April 1st - D-Day For Reilly's Garage

Al Reilly of Charlestown has operated Reilly's Garage on Mishawum Street since 1980. He knew when he moved into the former Brady's Auto Repair that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) was planning to take the building by eminent domain in the future, for the purpose of expanding and changing the angle of Mishawum Street. In 1980, the future seemed so far away. However, the future is here now. On April 1st, Reilly must close his doors.

Reilly is not bitter about the BRA's eviction notice. He is, however, angry that no effort has been made by the Authority to help local businessmen, like himself, stay in Charlestown. "I guess you have to be in the right circles to do anything in this town. I have no beef there. It's just that I have been trying to get something out of the BRA since 1970. I'm the last. They're taking out every small business in Charlestown," stated Reilly.

According to Reilly, all he

wants is a place to build another Reilly's Garage, if the BRA must take the Mishawum address. "This place used to be Brady's Auto Repair. Before that, it was Brady's Blacksmith. Bob Brady built this place with his father around the turn of the century. They used to shoe horses here. There are still rings on the floor where they used to tie the horses."

As Reilly recalls, "When Bob came back from the war (World War I), where he was stationed in France as a blacksmith, people weren't using horses much. They were driving the old Model Ts. So he bought the place from his father. That was in 1915 and he was here until he died

Reilly's eviction notice is not the first one received at the Mishawum shop. In 1965, Bob Brady was told the building was being taken by the BRA under its Urban Renewal Plan, which took much of the surrounding neighborhood. Before Al Reilly became the proprietor of the garage, he used to

work with Bob Brady. "Bob used to tell me he remembered what this place looked like before they built Schrafft's, even before they filled in the land to build Schrafft's. He said you could see the bows of the ships from here.

Reilly's Garage is the first business venture Al Reilly has undertaken. "Since 1980, I've been on my own. I used to be at Baldwin Street. I left in 1972. Then I used to do some body work for people here and there. I used to come down here and help the old man (Bob Brady). Now, my son Bob works with me," tells Reilly. "This place has been in service to the community since the turn of the century. Why they (the BRA) are doing this, I don't have the slightest idea. It doesn't make much sense.

The plans are to reconstruct Main and Warren Streets from City Square to Sullivan Square. Some of the smaller side streets in between will also be renovated. (continued on page five)

Winthrop Street Triple Deckers Scene Of Four Alarm Fire

Two triple deckers at 3 to 5 Winthrop Street (between Main and Warren Streets) were heavily damaged by a four alarm fire on Tuesday, March 4th. These buildings. which were not occupied. are scheduled to be renovated as part of the Tontine Crescent development now underway in the Warren, Main, Winthrop, Park, and Henley Street area.

According to a Boston Fire Department spokesman, the engines first responded at 12:45 a.m., reporting a working fire at that location at 12:48 a.m. The second alarm was sounded at 12:49 a.m., the third at 1:01 a.m. and the fourth at 1:08 a.m. The all out was signaled at 4:27 a.m.

The cause of the fire is being investigated by the Arson Squad of the Boston Fire Department.

Jim Adams, developer of the parcel, stated that the fire

Where Is Your Sense Of Neighborhood? Dear Editor,

I could not allow the letter of Mr. Kuttner in the February 27th issue of the Patriot, regarding the proposed sludge tansfer sites in Charlestown, to go without comment.

What disturbs me is not the fact that Mr. Kuttner does not find the proposed plant offensive and seems to feel that it is a viable use of Charlestown waterfront property - this is obviously his right. What does disturb me is the failure of Mr. Kuttner to consider the town as a whole and support the residents who live in the vicinity of these proposed sites and oppose having such a facility, with the resulting increase in traffic and potential emission problems, across from their

The town united to oppose the closing of the Winthrop Street Fire House several years ago, so that fire protection would be more readily available to the congested area surrounding the Monument and Training Field (including Soley Street). The closing of this station would have had very little effect on the "Top of the Hill" and yet residents of this area actively joined the protest for the good of the whole.

In 1984, residents throughout the town again united in opposition to an asphalt plant proposed for the City Square area. Again, this plant would have had little effect on the portion of the town toward Sullivan Square and yet these residents joined their City Square area neighbors to fight this proposal.

Where is your sense of neighborhood, Mr. Kuttner? Where is your support of fellow residents, whether they live on Soley or Sackville Streets? Charlestown has waged many wars since the infamous day of June 17, 1775 — it has survived, in many instances, only by the caring and support of one neighbor for another. Let us hope that this current battle is not lost because residents in one section of the town don't care what happens to their neighbors in another area.

The Bunker Hill Monument and Charlestown Navy Yard units of Boston National Historical Park attract more than 500,000 visitors annually. In recent years, we have worked with the Charlestown community on numerous projects to make the area safer and more pleasant for visitors and residents alike. A solid waste facility appears to be incompatible with this goal. Such a facility may result in undesirable noise, truck traffic, or public health hazards; or other environmental impacts inappropriate to the existing Charlestown environment.



April 1st - D-Day For Reilly's Garage

(continued from page one)

Mishawum Street is one of them. Reilly explains the plan is to not only widen Mishawum Street, but also to change the angle from the present perpendicular intersection with Main Street, directly across from Medford Street, to a new intersection that will occur at a 45 degree angle towards Sullivan Square, in front of the fire station.

"I think it's confusing because you have a fire station here across from where they want to put this street. You'll have trucks coming from Medford Street past the fire station, trying to take a left onto the new Mishawum Street. If there's ever a fire, the engines won't be able to get by," stated Reilly.

While Reilly says he does not understand the reasoning behind the proposed change for Mishawum Street, he has accepted it. He does, however, want to secure a new home for his business. "I'd be satisfied with a piece of land. Let me build a new place and let the BRA leave me alone ... Maybe somewhere along Rutherford Avenue or under 1-93," began Reilly, "If they're going to move one corner of Mishawum Street to the other side, let me put a place on

the new corner. They say they're going to put grass there, which will only turn into state-owned weeds. I've tried to talk to the BRA, but it's like trying to talk to that

pole over there. In past conversations with the BRA, different members of the Authority have told him they would try to help him, but Reilly says nothing has ever come from these conversations. "They're afraid to say yes. They're afraid to say no. And when they do talk, it's double talk. Needless to say, I'm not happy with the BRA.'

Last month, Reilly received his 30 day notice from the BRA. "Last Spring when they gave me a 30 day notice, I talked to the BRA and they said, 'Al, stay until the bulldozers come.' This time, it's D-day. They're moving on it this time."

When Reilly asked the BRA if there was any available parcels in Charlestown where the garage could move to, Reilly says, "I got a flat, blank 'no.' Unfortunately, if there is nothing in this town, I'll have to fold up my operation. I can't move out of town. It doesn't do much good to take a neighborhood service out of town. I don't want a mother to take her kids on a bus to get to me. Here in Charlestown, they can at least drop off their cars and pick them up later. or I can come to them."

What will Al Reilly do come April 1st? "I don't know," answered Reilly, "Right now, we're just trying to finish up what we have and still make a week's pay. You know, April 1st isn't





F.A.D. - FACTS ABOUT DRUGS

Before we are too hard on our drug using teenagers, we might first consider how we as adults use, misuse or abuse drugs. List the drugs we commonly use - caffeine, nicotine, alcohol, aspirin, tranquilizers - and ask ourselves the following questions: Would I quit using them if they were declared illegal? Do I drink coffee because I like the flavor or because I need it to get moving in the morning? Do I smoke because my nerves are in tatters? Do I take an aspirin at the slightest suggestion of pain? How often and for what reasons do I drink alcohol? Do I use pep pills for extra energy? Do I rely on barbiturates to get to sleep? or tranquilizers?

Our influence on our children is more what we do than what we say. There are many parents who will not talk to their children about drugs because they are unconsciously afraid that their own use will come up in the conversation. To become a 'learner' in this area is better than being a 'dictator'. And when we become partners with our children, it promotes honesty and

Peer influence soon takes over, but parental influence has lasting effects. Education about drugs cannot be separated from education for living. What knowledge and skills are necessary to drug education? First, there is a need for correct information. But information is only one part of education. Knowing the outcome of taking LSD won't stop the user who loves danger

Education must show how it is possible to make changes in spite of social conditions. Some conditions we live in are grim. But the skill of knowing you are responsible for your behavior and not blaming persons, places or things can be learned.

Gradually teaching children to make decisions and letting them live by the results is very important and another skill to be learned.



State Treasurer Seeks To Return \$13 Million In Unclaimed Funds

State Treasurer Robert Q Crane has released the names of 26,000 Massachusetts businesses and individuals who are due a \$13 million windfall from abandoned accounts.

Under the state's Unclaimed Money Law, bank accounts, insurance proceeds, uncashed gift certificates, payroll checks, customer overpayments and the like that have gone untouched for at least five years are considered by the state to be abandoned. All such accounts must be reported to the Treasurer, who then attempts to notify the rightful owners or their heirs.

Crane said compliance with the law is improving. "However, there are still

numerous instances where funds should have been returned directly, such as in the case of Boston Edison Company, General Electric, the New England Patriots, and United Airlines," the Treasurer said.

Treasurer Crane noted one important aspect of the Unclaimed Money Law requires that until claimed, all funds are kept in the state's General Fund where they are invested for the benefit of all residents and taxpayers here in Massachusetts.

Is An IRA Right For You?

During the tax season, many people consider contributing to an Individual Retirement Account as part of an overall financial plan. Since there are so many exciting investment options available, we are constantly being asked questions regarding tax and investment advantages. Your IRA is not, in itself, an investment. It is not an investment product. Rather, it is a simple plan that allows you to take advantage of immediate tax benefits while it helps you accumulate money over a period of time for retirement. As a wage earner, you are probably eligible for an IRA even if you are covered by another retirement plan. Nearly 40 million people in the U.S. have opened IRAs since 1982, when Congress allowed financial institutions to offer them to wage earners. And as the money in the accounts begins to accumulate, many investors are looking for ways to make the most of their "nest eggs".

Investment options vary widely ... mutual funds, certificates, limited partnerships, stocks, bonds, annuities, and money market accounts can be used to fund IRAs. Of course, what you choose depends on your long-term financial objectives.

We have included a few IRA "ABCs":

- Anyone who gets a paycheck can put up to \$2,000 a year into an IRA. For a one wage earner couple, the maximum is \$2,250
- The contribution is deductible from taxable income, and all earnings accumulate tax deferred until they are withdrawn.
- Regardless of when you file your 1985 return, you have until April 15 to contribute to your IRA and claim the deduction. Many IRA holders file early and use their tax refund to make their IRA contributions.
- Any money you take out of the IRA before reaching age 59½ or becoming disabled is hit with a 10 percent penalty.
 Also, you must begin withdrawing money by age 70½ or face a penalty.
- You can open any number of IRAs as long as the total annual contribution doesn't exceed \$2,000 (or \$2,250 for one income couples). For example, your IRA investments could include \$1,000 in a certificate of deposit. \$500 in a mutual fund of \$500 in stocks, all in the same year.
- You can move your money among investments as long as you have the investment trustees or custodians handle the transactions. You can take possession of the money for 60 days and move it, but you must wait 12 months before doing it again.
- You don't have to make a contribution every year or make the full \$2,000 contribution each year. Many IRAs can be opened for as little as \$50 and allow payments to be made throughout the year. Keep in mind, though, that regular investments add up.

It's important to understand exactly what an IRA is and how it can work for you. The main idea is to establish an IRA that is best for you — and then make the most of your IRA money.

Free Flu Shots Still Available

The flu season has started in Boston. But it is not too late to get protection. Boston's Department of Health and Hospitals still has influenza vaccine available for high risk individuals. Elderly or chronically ill city residents can receive a free flu shot as part of Health and Hospitals' continuing preventive health program. Since last October, the department has distributed 37,000 doses of the influenza vaccine through neighborhood health centers and other community health facilities and hospitals.

For most people influenza is not a serious illness. However, Health and Hospitals does recommend immunization for those high risk individuals most vulnerable to the effects (including pneumonia) of influenza. Individuals at high risk are:

- those over age sixty-five

- those of any age with chronic illness, such as heart disease, respiratory problems, diabetes, or kidney disease

and those confined to rest, nursing or convalescent

The influenza vaccine is a safe and effective means of preventing serious illness. The vaccine is available at neighborhood health centers throughout the city. Individuals not already ill with the flu are encouraged to get a flu shot now. Contact the Bunker Hill Health Center at 242-5700 for more information
