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## Low Is Not The Word To Describe Tuesday's Voter Turnout

Snow? . . . Cold? . . . Apathy? . . . None of the above? Just 12 percent of Charlestown's registered voters braved the elements on March 5 to cast a ballot in the Presidential Primary Election.

There were 7,915 voters registered in Ward 2, Charlestown for this election. This included 4,694 Democrats, 809 Republicans with 2,412 undeclared. Taking a Democratic ballot were 569 voters, with 371 voting Republican. No one was recorded as voting for the Libertarian candidates in the unofficial tally.

In the Democratic field, President Bill Clinton received 433 votes, Lyndon LaRouche Jr. 20, no preference 60 and there were 56 not voting for president.

James Roosevelt Jr. and Elizabeth M. Dunn, both from Cambridge, were elected Middlesex/Suffolk/Essex State Committee Man and State Committee Woman, respectively. There was no opposition for either candidate.

The election of a Ward 2 Democratic Committee was done by write-ins and stickers, which in some precincts created chaos, since no candidates had submitted names to the Democratic State Committee by filing deadline.

## Community Meeting On Parking In Charlestown

There will be a meeting from 7 to 9 p.m. on Monday, March 11, at the Knights of Columbus Hall, co-sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the Charlestown Business Association to address parking concerns in Charlestown.

Parking is a continuing headache for everyone. Charlestown is the closest non-restricted parking to downtown from the north. Commuters who use our streets, but not our neighborhood, are a common concern for residents, busi-

nesses and service providers in town.

There have been a series of meetings in Precinct 1, the area of town closest to downtown and to the MBTA Orange Line, about instituting resident parking on certain streets. While the results of a vote in that precinct are currently in question, there is no doubt that commuter parking is a continuing problem.

The solution to this problem is not simple. No one solution solves all of our problems. And each solution brings with it a different set of trade-offs, including forcing residents to comply with local car registration laws, constant enforcement by meter maids, parking restrictions on friends and families, and restrictions on those who serve the community but don't live here.

The current process used by the Boston Transportation Department involves holding meetings and voting on resident parking precinct by precinct. While this does

## Local Businessman Celebrates 50 Years In Charlestown

Fifty years ago Andy Sferruzza Sr. opened the doors of Air & Refrigeration Service at 53 Main St. In 1946, the lower end of Charlestown's Main Street was home to a Chinese laundry, the post office, and coffee, pawn and barber shops. The El and two-way traffic moved people in, around, and back and forth to Charlestown and Boston proper. The Navy Yard was going strong, spilling sailors into a thriving business district.

"I don't know where the time went," says 70-yearold Sferruzza, a past president of Charlestown's Ki-

## Committee Supports Housing Proposal For 258 Main St.

Plans to renovate 258 Main St. and provide 13 permanent Section 8 housing units for homeless elderly and other-aged adults were supported by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Development Committee at its Feb. 29 public meeting.

Recommendations for the redevelopment of the old JJ McCarthy's building, a former rooming house and neighborhood bar, will be presented to the full council at its March monthly meeting, tonight at 7 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St.

Committee Chairman Tom Cunha will suggest that the council support the nonprofit Boston Aging Concerns' (BAC) proposal

with continuing community input and monitoring on public safety, and the tenant-selection and building design-review processes.

Issues raised at three other community meetings with residents and BAC representatives include a safe selection procedure for tenants, a Charlestown outreach effort to encourage locally based housing, parking and open space, the building's facade and union labor.

Mark Dinaburg presented BAC's plans to receive ownership and management from the New Atlantic Development Corp.'s renovation of the four-story sorely-in-need-of-repair building. Dinaburg said the housing would provide 12 tenants and a resident manager with approximately 250 square feet, including

a private bedroom, bathroom and kitchenette. Fulltime maintenance and service coordinator staff members would be part of the plans, with program space offered on the first floor.

The proposed housing combines independent living with a shared community atmosphere. All residents would be referred for housing by service providers who work with people who are homeless or at risk of losing their homes. The Erich Lindemann Center would refer five of the selected tenants, and others would come from agencies in Charlestown and greater Boston.

Cunha asked redevelopment representatives specifically for an itemized list and criteria for the tenant-selection process, and for the actual number of Charlestown people that local organizations, such as the John F. Kennedy Family Service and Bunker Hill Health centers, claim are in need of this type of housing.

Residents expressed concern about any criminal background a prospective tenant may have, especially involving young children. BAC represenatives said that, in addition to personal interviews and references, C.O.R.I. record checks would be completed on all tenants. Neighbors also encouraged an alcohol-free environment for the housing program.

The council is expected to vote tonight on whether to support the committee's recommendations for the development.

ensure that those most immediately impacted have a say in what regulations get instituted, their decisions may also impact their neighbors who do not have the chance to participate.

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the Charlestown Business Association, seeing the potential for these impacts across the community, are cosponsoring this community-wide meeting. This is a chance for the whole community - residents and businesses alike - to get together and hear the concerns of neighbors all around town. It is also an opportunity for all of us to collectively search for creative solutions.

The results of this meeting will be used by the Neighborhood Council as input if and when precincts hold meetings to consider options for parking in their areas. 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
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## American Legion High School Oratorical Finals On Sunday





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## H.P. Hood Inc. Will Close Charlestown Plant As A Manufacturing Facility

Following a comprehensive assessment of Hood's Charlestown plant, the company has determined that due to the very unfavorable economics of operating the plant, originally constructed in 1927 as a processing facility, it will cease manufacturing but continue distribution functions at the Charlestown plant.

Of a Charlestown-based workforce of 325 employees, approximately

120 employees will be affected. Hood will continue to receive, warehouse and distribute fresh dairy and juice products from this location for the indefinite future. A full line of Hood dairy and juice products will continue to be available to consumers throughout the region as before.

Hood maintains seven other dairy, juice and food related manufacturing locations throughout New

England and upstate New York. Hood will be relocating its corporate headquarters to Chelsea.

"We regret that these necessary actions result in the loss of jobs of valued employees, however, we are providing those affected employees with a comprehensive separation package and outplacement resources, and are working closely with Mass. Industrial Services Program to ensure ongoing support for

these employees," stated Robert L. Keller, president of H.P. Hood.

According to Keller, Hood's former owners, Agway Inc., were planning to close the company's Charlestown plant due to unacceptable operating and cost factors.

Last May, the company successfully relocated its Charlestown milk production to other plants to competitive achieve

## Voke Recognized For Efforts On Minimum Wage Increase

Citing his commitment to improving the plight of working class families across the state, Mass. AFL-CIO President Joseph Faherty recognized Rep. Richard Voke at a recent State House celebration for the enactment of the new minimum wage law. Voke was able to utilize his position as Majority Leader of the House to shepherd his bill through the legislature and, ultimately, to override a gubematorial veto.

"Helping workers at the lower end of the wage spectrum to keep pace with inflation will improve their quality of life and reduce the need for taxpayer-supported government programs. It also sends the message that we, as a society, value our workers and their efforts," commented Voke.

Voke's action raised the minimum wage on Jan. 1

from \$4.25 an hour to \$4.75 an hour. The wage will also increase on Jan. 7, 1997 to \$5.25 an hour. Given that an estimated 296,000 workers currently

are earning the minimum wage, which translates into \$8,500 of annual income for an individual, and some 40 percent of these people are their family's sole breadwinner, Voke and many others felt the time for an increase had arrived.

Another in a line of initiatives that he has championed to provide working families with support and encouragement, Voke's efforts are continuing to make a difference in the lives of thousands across the commonwealth. His "Healthy Kids" program is providing health insurance to the children of the working poor and unemployed and his support of public education from kindergarten through college is making quality and affordable education possible for children everywhere. By leading the movement to defeat the Weld Administration's attempts to restrict access to nursing home care, he is helping seniors who otherwise could not afford essential health care services.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT DEDUCTING MEDICAL EXPENSES

Even high medical costs can have an upside. The IRS says that medical expenses are deductible to the extent that they exceed 7.5% of your adjusted gross income (AGI). Even if your 1995 medical expenses weren't astronomical, you might have had enough to exceed the 7.5% floor and qualify for an itemized deduction.

Home improvement costs. If you modified your home to accommodate a medical condition, your home improvement costs are deductible to the extent they exceed the increase in your home's value. Say, for example, you installed central air conditioning to ease your dependent son's asthma. If you installed the system for \$5,000 and it increased your home's market value by \$2,500, you can deduct the \$2,500 difference. Improvements made to accommodate a physically handicapped person such as the installation of elevators, handrails, or support bars - are also deductible.

Travel costs. You can deduct transportation and lodging costs that are primarily for, and essential to medical care for you, your spouse, and your dependents. For example, if a doctor asks you to stay at a hotel near the hospital of a sick child, you can deduct up to \$50 a day of the lodging cost.

Other medical expenses. Several often-overlooked costs have also been allowed as a medical deduction. For example:

- · Additional costs incurred to prepare foods for those with restricted diets.
- The cost of treating drug or alcohol abuse.
- · Premium payments for medical insurance.
- Costs to remove hazardous lead-based paint.
- · Additional expenses incurred to get publica-
- · The cost of orthopedic shoes, contact lenses, crutches, wheelchairs, hearing aids, elastic stockings, and false teeth.

#### COMMUNITY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its sixth annual Community Appreciation Awards Banquet on Saturday, April 27 at the Knights of Columbus Hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases, unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Residents, non-residents, businesspersons and employees are urged to take the time to nominate a person, business or organization deserving of recognition.

Persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.

Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations in the past are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, improve chances of being selected.

#### AWARD CATEGORIES

- Youth A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1996 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Elderly A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older as of Jan. 1, 1996 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Organization An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.
- Public Servant A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)
- New Resident A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.
- Unsung Hero A Charlestown resident whose deed/deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.

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
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
