

There Are No Plans To Close The Edwards Middle School

Students, parents, school staff and interested residents came to the Clarence R. Edwards Middle School on Tuesday night with one thought on their minds - to hear from the Boston School Committee and the Superintendent of Schools whether the Edwards was on the list for closure. They heard what they hoped they would - there are no plans to close the Edwards Middle School.

The evening, from start to finish, was an outpouring of pride, both in testimony

given before the members of the School Committee and the actions of the students and staff in welcoming the parents, residents and school officials.

Each person was greeted by a faculty member, escorted to a sign-in table by a student, given a school newspaper and a paper bag with snacks and brought to the school auditorium. The snack bag brought a few laughs from some of the over 100 guests as it contained oatmeal and juice, leaving them to question

whether the staff felt the meeting would go until morning when the gathering would need breakfast.

Hearing testimony were Superintendent Lois Harrison-Jones, School Committee members Felix Arroyo and Robert Guen and School Committee Secretary Laurie Robinson.

At the outset, Arroyo explained that the hearing was not one on a school closing, rather it was to make the school assignment process easier or more "user (continued on page 9)

One of these men, Thomas J. Flynn, left a wife and three children here in Charlestown as he answer-



ed his country's call. He made the supreme sacrifice on that foreign soil and his widow made her sacrifice here, raising their three children to adulthood without a father's guiding hand. These three children, Thomas, Nancy and Jeanne, stood proudly at Sever Street in Sullivan Square, near where the family was raised, and watched as a marker was unveiled and a Hero Square dedicated in their father's honor.

Later that morning, the scene turned to Auburn Terrace for the unveiling of a Hero Square to honor a

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




C.A.P.S Sponsors Infant And Child CPR Course

A CPR Course will be given on two consecutive Thursdays in May, sponsored by the Charlestown Association of Parents (C.A.P.S). This course can lead to certification if the participant takes both classes, Session I and Session II.

The participant must take both sessions to be certified. If what you want and need is a good basic understanding of CPR and first aid then you should take only Session I. (Please note: Session II will only be offered to those participants who have taken Session I.)

The Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee is pleased to announce that noted Irish folk singer Liam Tiernan will be performing a concert in Charlestown on Friday, May 28 to benefit the upcoming Bunker Hill Day celebration. The concert will get underway at 7:30 p.m. at the American Legion Hall, 23 Adams St.

Tiernan has been performing Irish Folk music since 1968. He is a professional and seasoned artist with a fine track record for pleasing audiences in both club and concert venues.

Tiernan is the founding member of the internationally known ballad group, "Barleycorn," which he formed in his native city of Belfast. The group had major success through all the cities of Europe and North America. They sang their own brand of ballads with a very distinct style. The group wrote most of their own material and had such great success with songs like The Men Behind The Wire, The Boys of the Old

Tiernan parted company with his good friends John Knox and Brian McCormick in August of 1981 to pursue a solo career in America where he had

many fans and friends. In the early part of his journey, Tiernan was accompanied by Allen Loughnane, a great master of the violin, in a duo called "Claddagh." The duo was together for three years, much to the delight of

crowds from Boston to San Francisco.

In 1984, with one solo album under his belt, he embarked on a road trip around the country to promote the good old ballad session. His tour took him from The Black Rose in Boston, (the city Tiernan calls home these days) to The Dubliner in Washington D.C., to Ryan's on Bourbon Street, New Orleans, to various other venues in Denver, Savannah. Chicago, Buffalo and numerous other cities around the country.

Tiernan has two albums in circulation at the moment with plans for many more. To hear him sing Irish ballads is a fine treat, a stroll down memory lane. He sings in the tradition of his good friends Paddy Reiley, Jim McCann and the late Luke Kelly with songs ranging from the soulful Raglan Road to Finagan's Wake.


The benches for the Training Field have been ordered and should be delivered shortly, and last week all 250 trees were selected and tagged in New Jersey. Tree shipments should begin in about a week with installation beginning shortly thereafter. The tree installation will be done by a specialty landscape subcontractor.


The construction to date has accommodated the gas strike, but contingency plans are being formulated to work around the potential inability to have gas services installed to new gas light locations. Plans include postponement of the related gas light installations, which may affect the timing of other street work.

A preconstruction meeting was held with the Middlesex Corporation at the Mead Street stairs to schedule the remaining street reconstruction. Middlesex is preparing to leaflet the abutting area for a potential start on upper Mead Street by the end of the week. Two posts and several rail sections are being fabricated for replacement of some new sections either missing or found damaged during erection. However, in the meantime, Middlesex will try to install temporary sections to allow use of the stairs. If they are unable to do so, then the stairs will remain closed. They anticipate being complete by mid-June. All in all, the stairs look good with the flowers in bloom and the trees about to do the same even though the overall contract is not yet complete.

So our hats are off in credit to our local mothers. They work hard and pull it off with true devotion as parents. To our lucky Charlestown children, a word of advice for the future. The Holy Bible, 23.21 recommends: "Despise not thy Mother when she is old."

We at the Patriot wish a Mother's Day of sunshine and family love to all the town families.





Arroyo stated that with the new choice plan, there would be earlier notification of a school assignment, sibling preference in the assignment, a priority given to students who live nearest the school and the provision that a child who wants to remain in the same school doesn't have to go through the application process. He added that a student can ask for a transfer to another school in any grade.

Arroyo stated that the hearing was for them to learn and to see how to improve the selection of the school by parents, since the Edwards was considered "under-chosen" in the first round of selection.

Edwards Principal Charles McAfee told the panel that his primary goal was "the best education possible in a safe environment." He explained that students who would have normally come to the Edwards from East Boston and for the Chinese bilingual program now had alternative schools to select. He did add that the present sixth grade is oversubscribed at present.

McAfee pledged to the panel to put more emphasis on "marketing" the school which included letters to all fifth-grade parents, a video presentation and open houses. He stressed the importance of parents being involved with the school.

Peter Looney, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, opened the public testimony. He stated that the Edwards was important and was one of the few public schools that take an active part in the community. Looney asked the direct question of the panel whether the Edwards was to close, and the answer was no.





Hero Square Dedicated To Thomas J. Flynn

Thomas J. Flynn

Thomas J. Flynn (Tom) was born on Aug. 18, 1917 to Thomas R. and Jennie (Donnolly) Flynn. Tom grew up on Beacham Street at Sullivan Square, Charlestown, as did his father and grandfather before him, who were both born on Dorrance Street at Sullivan Square.

As a young man, Tom entered the Civilian Conservation Corp (C.C.C.) program, and was sent to Maine where he helped clear forest land for various projects.

PRIVATE THOMAS J.

Tom wed Esther Callahan of Woburn and settled on Beacham Street, Charlestown. He went to work managing the family cafe (Park Cottage) which was located on Main Street. In 1942, he moved his growing family to Sever Street, and also went to work as a welder at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Tom entered the U.S. Army on April 6, 1944, taking his basic and advanced training at Camp Wheeler in Ga., Fort Devens in Mass. and Fort Mead in Md. He was then assigned to the 104th Infantry Division 1st Army, also known as the "Fighting 1st Timber Wolves." The Timber Wolves were a body of night fighting specialists. Tom saw action in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany and worked with the Timber Wolves fighting for Aachen, Germany, the first German town to be taken solely by American forces.

On the night of Nov. 19, 1944, while engaged in combat with German resistance in Aachen, Private Thomas J. Flynn was killed in action while cutting away a barbed wire fence surrounding a German pillbox. For his heroic action under fire, Tom was awarded the Purple Heart for military merit and wounds received in action resulting in his death.

Tom left behind his wife Esther and three small children. He was buried in a military cemetery in Henri-Chapelle, Belgium. In May of 1947, his body was returned to the United States and his final resting place at Oak Grove Cemetery in Medford.

(continued from page one) young man who also made the supreme sacrifice during the Battle of the Bulge in World War II - a young man who had yet to reach his 18th birthday, John Joseph Maheigan. His mother, Mary, along with his brother, Edward, and sisters Dorothy O'Donnell and Catherine Simonds looked on with thoughts of what might have been as the cloth covering on the square was pulled aside.

The ceremonies began at Sever Street with stirring music by the Colonial Band of Lawrence as U.S. Navy color guards from the USS Constitution, the Naval Air Station in South Weymouth and the Junior Air Force ROTC Color Guard from Charlestown High School stood at attention alongside the square. Soloist Kathleen Adams thrilled the gathering with her rendition of the National Anthem, Amazing Grace and later in the morning, Ave Maria
