night, Thursday, Nov. 15 at 7 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St. The meeting will focus on the Central Artery/ North Area (CANA) project as well as the Central Artery/Tunnel (CA/T) project as it relates to the Charlestown community.

Following an introduction, there will be a presentation on the CANA staging and schedule. An overview of the CA/T Scheme Z interchange plan will then be presented.

Charlestown liaison Ste-

phen Collins has stated that there will be an intermission so that residents can view the drawings and maps used during the presentation. Collins said that he would be available at that time to take questions from the gathering. He said that residents will be asked to write down their questions on the last page of a handout that will be distributed prior to the meeting. After all the questions have been submitted, each question will be addressed by the appropriate representative from the CA/T project.

The Scheme Z interchange plan, which has been termed the world's highest density highway interchange by several sources, has resulted in the expression of many concerns by residents. Some of these concerns include the proposed height of traffic ramps equal to an 11-story building in the area south of Rutherford Avenue; the number of traffic lanes crossing the Charles River; the increase in traffic on residential streets resulting from the proposed closing of the Traverse Street ramp

in the North Station area as previously planned; the transport of hazardous cargo through Charlestown streets to access the Tobin Bridge and Route I-93; as well as increases in noise, pollution and dirt.

Tonight's meeting will provide the opportunity for residents to listen to the presentation by the MDPW on the roadway project, see how the plan affects the Charlestown community and ask questions of the planners and engineers.

In response to issues raised by area residents and the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, the Board included a provision in their vote of approval. Additional wording was added stipulating that BRA staff conduct additional community meetings to address resi-

dential concerns regarding the construction of this almost \$10 million bypass roadway.







Prior to the call for committee reports, McLaughlin introduced Peter Jones, Scoutmaster for Charlestown Boy Scout Troop 2. Jones commented on his work with the Charlestown boys and his intent for continued involvement in the community.

John Riordan, director of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, addressed the council on a report Mayor Flynn had issued on city services. He noted that the report opens the books of City Hall and lets the residents see just how well the city departments are doing. He said that departments set goals at the first of the year and the report evaluates how each department measures up to its goals during the year. He said that he would make a copy of the report available to council members and to the public.

Ann Aylward, maritime director for Massport, reported on a recently signed purchase and sale agreement between the authority and Somerville Lumber for that company's threeacre property on Medford Street. She stated that the property had been for sale for several years and it made sense to hold it as port property with its proximity to the Moran Terminal

Aylward said the authority is presently negotiating a lease with Bay State Express for the Somerville Lumber site. She noted that Bay State, which is currently operating out of Charlestown Marine Park, wants to expand and would lease the whole property for a trucking and container operation with an estimated 40 to 50 truck moves a day. They would operate under a fiveyear lease with two-year options. She stated that Bay State would be obligated to raze the several one-story buildings over the next five years. Aylward said that the deadline for the purchase and sales agreement is Nov.

McLaughlin stated that he would like a forum to be held on the Somerville Lumber property for area residents. It was referred to the Mitigation Committee to set up a meeting. No date had been set at press time.

Haul Road Committee Moe Gillen and

Bob Wallace, co-chairmen

A presentation on the proposed Haul Road running on the north side of Medford Street from the existing Terminal Street to Main Street at Sullivan Square was made by representatives of the Boston Redevelopment Authority and Bruce Campbell & Associates.

At the outset, McLaughlin stated that the issues of concern to Medford Street residents expressed at the Nov. 7 Haul Road Committee meeting would not be part of the proposal under consideration by the council at this meeting. He said that the Haul Road proposal would not include traffic patterns or the small Medford Street-Haul Road connector opposite Baldwin Street designed to access area businesses. McLaughlin stated that these issues would be decided by Medford Street area residents at future committee meetings.

Following almost two hours of presentation with questions and comments from the council members and the audience, the council voted to approve "the design concept of the Haul Road proposal B-4.4 with the provision that there be further design review, input and planning with the Medford Street area vicinity neighbors, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, the Haul Road Committee and other residents of Charlestown to make this B-4.4 scheme compatible with neighborhood concerns and its traffic management/pattern beneficial specifically to the Charlestown district." (Please see related story on page one.)

Public Safety Committee Mel Stillman, chairman

Stillman reported that a new program that involves Boston Police officers leaving their cars and walking in specific areas is underway in Charlestown.

He sought approval by the council to hold the Public Safety/Police Community Relations meetings at various sites throughout the town. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, Dec. 11 at the Bunker Hill Museum, 43 Monument Square.

Basic Services Committee Peter Looney, chairman

Looney reported on a Boston Department of Health and Hospitals antismoking program being presented to seventh and eighth graders at St. Catherine's and St. Francis de Sales schools. He suggested the possibilty that the students could conduct meetings for adults on the subject when they complete the 25-hour course.

Election of Organizations To Be Represented On The Council

The seven community organizations with representatives on the council will conclude their two-year terms in January. Mc-Laughlin stated that a committee would be established to take nominations from organizations and recommend seven for inclusion on the council at the December monthly meeting.

A discussion ensued as to which council members would be eligible to sit on the committee and who would be eligible to vote on the committee's recommendations. Conway said that although it isn't spelled out in the bylaws, he would think that organizational members shouldn't sit on the selection committee,

but all 21 council members could vote on the committee's recommendations at the December meeting.

Galvin stated that two years ago the organizations were elected in December and selected representatives that were seated at the January meeting. He noted that if this procedure was not followed, only the 14 elected council members would vote in the January election of officers and those representing organizations would not be eligible to run for office or hold a committee chairmanship.

Mansfield added that there are 21 members on the council — all equal and the organization representatives should be part of a committee to discuss and decide voting powers.

O'Neil said that while the members have to ascertain which organizations will be represented on the council, there should be some attempt to clarify the council's constitution so the confusion won't happen again.

McLaughlin appointed Wallace to chair the Organizational Selection Committee. The committee will meet on Tuesday, Nov. 27 at 7 p.m. at the Bunker Hill Museum, 43 Monument Square. Organizations are asked to send their request

It was announced that Cunha will call a meeting during November for the committee, the BRA and, particularly, the residents of the Lawnwood Place and Main Street area to further consider the development plans for that parcel. No date had been set for the meeting at press time.

Also noted was that the committee and Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, have been monitoring the permits pulled for the construction in the former Nancy Sales building at the corner of Medford and Terminal streets.

Beware Of Drug-Laced Tattoos

A warning has been issued that a form of drug-laced tattoo called the Blue Star is being sold to school children. It is described as a small sheet of paper containing blue stars, each the size of a pencil eraser, and each star is soaked with LSD. The drug can be absorbed through the skin simply by handling the paper.

Another item being sold is brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps. These contain pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters, clowns, Bart Simpson and butterflies. Each one is wrapped in foil. This is a new way of selling acid in a form appealing to young children and a young child could happen upon these and have a fatal trip.

It is also believed that little children could be given a free tattoo by other children who want to cultivate new customers without the child's knowledge.

A stamp called Red Pyramid is also being distributed along with microdots in various colors and a Window Pane which has a grid that can be cut out.

If your child obtains any of these drug-laced items, do not handle them. They are known to react quickly and some are laced with strychnine.

Symptoms of drug ingestion include: hallucinations, severe vomiting, uncontrolled laughter, mood changes and change in body temperature. Children exhibiting such symptoms should receive immediate medical attention.

Anyone finding tattoos or stamps described above should contact the Boston Police Department.

Haul Road Gets Green Light

(continued from page one) the BRA to proceed to its Board for approval of the proposed alignment plan, termed Alternative B-4.4, providing an agreement could be included that community residents, especially abutters to the road, be allowed further input in the design review process and planning that would make the plan compatible with neighborhood concerns. These include: a beneficial traffic pattern in the area that would accommodate residential and business needs.


During the council meeting and at a Haul Road Committee meeting held the previous evening, the proposed plan that would construct a roadway north of Medford Street to divert heavy truck traffic from Medford Street was outlined. The road would help alleviate existing conditions and anticipated increases in traffic volume generated by the completion of development plans at the former sugar refineries on Medford Street and in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Residents attending the meetings expressed their

reluctance to approve the concept of the bypass road without assurance that traffic gaining access to the roadway would not travel on residential streets. The construction of the Haul Road was seen as beneficial by a majority of the residents, but any increase of traffic in the highly congested neighborhood was strongly opposed.

According to BRA officials, the proposed Haul Road would offer a 100 percent heavy vehicle bypass of Medford Street, a request heard from residents of the area. The two-lane roadway would run adjacent to the existing railroad tracks with access points at Terminal Street behind the former Nancy Sales building and in Sullivan Square at the entrance to The Schrafft Center building. A total of 1,800 linear feet of rail would be taken up and rebuilt further away from the fire station, a buffer zone and landscaping would be constructed between the Haul Road and Medford Street and improvements to the existing Medford Street would total \$4.9 million.

The traffic scheme that

routes vehicles away from Medford Street and onto residential side streets was adamently opposed by residents of Short, Baldwin and Chappie streets.

Keeping all truck traffic off Medford Street would hurt existing businesses stated John White, proprietor of the Mobile Gas Station on Medford Street. White would like a clarification on the weight limit of vehicles permitted on Medford Street. He said that much of his business is generated from small trucks under two tons. He voiced his approval of the plan to keep heavy truck traffic off Medford Street, but requested

that his concerns be addressed, adding, "I would be the loser in the Haul Road. I make my livelihood from the flow of traffic. If the Haul Road was used by trucks, buses and cars, I would go out of business."

Haul Road Committee
Co-Chairmen Bob Wallace
and Moe Gillen stated their
strong commitment to the
residents of the area that
they would have a voice in
the solution to the traffic
management issues relative
to the construction of the
Haul Road. The vote by the
Neighborhood Council and
subsequently by the BRA
Board, reiterates that commitment. If financial re-

quirements are obtained from the state, construction would not begin until mid-1992. The time span allows opportunity for all parties involved to reach a satisfactory solution.

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

McLaughlin reported that discussion is underway with Bunker Hill Community College to plan for community benefits in the form of education and jobs in conjunction with the

Wallace noted that only 4 percent of the students at BHCC come from Charlestown and questioned whether just that 4 percent would be eligible for these benefits.

Conway added that the benefits package included the eligibility of all residents, young and old, to enroll in such a program. He noted that it should be geared to Charlestown peo-

Mitigation Committee Bill Galvin, chairman

Galvin reported on a committee meeting with representatives of the Charlestown Marine Park, the former Amstar Sugar Refinery site on Medford Street. He related that Attorney Bud Shadrawy outlined the proposal of four companies to establish office space at the facility.

nants include: A & A Limited with two employees, occupying 500 square feet; Montfreight, a freight forwarder with 10 employees, occupying 2,000 square feet on the second floor; Cawley Co., a freight forwarder with eight employees, occupying 200 to 300 square feet; and Dan Transport with five or six employees, occupying 1,300 square feet on the second floor.

Shadrawy had told the committee that these firms

are now in the Delta Building at Logan Airport which is being closed Jan. 1 and will be demolished. He said that the increase in traffic will be minimal as the focus is on paper work and added that the firms serve a marine-industrial purpose.

Galvin reported that these firms will be required to advertise for jobs locally if vacancies occur or if the firms expand, so community residents will have the first opportunity to apply for openings.

Veterans Committee Jim Conway, chairman

Conway said that there was nothing new to report on the Korean Veterans Memorial planned for the Navy Yard.

Gillen stated that the Veterans Field at the Quinn Athletic Complex is in bad condition and hasn't been maintained. Conway said his understanding was that the focus of the Veterans Committee was just the memorial.

McLaughlin referred the field problem to Looney and the Basic Services Committee with the suggestion that they work together with the veterans.

North Area Task Force Ken Stone, liaison

Stone announced the Massachusetts Department of Public Works meeting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 15 at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

McLaughlin noted that in trying to modify the Central Artery interchange here in Charlestown, a ramp was eliminated from the plan that alleviated traffic through the Charlestown community. He added that now traffic will be next to you in City Square. He said that Scheme Z is still a monster.

Stone stated that hundreds more cars will be on the Charlestown bridge during peak hours.

McLaughlin explained that Stone is in a difficult position, for in order to alleviate the traffic on Charlestown streets, the ramp would have to be put back into the plan. Mansfield added that the MDPW eliminated the ramp from the plan three weeks ago.

Washington Street resident Tom King reminded the members that with the removal of the ramp, hazardous cargo would be re-

quired to use city streets to reach the Tobin Bridge and Route I-93 north. He pointed out that the ramp wasn't removed by the state as a mitigation measure, it was done at the insistence of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Coast Guard to eliminate some of the pilings in the waterway.

King said that even with the ramp removed, the interchange will be 11-stories high. He said the ramp could be put back, but "other schemes would be more beneficial to Charlestown."

Stone noted that the Central Artery/North Area project underwent 10 years of discussion. He said that the CA/T North of Causeway Street has come upon us quickly. He expressed his concern asking the council to assist in slowing down the project.

King related that in a meeting with Secretary of Transportation Fred Salvucci, he found there was no time for change. He said the MDPW is going through the final Environmental Impact Study that is ready to go to print. King said the MDPW has rushed to get it ready for mid-November publication in the Environmental Monitor. After it is in print, which takes about seven days he said, there are 30 days of public comment. He explained that once it is signed off by the Environmental Protection Agency, estimated by King to be about Christmas Eve, "it's

King said there is still time for change and his group, Citizens for a Livable Charlestown, is aiming to make an impact on Scheme Z. He added that a Cambridge group has been working hard on this and will vote on it in two weeks. King stated that they believe that there is a chance for change in the new administration.

Stone cautioned that residents will hear from the MDPW that they will kill the project if they oppose it.

King agreed that this is what they will say. However, he noted, delay is not detrimental to the overall project. He added that "the MDPW is ready to give out contracts and we're still asking what they are going to build."

Council members and residents were urged to attend the Nov. 15 meeting.

Other Business

D'Ambrosio requested that the BRA and/or the Bricklayers come before the council to outline the plans for Building 104 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. She said that she understood Shipways residents had seen the plans, adding "and I want to see them."

Two Charlestown Youths Named To Youth Leadership Corps

Two Charlestown youths were among the 37 high school juniors welcomed into the first class of the Mayor's Youth Leadership Corps by Mayor Raymond L. Flynn in ceremonies held recently at the James Michael Curley House in Jamaica Plain.

Jennifer Burns, who attends Boston Latin School, and Joseph DeRoeve, a student at Malden Catholic High School, were among the group of young people who heard welcoming remarks by Mayor Flynn, Jack Curry, president of Northeastern University, and Jack Driscoll, president of the Boston Bar Association, the chief executives of the other institutions involved in this public-private partnership.

The Mayor's Youth Leadership Corps is part of the city of Boston's Safe Neighborhoods Plan. Corps members represent each of the city's neighborhoods and come from public, parochial and private schools throughout Boston. The curriculum they will study

in the year-long program is designed to improve their leadership and communications skills, promote community service, teach them more about the city of Boston and cover subjects ranging from the arts to the criminal justice system, from business and economics to cultural diversity and the environment.

In addition to presentations and discussion sessions, corps members will work on community service projects, go on field trips and be placed in paid summer internship positions related to their areas of interest. Each corps member will receive a \$1,000 scholarship upon completion of the program.

Following graduation exercises at the end of next summer, this first class of the Mayor's Youth Leadership Corps members will be brought together with succeeding classes in order to form a network of young people to provide leadership for the city of Boston and its neighborhoods in the future.

Department Of Public Works Addresses Community Concerns

Community concerns have been voiced about Central Artery bridges, design and impacts. The Massachusetts Department of Public Works in this week's edition of The Charlestown Patriot responds to traffic and environmental concerns. If you have other concerns that you would like addressed, please call Stephen Collins, the Central Artery Charlestown liaison, at 951-6000.

Question . . . What are the air quality impacts to the Charlestowm community caused by the river crossing and interchange?

The Central Artery/Tunnel project will improve air quality in Charlestown significantly over current conditions. In City Square, which was chosen as a test site because it is a busy intersection and therefore a worst-case condition, the carbon monoxide (CO) level will be significantly below EPA standards of 9 parts per million (ppm). In 1987, the CO level was 6.5 ppm; in the year 1998 with the Central Artery project, that level will drop to 4.8 ppm. Residential areas will see even greater improvements. And these predictions are worse than can now be expected since they do not include improvements expected from the new Clean Air Bill just passed by Congress.

Air quality will improve throughout the city due to the Central Artery/Tunnel project. In addition to carbon monoxide reductions, there will be decreases in levels of Hydrocarbons (HC), Nitrogen Oxides (NOx) and airborne particulates.

Question... What is the expected volume of traffic coming into City Square from downtown Boston upon completion of the Central Artery/Tunnel project?

Traffic levels into City Square from downtown Boston, given just CANA completion in the year 2010, is expected to be 2,900 vehicles per hour during peak p.m. traffic times. However, with the completion of the Central Artery/Tunnel project this level will be reduced to 2,400 vehicles or an improvement of 13%.

Question . . . What are the vehicular noise impacts to Charlestown and will there be a need for noise barriers?

Additional receptors were located in Charlestown at the request of community residents. The new data reveals that although noise levels are predicted to be high enough for mitigation to be considered, the source of this noise is traffic traveling on Rutherford Avenue rather than on the I-93 structure. To shield the community from these noise sources, a combination of walls, berms and dense landscaping is being suggested, subject to community review.

Question . . Will the CANA loops connect with the existing 1-93 structure before the completion of the Central/Artery Tunnel project? If so, when will this happen and where will the traffic be routed until the connection is made?

The CANA loops will tie into the existing structure prior to the completion of the Central Artery/Tunnel project. It is estimated that the connection will be complete during the latter part of 1993 and the temporary viaduct will remain in place until that time.


Question . . . Are the CANA tunnels equipped to handle hazardous cargo transport? Will this cargo be routed through residential streets?


The CANA tunnels will be equipped to handle the transport of hazardous cargo, which largely consists of fuel trucks. Since this cargo will be prohibited from the Central Artery and cross harbor tunnels, options for these trucks will be either directly from the CANA tunnels to the North Washington Street bridge, or from the CANA tunnels to I-93 until the Nashua Street off ramp.

Representatives of the DPW will be in Charlestown on Thursday, Nov. 15 at 7 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St. to provide information on the Central Artery project as it relates to this community and to answer questions from residents.



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
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
