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North Mead Street Mud Slide Forces Evacuation Of Charlestown Family
by Chris Nicastro Massive erosion on a hill behind North Mead Street， triggered in part by excava－ tion during the preliminary construction of condomin－ iums，has prompted one Charlestown family to eva－ cuate their home
The erosion may also have endangered another North Mead Street home， as well as the Saint Francis de Sales Cemetery．
John Murray，his wife

Mary Beth and children Kathleen，Meghan and Ry－ an evacuated their 21 North Mead Street home on April 5 at the urging of Edward Doherty，a part－owner of the Cobblestone Landing Condominiums．According to Patrick Murphy，Mur－ ray＇s attorney，Doherty was concerned over the damage the heavy rains had caused to the recently exca－ vated hill behind the Mur－ rays＇house，and told him to

have the Murrays leave the house immediately
The Murrays spent the next two nights with a rela－ ive before moving to the Royal Sonesta，courtesy of he Cobblestone Landing levelopment team．On April 13，the Murrays returned to their home． According to Jack French，the Cobblestone＇s architect and part－owner． he Murrays＇home is cur rently in no danger．He said the erosion that occurred on April 5 and 6 appears to be much worse than it actual－ y is．French said．＂We rad an unusual rain and it did saturate the natural fill but in terms of structural damage，there isn＇t any．＇ According to Murray， however，the danger posed o his house and his family was very real and still ex ists．Murray said that over two day period， 17 yards of his property had slid down the hill．Any further excavation on the hill，he believes could endanger his house and possibly his family．
＇My clients were scared o death that Sunday night，＂said Murphy ＂John told me that there were people all over his backyard and trees were going down everywhere The children were wide awake throughout most of （continued on page 10）

Now, as a community liaison for the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (DPW), these close personal relationships, this network of "Townies" that Flanagan has cultivated over the years suddenly akes on an added, professional dimension. As the community liaison, Flanagan will act as the primary go-between for the DPW

My role is basically to serve as a person in the community who people can call. If they have a sugges-

Flanagan believes strongly in the CANA project. While he acknowledges that there will be traffic headaches for Charlestown residents and commuters over the next five years, he is confident that a new revitalized City Square will make it all worthwhile

We'll be restoring Charlestown's neighborhood center." said Flanagan. "If you talk to thirty different people, they would remember thirty dif ferent City Squares. They would remember when the Hollywood Theatre was down there, the Globe Discount Store, Dot's Dinner, The Stork Club. It's always been a very busy area and it will be once again. Flanagan graduated from Charlestown High School in 1972. He attended Boston State College and received a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Suffolk University. He has worked at the Charles Street Jail and as a legislative aide for the $\mathrm{Ci}-$ ty Council. In 1984, he worked as a project coordinator for the Mayor's Office of Community Participation.

## Water Leaks Dampen Tiny Tots Program

Children sat decorating Easter eggs and coloring holiday pictures amid an assortment of buckets of various shapes and sizes in their classroom this past Tuesday morning past Tuesday morning. Last week's torrential rains,
with the additional downpour this past Monday, took its toll on the Community Room of the Harvard/Kent School - the home of the Tiny Tot Program, a pre-school education and recreation program under the auspices of the Charlestown Community Schools.

This week, parents expressed concern over the conditions in the classroom as seven ceiling tiles are missing, having deteriorated from the downpour of water into the room. Leakage has streaked the exterior wall of the room as
white lines mark where the water passed through the ceiling forming rivulets down the wall.
Also, parents expressed concern over the composition of insulation visible around the pipes that are exposed through the openings in the ceiling tiles. They also pointed out that the room smells musty and the rugs are mildewed.

The problem with water leakage is not new to the Harvard/Kent School having occurred almost constantly since the building was opened in the early 1970's. Repairs to the roof areas and skylights were done in 1973 and in 1986 but the source of the water problem has never fully been corrected, thus the leaks reoccur.
The fact that the Tiny Tot Program was forced to
close last week and this past Monday due to the amount of water leaking into the classroom, disturbed the parents.
This fact also disturbed Elizabeth Starr, head teacher of the program which serves some 16 Charlestown youngsters. She stated that there have been many promises by the Boston School Department that repairs would be done to correct the leakage problem and to replace the ceiling tiles.

She said that even on a normal" rainy day, there are leaks, but the heavy rain made remaining in the classroom an impossibility. Starr said that she is concerned that children with allergies might find the dampness hampering their breathing. She also noted that the forced closure was
disrupting to the children's educational program
Debbie Lent, teacher in the Tiny Tot Program said that dealing with the water was very difficult - as fast as it was cleaned up, it poured back in. She also noted that the hallway that connects the kindergarten classrooms smells musty as the carpeting in that area becomes soaked from leaks in the skylight.
Starr quoted a letter dated December 19, 1986 from Paul Mooney, Senior Structural Engineer of the Boston Public Schools, indicating that work would be done in the area "this spring" to clean and find out the exact source of the leakage and make the necessary repairs to the community room, cafeteria and the skylights in the kindergarten areas.

Anthony Dileso, Direc tor of Facilities Manage ment, stated that the work orders are running behind. He said that this work, estimated to cost between $\$ 15,000$ and $\$ 18,000$ will be going out to bid "in a week to a week and a half." He said that the bid process would take six to eight weeks as it must be advertised in the City Record and then the bid would be awarded to the lowest competent bidder.
Dileso stated that the work on the roof would be done this summer and the classrooms will be repaired and ready for fall. He said that he will make it a priority item and that monies will be made available under the maintenance budget to sec hat this work is completed. He noted that this project will straddle this and next year's budget and the mon-
ey will be available. In response to questions by parents as to the insulation visible around the pipes in the ceiling, Dileso referred to a report by Hygeia, an asbestos testing firm. He stated that the report of a survey done in the Harvard/Kent building indicated that there was no asbestos throughout the school itself and none around the structural beams. He said there should be no fears of asbestos in the classroom.
Starr was encouraged by the commitment of Dileso that the work would be completed during the summer. She said that it is unfair to the parents and to the youngsters to have to close down the program. Their plans are to continue the Tiny Tot Program through June 12th - and hope for dry, sunny weather.


Development Committee To Meet To Review Status Of Land Parcels

The Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will meet on Thursday evening, April 23, at 7:00 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill Street.
The Committee, under the chairmanship of Mike Powers, will review the status of the proposed redevelopment of Parcels R-87. R-23B and R-59D2
Parcels R-87, at the intersection of Tremont and Prospect Streets, has been the subject of several community meetings. The concensus of the community has been to request that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) divide this approximately 57,000 square foot parcel into in-
dividual 3,000 square foot house lots for development by individuals. The economic feasibility of such a proposal and the time schedule for the development of this land will be addressed by Larry Brophy from the staff of the BRA.

Also on the agenda is Parcel R-23B at 36 Belmont Street, which is a lot appropriate for construction of a single family house, and Parcel R-59D2. a 3,500 square foot parcel at 41 Old Rutherford Avenue. To date, two individuals have expressed interest in the development of this parcel for a muitiple unit dwelling.

(continued from page one) the night. It was a nightmare."
Murphy said that architect Arthur Choo of the Arthur Choo Associates, who was retained by Murphy, has surveyed the site and believes that the house at 21 North Mead Street, Phillip and Ann Doherty's house next door, and the Saint Francis de Sales cemetery are seriously endangered by the erosion.
According to Murphy, the mud slide could have been avoided if the developer had properly shored up the hill after receiving a court order to do so on March 23. "It seems to me that they were trying to save a few extra thousand dollars and didn't put up the retaining wall in time," said Murphy
On March 23, Judge William Grabeau of the Suffolk Superior Court
ordered Cobblestone to halt all excavation work until it had properly addressed the erosion problem.
While maintaining that the Murrays' house was never endangered, French said the April 5 slide probably never would have occured if the court had not issued the temporary restraining order. According to French, the order held up construction during a critical period. If the Murrays hadn't gone to court, he said, the construction team could have taken ad vantage of the sunny weather and been able to properly buttress the hill.

The City's Inspectional Services Department has been monitoring the dispute since mid-March and has been receiving daily report been receiving daily reports on any movement of the house at 21 North Mead Street from the Harry R.

Feldman surveying company. Inspectional Services Commissioner William Sommers said there appeared to be very little immediate danger for the Murrays. However he added that if the Cobblestone Landing Company wants to continue construc tion, it must first convince the city that any future erosion has been completely checked.

Murphy and his clients, John and Richard Murray, are seeking a permanent halt to all excavation on the hill and a new design plan for the condominium complex subject to the Murrays' approval. "Basically, my clients don't want to be the first occupants of the Cobblestone Condominiums," said Murphy
The Murrays are also seeking $\$ 300,000$ in damages.

## Expansion Of Moran Terminal Planned By Massport For Schiavone Site

by Chris Nicastro In order to ease pressure on its overworked Moran container terminal, Massport plans to expand its operation into an adjacent site formerly occupied by the Schiavone scrap metal terminal.
By clearing out and paving over the 11 -acre site, Massport expects to be able to properly manage future growth in the port of Boston through 1995. Experts currently predict a four percent growth in business at the Moran Terminal over the next eight years.
-The capacity for Moran Terminal is really about 33,000 containers a year. Right now we're at 40 . 45,000 . When the Shiavone site became unexpectedly available, we, of course, took advantage of it," said Massport's Maritime Director Anne Aylward. The

Schiavone scrap terminal vacated its Charlestown site in 1985 while still under lease.
At a community meeting on Tuesday, April 14, Aylward said that the two year, $\$ 10-12$ million construction project would involve removing debris, grading, paving, fencing, and lighting the site. Towards the end of this expansion project. Massport plans to move the main entrance to the Moran Terminal from its present location to the east end of the facility allowing direct access from the bridge over the Little Mystic Channel

Robin Ellis, Massport's environmental analyst said that clean-up at the Schiavone terminal would also involve the removal of a small area of contaminated soil in the far corner of the site. The Department of

Environmental Quality Engineering (DEQE) has ordered Massport to clean-up the "hot-spot." The affected area is ten feet square and six inches deep. According to DEQE, the contamination is very minor.
During the peak construction period from midSeptember to December. 5,000 cubic yards of debriand fill will be removed per day, translating into 40 one-way truck trips per day through Charlestown. In light of the imminent Central Artery North Area project and the potential Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) transfer facility on Piers 48, 49 and 50 . Charlestown residents at the meeting said they were not thrilled with the prospect of more trucks travelling down Charlestown streets.

ncreasing truck traffic in Charlestown on Medford Street during the summer when the school children are on vacation," charged Moe Gillen of the Neighborhood Council. "What if anything, is Massport doing to expedite the truck route signs?'" he asked.
Aylward said that permanent truck route signs in Charlestown were long overdue. She, however cited the difficulty of coor cited the difficulty of coor dinating such sign posting: with the City and urged Gillen and other residents to petition the City for the signs.
"Look, we've got a mafor construction site on which we want to build. This is a lever that you ought to use to get the truck signs. This is an opportunity to get those signs, " said Alyward.
Charlestown resident Ed Johnson said that the truck traffic problem on Charlesfown streets is not as accute as many residents believe. According to Johnson, vir tually all of the trucks that ravel through Charlestown stay on the main roads

I don't see many trucks running through the town because someone doest ${ }^{\circ}$
know where he's going. Everyone's always concerned with where the trucks are going but for fifty, sixty years when the Navy Yard had 40-50,000 cars coming in and out, there was no major concern."
Aylward agreed. ${ }^{-1}$ I never met a trucker who wanted to take a tour of residential streets with a forty-foot trailer.

Neighborhood Council President John Tobin, following a line of questioning he had used at last week's MWRA meeting, urged Massport to consider using railway to transport some of the debris and fill out of Charlestown. According to Aylward, the rail option is simply too expensive to give serious consideration.
In concluding remarks. Aylward said she agreed with Charlestown resident Bob Wallace who believes that a deficient roadway infrastructure in Boston could jeopardize the city's future growth. With nearby ports in New Hampshire and New York. Aylward said that Boston must address its serious traftic problems before frustrated
shippers and truckers turn elsewhere.
Aylward also said that an increased emphasis on traffic problems has diverted time and energy away from other items on the Massport agenda. "It's gotten to the point where I have to go to public meetings to see members of the ILA and other business associates." Speaking on the bid by the MWRA to locate a transfer facility on Massport's Piers 48,49 and 50 in Charlestown, Aylward said she sees some real problems with the MWRA plan. Aylward said that with all of the other projects being planned for Charlestown, the MWRA would have to come up with a thorough traffic analysis ('with 1987 numbers'") before leasing out the piers.
"It's really hard for me to believe that this is the ideal point for the facility," said Aylward. "There are two choke points into the peninsula and one is going to be cut off with the City Square project. I am not about to let the MWRA choke this terminal (Moran) because of Dee Island.

## The Bicentennial Of The

United States
Constitution


Two centuries ago, in May 1787, representatives of the American States convened in Philadelphia to revise the Articles of Confederation. On September 17, they completed work on a new national Constitution - a document that laid the foundation for a truly democratic society, establishing a federal government of the people, by the people and for the people. The events leading to the establishment of the Constitution that took place during this week two hundred years ago were
April 16, 1787 - William Blount was chosen to represent North Carolina at the Philadelphia Constitutional Convention.
April 17, 1787 - The New York House of Assembly went to committee on the bill to repeal all laws or parts of laws inconsistent with the treaty of peace. April 18, 1787-James Madison suggested in Congress that to facilitate reaching an agreement with Spain on navigation of the Mississippi River. Thomas Jefferson should proceed to Madrid to replace John Jay.
April 19, 1787 - "Plato" pointed out in the U.S. Chronicle that the people were divided into two great classes: the holders of public securities and those who held few or none whose interest was discharging the public debt in the easiest manner possible.
April 20, 1787 - An editorial from Portsmouth, Massachusetts in The New Hampshire Spy predicted Franklin's and Washington's presence at the Convention would win over the ' ... narrow-souled, antifederal politicians, who have hitherto damned us as a nation.

## Congressman Kennedy Endorses Mystic River Plan

United States Representative Joseph P. Kennedy II this week announced his endorsement of the Flatley Company proposal to revitalize the Mystic River waterfront area adjacent to the Schrafft High Tech Center in Charlestown.
In a letter to Colonel Thomas A. Rhen, Division Engineer of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Congressman Kennedy urged final approval of the plan and endorsed the proposed construction of new park ing facilities on river tide lands abutting the Center and the Ryan Playground.

The plan also calls for developing the area as a new community recreation site. If approved, the Flatley Company will oversee construction of a public waterfront park, boat launching ramp, water taxi terminal and a community sailing club.
'I believe the revitalization plan presented by the Flatley Company represents an attractive, new use of what is now a rubbishstrewn, highly polluted stretch of the Mystic River," said the Congressman. Kennedy says he likes the plan because it will diminish the demands for onstreet parking in the residential areas surrounding The Schrafft Center. He also feels the improvements and additions to the waterfront will draw new businesses to the Center which, in turn, will lead to additional employment opportunities for local residents.
The Congressman joins other prominent local officials, including former Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., State Representative Richard Voke and Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini in supporting the plan.
