alive and free. All four of us would have been sentenced many months ago to long terms were it not for people of integrity and courage living in and around greater Charles-

The Friends of Irish Freedom of greater Charlestown were our salvation. They gave key help to Attorney Peter McCabe when he visited Boston. Our successful legal strategy was partly that which John Hurley had urged for months. John left a hospital bed in November 1991, soon after the Chicago FBI raids, and along with Al Madden came to Chicago to help us. Again, on Jan. 4, 1993, for our scheduled trial, greater Charlestown men were here in Chicago ready to testify in our defense. John Hurley, Joe Kelly, Al Madden and George Collier came, ready to testify, at no expense to us, and former Senator Francis D. Doris also was on stand-by, ready to fly to Chicago to give testimony for us. Joe Kelly postponed a major hip operation to testify. The trial was postponed on that date when the federal prosecuter saw the men from Charlestown. Three weeks later the federal government dropped the case. For us, Charlestown is henceforth holy ground; a place that produces spirit and

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BRA Awarded \$1 Million Grant For New Gate 6 At Navy Yard

Secretary Ron Brown of the U.S. Department of Commerce, through its Economic Development Administration, awarded a \$1 million grant to the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) to construct a new Gate 6 and entrance roadway to the Charlestown Navy Yard.

BRA Director Paul Barrett said, "This grant will enable the BRA to carry out infrastructure improvements necessary for the next phase of the Navy Yard redevelopment project, which includes a major biomedical research center, and prepare for the possible relocation of the Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital, which will keep 1,200 existing jobs in Boston. This investment in new infrastructure clears the path for a \$450 million investment that will create more than 2,500 construction jobs and 2,200 new permanent jobs.

"In the past decade, more than \$500 million in private investment has taken place at the Navy Yard. The more than 3,000 jobs created there, as well as the new housing and open space, make this one of the most successful military base conversions in the country."

Barrett further stated, "This type of public investment by the Clinton Administration is an example of

the new leadership which President Clinton is exerting with his economic stimulus package. The Clinton Administration is setting the stage for new job growth and economic opportunity for residents of Boston and other cities across the country. This will fuel investment which puts people back to work in permanent jobs, not 'make work' jobs. These jobs are tied to new economies and new growth sectors."

The construction of Gate 6 will cost approximately \$2.3 million, with the remaining funds for the project to be provided through the city capital budget. Capital funds in the amount of \$600,000 will also be used to extend 16th Street and First Avenue, thereby providing access to the new development parcels.

The construction of the new gateway and streets, in addition to providing direct access to the remaining undeveloped parcels in the Yard, will allow major development to proceed without creating additional traffic impacts on the residen-

tial areas of the Navy Yard.
Since its acquisition by
the BRA in 1978, the Navy
Yard has become one of the
largest historic preservation/waterfront revitalization projects in the country.
Nineteen historic buildings
have been redeveloped and
more than 22 acres of open
space created.

The BRA has completed the permitting process for the development of the balance of the Yard, giving this site a competitive advantage over numerous sites outside of Boston. This new development will enhance the critical mass of research and biotechnology space already located there. Mass. General Hospital, for instance, with its more than 600,000 square feet of space, is the site of the recent discovery of the genes related to both Lou Gehrig's Disease and Huntington's Disease. Three biotechnology companies - Bio-Transplant, Diacrin and Ergoe, are already located in the Yard, with two of these companies planning for the expansion of their opera-



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
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
