


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
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

# Conway Re-Elected Legion State Vice Commander

James W. Conway, Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post American Legion was recently re-elected a Vice Commander of the Department of Massachusetts, American

The election was held at the 61st Annual State Legion Convention in Springfield, Mass. by delegates representing the 70,000 members of the Legion in Massachusetts.

There are five State Vice Commanders elected annually at large in an election process similar to that used for the Boston City Council.

Department Vice Commander Conway, a 26 year member of the Bunker Hill Post, has served

three terms as its Commander, is a Past Commander of Suffolk County District 7, and Past Department Historian.

The other Vice Commanders are Dorothy Dickson of Norwell, John "Spider" Smith of Orange, William Smith of Worcester, and Henry "Romey" Troville of Somerville.

James H. Denver of Springfield was elected Department Commander in a three-man race.

Jim Conway was the first member of the Bunker Hill Post which was founded in 1919, to ever have been elected to the high office of State Vice Commander.

Since the convention, Bunker Hill Post has been singularly honored by State Commander

Denver with the appointment of Past Commander H. Vincent Strout as Department Assistant Judge Advocate.

Three members of Post 26 have also received important appointments from Commander Denver.

Jim Conway was appointed Director of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Division and Chairman of its Rehab sub-division. He was also reappointed, for his fourth consecutive term, as Chairman and Editor of the state newspaper, the Massachusetts Legionnaire, which is published nine times a year and mailed to the Legion's 70,000 members.

Past Post 26 Commander Arthur L. Hurley was appointed Chairman of the Death Claims and Insurance Committee.

Past Commander H. Vincent Strout was appointed Director of

the Internal Affairs Division and Chairman, of its sub-division, Constitution and By-laws.

Other state officers elected were Adjutant - John P. Swift of West Roxbury, Treasurer -Edward Norcott of Hanover, Historian - William Donahue of Lynn, Chaplain - Rev. Gerald Milliken of Saugus, Committee Woman - At - Large - Evelyn Lamb of Hyde Park.

Also elected were National Executive Committeeman Robert W. Groccia of Oxford and Alternate National Executive Committeeman John P. "Jake" Comer of Quincy.

Jim Conway, in a note of thanks to convention delegates for their support, has announced that he is a candidate for the high office of Department Commander at the 1980 Convention to be held in Pittsfield next June.





Water Streets and for a new bridge over the Little Mystic Channel near Moran Terminal. The plans are nearing completion and they will be the subject of a public hearing in Charlestown in the fall. This is the third in a series of articles prepared to inform citizens about the project before community meetings and the public hearing. Previous articles have discussed the plans for Gates 4 and 5 and the Little Mystic Channel bridge. This article deals with the proposed improvements around Gate 1.

Gate 1 has historically been the principal entrance into the Navy Yard, and it will remain a major Historical Park is completed. The gateway will be designed to reflect the historic character of the park. New granite paving,

gateway when the new National granite posts, street lighting and landscaping will be added to make this entrance more attractive. The sketch shows these improvements. A bus drop-off area will be constructed in front of the gate for tour buses, and a bus parking area will be built

across Water Street from Gate 1 on land owned by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works. Crosswalks for pedestrians will be built across Water Street near the Pavilion to the bus parking lot and from there to the existing pedestrian underpass near Gray Street, as shown on the map.

Before the Chelsea-Water


project is constructed, vehicles will continue to use Gate 1, as they do now. Once the project is completed, Gate 1 will be just for pedestrians, with vehicles using it only in emergencies. Gate 2 will be kept closed as it is today, but access through it will be possible in emergencies. As described in previous articles, Gate 4 will serve both pedestrians and vehicles and it will be an important point of access to the park for local residents. Gate 5 will serve mainly vehicles, but pedestrians will also be able to

New ramps will be built from the Central Artery northbound into the Water-Chelsea connector (see map). One ramp will lead north along the edge of the Tobin Bridge approaches. There will be a new traffic signal where the ramp meets the Water-Chelsea connector at the corner of the Navy Yard. The second ramp will

curve around in front of Gate 1 to join Water Street southbound. It will replace the existing ramp with a safer one. A new pedestrian light will be installed at the crosswalk near the Pavilion.

In the proposed plan, Water and Chelsea Streets will be connected. This calls for construction of the roadway through a corner of the National Park. The construction requires that about 400 linear feet of the historic granite wall around the Navy Yard be relocated into the National Park. Moving the wall is an integral part of the project, and the process is being supervised by the National Park Service to be sure that the wall's appearance after construction is historically accurate and visually pleasing. The area inside the Navy Yard which will be affected by moving the wall in will be landscaped in keeping with the historic character of the national

If you have comments or questions about any part of the Chelsea-Water project or if you would like to see the plans in person, you can contact Dick McAllister at BRA, Boston City Hall, Boston 02201, telephone 722-4300. The next and final article in this series will summarize the total plan for the connector and the Little Mystic Channel bridge. Related projects and issues will also be reviewed in that article and citizens will be given information on opportunities for participation in meetings and the public hearing.

# MBTA Takes Additional Steps To Assure Safety On Orange Line

MBTA Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Robert L. Foster today in a letter to DPU Commissioner Doris Pote, pledged a stepped-up cooperative effort between the MBTA and the DPU regarding safety conditions on the Orange Line.

"The safety of the public is the first consideration of both our agencies and I am sure that, within that constraint, an effective plan for interdepartmental communication and joint implementation of speed restrictions can be mutually agreed upon," Foster said.

"The Operations Directorate at the MBTA has taken steps to assure that the utmost safety precautions are carried out in regard to service on the Orange Line," Foster added.

"A monthly recap bulletin will be issued by the Chief Engineer to the Transportation Department describing all temporary slow orders in effect by location, and posted speed, including any special instructions which may be necessary," Foster stated.

## Nomination Papers For Election To Ward Committee Available

Chairman of the Massachusetts
Democratic State Committee
Chester G. Atkins announced
today that nomination papers for
election to local ward, committees are now available. The
election takes place on March 4,
1980 - the day of the
Massachusetts presidential
primary.

"We are going to be working between now and the March election to encourage active Democrats to seek a spot on their local committee," Atkins said. "We hope that those who have worked hard in the past will continue to serve and help us bring in some new faces."

Ward committee members serve four year terms as local officials of the Democratic Party. Each local committee has the option of setting its membership between 3 and 35 members. There are 609 local committees in the Commonwealth.

"The state-wide debate over the proposed party charter has activated local Democrats," Atkins said. "It has stimulated a new awareness of the party.

"We have one of the most influential Congressional delegations in Washington. We hold every important state-wide office, and we dominate the legislature.

"The nation's attention is focusing on Massachusetts attitudes as the presidential primary season approaches. We are in a unique position to affect policy on the local and national level. It is a very good time to get involved in the party."

The important dates in the process are as follows: August 7, 1979 - Nomination papers available from State Committee, Secretary of State, and local city and town clerks. November 9, 1979 - Deadline for filing nomination papers with local registrar (5:00 p.m.). November 20, 1979 - Deadline for filing nomination papers with Secretary of State (5:00 p.m.) March 4, 1980-Election of local committee

Local committee nomination papers allow for the formation of slates. Slates have an advantage over individual candidates

because by law a slate appears first on the ballot.

If no notification of selected membership size of a local committee is received by the Secretary of State by October 16, 1979, then 10 members will be assigned to the local committee by the Secretary of State.

Those wishing nomination papers or further information should contact Moe Cunningham at the Democratic State Committee, Room 317, 11 Beacon Street, Boston, 02108. Nomination papers are also available through the Election Division of the Secretary of States's office.

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
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

REMEMBER A WHILE BACK HOW I TOLD YOU ABOUT A POLITICAL RALLY I ATTENDED at the white church in Dorchester's Codman Square which was struck by lightning seconds after a candidate told the audience "if I'm not the best City Councillor this town has ever had, may God strike me dead?"

Well Dick McBrine, who came from that area, says he also recalls that incident and he adds one of his own. According to Dick a few days after the rally another storm struck during Sunday services. The storm was a beauty and the pinging of hail could be distinctly heard over the music while the collection was being taken.

It became so disconcerting that when the organ was stilled the minister said to the congregation "that sounds like hail."

The organist, thinking he was referring to this selection, quit on the spot.

West Roxbury's Harold Kenny, one of City Hall's best, asked me how I managed to review three or four books a week. When I explained I took a course in speedreading at Curry College, he still wagged his head in incredulity.

All of which reminds me about the time Groucho Marx wrote a puff piece for a book by S.J. Perlman: "From the moment I picked it up I was convulsed with

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laughter. Some day I may read it "

Three Laurel-Leaf books were published this summer which my kids are delighted to recommend to your kids.

The first is titled "The 290" and in it Hans Christian Andersen Medal Winner author Scott Dell tells a tale of high intrigue on the high seas. "The 290" is an exciting story of a ship of the same name, built in secret for the Confederate Navy by the English. Adventure abounds in this one.

Briefly it's about Dan Chadwick, 13, who thinks the isolated farm he's on in a Maine valley is perfect and serene. The peace ends abruptly, however, when a nearby derelict farm known as "High Kingdom" is rented to a commune of "hippies." Adults will enjoy this one, also.

If your child is 12 or older another book that should grab his or her immediate interest is "Deadline" by Kathleen A. Begley, a gal who knew she wanted to be a reporter ever since her third grade teacher pinned a story of her visit to the circus on the bulletinboard.

That tiny bit of attention was to pave the way to a fulfilling career and Kathleen tells the story of how she became a reporter, starting as a summer copygirl to her present assignment with the Chicago Daily News.

And before we leave The City Scene "small folks" library leave us not forget two "Raggedy Ann" books published for readers six to nine years old. "Raggedy Ann in the Magic Book" has Ann and Andy strolling in the Deep, Deep Woods when they meet a Fuzzy wump. The other is "Raggedy Ann's Wishing Pebble" and author Johnny Gruelle has Ann getting the pebble but also the business from mean, selfish Mr. Minky who is jealous of the stone.

A while back I promised you some tips on where to dine when you're down Cape Cod way before Labor Day, so let's begin:

The Captain William House in Dennisport has a memorable Sunday champagne brunch featuring fluffy omelettes, eggs Florentine or Benedict and delectable crepes.

If you want to lunch out but not get knocked out financially in the process, try The Charlies Restaurant in Hyannis. There you can have the soup of the day, plus a 16 ounce serving of Michelob and your choice of tuna, chicken salad, ham, hamburger or turkey sandwich, all for \$3.

Another reasonable eatery is the "200 Mile Limit" in South Yarmouth. There for \$4.95 you can savor a complete scallop dinner. If money is no object then do try one of my favorite spots, The Barnstable House on Route 6 A, Barnstable. Everything is outstanding, so's the price.

There are also some great buys for those in the know, such as the Hyannis Elks Fish Fry on Fridays, where the menu and the price vary, but where the food is super and the price right. Another grand take-in is the old fashioned bean supper the First Baptist Church in Hyannis has from time to time. Adults pay \$2.75; children \$1.50.

If you're staying home this weekend, but still want the finest in foods, you need only travel to Dorchester to Blinstrub's Old Colony House Restaurant on Morrissey Boulevard.

This is a five star restaurant, serving some of the best fillet mignon and fresh fish and shellfish this side of Paris. The price is right, the atmosphere a delight and I'll meet you in the lounge.
