★ Street Reconstruction — Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Director of Economic Development Paul Barrett has announced that the Charlestown Street Reconstruction Project contracts are scheduled to be advertised for bids on Jan. 27 and Feb.

3. Also being advertised at that time is the repair contract for the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights), as a separate project.

The contract bid process is scheduled to be completed on March 2, Barrett stated, with a vote expected by the BRA Board of Directors on March 5, allowing the projects to begin.

The Street Reconstruction Contracts will involve improvements to 30 neighborhood streets, including: Adams, Chestnut, Common, Concord, Devens, Essex, Ellwood, Ferrin, Lawrence, Lexington, Ludlow, Lyndeboro, Middlesex, Mt. Vernon, Park, Prescott, Prospect, Russell, Seminary and Washington streets; Monument Court, Mt. Vernon Avenue, Nearen Row and Old Rutherford Avenue. Four additional streets were added to the contract after residential protests were heard by the Neighborhood Council. These streets are: Edgeworth, Tremont, Union and Winthrop streets.

An April 1992 construction start is expected. According to the BRA, public hearings will be conducted prior to the scheduled work.

★ New Phone Numbers For City Hall — The city of Boston is in the process of making slight changes to its telephone numbers.

In most cases, only the first three numbers of City Hall departments will change from 725 to 635.

For example: the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services was 725-3485 and is now 635-3485. And the 24-hour mayor's hotline was 725-4500 and is now 635-4500.

In an effort to ease the transition of City Hall office numbers from 725 to 635, callers still calling City Hall's old main number — 725-4000, will get a recording informing them of the change. To avoid this, remember that City Hall's main number is now 635-4000.

This change applies only to 725 numbers in offices located in City Hall itself.

★ Presidential Primary Voter Registration — Tuesday, Feb. II, is the last day to register to vote in the upcoming Massachusetts presidential primary. The city's Election Department will remain open for extended hours on several occasions in the coming weeks, and the city will conduct neighborhood outreach programs to encourage registration.

Voters should confirm and, if need be, change the party affiliation they declared when they last registered to vote.

Voting in the March 10 Massachusetts Presidential Primary will be a little different this year. There are three political parties in Massachusetts — the Republican, the Democrat and the Independent Voters parties. Voters must be registered either as a Republican,

a Democrat, an Independent Voter or as an "unenrolled" voter.

Because the Independent Voters party will have a ballot of their own - just like the Democrats and the Republicans - voters who are now registered "Independent Voters Party" will only be allowed to vote on the Independent Voters Party ballot.

Voters must be registered as "unenrolled" to pick the party ballot they desire.

Once you choose a party's ballot, you become automatically enrolled in that political party. You may return immediately to "unenrolled status" by filling out a change of party status form after you vote.

To confirm if you are registered as a Democrat, a Republican, an Independent or an unenrolled voter, check with the city of Boston's Election Department, City Hall, Room 241, during regular business hours. The Election Department will also stay open on Saturday, Feb. 8 from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. and Tuesday, Feb. 11 from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Additionally, the Election Department will be setting up election registration program centers in soon-to-be announced neighborhood locations on Feb. 8, 10 and 11.







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Smoke-Free Charlestown Children

Having lived in many places, one thing that struck me when I moved to Charlestown a couple of years ago was the huge number of cigarette smokers. I was not surprised when Dr. Roger Sweet, who has been involved in this community for many years, told me that Charlestown had the highest rates of smoker's cancer and cardiovascular deaths in all of Boston. In fact, in a recent report from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health about death and disease from smoking, Charlestown had one of the highest rates in the whole state.

If you live in this town, you don't have to look too far to find someone you know or are related to that has died from cigarettes. Smoking is the number one preventable cause of death and disease in Charlestown and the people of this town

are suffering an undue and unnecessary health burden from this addiction.

This senseless death and disease is almost entirely due to the greed of the executives in the tobacco industry. Through their incessant barrage of cigarette advertising they are able to make us feel that smoking is normal. They sell us on images of smoking as being cool, glamorous, sexy and healthy. The worst part is that they do this to our children, the ones most vulnerable to their appeal and the ones most likely to become addicted.

This is no accident. The industry loses over a thousand regular customers each day in the United States in smoking-related deaths. They also lose a lucky few who are able to quit. These lost customers need to be replaced in order for the tobacco companies to keep up their profits, the same profits that can be

measured in human death and suffering. It is rare that people will begin to smoke as adults.

The tobacco industry turns to children to replace the dying and quitting smokers. Ninety percent of smokers begin smoking as teen-agers or younger. The children of Charlestown see cigarettes everywhere. They see their parents and the older kids smoking. They see magazine ads, taxi cabs, store signs and billboards showing them how cool they can be if they smoke. We live in the shadow of the huge "Marlboro man" at the Tobin Bridge, that tells the kids that they can be like a cowboy if they

smoke. These unfortunate children start to smoke, become regular smokers, and before they know it they become addicted. Because it can be almost impossible

to break this addiction, many of these children will end up smoking for the rest of their lives, and most of them will suffer illness and death from cigarettes. The cycle of cigarette addiction then perpetuates itself throughout generations. And all the while the tobacco companies are laughing themselves all the way to the bank.

This senseless destruction of human life has got to stop. We need to do everything that we can as a community to rid our children of this burden. How can we do it?

This problem has to be approached in many ways: · We need to educate our children about what the tobacco industry is trying to do to them. We need them to understand that the tobacco industry is trying to addict them to this drug that is more likely to kill them than alcohol, violence, cocaine and heroin put together. They should be educated about what those advertisements are really saying to them. Children need to understand that they are being conned by the tobacco companies.

· We need to help the smokers who are trying to quit, with all the support and understanding we can give them. We need to realize that quitting smoking may be the most difficult thing that a person does in their whole life; it is that powerful an addiction.

· We need to stop stores (and vending machines) from selling cigarettes illegally to minors.

· We need to get rid of as many cigarette advertisements as we can. For example, we can ask for taxis that don't have cigarette

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billboards on their roof. We can ask our stores not to put cigarette ads with those "cool" camels on the front doors. We can demand that the billboard companies stop advertising cigarettes in our town.

Nobody should have to become addicted to nicotine as a child and suffer the miserable consequences. In Charlestown this is happening at a rate higher than anywhere else in the city. It is time we wake up to this problem and put an end to

My dream is for the cycle of childhood nicotine addiction leading to high smoking-related death rate to come to an end in Charlestown. I want Charlestown to be a place where the children think that it is not cool to be conned by the tobacco industry into smoking cigarettes.

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USS Constitution Museum To Present Lecture On Life At Sea


