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ey team, is one of six former Terrier greats who will be inducted into the Boston University Hall of Fame. The 28th Annual Hall of Fame Banquet will be held Saturday evening, May 31, 1986 in the George Sherman

Jack O'Callahan, graduating in 1979 with a degree in history, enjoyed a fine career as a defenseman on the Terrier hockey team.

By far, his best season was his junior year when he helped the Terriers to a 30-2 record and the championship in the NCAA, ECAC and Beanpot Tournaments. Scoring eight goals and 47 assists, O'Callahan reaped a bundle of individual awards. In addition to being named most valuable player of the Terriers, O'Callahan was the MVP of the Beanpot and of the NCAA Tournament, where he tied a tournament record with six assists. He was also named first team All-East and All-New

Currently playing for the Chicago Blackhawks in the NHL, O'Callahan captained the Terriers his senior year and was named All-America and All-East. He also became the first player in Terrier hockey history to be named MVP twice.

O'Callahan is also the only athlete to receive the Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane Award as the University's top male athlete twice. He won that honor his junior and senior years.


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# Affordable Housing Proposal To Be Presented At Public Meeting

Charlestown residents will have an opportunity to review a proposal for affordable housing in Sullivan Square at a community meeting to be held tonight (Thursday, May 8th) at 7:00 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill

The proposal by the Brick-

layers and Laborers Non-Profit Housing Corporation, calls for brick townhouses to be constructed and sold for approximately \$75,000 on the BRA-owned site at the corner of Main and Bunker Hill Streets.

According to Tom McIntyre of the Bricklayer's Union, the group wants sugges-

tions from Charlestown residents in order to make the houses fit into the site and the neighborhood. At this meeting, McIntyre and William Rawn, the architect, will discuss their design, site plan, and other features of the development. BRA staff will also be on hand to answer questions.

# BRA Board Questions Community Support

# Immobiliare-Congress Tentative Developer

Local community groups had a hard time convincing the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board at its Thursday, May 1st meeting, that they had nothing but the purest of intentions when the three groups endorsed the Myerson/Allen and Company proposal to renovate Building 105 in the Charlestown Navy Yard over the BRA staff's preference the Immobiliare-Congress Venture.

The three groups; the Charlestown Preservation Society, the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation (EDC), and the Charlestown Merchants Association, forwarded a joint letter of support to the Board dated April 28th in support of the Myerson/Allen team because, as the letter stated, this team best met the criteria set forth by both the BRA and the National Park Services. BRA Board Chairman, Robert Farrell, however, stated he felt uncomfortable receiving this endorsement because he felt the groups, for one, did not represent a wide enough community base, and second, two of the organizations had ties to the Myerson/Allen group.

This was the second time the question of who would receive tentative designation of Building 105 has come

before the BRA Board. On Thursday, April 17th, the BRA staff and Director Stephen Coyle had recommended to the Board that Immobiliare-Congress Venture receive the designation. At that time, the Board voted to table their decision since there was opposition from community groups to the recommendation.

During the two week interim between Board meetings, members of the three Charlestown organizations met with the two development teams on Wednesday. April 23rd at the Mary Colbert Apartments. After reviewing both proposals again, the members of the three groups drafted a letter dated Monday, April 28th. to the BRA Board reaffirming their support for the Myerson/Allen and Company proposal.

At the May 1st Board meeting, BRA Director Stephen Coyle submitted a letter to the Board supporting Myerson/Allen. Originally, Coyle had agreed with his

statt that Immobiliare-Congress Venture be named the developer. According to Coyle's letter, which was read by Farrell, this switch in support was the result of a suggestion by Mayor Ray Flynn that the community benefits from the Myerson/ Allen were greater than those of Immobiliare-Congress, even though "each team equally qualify" for the designation.

Farrell questioned EDC President Thomas Cunha on an agreement between the Myerson/Allen and Company and the EDC which stated that if the developer received the tentative designation for Building 105, they would donate \$57,000 in monies and "in kind" services to the EDC. Farrell asked Cunha what the EDC was and how were they planning to use the money.

Cunha told the Board that the EDC is an elected group of Charlestown residents who work to secure affor-

#### HOME INSPECTION CONTINGENCIES

Today, many offers to purchase homes have a contingency allowing the buyers some time to get a home inspector or some other structural expert to go through the property. If something turns up that the buyers don't like, they can back out of the agreement without losing their earnest money deposit. While these contingencies make sellers a little nervous, they're a good idea.

The time period is negotiable, and in most parts of the country the buyers have about a week. During this period, the buyer can usually cancel the contract for almost any reason by stating that the structural report was not satisfactory. A couple with terminal buyers' remorse, for example, can cite some minor defect — and every house has at least one - as a reason to withdraw the offer.

There's a positive side, however. Often knowing they have a brief cooling off period will encourage buyers who would not otherwise make an offer to take the plunge, and the vast majority of these people will go ahead with the purchase. Also, the inspector usually addresses and overcomes misgivings, and confirms their decision to move ahead with the purchase.

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# Bunker Hill Monument Association Recipient of Artifacts From The Battle Of Bunker Hill

Major and Mrs. Martin A. Gibbs of Chippenham-Wiltshire, England were guests of the Bunker Hill Monument Association at an event at which Major Gibbs recalled the involvement of his ancestor, Sir Thomas Hyde Page, who served with the British forces, at the Battle of Bunker Hill. The evening at the Hull Room in the Charlestown Navy Yard included presentations by Gibbs to the Association of various photographic copies of a painting, plans and maps, and a letter, all relavant to the American Revolution from the British perspective.

President of the Association, James W. Conway, introduced Major Gibbs, who related the history of Thomas Hyde Page. Gibbs began by stating that his great, great, great, grandfather, Thomas Hyde Page, was of comparatively humble origins, but was well educated in London. Gibbs said that he "must have had a mathematical bent as he was selected by the Master General of the Ordinance, who the king put in charge of ammunitions, guns and forts, to join the Corps of Royal Engineers, a military body of officers and troops put in charge of the fortifications of the country. When the army went abroad to fight, the Corps went with the troops where they threw up the redoubts, dug trenches, sighted guns and did technical work, which is still done today by the Royal Engineers.

Gibbs went on to say that Page went to the Royal Military Academy, where he was the top cadet and, as such, received a gold medal from King George III.

According to Gibbs, "Page appeared in Boston at the start of the Revolutionary War and was one of the engineers who was in charge of the guns."

Page served as Aide-de-Camp for British General Pigott, who was commanding part of the British Army at the Battle of Bunker Hill. According to Gibbs, "Page was wounded quite badly in the foot in the Battle of Bunker Hill. From Charlestown, he was taken back to Boston, where his foot was amputated and he was sent back to England after only 11 days in this country.

"When Page arrived in England, he was no good as an officer on the active list, so he transferred himself to the Invalid Corps of the Royal Engineers. The Corps dug wells, put up forts, surveyed the whole of the eastern coast of England as it faces France and Holland (as England was permanently at war with France in those days, sometimes more at war than at other times) and they protected the country from privateers and encroachers. Page made a name for himself doing that and he became so famous that the King made him a Knight - Sir Thomas Hyde Page, and he became a member of an institution called the Royal Society, which was made up of prominent scientists and astronomers, people such as Sir Christopher Wrenn, and they used to meet monthly to discuss things that were of interest at that time."

Major Gibbs then proceeded to explain the photographic reproductions that he was presenting to the Monument Association. The first presentation was a color photograph of Sir Thomas Hyde Page reproduced from a portrait that hangs in the Manor owned by Gibbs.

Gibbs, in presenting the Association with maps of Charlestown, the plan of the redoubt on the hill, and the plan of the general area of Boston, explained that it was the duty of the Master of the Ordinance to be in charge of the guns, but they needed maps to know where to sight the guns.

Gibbs stated that he would assume that Page took the plans of Charlestown with the area names, from maps already in existence, but the plan of the redoubt on the top of the hill was his original.

Gibbs said that the original plans and maps of Page are in the Institute of Royal Engineers in Chatham, in Kent, England, which is the repository for all military, engineering, and historical plans. Gibbs noted that a plan of the redoubt was sent with a letter by Page to his mother in England the day after the Battle.

Gibbs also displayed several artifacts from their family home, including a leather covered water bottle carried by Page at Bunker Hill.

Elsie Gibbs then explained to the gathering how these presentations came to be made to the Association, stating that their home. Shelton Manor, which was built in 1282, is open to the public. On display in the library of the Manor is a collection of Bunker Hill memorabilia and during a visit to the Manor, a retired Bishop from Massachusetts suggested that the Gibbs contact the Monument Association. Thus their visit to the United States provided an opportunity for them to present copies of some of the memorabilia on display, to the Associaiton.

Mrs. Gibbs extended an invitation for members to visit their Manor, if they are ever touring England.

In appreciation to the Gibbs for their donations to the Association, citations and gifts were presented to the couple from city and state officials and they were awarded memberships in the Bunker Hill Monument Association.

The event concluded with a slide presentation and talk by Barbara Thibault, Site Interpreter for the Public Archaeology Laboratory, on the excavation of the foundation of The Great House in City Square.

The organization has been active since 1977 and was responsible for the reconstruction of the former Harvard School on Devens Street into the Mary Colbert Apartments, a HUD subsidized elderly housing facility. The group currently has a proposal before the BRA to construct affordable housing units on the BRA Land Parcel C2-A, which is located between Main Street and Rutherford Avenue, and had asked two of the original five

development teams who submitted proposals on Building 105, the Housing Associates and Myerson/Allen, both of whom have housing expertise, to provide "in kind" help to the EDC. Cunha stated only Myerson/Allen offered the EDC financial assistance, but "by no means, at anytime, were we going to sell the EDC name for money.'







# Cobblestones —

# A Link To Charlestown's Past

As any longtime resident remembers, the streets of Charlestown are lined, not with gold as their ancestors believed when they first arrived from all corners of the globe, but with cobblestones dating back perhaps to the eighteenth century when Charlestown was rebuilt after the Battle of Bunker Hill. Under nearly every street, avenue and pathway of Charlestown lie an intricately woven pattern of cobblestones covered by layers and layers of "modern highway" and not until, in the dead of winter, when your car hits a pot hole the size of lake Erie do you even think of these stones, which now become visible under the front end of your vehicle.

The reconstruction of Main and Warren Streets now underway has brought to the minds of many area residents the excavation of cobblestones and concern about their disposition, once they are removed from their historic roadways. One local "historian" stated, "What will happen to these stones once they are removed? After all, the streets now being excavated were, and still are, the main thoroughfare between Boston and points north. Much of the town's history took place on these streets - from the horse and buggy days to that of the trolley cars my parents traveled on, not to mention the overhead elevated structure that blighted the town for so many years. I would hate to see those cobblestones removed and just dumped in a vacant lot somewhere or worse yet, be used to build some ornate fence around a home in Wellesley Hills!"

According to a spokesman for Baker and Company, the firm doing the reconstruction work on Main and Warren Streets, "after excavating the cobblestones, they are transported to a Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) site and are under the control of the Charlestown Preservation Society.

John Tobin, Acting President of the Charlestown Preservation Society, confirmed that "in the contract between Baker and Company and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, it is mentioned that the cobblestones will be disposed of under the supervision of the Society." He explained that the Society is 'only interested in selecting large, unique stones to be used within Charlestown, particularly in the Thompson Square area reconstruction."

Jim English, Project Director for Charlestown for the BRA, stated that over one million cobblestones might be involved in the excavation of Main and Warren Streets. The BRA's involvement only consists of supplying a site within the immediate area to service the contractor and the Preservation Society, he said. "The BRA is not gaining anything," English stated, "but hopefully, good will.'

What will happen to all these cobblestones? After the Charlestown Preservation Society selects the exact stones they feel are needed for future development areas in Charlestown, and this is estimated to be around 10,000 cobblestones in total, the Department of Public Works of the City of Boston will transport the remaining stones to a DPW lot where the Purchasing Department will hold a public bidding process and sell off the stones to the highest bidder and thus provide revenue for





# FACTS ABOUT DRUGS - F.A.D

I have just returned from the funeral of a 24 year old man who committed suicide by hanging himself. The sadness of this act, the devastation of his family, the alarm and grief of the community is almost unbearable. I ask myself questions — many, many questions. Could I have said something? Could I have stopped him? Why didn't I see the signs? How could he have done this to us? In my files I have material on suicide that I have not read. I am going to share some of it with you. First the myths:

Myth: People who talk about suicide never actually do it. The truth is that almost everyone who attempts suicide has given some warning. When someone talks about suicide, do not ignore such warning.

Myth: Talking about suicide will cause a person to attempt suicide. Wrong. Asking a person if they are thinking about suicide may make the person relieved that someone finally recognized their pain.

Myth: The suicidal act is an attempt to cope with serious personal problems. The truth is most suicidal persons are "irrational" at the time of their suicidal crises; they want to live but are feeling hopeless and cannot see other solutions to their problems.


Myth: If someone wants to kill themselves, there is usually no way to prevent it. Most suicidal persons do not want death, they want to end the pain, but they wished to be saved.

Myth: Once a person has tried suicide and does not succeed, they will not try again. The truth is that 80% of persons who die by suicide have made at least one previous attempt.

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
