Mayor Flynn Launches "Health Line" Service For City Residents

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn announced the start of the Mayor's Health Line, a free-of-charge health information, referral and advocacy service that targets Boston's 100,000 uninsured residents.

Designed to ensure that all Boston residents have access to health care services, the Mayor's Health Line will operate weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and will be staffed by multi-lingual intake workers. The telephone number is

Mayor Flynn said, "In Boston, some 100,000 people are without health insurance year-round and thousands more are estimated to lose coverage for part of the year or have insufficient coverage. Because of this, many of our residents do not get necessary medical attention. The Health Line will help Boston residents get the quality health care that they need. whatever their financial situation."

The consequences of the inability to pay for health care include delays in seeking care, uncoordinated services, and the use of inappropriate services, particularly emergency rooms for non-acute conditions. The Health Line will secure care for callers at health centers and hospitals, Boston providers having reaffirmed their commitments to serve the uninsured. Health Line staff will also assist those in need in obtaining free care, reduced fees, Medicaid and other coverages. In particular, the Health Line will do intake to enroll Boston's uninsured pregnant women in the states's new Health Start project, which provides coverage for prenatal care and delivery.

Additionally, the Health Line staff will work with Boston's health care providers to coordinate the flow of patients as well as centralizing information on available services. An important component of the program will be follow-up, to ensure that callers get appropriate care. Information collected about the access problems of Health Line callers will be used for long-range planning.

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



The developer will make an annual base rent payment to the Authority in the amount of \$91,250 and an additional annual payment totaling \$0.10 per square foot for security services and maintenance of public open space. In addition, the developer will pay to the Authority 5% of the gross sales price of the condominiums and the Authority will receive an additional 2% of the future gross sales prices of any subsequent resales. These requirements will be incorporated in the lease for the property and in the master condominium deed to ensure future compliance with these terms.

The developer will also construct, at its own expense a landscaped pedestrian way adjacent to Building 106 as part of a later phase of development.

Michael P. Quinn Swan Boat Plaque To Be Dedicated April 21st

During the summers of his youth, Michael P. Quinn would work on the Swan Boats in the Public Garden which were established in 1877. Under the professional and prudent aegis of Paul Paget and his family. Mike enjoyed these halcyon days.

On an August day last year while walking through the Public Garden, Patrick J. 

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



Four Public Sessions For Viewing

Halley's Comet

Those who attend the sessions will have a last chance to view the comet through telescopes as the celestial visitor travels away from the Sun and Earth and back into the depths of space. In late April and early May, the comet will be visible from the Northern Hemisphere from the end of twilight late into the night, but will be rapidly growing dim. Current projections suggest that Comet Halley may shine at about fourth magnitude and retain a hint of a tail during the center's viewing week: however, comets are unpredictable and can change in brightness unexpectedly.

The Center for Astrophysics is located at 60 Garden Street in Cambridge, about one mile west of Harvard Square. It may be easily reached by public transportation. Parking is available.

The article proposed moving this monument temporarily to either Park Street or the Harvard Mall. Either location will again successfully hide the monument. City Issues Revaluation Assessment Notices

City of Boston Assessing Commissioner William B. Coughlin-announced that the City, as required by State Law, has issued Revaluation Assessment Notices. Upon preliminary certification by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue, the notices, which are the result of the recently completed door to door revaluation of property, have been mailed to each homeowner.

The new assessed value for each property on the Assessment Notices represents 100% of the fair market value of the property as of January 1, 1985 (FY 1986 tax year). The purpose of the state mandated revaluation is to determine accurate assessments city-wide to insure that every property owner pays his or her fair share. The new assessed value and tax rate are subject to review and final certification by the Department of Revenue, prior to the issuance of the FY 1986 tax bills in the late

Commissioner Coughlin states, "Your new assessed value may be more than your previous assessment, but this does not mean your taxes will go up proportionately. As a result of this revaluation, consistent with the requirements of Proposition 21/2, the tax rate has decreased substantially. This means that in some cases, property taxes have gone down. If your taxes have gone up, this is due to the simple fact that your home is now worth more money.

Taxpayers are advised to remember two important points about the Assessment

First, the payment made toward the estimated tax bill issued last November, 1985, will be deducted from the actual Fiscal 1986 tax bill when it is issued in the late

Second, the Assessment Notice does not reflect Clause Exemptions. Clause Exemptions will be included in the actual tax bill. Taxpayers with questions about clause exemption eligibility or applications should call

the Assessing Departments Social Services Unit at 725-4288. Property owners who are elderly (over age 70), blind, disabled veterans, widows or widowers, who have not applied for clause exemptions in the past, should contact the Social Services Unit.

Property owners who have questions pertaining to their new assessment, should call the Department's Taxpayer's Assistance Unit at 725-4866. For those taxpayers who might require further assistance, staff of the T.P.A. Unit will schedule the property owner for an appointment with an assessor at one of the informal hearings to

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
