During the reconstruction work on Main and Warren Streets, many residents have voiced their concerns about the changes taking place along that heavily travelled route.

Among these complaints was the width of the new sidewalks on Warren Street between Monument Avenue and Pleasant Street where sidewalks have been narrowed to widen the new roadway. Pedestrians have found it difficult to maneuver around the street lamps and implanted tree openings. Handicapped people and mothers pushing baby carriages have found it impossible to use these new sidewalks.

Engineers from Edwards and Kelcey, the engineering firm that designed the new roadway, representatives from the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA), the Massachusetts Department of Public Works and a representative from the City's Handicapped Office met to review the design and work

out solutions to make the sidewalks more accessible. Measurements were taken at lamp posts and tree plantings to determine if adequate space was being provided for wheelchair access.

(continued from page one) 5,680 Travaglini 3,115 DiLibero 1,629 Picarello In the Mayoral race, in-

cumbent Mayor Raymond L. Flynn captured 63 per cent of the vote in Charlestown compared to an average vote of 70.6 per cent citywide. Challenger, City Councillor Joseph Tierney. tallied a 36 per cent vote in this community, some eight percentage points above his citywide average.

In the At-Large race for Boston City Council, incumbent Albert L. "Dapper" O'Neil topped the At-Large slate in this community where he totalled a whopping 67 per cent of the votes cast for that office.

Second in the standings was former City Councillor Fred Langone with 35 per cent, followed by incumbents Michael McCormack at 34 per cent and Christopher Iannella with 32 per cent. They were followed by Joseph Casper at 23 per cent, Rosaria Salerno at 20 per cent, Michael Kane at 19 per cent and Stephen

Murphy at 17 per cent. These eight candidates will be battling for one of the four at-large seats come November 3rd.

Finishing with 26 per cent of the Charlestown vote but out of the money citywide was School Committee Member Kevin Mc-Cluskey.



Upcoming Neighborhood Council Elections Focus Of Monthly Council Meeting

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council held its monthly general meeting on September 16 at which time the members established the guidelines for the Council elections that could add a maximum of seven more seats to the Council, one representing each of the seven precincts in Charlestown. Additionally, the various committee chairpersons submitted reports on their respective committee meetings held within the last month.

After much discussion, the Council decided that the Council election will be held on October 24 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. with all seven precincts voting at one site, as yet to be determined. The polling site will be announced at a later date.

Nomination papers may be obtained in person from September 25 to October 2 at the office of Council Chairman John Tobin at One Church Court. The papers must be returned to the same address by October 16.

least 18 years old and obtain a minimum of 25 signatures on their nomination papers from residents within their own precinct who are also at least 18. Verifying the residence of the signers rests with the nominees. Voters, who are at least 18 years of age, must show proof of residence at the polling booth on October 24. There will be no proxy or absentee ballots in this election.

An Election Committee. chaired by Stephen Spinetto and consisting of nonrunning council members, will choose the polling site and oversee the election.

Present Council members are not obligated to run in this election as their Mayoral appointments do not expire until 1988. Nineteen members now sit on the Council, as member Donna O'Brien's resignation was brought to the Council at this meeting. Therefore, the total number of the Council could reach a maximum of 26 members after the October elections. Next year that number may change as separate elections will occur for at-large seats and for representatives


from community organizations.

Tom Cunha, chairperson of the Housing and Development Committee, presented his report by reviewing the process of meeting developers two at a time to examine the four proposals for Parcel P-2A, located at the intersection of Main and Bunker Hill Streets.

The negotiations for the parcel ask that developers donate 25 per cent of the profit from their development to a community based organization. Cunha said that the committee expressed some concern that a good proposal could be matched with a poor choice for a contribution or visa versa. He said that a committee decision on a proposal may be clouded by the organization chosen for the contribution.

Cunha said one developer agreed to the request concerning the 25 per cent profit, one developer noted he already made commitments to people, and the other two parties have not been presented with the request.

Council member Peter McClure voiced some concern with the committee's decision to re-direct the 25 per cent profit from the community back into the developments. He said that this could hinder organizations in need of those funds. However, Cunha said that the committee is only making a request of the developers and not a demand. Council Chairman John Tobin added that the Council


will make a final decision on the matter at a latter time after the committee has submitted its final recommendation.

In addition to the committee meeting further on P-2A, they will also review five proposals submitted for the building at Lawnwood Place and Main Street known as the "yellow brick building" and three proposals for the structure at Walker and High Streets.

The Human Services Committee report was given by Chairman Moe Gillen. He said that Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) received \$200,000 from the state to study health conditions in Charlestown because of the high rate of cancer, stroke and heart disease in the town. While health officials seem to believe lifestyles and habits are the chief causes of health problems, Gillen said the environment should also be investigated. He requested that Judy Evers of Neighborhood Services write a letter to Doctor Roger Sweet of MGH to express the community's concerns regarding environmental problems that may contribute to health issues. Gillen especially focussed upon the proposed coal burning plant near Sullivan Square.

On another matter, Gillen said his committee has not yet addressed the changes that the National Park Service is requesting regarding the Freedom Trail. This issue will be examined at the meeting of the committee on Wednesday, September 30 at 7:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church, 5 Monument Square.

Chairperson Dennis Mc-Laughlin submitted the report for the Planning and Zoning Committee that is working to establish an Interim Planning Overlay District (IPOD) for Charlestown. An IPOD provides temporary zoning regulations for an area where the Zoning Commission has determined that current zoning may be inappropriate. He reported that the formal community panel to assist the committee in de-



In other business, Council member Tom White requested that the Council send a letter to Fire Department officials to complain about inadequate coverage in Charlestown. Recalling a Public Safety meeting in the Parkman House last May, White reported that District Chief Cook said that Charlestown is well protected, but he would increase the number of firefighters. White, who is a firefighter, said the increase has not yet occured.

Council member Ken Stone said that with the growing size of the Navy Yard, Charlestown is not adequately covered. White added that extra men are needed as firemen also deal with health emergencies, not just fires. While White noted that surrounding communities are available for assistance, Council member and retired firefighter Marty O'Brien said with all the construction and traffic, the help could never get through in time of need

McClure suggested that the letter include a request that a fire representative address the concerns of the community and Tobin added that if a public meeting should occur, O'Brien and White should co-chair it.

Donna Lane-Hickey, community liaison for Massport, up-dated the Council on the status of discusion between the staff of Massport and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) concerning the use of Piers 48, 49 and 50 as an equipment transfer site for the construction of a waste treatment facility on Deer Island. She said that negotiations continue with no date yet established for a final agreement. The Council decided unanimously to send a letter to MWRA Director Paul Levy requesting that a community representative be present at all future meetings.

When the meeting opened for public input, resident Eric Anderson requested assistance from the Council regarding parking permits for the residents of the Harvard Mall area. He said that after following proper procedures with the City, the residents have hit a road block. The residents will soon meet with the Basic Services Committee for further assistance.

Anderson also informed the Council of his plans to build a two-unit development on a parcel of land that he has owned for ten years, but that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) told him to go through the community before the Authority can act on the request. The Council told Anderson it is policy that they do not deal with developments under four units, but a letter will go to the BRA to clarify the situation so Anderson may proceed with his plans.

Cunha presented the Council with copies of a contract that the BRA will examine, as they are the only city agency that has not signed a contract with the Council yet, according to Cunha. The contract asks for a quick response from the BRA to recommendations from the Council and that a representative of the Authority meet with the Council when needed. Cunha added that the BRA has already reviewed the contract and had no initial reaction.

And finally, a resident requested that the Council investigate the reason that the middle lanes on the North Washington Street Bridge are closed, as they are supposed to be open for use. Although the Council took no action upon this request, Judy Evers of Neighborhood Services will look into the matter.

Ground Breaking Ceremonies Mark Start Of CEDC Housing Development

Rain did not dampen the spirits of the approximately 75 people that gathered on Saturday, September 19 at the ground breaking ceremonies of the Townhouse Development being built by the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation (CEDC) at the corner of Main and Baldwin Streets.

Residents and officials spoke publicly and among themselves of the promise this housing brings to the community because of its affordability and its being constructed by a neighborhood organization.

As Stephen Coyle, director of the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) addressed the crowd under the rain protective tent, he called the situation a "man bites dog story" because of the unusual occurrence that a neighborhood group will construct the Townhouse Development.

Coyle added that this action begins a partnership between the City, the BRA and the CEDC that will extend into the Charlestown Navy Yard. In particular he noted Building 104 in the Navy Yard that will be a rehabilitation effort involving The Raymond Group and CEDC. Coyle also criticized the federal government for not lending much asistance in the area of housing as it "abandoned its commitment." He noted a nationwide ten percent decrease in housing, while a ten percent increase has occured in Massachusetts.

Coyle commended the CEDC for reaching this stage in development, cut-

ting over two months from the average time it takes to put such a package together.

In State Representative Richard Voke's remarks to the gathering, he also noted the lack of support for housing from the federal government. Voke stated that next to traffic, housing is Massachusetts' biggest problem. He added that the House Ways and Means Committee, of which he is the Chairman, received a \$280,000,000 package for the repair of federal housing which was not being worked upon by the federal government. According to Voke, so much work was needed, the package was increased to \$414,000,000 before it left the Committee.

proliferation of condominiums that threaten their homes and about their need for a place for their children to play," he said. The result, he added, is the townhouses that will be built over the next ten months in the now vacant lot known as Parcel C-2A.



houses will be two-family dwellings. A total of 55 parking spaces will be provided behind the structure






Receive Awards At Don Bosco

Benjamin E. Quinn of 74 Medford Street received the awards of the Freshmen class in Drawing and Computer Literacy.






Secretary Of Defense Weinberger At Charlestown Navy Yard In Celebration Of The Bicentennial Of The Constitution

"Two American Originals - a celebration" was the theme of a ceremony paying homage to the 200th anniversary of the United States Constitution held on Friday evening, September 18th in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Sponsored by the New England Region of the Navy League, the event, originally planned for Pier One adjacent to USS Constitution, was moved into Building 149 as torrential rains inundated the area.

Red, white and blue bunting adorned the levels of the building and a 15-star American flag hung over the podium on the second floor of the structure. Patriotic music was provided by the United States Navy Band with vocal selections by the Navy Sea Chanters. The crew of the USS Constitution acted as honor guard.

In his welcoming remarks, Commander David M. Cashman, USN, Commanding Officer of USS Constitution, compared the two Constitutions - the document and the ship named in its honor. He noted that both the document and the ship, which will be 190 years old next month, were contemporaries they both have been challenged and they are both pillars of this country. Following his remarks, Yeoman First Class Earnest L. Hall, USN recited the Preamble to the Constitution.



Charles F. Adams, president of the USS Constitution Museum Foundation introduced the Honorable Caspar W. Weinberger, Secretary of Defense, to deliver the Keynote Address.

Weinberger focused on why the Constitution is worth celebrating. He pointed out that although we celebrate the genius and insight of the men who gathered in Philadelphia 200 years ago to frame this document, they were not demi-gods and did make errors in judgment, as the presence of slavery and the eventual Civil War over this issue would attest.

He called these men "well-educated, vastly experienced, and deeply reflective - perhaps the most intense concentration of Statesmen in this, or any other nation's history."

Weinberger noted that like the Revolution's Bicentennial II years ago, the Constitution's should be one of joy. But he added that there should be a greater degree of solemnity and even caution. As the Revolution generated the possibility of a free nation, the Constitution transformed that possibility into a reality - and that transformation is still proceeding.

In order to explain the magnitude of the framers' accomplishment, the Secretary brought the audience back to the year 1787. He pointed out the incompetence and weakness of this nation, with no strong executive and "more noise than leadership from Congress." The economy was stagnating, commerce dwindling and states bickering.

The only solution, according to the Secretary, was a strong and stable national government. At that time, there had never been a nation as huge as America

that still remained a republic; there had never been a strong and stable government without a Dictator. King or Emporer at its head; nor had there been an example of popular government that had lasted more than a generation.

The challenge facing the framers in Philadelphia, stated Weinberger, was enormous, unprecedented and practically insurmountable - but they did it and the Constitution of 1787 was a "magnificent achievement.'

Weinberger went on to say that the second reason

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to celebrate is the fact that the Constitution has governed effectively for 200 years. As to the endurance of

the Constitution, Weinberger stated that the framers developed a complex system of checks and balances, appealing to the passions that "move men and nations" so that the institutions they constructed would "use the ambition of one politician to check the ambition of another."

He also pointed out that the basic human values that must be served in creating a large republic were "se-

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curity, freedom and republicanism." He stressed that the urgent problem at that time was to "fashion a government that could achieve these and the aims of security and safety." Weinberger went on to say that "no people will come to revere and respect and remain attached to a form of government which they believe cannot protect them - no matter how 'free' they are.

Weinberger cautioned as to the dangers of "institutional imbalance (between all branches of government) and popular indifference to liberty" that may undermine the Constitution.

Weinberger noted that "a free Constitution lives in the minds of citizens who love their freedom and the self-government that secures that freedom. With-

out the belief in the minds of the people that self government matters, such a Constitution will not long endure. With this belief, such a Constitution is unshakable."

In concluding, Weinberger stated, "When I contemplate the unborn generations over the horizon and the fate that may lie in store for them . . . Let us hope that they, too, will have cause to celebrate this free Constitution. Then will our descendants rise to call us - and themselves - blessed."

Following closing remarks by William C. Kelley, Jr., National Vice President of the Navy League of the United States, the gathering stood and joined in singing "God Bless America."


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Allston/Brighton Representative Provides Input Into Planning And Zoning

An Allston/Brighton resident already experienced in neighborhood re-zoning met with the Planning and Zoning Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council to lend advice that may save the Charlestown community from committing time-consuming errors in its endeavor to re-zone Charlestown.

Co-chairperson of his community's Planning and Zoning Advisory Committee (PZAC). Ray Mellone, addressed the gathering on September 17 on invitation of the Charlestown Committee. He reflected on mistakes made in his own community as they worked to establish an Interim Planning Overlay District (IPOD) and supplied some assistance as to the direction the Committee and community panel should take.

Mellone said that the Committee should set goals for itself and work in the areas that it knows best first. He added that the Committee probably knows more negative issues than positive ones: for example, parking problems or zoning that the community wouldn't want - such as an "autobody shop next to a church." Mellone also cautioned the group not "to look at Charlestown as though you have to zone every piece of wood."

Mellone outlined the processes used at different levels of the zoning procedure that involve the Board of Appeals, the BRA and the Zoning Commission. Problem areas that Allston/ Brighton encountered included demolition and the legality of moratoriums on building permits. He said that someone can demolish a building, but the question remains as to what should fill the open space. He added that after seeking the legal opinion of the BRA, the authority confirmed that a moratorium on building permits is illegal.

Committee member Steve McHugh noted that Mellone spoke of two processes: developing a zoning amendment with general restrictions and examining the community and then deciding what categories should be in a certain area.

as grey areas do exist. He offered two pieces of advice: areas that are already homogenous - leave alone and don't let anyone else decide how things should be completed as that decision rests with the community.

Committee Chairperson Dennis McLaughlin outlined Charlestown's problems for Mellone. McLaughlin said half the town consists of newcomers and the community does not know how to get space for housing to keep their children in the neighborhood in the future. The only available land, noted McLaughlin, lies in the Navy Yard, which is totally designated to developers. As families cannot find places to live, he added, the only way to get affordable housing is to attach it to development projects in the Yard.

Mellone suggested that Charlestown not "sell itself short." He again pointed to establishing what the community wants through goal setting - getting those items may be a different matter. Mellone suggested that the Committee and panel turn to the BRA for assistance as the BRA has expertise in this zoning area, may contribute original ideas and explain technical jargon.

When Mellone completed his presentation, mainly because the established meeting time limit of 8:30 p.m. halted him, the Committee and panel thanked him with warm applause and repeatedly voiced their appreciation.

Earlier in the evening the committee had less pressing matters to attend to as the open public section of the meeting passed without questions.

McLaughlin finalized the membership of the Committee and the panel. Representatives of the BRA, The Raymond Group and agencies such as Massport are not members of the panel, but serve as resour-

ces for information. Two Committee members not in regular attendance, Moe Gillen and Ronan FitzPatrick were removed by Mc-Laughlin with the consent of the Committee in accordance with the attendance policy. He said that while no set attendance guidelines exist, the Committee must address obvious absences accordingly.


Dave Armametti of the BRA said that the information the Committee and panel requested at the last meeting regarding variances, parking and traffic will be obtained soon.

Some discussion occured and concern was voiced among Committee members when McLaughlin suggested that the first neighborhood study should be the Navy Yard. Kathryn Downing said that the Committee needs more information regarding traffic and density before starting with the Yard. She added that by examining other. more familiar neighborhoods first, the Committee could better develop itself. At the same time she said she does not want to impede development in the Yard.

A number of members expressed concern that the Yard was being separated from the rest of Charlestown simply because of barriers such as the wall and the bridge

McLaughlin said the town must be examined in sections and physically the Yard is a section on its own. He added that most of the development activity will occur in the Yard. He also warned against spending too much time studying the matter as he "doesn't want a Doctorate" in the subject of the community process.

A realistic goal of mak-





Did You Know . . .

If you weren't eligible for food stamps last year, that doesn't mean you won't be eligible this year. Did you know that the income guidelines for food stamp eligibility change every July 1? That means that if your income was slightly over the guideline last year, it is possible it could be under the standard as of July 1, 1987.

The Food Stamp Program is administered by the United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service. The program is actually run by the Department of Public Welfare, in this state.

Eligibility for the program is based on a few requirements. You must be a U.S. citizen, refugee or legal alien. You must provide Social Security numbers for yourself and all members of your family. If members of your household don't have a Social Security number, the food stamp worker will provide you with the application to apply.

Your household may have up to \$2,000 worth of countable resources and up to \$3,000 if at least one member is age 60 or older. Resources refer to property that you own. Cash, savings and checking accounts, and the cash value of some cars are considered countable resources. Your home, personal belongings, and life insurance policies are not counted as resources.

Almost all types of income are counted under the food stamp program. This means that income from a job, child support payments, unemployment benefits or a pension are counted. Your household gross monthly income must be less than the amounts listed below in order to qualify for the food stamp program. You will be asked to verify the household income with copies of pay stubs, or a letter from an employer, or benefit letters from Social Security, unemployment, etc. . . .

In order to apply, you need to fill out an application form. The form is available at your local Food Stamp office, by mail, or at the Kennedy Center, 27 Winthrop Street. After you turn in the application, a worker will hold an interview with you. It's a good idea to call the local welfare office and schedule an appointment with a food stamp intake worker. If you qualify for the food stamp program you will receive the stamps within 30 days of filing the application. You will be issued a photo I.D. and a card stating the amount of food stamps you can receive. You will receive a new card each month for which you are eligible.

Remember to bring the following items with you when you apply and don't forget to report any changes in household circumstances when they happen:

- Identification showing your name and address
- Proof of income

- Bank book or current bank statement
- Receipts for childcare, or the care of other dependents who cannot care for themselves.
- Receipts for housing costs rent, heating and utilities
- Proof of legal alien status
- Medical bills if you are 60 or over, or disabled



One Thousand School Children Gather At USS Constitution To Celebrate The Bicentennial Of The U.S. Constitution

by Mary Ziniti "Celebrate Citizenship Day" took place on September 16 in the Charlestown Navy Yard when 1,000 Boston elementary school children recited "The Pledge of Allegiance" to honor the United States Constitution on its 200th birthday. President Reagan led the Pledge from Washington, DC and it was beamed by satellite into the Yard and across the nation.

The afternoon began with the children busing or marching into the Yard from their various schools that included Charlestown's own Saint Catherine's, Saint Francis de Sales, and the Harvard Kent. Some students dressed in their parochial school uniforms, some in just everyday clothes and other joined in the spirit of the day by donning red, white and blue garb. As the students arrived, Park Rangers from the National Park Service distributed copies of the Constitution and small flags.

The 1,000 students formed a circle outside the USS Constitution, the namesake of the document they met to honor. Aboard the vessel, before a much smaller gathering, Mayor Raymond L. Flynn presented awards to the six student winners of the "Advocates for Freedom" essay contest sponsored by the New England Telephone Company. Students wrote essays describing how they would use the Constitution to improve the lives of Bostonians, related Rosemarie Sansone, director of the Mayor's Office of Business and Cultural Development.

The Mayor returned outside to address the thousand waiting for the climax of the day. After other platform speakers, the Mayor told the students that Citizenship Day and the Constitution call for treating other people with respect and dignity especially immigrants who came to America "just like our parents or grandparents."

The world's largest flag, one the third of the size of a

football stadium was then unfurled by students of Catholic Memorial High School. Pulled tightly by the 1,000 standing patiently so not to touch the ground, the massive flag nearly swallowed half of Pier One.

"America the Beautiful" and "The National Anthem," sung by Angelo Picardi, added to the electricity of another historical moment in Boston.

Finally, after Reagan's address, with right hands touching thumping hearts, those words were recited: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.'

How appropriate that these few, common lines were used when one considers that these words would not have the legal opportunity for utterence if not for that precious document signed 200 years ago in Philadelphia that today defends our freedom of speech.




The Holden School — An Alternative In Education

ed through the 84 inch outfall (pipe) on Joiner Street when necessary. He said that the 84 inch outfall could not accommodate all the surface drainage from City Square and the tunnels, so an area to hold water is needed. According to Glenn Sadulsky of Howard Needles Tammen and Bergendoff (HNTB), the Joiner Street outfall empties into the Harbor.

Maffei added that this drainage detention vault must also be ventilated to

draw exhaust air out and maintain fresh air within it. A ventilation stack would be built in the northwest corner of New Chelsea Street and New City Square Street, in an area between the tunnels.

Personnel will enter an access shaft, or riser shaft as it is also called, provided in the sidewalk to service the detention vault, Maffei said. The 25 feet by 35 feet riser shaft would extend seven stories underground (continued on page 8)

Plaque Dedication Ceremonies Mark "Nathaniel Gorham Day In Charlestown"

There were no fireworks, no nationally known speakers - in fact, what there was on a recent Sunday was torrential rain. But this inclement weather did not dampen the spirit of the group that gathered in this community to share in honoring the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution by celebrating "Nathaniel Gorham Day in Charlestown.

A plaque honoring Charlestown's native son and signer of the United States Constitution. Nathaniel Gorham, was dedicated at the Phipps Street Burial Ground by the Massachusetts Daughters of the American Revolution (MDAR). This event was followed by ceremonies at the Bunker Hill Museum by the MDAR followed by a program on Gorham and the Charlestown of 1787 presented by the Charlestown Historical Society.

The gathering joined in a tribute to the heroic men and women who have served our country with integrity and devotion, stating, "Let us dedicate ourselves anew to a faithful stewardship of the blessing we have inherited through their support of noble ideals."

Representatives of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and Children of the American Revolution (CAR) joined with the MDAR and members of the Charlestown Historical Society and Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion for the program.

MDAR State Regent Mrs. Eric G. Hook acted as Master of Ceremonies. Taking part were Mrs. William Potter, MDAR State F.

Chaplain, who opened the program with an Invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by MASAR State Historian Eugene Richards. The American's Creed was recited by MDAR State Vice Regent Mrs. James J. Lucas, the SAR Pledge by MASAR State Secretary and Gorham Descendant Cecil M. Daggett, and the CAR Pledge by Jon Urbaczewski, CAR State Vice President.

Greetings were brought by Raymond F. Fleck, MASAR Past State President and Nathaniel Gorham VII, who journeyed from upper New York State for the ceremonies honoring his ancestor.

Among the invited guests was Representative Richard A. Voke who presented a proclamation from the Massachusetts House of Representatives to the Charlestown Historical Society in honor of Nathaniel Gorham, signed by Voke and Speaker of the House George Keverian. He related the fact that Gorham had been a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives and had, in fact, served as Speaker of the House. Voke praised the gathering for their dedication to preserving the memory of Gorham and honoring Charlestown's native son and his contribution to our nation's history.

Also present was Boston City Councillor Albert L. "Dapper" O'Neil who read a citation honoring Gorham from the Boston City Council, which had been offered by Councillor Robert Travaglini. O'Neil was critical of persons who demean this

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
country and those who have served in this nation's wars. He praised those present for their commitment to the history, as well as to the future of America.

Reverend Isaiah Sears, retired pastor of the First Baptist Church, offered a blessing.

James W. Conway, Commander of Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion and past president of the Charlestown Historical Society, who along with Marie Alves co-chaired the Society's program, extended a welcome to the members of the MDAR and their affiliates. He noted that the Bunker Hill Museum, the location of the ceremonies honoring Gorham, was operated by the Society and is the one project developed in the City during celebration of the Bicentennial of the Nation in 1975-76 still in existence.

Conway read a proclamation from Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, naming the day as "Nathaniel Gorham Day In Charlestown." Proclamations were also read from Senator Francis Doris and Governor Michael S. Dukakis in honor of Gorham and the Bicentennial of the Constitution.

Robert Bayard Severy, a member of the Historical Society, then took the gathering on a narrated slide tour of old Charlestown, relating facts on Gorham, correspondence regarding this native son and the Charlestown of 200 years ago. His knowledge of the subject as well as a plethora

City Officials met with neighbors of the Doherty Playground area of Charlestown on September 23 to discuss proposed improvements for the Clougherty Pool, located in the playground area.

Residents said they approved of the plans presented except for a proposed new deck between the kiddy pool and the swimming pool. They argued that it would become a drinking area for youths at night and allow the small children too easy access to the adult pool.

Steve Rusteika, project manager for the Public Facilities Department, said it would be no problem to remove the new deck if residents opposed it.

Rusteika described the entire improvement project that includes rehabilitating the bathhouse and general repairs of the pools. He said that the work would cost approximately \$1 million dollars with funds coming from both the Capital Planning office for the City and George Robert White Fund who owns the pool area. Bids for the general contracts are due the first week in October and construction

is expected to begin anywhere from one and a half to two months after the contractor is chosen, according to Rusteika.

Although construction may not be completed by next summer when the pools would be scheduled to open around June 15, substantial work will be done Rusteika added.

The plans that Rusteika presented with the assistance of architect Peter A. Ringenbach of Perry, Dean, Rogers and Partners, includes work on the bathhouse and the pools.

The first floor entrance to the bathhouse that now faces the basketball court, will change to where the closed turnstyles are currently located. Thus the building will have "one point of control" where all individuals will walk past the same desk both entering and exiting the building.

The first floor of the bathhouse will have the women's locker room, a first aid room and house facilities for the handicapped, elderly and children. Rusteika said that inoperable facilities will be removed and replaced.

The second floor will house the men's locker room, the lifeguard room for both males and females and a staff office. Again, new facilities will be added where needed.

Rusteika said that no plans exist for reopening the concession stand on the top floor of the building. He added that if, however, Community Schools wish to open the area, he said it can be done. Residents suggested boarding up the area if it will not be used so that it would not become a hangout for youths.

General repairs outside the bathhouse will include the replacement of missing and broken light posts and lighting the area.

As for the pool, a new filtering system will be installed that Rusteika said is used in many NCAA pools. The diving pool will again be operable with new diving boards. Special, portable stairs that provide easy access to the pool for the elderly, children and the handicapped will be installed and these may also be removed for storage.

Neighbors also expressed some concern about the installation of a three-meter (approximately ten foot) diving board at the diving pool as youths may hang off it and injuries could occur. At the suggestion of Rusteika, residents agreed to try the high diving board for a trial period as it can be removed when the pool closes each evening. If problems do arise, the City can remove it permanently.

Repairs on the rest of the park area will begin once the repairs on the pool area finish, Rusteika said.



Members Of The Charlestown Teen Connection Honor Parents And Supporters At Awards Dinner

The Charlestown Teen Connection, a group of over 90 local teens, honored their parents, individuals, organizations and businesses who have supported their program since it was formed last December.

At an Appreciation Dinner, held recently at the Knights of Columbus Hall, the teens organized and moderated the speaking program and the entire evening was carried out in a manner that would put many an adult to shame.

The adults in the audience, including parents and guests, expressed pride in the accomplishments of the teens and were touched by the framed certificates of appreciation that were presented.

The headtable consisted of members of the Teen Council and Peer Leaders who direct the activities of the Teen Connection. Each individual had prepared a portion of the program and it was faultless.

Melanie Marsden opened the program, welcoming the guests and calling on Reverend Isaiah Sears, retired pastor of the First Baptist Church, for a blessing. She then invited all to help themselves to the delicious catered buffet.

Following the dinner, Nancy Kane, a tenth grade student at Boston Latin School, explained the Teen Connection. She stated that they are younger representatives of their parents and their community and that they "have an amazing amount of pride for this one square mile called Charlestown." She went on to say that last December the Charlestown Community Schools interviewed for eight Peer Leader positions 90 teens called regarding the job and 60 were interviewed. Kane said that the eight selected were at the head table and that their duties included involving as many teens as possible in their weekly Teen Council meetings.

Kane said that in eight months some 350 teens from every area of the town have been involved in activities. She concluded by stating that "we are the largest and most productive Teen Council in the City . . . and we feel that we

have begun to change the image of Charlestown's youth."

Danny Marsden, a junior at Don Bosco Technical High School, gave a progress report. He stated that the "Charlestown Teen Connection has been successful for many reasons. The main reason is because we do things." He listed such events as Ball Hockey Leagues, a dance, trips to professional sports games, movies, amusement parks, community rowing, bowling, tours and numerous excursions for pizza and Kelly's Roast Beef.

Peer Leader Derek Gallagher pointed out that the Teen Connection is more than "fun and games." He noted that through fundraising efforts such as a bake sale, raffles, a dance, donations and the recent Boston Bruins Benefit Softball Game, the teens have raised a total of \$4,495 in the past eight months.

Michael Erardi, who is also a Peer Leader, spoke on the issues that teenagers must face and the programs that have been presented relative to some of these issues. Erardi stated program subjects have included racial issues; sex, AIDS and contraceptives; alcohol; drugs; teen suicide; jobs; and alternative education. He said that members visited the Deer Island House of Correction on the "Choose Life" Program and that 50 teens met with Boston Police Committioner Roache at the Parkman House to discuss violence in Charlestown.

Kerry Woods, a senior at Christopher Columbus High School, stated that not only do the members raise money and go on trips, but also "have a commitment to our community." She noted their participation in a Citywide Youth Congress, involvement in the "Don't Be Pushed" campaign, the clean-up of three rooms in the Community School for use by the Teen Council as well as the clean-up of two badly overgrown areas that are used by children. Some of their other activities have been in helping to deliver fruit baskets to elderly shutins, participating in a 20mile walk for hunger, and their involvement in several anti-drug use programs.

Teen Council member Kathleen Connolly outlined some of the activities planned for the fall and winter and invited other teens to join them. She stated that the regular Teen Council meetings are held on Monday nights, with Girls' Ball Hockey Games on Tuesdays, Girls' Aerobics Classes on Thursdays and Flag Football League Games on Saturdays. Connolly added that they are planning two dances, a bowling league and many winter trips.

Melanie Marsden, an eighth grade student at Boston Latin School, addressed the parents and family members of the Teen Connection. She stated, "The Charlestown youth have decided that the time has come to appreciate those people who have supported us through good times and bad. A parent must put up with so much - from our birth, through so many growing stages, the punishments, our laundry, dirty rooms, our smart faces, and, of course, our constant





MDPW Updates Community On CANA Reconstruction Project

(continued from page one) from the sidewalk. Two ventilation pipes - in-take and exhaust - would extend up through the sidewalk along with the shaft. The exhaust, according to Maffei, would blow out towards Chelsea Street in the direction of the Harbor. Maffei added that the stack and pipes would be blended in aesthetically with the rest of the area and the other proposed ventilation buildings as this 27 foot tower would be disguised with brick, concrete and copper.

Maffei also said that ventilation would occur 100 percent of the time, but in th event of an accident in the tunnel that may cause smoke or fumes, the high

fans would activate. He also said that for the majority of the time the vault would be dry. After the meeting, Sadul-

sky said that the vault could also be used to store hazardous waste if any should ever leak in the tunnels. This waste would then be pumped out somewhere other than into the Harbor, he added.

Residents attending the meeting inquired about the possibility of a clock eventually being placed atop the proposed tower. Officials said that while no definite plans would be made now. a clock could be allowed for if the community so desires. Officials also said that sufficient sidewalk space would be available around the tower. Additionally, any information plaque needed for pedestrians in the area would be provided at a later time by the City, Maffei said.

Also discussed at this meeting were landscaping plans for the CANA project. Sadulsky said that at a hearing with the Department of Environment and Quality Engineering (DE-QE) in May, the DEQE issued a Chapter 91 permit with seven orders of conditions that if followed, a permit would be granted. One order of condition, he said, was to create a landscaping plan. Deneen Crosby, a landscape architect for Wallace Floyd Associates, after working with officials at the MDC, presented changes that have occurred in the 25 per cent landscaping plans for the areas including Miller's River and the Paul Revere Park.

The changes, she said, included adding the Miller's River area by landscaping on both sides of it, a pedestrian walkway leading from Rutherford Avenue down to the park system, the redesign of Paul Revere Park and an area including the pedestrian bridge over the railroad tracks. These design changes are in an approval process with the MDC.

She presented an outline of pedestrian walkways in the area as well as the redesign of the Paul Revere

Park. Additionally, a new entrance will be established off Rutherford Avenue with new granite pillars. Sadulsky said that the MDC should grant a final approval on October 1, after which 75 per cent and 100 per cent design plans will be submitted.

David Flanagan of the MDPW reviewed the status of the YMCA artifacts that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA), the community and the "Y" want salvaged from the scheduled October 31 demolition of the structure. The various agencies made known their choices for articles they wished saved by submittig letters to the MDC. Flanagan said that the BRA requested the salvaging of the entranceway of the "Y" building to be used in the proposed Shipyard Park area in the Navy Yard. He added that the "Y" would like to have the cornerstones and the two plaques that say "USA" and "USN," which were already requested by the North Area Task Force (NATF) and are covered in the salvaging contract between the MDC and the O'Rourke Construction Company. Ken Stone, a representative from the NATF said that as long as the artifacts are salvaged, the group has no qualms as to where they go. The BRA must negotiate with the O'Rourke Company.

Finally, a construction up-date report was submitted by Arthur Rich, CANA coordinator. He said that they are generally working in two areas, the north section that includes the Chelsea Street area where they are driving in pilings, and behind the YMCA.

Rich said that a large amount of traffic is being directed to Lowney Way to allow work room on Chelsea Street. He added that they work on a day-to-day basis and could not offer a completion date, the utility work should be completed by December, however. The area along Main Street up to Thompson Square that involves work on the sidewalks and the lamp posts should be finished this fall, Rich added.

While the project is three per cent behind schedule, Rich said that work will be done to repave areas worked on in the last few months to avoid pot hole problems during the coming winter.

At the close of the meeting Flanagan advised residents to remain aware of illegal dumping by individuals who will attempt to unload their own debris on that which exists from the CANA work. He suggested that residents make note of license plates so that violators may be dealt with accordingly.

Finally, Dan Kovacevic of NATF requested that coordination be established between the on-going projects in the area to maintain continuity of electric and gas street lighting in the Harvard Square area. Sadulsky said any work done in an area where the City has already installed gas lighting would not be replaced with electric lighting.

Flanagan said that any further questions or concerns of residents should be directed to the MDC Field Office located on Rutherford Avenue by calling 242-5980.

City Seeks Court Action To Resolve Green Street Sewage Leak

Legal action is being taken by the City of Boston to resolve the problems that have occurred regarding the repair of the sewer leak on Green Street, which has been pouring waste out onto the street for almost five months.

Dan McNamara, principal inspector of the Housing Division of Inspectional Services, stated that the problem involves one of the three property owners whose sewer lines were determined by the City to be the possible source of the leak. He said that the owners of 44 High Street and 14 Green Street have signed an agreement to take measures to determine the site of the leak


According to McNamara, the third party, from 46 to connect his sewer line into the common line on High Street. The question has arisen as to whether the party is still responsible for determining the source of the Green Street leak.

McNamara stated that his office and attorneys from the City are preparing to file the civil action. He said that they are seeking 1) that the condition be resolved and 2) that the judge determine whether the third party has a responsibility in the determination of the source of the Green Street leak.

McNamara reported that he had visited the site on Monday and acknowledged the fact that the sewage is seeping from under the temporary plate installed in front of the Library.

He stated that the City is hoping for "quick action" on this problem from the



The Housing and Development Committee of the Neighborhood Council will meet on Monday, October 5 at 7:00 p.m. at the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) offices in Building 34 in the Charlestown Navy Yard to discuss the four proposals submitted for parcel R-96, located at 136-142 High Street.

Developers submitting applications for review by the Committee include Myerson/Allen and Company. Inc., High Street Development Corporation; Stahley Corporation; and Conroy Development Corporation.

Myerson/Allen proposes to build "12 residential units, of which six units would be sold at market rates and six below cost at prices that would qualify for MHFA low interest mortgages. Long-term affordability would be maintained via deed restrictions," they stated in their application. The proposal also includes ar-

ranging a 25 percent equity participation with a "non-profit community development organization," with none specifically named. The average price of an affordable unit would be \$100,000, while a market priced unit would cost \$165,000. Additionally, the average size of an individual unit would be 692 square feet.

Also submitting a proposal is a recently formed group of Charlestown residents and merchants called the High Street Development Corporation. "It's intent," stated the group's application, "is to produce affordable housing opportunities for Charlestown and Boston residents while, at the same time, revitalizing an important area of Charlestown." This local corporation proposes to build 12 units that would each sell for \$81,000. The average size of each proposed unit is 600 square feet. In their proposal, the High Street Development Corp. indicated the contribution of 25 percent of the net profits would be directed to the Courageous Sailing Center for a particular segment of the sailing program with no specific area yet targeted.

The Stahley Corp. also submitted plans for 12 units that would all "be marketed through the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation (CEDC)." This proposals also calls for CEDC to "be the recipient of the 25 precent profit participation as a non-profit group." These funds would be used to offset the price of the down-payment for the affordable units. Of the 12 units, four would sell as market rate units (\$130,000), another four would sell as moderate rate units (\$72,000) and four more would sell as low income units (\$50,000). The average unit size is 690 square feet.

Finally, the proposal by Conroy Development Corp. for the parcel includes de-

Residents Question Citizen Participation In Artery/Tunnel Project

State Transportation Secretary Frederick P. Salvucci has announced a citizen participation program to seek public reaction to the plans for the state's \$3.1 billion Central Artery/ Third Harbor Tunnel project.

Salvucci stated that this program allows neighborhood residents, business owners and commuters an opportunity to learn what the engineers are doing and to voice their opinions.

He stated that there will be three types of meetings: community meetings, regional task forces and general informational forums.

The community meetings, according to Salvucci, will be held regularly in five project locations to discuss design issues with residents and local merchants. The first round of meetings will begin on October 15th with a meeting in South Boston, South End/Chinatown on October 22, East Boston on November 4,

North End/Waterfront on November 12, and North Station on November 18.

Ken Stone, co-chairman of the North Area Task Force (NATF), expressed concern that a meeting has not been scheduled for the Charlestown community.

Stone, in a conversation with Salvucci's office, pointed out that Charlestown will be affected by this project as the depression of Route I-93 to allow for entrance into the Central Artery Tunnel will begin in the vicinity of Bunker Hill Community College.

Stone stated that Salvucci's office has asked that a letter be forwarded requesting a local meeting and that NATF would be following up on this matter.

Plans for the project call for the opening of the third harbor tunnel in 1994; both directions of the new underground artery in 1996; and the completion of all

Additionally, the Board approved that The Raymond Group erect a two story addition to the existing building as well as erecting two, 11-story wings to the sides of the structure.







Main and Warren Streets **Reconstruction Update**

The final asphalt coating has been poured on Main Street between Sullivan Square and Thompson Square. Pavement markings will be in place within one week and all regulatory signs are under production and should be in place within two weeks. All cement sidewalks along Main Street are completed and open for traffic. With this work done, 70% of the total job is finished.

Boston Gas has started to connect the remaining lamps on Warren Street. Brick work on the sidewalks is being done on Warren Street at two locations, at Thompson Square and outside Constitution Cooperative Elderly Housing. Also, the sidewalk outside Saint Mary's Church will be bricked this week.

The sidewalk on Warren Street between Monument Avenue and Pleasant Street will have a clearance of 36 inches for wheelchair accessibility. To assure this width, the gas lamp outside 77 Warren Street will be moved closer to the curb and trees will be eliminated if the desired width of the sidewalk cannot be made at a point where a tree opening had been placed.

Two street lights have been replaced on Main Street between Dunstable and Stacey Streets (opposite Salem Street). A third light, outside 256 Main Street, is in the process of being repaired.

All residents are reminded not to park along the stretch of the roadway still under construction. Cars will be towed at the owner's expense if found in the way of the construction crews.

Neighborhood Council Elections

Dear Mrs. Conway:

I am writing relative to the upcoming elections for the Charlestown Neighborhood Council. As this will be the first time that any seats will be filled by election, it is important that the community be informed of the election process.

Seven seats are open for candidates running from the town's seven precincts. In order to run, a candidate must live in the precinct he wishes to run from, be 18 years of age or older. Signatures must be submitted on approved forms that can be secured at my office, One Church Court. Charlestown, between now and October 2. Signatures are to be returned to my office by October 16. Anyone wishing to run must take out papers in person and must identify himself with an appropriate form of identification at the time of requesting same.

The election will take place on October 24 between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. It will be held at one central location which will be named later. Those wishing to vote must be residents of the precinct in which they vote, be 18 years of age or older and may be required to present some form of identification if their names do not appear on the police listing of residents that will be used for checking residency. Proxy voting will not be allowed.

The Council's special Election Committee will be responsible for running the election and will be the group that will decide any questions of procedure that arise. Candidates are responsible for insuring that signatures are correct and that all other procedures outlined here are followed. Failure by a candidate to do so will result in disqualification.

GREAT HOUSE FOUNDATION EXCAVATION UNDERWAY

The CANA archaeological team is excavating the Great House site in City Square directly across from the C House. The site, excavated once before, has been identified as the location of the foundation of the residence of the first governor of the Commonwealth, John Winthrop. The Great House was the first substantial building in the Boston area (erected in 1629) and was used as a meetinghouse by revolutionaries and later as a tavern. The Great House foundation will be excavated, removed, documented and carefully stored until a decision is made on where to place it. The foundation, and the rest of the artifacts, are the property of the MDPW and will be treated to prevent deterioration.


