For the past seven months there have been a series of meetings regarding Charlestown High School. The meetings have been spearheaded by District One Boston City Councillor Diane J. Modica; Councillor Peggy Davis-Mullen; Peter Looney, chairperson of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council; Bob McGann, Charlestown Community Centers; Moe Gillen; Judy Evers, Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services; Stacy Johnson, Headmaster, Charlestown High School; Al Holland, Boston School Department; Capt. Ron Conway and Deputy Supt. Gerry Mc-Hale, representing the Boston Police Department; and representatives from the Boston Housing Authority enforcement.

As a result of initial meetings, the group has evolved to include Mary MacInnes and representatives from the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force; Barbara Burke, Chief Probation Officer, Charlestown District Court; Bill Mc-Gonagle, BHA; Leo Boucher, Boston Parks Department; Dan Ryan, Healthy Charlestown Coalition Coordinator; Kenny Giordano, Boys & Girls Club; Bob DeCristoforo and other BHA Youth Outreach workers.


The group meets on a bi-weekly basis to address various issues at the high school. One of the most important issues is truancy. Many residents have

voiced their concerns about the number of students that are not in school on a daily basis. There have been four extra paraprofessionals assigned to the doors at the high school and this has helped the situation, but the problem still exists.

On two occasions, there has been a cooperative effort amongst the Boston Police Department, Charlestown High School and the Boston Housing Authority to sweep the town for truant students. As a result of these efforts, many students have been identified to the school officials and their parents have been notified that their son or daughter is truant from school. These sweeps will continue throughout the school year and the school will continue to notify parents.




Eric Michael Foley of Charlestown and Kerri Ann Mc-Gee of Dorchester were married recently at St. Gregory's Church in Dorchester.





* Seeks To Sell Used Cars ... An informational meeting, chaired by Charlestown Neighborhood Council Precinct 7 delegate Tom Cunha, was held on Nov. 17 at Bishop Lawton Hall. Other members of the council present were Mel Stillman, Jim Conway, Gregg Nolan and Bill Galvin.

John White, proprietor of the Mobile Gas Station on Medford Street since 1984, is seeking to receive permission from the city to locate five used cars on the property.

The spokesman for White was his attorney John Tobin. Tobin explained that his client is seeking a license and use permit for no more than five used cars on the site. He said that White is responding to customer requests and as an adjunct to his business. He said that there would be no change in hours, which will continue to be Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. He said they have yet to apply for the license and/or permit.

Following questioning of White and Tobin by the council members and abutters that were present, a vote was taken that the members agreed to bring before the council as a whole at its December meeting.

They voted unanimously to recommend approval of the license and/or permit to have up to five used cars on the property with restrictions being that it be a low-key operation with no additional lighting, no banners, no streamers, only small for sale signs on the vehicles and the vehicles be stored inside the garage at night.

* Graffiti A Felony ... Boston Police Patrolman Daniel P. Linskey has announced that the former misdemeanor act of graffiti is now considered a felonious act punishable by imprisonment. Also, upon conviction of either Sec. 126A or 126B of the new law, the individual's driver's license shall be suspended for one year. The law also penalizes those convicted by requiring them to pay for the removal of the damage as well.

City of Boston Commissioner of Parks and Recreation Patrick S. Harrington, agrees that this new law should discourage a lot of graffiti vandalism in Boston parks and elsewhere in the city. In a move that other Boston officials have hailed as long overdue, the legislature has taken a bite out of crime that up to now was considered a minor nuisance.



Paul White, states, "Whoever sprays or applies paint or places a sticker upon a building, wall fence, sign tablet, gravestone, monument or other object, such person . . . shall be punished by imprisonment for no more than two years."

King Solomon's Lodge To Hold Memorial Breakfast

On Sunday, Nov. 27 from 10 a.m. to noon, King Solomon's Lodge, in conjunction with Boston National Historical Park, will hold a memorial breakfast in honor of Maj. Gen. Joseph Warren at the historic Commandant's House in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

According to lodge records, 200 years ago, from Nov. 11, 1794 to Dec. 2, 1794, "a committee was formed to procure the land

of Russell's pasture." During these few weeks, the dedicated members of King Solomon's Lodge, "erected a memorial in honor of our late brother, the most worshipful Joseph Warren." This was the first memorial to honor the veterans of the Battle of Bunker Hill in historic Charlestown. This memorial was a Tuscan pillar, 18 feet in height, 8 foot square and fenced to protect it from injury. On top of the pillar

was placed a gilt urn, with the initials and age of Dr. Warren, enclosed in the square and compasses.

Two-hundred years ago in March, 1794, Pres. George Washington, signed the naval act which gave birth to USS Constitution, which is now undergoing renovations in historic Dry Dock 1, across from the Commandant's House in the old Charlestown Navy Yard. For many, this is a happy historical coincidence; for others who know of the brotherly friendship of these two great historical figures, the dedication of the first

memorial and the birth of USS Constitution is a cause for remembrance and celebration for the past success of the science and commerce and the memory of art in the best promotion of Masonic awareness.

This breakfast will seek the efforts of all to aid Boston National Historical Park in charting the next 200 years for the light and illumination of the arts and sciences with projects that seek to promote the ideals that Warren and Washington espoused

being a parent, a grandparent, a husband, a wife, a son, a daughter, an aunt, an uncle, a nephew, a niece or a cousin, because there may be nothing in this world that you should be more grateful for than family.

It has been said here before on other Thanksgiving days, but I feel it bears repeating. Pearl Harbor was attacked three days short of my first birthday. Historians, then, can figure out how many Thanksgiving dinners of which I have partaken. In each of those years, the dinner has taken place in the same third floor apartment on Elm Street with my parents.

Allow me, please, to briefly tell you about Thanksgiving dinner on Elm Street as I knew it then, and still know it now.

By the time I came along, my sister Helen had already been a part of the scene. Thanksgiving of 1941 marked my first attendance at the annual celebration. It would be impossible for me to remember that particular Thanksgiving dinner and the next few after that, but pictures and old stories confirm the fact that I was there.

By 1944, Leo, one of my two brothers, joined the group, and four years later, Paul, my second brother, completed the immediate family gathering.

We stayed that way for a long time. On the night before Thanksgiving, we watched Ma baking pies, and we used cookie cutters with the leftover pie crust to form delicious circles and stars. We cracked walnuts and filberts, and opened a can of plum pudding purchased especially for the holiday dinner. We stood by as the turkey was expertly prepared for the oven, and we always knew that Dad would be up by six the next morning to place him in the oven.

By eight o'clock Thanksgiving morning, the house would be filled with the tantalizing aroma of a roasting turkey, and we would get out of bed to await his midday arrival at the dinner table.

As the years began to tick by, football became an important part of the day as each of us would spend the morning rooting for his or her favorite high school team.

Time, too, increased the family members. Eventually added to the mix were Ma and Dad's grandchildren, Karen, Anne, Kevin, Kathleen, Brenda, Marie, Paul and Brian. Now there is a greatgranddaughter, Kaila, and twins, yet to be named, on the way. The time for the twins' appearance is so close, that by the time this piece is being read, they may already be on the scene. One year, brother Paul extended the number in attendance by one, when he invited a friend to celebrate with us.

Today's dining room is yesterday's bedroom, and when six of us were living under the same roof, space dictated that we have Thanksgiving dinner in the kitchen. Now, with the household numbers down to a more workable figure, the dining room table has become Thanksgiving's center stage.

Since my first Thanksgiving, there has been a World War, the Korean Conflict, Viet Nam and Desert Storm. Man has walked on the moon and computers are doing things that seem incomprehensible. The Red Sox have been in four World Series, but have been successful in none. The Patriots were founded and are now more than thirty-years-old. The Celtics and Bruins of my younger years are now but a part of local sports history. Jack the Barber has closed his shop and retired.

There has been the "Hippie," the Hollywood, the Alibi, the prison, Bond Bread, Schrafft's, Revere Sugar, Domino Sugar, Dot's Diner, the White Tower, the Waldorf, Scalli's, Kelly's, Charlie's, the Oak Tavern, the Pilsen Garden, the Morning Glory, the Stork Club, Matt Green's, Charlie Murphy's, Purity Sugar Cone, the Lobster House, the Shamrock, Monroe's, the Old Timer's, the Point Tavern, Sam's Sub Shop, Kappy's, St. Mary's School, St. Francis' School, Bunker Hill streetcars, the Main Street "El," and oh so many more places have come and gone or closed their doors in Charlestown.

Today, though, Thanksgiving 1994, I will, along with my wife and daughters, return to that same third floor apartment on Elm Street to share my favorite holiday with my parents and other family members in the only place I have ever known Thanksgiving dinner.

For this, I am most grateful. Have a Happy Thanksgiving!

Parking: One Of Charlestown's Favorite Topics

Boston Transportation Department (BTD) Director of Community Affairs James Mansfield led the discussion on what can be done to relieve the area's parking problem.

Concerned residents pointed out various problems such as: commuters parking in the area to take the T; a need for considerable parking due to the Life Focus Center, the made by residents and

Charlestown District Courthouse and Olives; and future parking problems with the construction of the Shawmut Center.

proposed Mansfield two programs that could be implemented in the area. Meters could be installed or two-hour parking limits could be established in City Square. The two-hour parking would be from 8 a.m. until 7 or 7:30 p.m. Parking spaces would also be set aside for the courthouse and the Life Focus Center to use during business hours, but would be available for res-

idential use at night. Various proposals were

CNC members. These included using resident parking stickers, making Constitution Road two lanes of travel and bringing back parking from 18 -30 Main Street. Residents were also concerned that strict parking measures in City Square would force people to park in the surrounding areas. However, Mansfield stated that "there is no more available parking" in Charlestown for these vehicles to fill.

Residents felt that meters in the area would be an unsightly addition to City Square, and the idea was not endorsed. Mansfield noted that whatever plan was to be implemented would have to be decided by the neighborhood.

CNC members Judy Brennan, James Conway, Marty O'Brien, Mel Stillman and Basic Services Chairperson Bill Galvin voted to bring the comments and suggestions made at the meeting back to the CNC.

Mansfield said that he would return for another meeting with plans for various options.

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





Charlestown Neighborhood Council Endorses Expanded Sailing Program

At its November monthly meeting, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) unanimously endorsed the proposed merging of the Courageous Sailing Center and the Flatley Co. Sailing program.


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

Sgt. Detective Bob O'Toole does a pretty good job of imitating Sgt. Joe Friday from the classic television series, "Dragnet." "Just the facts, ma'am," was actor Jack Webb's famous line in the long-running crime investigation series. O'Toole mimics the monotone delivery well and in doing so, is making his point about the changing image of Boston Police officers and their department.

Their jobs are more than "just the facts, ma'am" days, O'Toole these explained. He sees the image of the Boston Police moving more and more toward "holistic and humanitarian" jobs with what he calls "the three P's as role models: Partnership, Problem-solving and Prevention in the city's neighborhoods." O'Toole is very image-conscious and well he should be, because public relations for the Boston Police is his job. He is director of the Office of Informational Services for the department.

The Boston Police Department has embarked on a new, live television talk show series, "Call The Cops," every Thursday at 7:30 p.m. on The Answer Channel 24 on cable channel 24 in Boston. It is a weekly live talk show channel for non-profit and public agencies serving Boston.

O'Toole and Sgt. Margot Hill, police coordinator of The Crime Stoppers Unit, will alternate as anchors, presenting a guest a week to answer questions

of viewers. Fielding the telephone calls at 973-4848 are Police Officers Tracy Wyse and Brendan Flynn, both in Informational Services. They have all been trained to operate the two-camera Answer Channel studio.

O'Toole plans to showcase captains from all the districts, community police and personnel customarily behind the scenes such as graphic artist Bobby Neville or those in the public eye such as the popular singing group, "Down By Law," composed of local African-American police officers.

The emphasis in the talk shows will go beyond law enforcement and into prevention programs which are underway throughout the city. "We want to get across how we operate," O'Toole explained, "away from the television image of "NYPD Blue" and "Hill Street Blues." We want to get across that police don't only enforce laws."

O'Toole is from a policeman's family. His dad, the late Patrolman Thomas F. O'Toole, retired from the Boston Police Department in 1973. He walked the beat in Hyde Park for 18 years, moving to downtown duty before retirement. The O'Toole family lived in South Boston during Bob's early years. He was born on Carpenter Street, right off Andrew Square in Southie, then moving to Charlestown where he lived on Ferrin Street, down by the "old Bond Bread" facility, then to Trenton Street. He attended the Clarence R. Edwards Junior High School and graduated from Charlestown High School in 1964. He joined the U.S. Marine Corps and was stationed mostly state-side.

He joined the Boston Police Department on Aug. 28, 1968. His curriculum vitae in the department is extensive and varied from being an undercover plainclothes officer in the Anti-Crime Unit to serving on the faculty of the Boston Police Academy.

O'Toole, who recently retired from the Air National Guard as chief master sergeant after 25 years of service was activated into military service in 1991 for Desert Storm. He was trained to replace Air Force Security Police, but did not go overseas. He was again activated in 1992 for Operation Restore Hope in Somalia. He was stationed in Spain with a refueling unit and did one landing in Somalia.

His family consists of his oldest brother Thomas F., a retired U.S. Marine Major now in private business in California; brother Daniel, a patrol sergeant with the Manomonie Falls, Wisconsin Police Department; and a sister, Shannon O'Toole-Foley, a paramedic, on active duty with the Air National Guard. His mother, Dorothy,

75, lives in the Mary Colbert Apartments on Devens Street in Charlestown. O'Toole is married to the former Dorothy A. Dalton of Salem and they reside in Saugus with their daughter, Colleen Marie.

YOUR RETIREMENT FUNDS: WHAT TO WITHDRAW AND WHEN

When you reach retirement age, you'll probably have an array of different investments and savings plans. As well as your normal savings, such as CDs, stocks and bonds, you may have a company pension plan and tax-deferred investments such as IRAs, a 401(k) plan or annuities. Here are some guidelines on making withdrawals.

• Leave money in your tax-deferred plans as long as possible so that the earnings continue to grow, free of tax. Draw down your other savings first if you need extra money to supplement social security and pension plan payments.

• As a general rule, don't withdraw funds from IRAs, annuities or a 401(k) plan before you reach age 59 1/2. Except in a few special cases, you'll face a 10% tax penalty from the IRS if you do.

Don't withdraw more than \$150,000 in total from tax-deferred plans in any year, or you may face an excess distribution penalty.
It's important to start withdrawals from your IRA and 401(k) plans by April 1 of the year after you reach age 70 1/2. If you don't take at least a specific minimum amount, the IRS will impose a penalty of 50% of the shortfall.

• If you have a company pension plan, you may have a choice of a lump-sum distribution or various annuity options. Some advisors recommend the lump-sum option, but explore the alternatives carefully to see which is best for your particular circumstances.

• You can start to draw reduced social security benefits at age 62, or larger benefits if you wait until you are older. Payments are tax-free unless you exceed certain levels of income from other sources.

• The tax rules on retirement plans are complex. Seeking professional advice before you start withdrawals may avoid tax problems. Call us if we can help.


