## Mount Rushmore Flag To Wave Next To The "USS Constitution"

## "Boston's Second Annual

 Tribute to Old Glory" will be presented free to the public from 5 to $5: 45$ p.m. on Sunday, June 19 on Pier One in the Boston National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.The focus will be on the flying of the Mount Rushmore Flag, measuring 85 x 45 feet, which was dedicated and flown first a year ago and has traveled thousands of miles across the United States. It returns to the Charlestown Navy Yard on June 19 to be unfurled and flown alongside the USS Constitution at Pier One.
This will be the first step of its 1988 journey to arrive at Gettysburg on July 3 in celebration of the 125 th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg where the flag will unveil the Eternal Light Peace Memorial.
In addition to the Mount Rushmore Flag, the ceremony will include the presentation and flying of nine Gettysburg peace flags representing the nine major New England regiments

 Gettysburg.The State of Rhode Island will send its historic Gettysburg Gun, used during the battle in 1863, from the State House in Providence to the Charlestown Navy Yard to be on display for the day.

Weather conditions permitting, the flag will fly until 7 p.m. at which time it will be lowered, folded and placed back into a chest.

## History Comes To Life On Bunker Hill

'We were ordered to parade at 6 o'clock with one day's provisions and blankets for a march somewhere, but we did not know where. . . About 9 o' clock at night we marched down onto Charlestown Hill (Breed's Hill) against Cox (Copp's) Hill in Boston, where we entrenched, and made a fort of about ten rod long and eight wide, with a long and eight wide, with a
breastwork of about eight breastwork of about eight
more. We worked till about more. We worked till about
five in the morning." . . . five in the morning. wrote Private Peter Brown of Prescott's regiment on the evening of June 16, 1775.
The annual historic demonstration on Bunker Hill, in which costumed volunteer 18th Century British and Colonial soldiers relive the first major battle of the Revolutionary War, will be presented free to the public from 1 to 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 18 at the Bunker Hill Monument, which is part of the Boston National Historical Park.

The Battle of Bunker Hill, which was fought 213
years ago on June 17, 1775, was a military defeat for the colonists. However, the importance of the battle cannot be overstated. In its af termath the British found a new respect for the independent character of the colonial forces while the col onials were able to learn the importance of tactical planning and discipline so much needed in the formation of the Revolutionary forces in their fight for liberty,
In addition to the historic demonstration, an 18th cen tury military encampment complete with historic weapons display, musket drills and other encampment activities will be presented free to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday June 18 and Sunday, June 19 in the National Historical Park section of the Charles town Navy Yard.

## Development Issues Main Focus Of Neighborhood Council Meeting <br> Board on Parcel P-2A, the

ment issues, once again dominated the agenda. Committee meetings on parcels R-87 and R-107, the upcoming vote by the BRA

Navy Yard Master Plan, Chapter 689 housing were reported and a presentation was made by Dick Held and Paul Kelly on their planned development on Main and Warren Streets
The Council voted to endorse the Breed's Hill Associates development plans for Parcel R-107, located at Main Street and Lawnwood Place. This was the only developer to make a presentation before the Housing and Development Committee.
The Housing and Development Committee reported to the council on their May 31 meeting with abutters of Parcel R-87, located at the intersection of Tremont and Prospect Streets and Lowney Way. The committee had voted to have the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) draft two Requests For Proposals (RFPs) for the parcel, one for individual row housing and the other for single family house lots on 47,000 square feet of the land, with the remaining 10,000 square feet to be transferred from the ownership of the BRA to that of the Boston Hous ing Authority for Chapter 689 housing. Once the BRA has the drafts readied. another public meeting will be held to solicit input from
velopment of that parcel. Council member Tom ha reported that he had ha mepord that he had made that motion to address the concerns of the aubtters and members of the council so that the construction of affordable housing units could be compared to a plan with individual house lots. He stated, "The neighbors should know how and what they are going to be impacted with and it is im portant that the people involved with this [parcel] be included in the process."
Council member Jim Doherty voiced his concern on the issue of Chapter 689 housing being included in the RFP drafts. "The abutters are vehemently opposed to $689, "$ he stated. He then repeated a motion he had made at the May 24 special council meeting asking for "a rejection of 689 housing on that parcel." "The council voted 7 to 5 to reject Chapter 689 housing on that site," he stated. He questioned the other council members as to why it was still included in the discussions of developing the parcel. Doherty concluded, "Treat 689 as rendered:"
Council member Betty Golden asked why an amendment was attached to the RFP drafts to include

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Chapter 689 housing at the May 31 meeting, meet ing that she said was called only to address the development of the remaining section of the site. She stated that it has been implied that opposition to this [placing Chapter 689 housing on R-87] is taken as opposition to this form of housing. Currently the BHA has land available that they own themselves and can develop. Have the Housing Authority build these units on land they have. I would like to see this triangle at Tremont and Prospect go for Charlestown. I would glady accept it, if the State could say that at least two members of our communiy would benefit from it. I would rather see BHA build this for families from Charlestown with handicapped members, handicap is inclusive of mental and physical. That way we would be able to take care of some of our own plus still provide this type of housing." She further stated, "Our major concern has always been the abutters. The council has not really listened to any thing the abutters have said have not heard one abuter say they are opposed to ny handicapped resident residing in the area. The whole thing is the process." This was met with a round of applause from the audience.
Resident Ann Considine stated that she felt any vote by the council at this time was illegal since the body had already voted on the subject dating back to 1986. When you put it in, it's in, case closed. I am not against handicapped people. I am against you people [the councill voting on something that already took
place back in 86 . No one in this community has worked harder for the handicapped than myself Don't ever put me in a place where I have to answer to the handicapped of this own. You people have meeting after meeting to get what you want Let the neighborhood speak. The issue is that you already made an agreement - the council, not the BRA! You had meetings and decided to go along with what the neighborhood said and now all of a sudden someone wants something and we'll stick it to them [Charles town] again," she stated.
Discussions took place between council member on the subject of Chapter 689 housing and it's need to be placed in the communi$y$ after which a vote was taken by the council to accept Chapter 689 housing by a vote of 16 to 2 . Anoth r vote was passed 17 in favor and one abstension to ask the BRA to draft two RFP's for Parcel R-87.
The Planning and Zoning Committee presented a memo that was sent to BRA Director Stephen Coyle requesting further information on the Navy Yard Mas ter Plan that he presented to the community on May 10. Council members, concernd about the length of time it would take for the committee to make a decision on the BRA plan for the Navy Yard, asked how long it would take its members to gather all the information they need and then come before the council with their results. It was agreed that by the end of July the committee would be prepared to make a presentation at a public meeting. Kathryn

## Harry And The Kids - A Partnership In Sailing <br> by Lynn Peters <br> the children of the city,"'

Harry McDonough doesn't work for nothing. He says he's yet to see the \$1 annual salary Mayor Raymond L. Flynn agreed to pay him to run the Courageous Sailing Center in the Charlestown Navy Yard. This summer marks Hary's second season introducing city kids to the sport and the dream to someday sail aboard two-time America's Cup winner Courageous.
"He still owes me the dollar, the s.o.b.," Harry booms with a bark that could rattle even Flynn to the bones thinking he owed this old salt anything. "But that's OK. It'll come in time. I'm not gonna starve waitin' for it.'
The retired 34 -year U.S. Customs Service worker, ex-NFL Boston Yanks running back, and founder and director of the five-year-old MDC Harry McDonough Sailing Center in South Boston hardly needs the buck.

Instead, Harry McDonough has been passing around his 60 years of sailing know-how for free to "any kid who can swim" since last June 29 when his Charlestown program of ficially began. And it is "his" program. That \$1 contract means, "nobody can tell me what to do. I can walk right outta here and take that boat with me."
That boat, the world-famous 12 -meter captained to victories by the likes of Ted Hood in 1974 and Ted Turner in 1977, was a gift Harry wanted from syndicate head Leonard Greene for the city. The Charlestown Navy Yard seemed to perfectly accommodate the yacht's size, and Flynn and Senator Edward Kennedy, among other influentials, rallied behind Harry. With reported offers of $\$ 2-3$ million for Courageous after the 1987 America's Cup trials in Freemantle, Australia, Greene told Harry he was insane to just ask for the boat.

Finally, he said, 'Harry, stop it. You're driving me crazy. I'll give the boat to barrel-bellied Harry says flatly.

Courageous is something of a great green ornament on the harbor now, gracing the waterfront with throngs of future sailors and instructors. No one has to apply. Nearly all of the kids who go out to Pier Four for a look or a lesson have never been on a boat in their lives. What's more is Harry's taught blind and handicapped youngsters to sail for 20 years.
"My father worked hard to make me my first sailboat when I was 7," says the nearly 67 -year-old steadfast Southie native, whose four grown children are also expert sailors. "I just wanna give kids what I had. This is my life."

This year Harry has more boats for the Center and expects nearly double the 1,700 kids who participated last summer. He has organized the Courageous Chal lenge races for July 3 and 4 , inviting Turner and Hood to captain Courage-

ties for his less-fortunate city kids. Two of his Charlestown super students are getting more than free boat rides and summers on the water.
Harry pays 12 -year-old Billy Egelston and Shawn Porter, 10 , out of his pocket to work at the Center for him. Every day of the week Billy and Shawn head down to the Navy Yard to pull cans and paper out of the harbor, work around the boats and docks and to sometimes clean Harry's car. They do pretty much what needs to be done, and they do it all rather graciously.
Billy and Shawn are not old enough to be on the city's payroll. Harry believes any kid with a social security card should be able to work, specifically, any kid from Charlestown deserves to work with him. In fact, Harry is apparently disgruntled with the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority's Executive DiAuthoritys Executive Di-

sharing his enthusiasm.

need jobs," Harry's voice gets a bit louder than normal. "It means a lot to a kid and the family if he or she an have some money for chool clothes or any small thing they can do with it:'
Harry figured that the harbor's creosote and oil pollution matched need for need with general economics in some Charlestown families. He dashed off a note to Levy suggesting the MWRA hire two young Charlestown girls to wash Courageous daily. Levy says he declined the offer Harry's indignant.
"Im not so sure I want to have a 'dispute' with Harry McDonough," Levy says, responding to a charge the wo are embattled. According to Levy, the MWRA does not hire anyone to clean the harbor. He told Harry to take it up with the National Parks Service We run the sewer system, not the marinas," says Levy, He thinks the Courageous Sailing Center has a great program but says he would rather consider the situation s "an offer and a nonacceptance.'
Harry fully believes Levy ought to do better than that and ought to be concerned with his disappointment. It's old news that Harry has run up against opposition before. He beats the system by taking care of boys like Billy and Shawn himself.
Harry apparently sees promise in these two, who might otherwise not be givn much of a chance to live out their potentials. The Navy Yard has become a second home for Billy and Shawn.
"always know where my kid is," Kathleen Porter says. "Harry's a grouch. He's a comedian. And he keeps him in line."
tell every kid the same hing: If you do a good job we'll hire you through high school and college, and you'll be set for life," Harry says. "But I'm a bitch and bastard to work for. You survive me, and you'll last ten wars. Be a wise guy, and you're gone."
How do the kids feel bout their crusty coach? "He's awesome," says Billy. "He yells at you a lot for nothing and calls you
names. He's awesome,"
What you notice about Billy and Shawn right away is their confidence with what they've learned from Harry. They claim they can each anyone anything about sailing.
Billy, who lives on Starr King Court and attends the Harvard/Kent School, seems to feel good about himself and his accomplishments. He sports a pullover Courageous Sailing Center windbreaker as if it were a medal, pulling it taut so very letter can be read clearly. He admits to taking a little longer to learn all he has, more than a month, but adamantly maintains he can each anyone what he knows.
Shawn learned quicker.
Best of all he likes "hail- the world together.
ing," a side-tipping maneuver for speed he gets quite a thrill from. Shy at first glance, Shawn comes to life when he explains his responsibilities at the Center and how he and Billy have already been allowed to tow Courageous.
These kids are more important to Harry than just hard working local kids. According to his mother, Shawn's dyslexia keeps him two to three years behind in reading, and Harry's right there bouting it out for the boy in still other arenas. He fully intends to have Shawn accepted on a full scholarship to the Landmark School in Prides Crossing for bright and above-aver-
age dyslexic children
The school costs boarding students a phenomenal $\$ 25,900$ a year, offering those with the language learning disability a chance to excel with focused special attention.
"Shawn will be there in the fall," Harry bellows. "He'll be there if I have to drive him up there myself and bust through the gate. And I guarantee I'll get a scholarship a year from them.'

Ann Brennan, assistant director of admissions at Landmark, only spoke with Harry once but remembers it well. She explains the school's reputable application and evaluation process.
"Harry's bulldozing us," Brefinan says of Shawn's evaluation still being in the beginning stages. "To put an inappropriate youngster here could be devastating to him." Brennan has only just seen Shawn's current school files from the Blackstone School, where he attends in the South End. She speaks highly of Shawn's potential and is ready to schedule the necessary interview and placement testing. Admission decisions are made the same day.

The school only provides minimal scholarship money, a maximum $\$ 5,000$, for accepted students. Under Chapter 766, Shawn's school district would fully fund his tuition if it finds him needy of alternative education. Brennan says

cil member Mel Stillman. The Commission is funded jointly by the City of Boston and the state Executive Office of Communities and Development. He stated that the Commission had informed him that there were no state funds for this arson prevention program in this year's state budget and requested that the council send a letter to Representative Sal DiMasi in support of inclusion of funds in the budget for this program. A letter will also be sent to the BRA Board endorsing the plans to build a park in Thompson Square on BRA-owned property outside the Neworld Bank in Thompson Square in honor of John Boyle O'Reilly. It was announced that the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will have office space on the first floor of One Thompson Square, equipped with a telephone, to help handle the council
business.
Concerns were raised at the meeting that were referred to committees for further investigation and discussion. One of these concerns involved a reported slow response time by Health and Hospital ambulances. The second was relative to the possibility of a garage being built at Sullivan Square by the MBTA to accommodate 3,000 commuters.
It was noted that a uniformed police officer was present in the audience. When asked if he was there at the request of the council, he responded "No, only as a spectator." This response pleased one council member who said the council had been accused of "being scared of our neighbors."

## Neighborhood Stabilization Bill <br> Wins Support In Charlestown

With debate on Mayor Raymond Flynn's Neighborhood Stabilization Bill expected to begin next week expected to begin next week
on the floor of the City on the floor of the City
Council chambers, several Council chambers, several
Charlestown organizations have offered their support for the housing bill.
Formal endorsements of the bill have been made by several organizations including the Charlestown Affordable Housing ComAffordable Housing Com-
mittee, the Kennedy Center, a social service agency, and Charlestown Community Schools.
Several community leaders have expressed their individual support as well. Among them is Beverly Gibbons, Elderly Services Director for the Charlestown Community Schools. In a letter of support, Gibbons wrote, "Many senior citizens are being forced to vacate rental units under pressure of condo conversions. The only choice remaining to them is to turn to subsidized housing It is also traumatic to their health and psychological well-being to be faced with an uncertain future of not knowing that they can be allowed to live out their remaining years in a neighborhood in which many have spent their whole lives."

The Neighborhood Stabilization Bill, aimed at preserving affordable housing

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in the neighborhoods, allows the City to regulate condominium conversion by requiring property owners of regulated apartments to seek a permit from the City before converting their City before converting their
apartments to condominiapartments to condominiums or cooperatives. Under
the bill, a permit is granted immediately if a majority of the tenants in a building want to purchase their units.
The bill will not apply to housing units converted to condos or co-ops before May 4, 1988, singles, twos and owner-occupied threeunit buildings, rental housing not covered by the rent equity law, newly constructed housing and substantially rehabilitated housing accommodations.
"It has become more and more difficult for some families to remain in Charlestown because of escalating housing costs," says Judy Evers, Charlestown coordinator for the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Serfice of Neighborhood Ser-
vices. "And the chances for these families' children and
grandchildren to find their own housing in he neighborhood has grown dimmer."

The Boston City Council has scheduled a public
hearing on the bill for Tues day, June 14, at 7 p.m. in the City Council chambers on the 5th floor of City Hall, and a Thursday, June 23 , hearing at $10 \mathrm{a}, \mathrm{m}$. on possible amendments.

(continued from page one) that he had heard the rumors and had spoken to one of the lottery winners who was more than concerned that he would no longer be able to afford the unit he and his family had been planning on moving into. planning on moving into.
Cunha also stated that anCunha also stated that an-
other party had given his other party had given his
landlord notice of his move into the new housing, and now was fearful that he would have no place to live if he could not afford the home he had "won."
Telephone calls were received at the Charlestown Patriot office the morning after the meeting seeking information to verify the authenticity of these stories. Concerned lottery winners expressed their eagerness to find out the truth. Many
had already heard these stories, but treated them as merely rumor until they had heard Cunha's remarks at the meeting.
Concern was then replaced with panic in the case of one lottery winner who had been served an eviction notice to make room for the tice to make room for the
landlord's son, who had landlord's son, who had
also won a unit. This man, also won a unit. This man,
now afraid he wouldn't be able to purchase his three bedroom unit, had already given notice that he would be out of his present apartment by the end of September.
A call was made to Tom McIntyre, president of the Bricklayers and Masons Non-Profit Housing Corporation, Inc. to determine what was truth and what

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was rumor. According to McIntyre, " 100 percent of the lottery winners will be moving into the units once they are ready for occupancy. There has been no price increase - the price did not go up." He stated that he has not called all the future owners together as of yet because there is nothing that can be done until the units are ready. "What would we say to each other, 'Hi, how are ya' and send them home?" he stated. McIntyre also said that he anticipates that by September or October he will meet with the lottery winners and at that time deposits will be placed on the units and papers will be passed.

According to Jim English, director of harbor planning and development for the Boston Redevelopment Authority, "There is no problem. Nothing has happened since the lottery to confirm these rumors." English also stated that "assuming all was accurate with the applications at the time of the lottery, they [the lottery winners] should be allowed to move in when the housing units are completed."
McIntyre also reported that "everything is proceeding" but stated that if anyone had any questions or concerns to call him at $426-4508$ and "I will be happy to talk with them."

## Open Letter <br> To Charlestown Community

I am currently a member of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and have been since its inception in 1985.
My letter is in regard to letters appearing in last week's issue of the Patriot. I feel the letters in question were not a true representation of the concerns raised by council members, residents and abutters with regard to Parcel R-87 at Tremont and Prospect Streets.
It is definitely wrong for anyone to infer that those opposed to the proposal, which was presented by the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) for 689 housing, are opposed to having mentally retarded people reside in the area. I am stating emphatically, this is not the issue.

The main issues that have been raised regarding the BHA's proposal are:

1) Residents do not want a proposal for housing which includes the BHA as they currently have properties which could be utilized for this proposal.
2) Under this proposal for eight units of housing, it is unlikely that any Charlestown residents will reside in these units.
3) Abutters have stated they believed this designated area would be affordable housing for Charlestown families with handicapped members, which they could own. (Handicapped is inclusive of mentally or physically handicapped.)
My own idea of a solution has been for the BHA to build on some of their property and build affordable units for Charlestown residents with handicapped members so that we can take care of some of "OUR OWN" also. Recalling past development issues which the Neighborhood Council has had before them paints a better picture:
4) Council members and residents were opposed to a particular developer for Parcel C2-A at Baldwin and Main Streets because included in the proposal were two units of handicapped housing which would be owned by the BHA. (Reason for opposition: Did not want anything which would include the BHA.)
5) Council members and residents were opposed to the one-third of the total units of Parcel P-2A at Main and Bunker Hill Streets being included as low income affordable housing. (Reason for opposition: BHA would likely be the purchaser of the units.) The final recommendation of the Neighborhood Council to the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) was to exclude low income affordable units.
Many say they are advocates of affordable housing for our young families hoping to stay in Charlestown. I believe our handicapped families are entitled to this same opportunity.
