
★ Street Reconstruction Update ... Susi continues work on Prescott Street setting curb and should start pouring sidewalks by the end of the week. They have completed the installation of roof drains and the excavating of the street. The remaining drain lines should be installed at the intersection of Prescott and Devens next. Since the gas lights all ready exist on Prescott Street and once the drainage is complete, the intersection should be ready to pave, probably by next week, but certainly prior to the parade. His next endeavor will most likely be stripping Prospect Street for grading and gravel, and coordinating the new gas light services with Boston Gas.

Schumacher, Susi's landscaper, has completed tree installations on Old Rutherford Avenue, Russell, Lawrence and Devens streets and should be working the rest of the week on portions of Washington and Essex streets. Once again, please be aware that certain tree species will lose their leaves because of the transplanting and should refoliate, if not, they are warranteed and will be replaced. Susi is installing tree pits on Lexington and Mt. Vernon streets in advance of the plantings. When the spring planting is complete, the landscaper will go back and install the surface treatment of brick and mulch in the tree pit.

In anticipation of completing the major work of the reconstruction effort, punchlists are being formulated on each street by the Boston Redevelopment Authority and Bryant Associates. These punchlists will accommodate uncompleted contractural items like roof drain connections and list remedial work such as damaged sidewalks. Therefore, once the remaining streets such as Prescott, Prospect, Ludlow and Monument Square (lights only) are completed, Susi will be back to each street, accomplishing punchlist work.

On the Forty Flights, the Middlesex Corporation has been provided with its punchlist and is working toward completing the project within the month. Last week, upper Mead Street was paved and the contractor has been working on concrete wall finishes, railing paint and tree pits. Besides completing certain work items and repairs, only street signs and pavement markings remain to be installed.

Nobby combined his medical training and business backround as coowner of the Medford Family Health Center and the Somerville Diagnostic Center. In addition, during the 1992-93 academic year, he was an instructor in Ultrasound Technology at Bunker Hill Community College, and was a member of the Massachusetts Teachers

Association. Nobby married Peggy Lynch of Charlestown in 1987. In addition to his wife, he leaves two sons, Norbert C. Jr. "Jay" and Albert "Doug" of Charlestown; two daughters, Lauran of Lowell and Robin of Billerica; his daughter-in-law, Beth (Quinn) of Charlestown; and two brothers and five sisters. He was the sonin-law of Pauline (Shaw) Lynch and the late William I. Lynch of Charlestown.



CNC Approves Benefit Grants – Hears Plans For Building 104

There proved to be a full agenda for the members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) to consider at its monthly meeting on June 1. Vice Chairman Tom Cunha was in charge of the gavel in the absence of Chairman Peter Looney for part of the meeting.

Those present included Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, Treasurer Nancy Keyes and members Jeanne Davis, Bob Scalli, John Dillon, Tom Pitts, Jim Conway, Bill Galvin, Dennis Collins, Ken Stone, Judy Brennan, Bill Mc-Cabe, Edna Kelly and Moe Gillen.

Keyes, chairman of the Benefits Committee, read the report of the allocation of \$50,000 in community benefits money as part of the mitigation agreement with the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) and the community. She told the CNC that \$5,200 was designated for the Charlestown Emergency Fund under a prior council vote. The remaining \$44,800 was divided among the 24 organizations that submitted applications as follows:

Prior to the vote, a question was asked as to what was the Harbor School, and Keyes replied that a group was seeking seed money to begin an alternative elementary school in the Navy Yard.

The CNC voted to accept the recommendations of the committee.

Tom McIntyre of the Bricklayers and Carpenters Non-Profit Housing was introduced by Cunha to inform the CNC on plans for Building 104 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. McIntyre brought along a model of the building, which is on First Avenue adjacent to the Shipways condominiums.

McIntyre, whose organization constructed the affordable housing on 13th Street, stated that this \$5 million renovation project would create 46 units of low income elderly housing with 28 parking spaces inside the three-story structure. Persons eligible for this housing would be 62 years of age or older.

He said they would all be one-bedroom apartments with a separate bedroom, living room, kitchen and bath and they would all be in ADA compliance. The units would be between 650 and 750 square feet, depending on the design, and they would be heated by gas and have central air conditioning. The rent would include all utilities except a teleSince there is no land surrounding the building, plans include a solarium, an outdoor patio within the frame of the building, and a roof-top and outdoor decks. The facility would house a building manager, and would have two elevators and a recreation room.

phone.

McIntyre stated that the organization has been working with the city, state and federal governments to fund the project primarily with tax credits purchased by several companies who, in turn, become limited partners. He said that tax credits have been purchased by Houghton Mifflin, NYNEX and the Boston Company. The remaining money necessary for construction, about \$2 million which he called an "end mortgage," has been committed by the AFL-CIO for \$11/2 million and \$500,000 in linkage money from the city. He said that the zoning permits and Boston Redevelopment Authority designation are in place and they are "getting close to making a welcome addition to the Charlestown Navy Yard," adding that if the finances fell into place, construction could begin as early as July 1.

McIntyre was asked about the rent and it was stated that it would be \$500 per month. However, it was noted that 23 of the units will be under a projectbased Section 8 certificate with 30 percent of the eligible person's income allocated for rent.

Since the law on designating a specific number of units for the community has changed since the lottery for the affordable units on 13th Street, members asked that local residents be allowed to fill out applications prior to a citywide advertisement. They also asked that the housing office be located in Charlestown. McIntyre agreed to both of these requests. Cunha also asked McIntyre to meet with abutters at a Development Committee meeting if there are still concerns with the development.

A delegation from Charlestown Little League brought complaints to the CNC on the deplorable conditions of the field at Rvan Park that pose a safety hazard for the players. They stated that the majorleague field had been done over, but the minor-league field needs a new surface as it is covered with holes and there is a trench in the back of first and second base. One of the coaches stated the minor-league field was "not fit to play on."

It was suggested that a Basic Services Committee meeting be called to address these problems with representatives of the Boston Parks Department, and a recommendation was made that the meeting be held at the field.

On Wednesday, Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, contacted Boston Parks Regional Administrator James "Stretch" Walsh. She said that he promised that the work on the field would be done Thursday morning (today) in preparation for weekend play. He added that the field house is slated for renovation in 1994.

Cunha read a copy of a hearing notice from the Boston Licensing Board on a hearing scheduled for Wednesday, June 9 at 10 a.m. in Room 809A at Boston City Hall. The board will hear testimony on an application from CSTA Productions Inc., Anthony J. Costa, manager, for a CV 7-day All Alcoholic Beverage License with a closing hour of 2 a.m. for 258-260 Main St., the site of the former J.J. McCarthy's.

CNC members were concerned as to why the applicant did not make a presentation before the council. It was also noted that a recognized organization, the Mishawum Park Tenants Association (MPTA), represents the residents in the housing surrounding the site and they had not been notified of the hearing except through Evers and Looney.

It was voted that the CNC write a letter to the Licensing Board informing them



On Saturday morning, June 5 dozens of Charlestown residents who care about recycling will canvas the neighborhood.



will contain trees and shrubs, with a cost estimated at \$250,000.





Voke Praises Local Aid Increase

State Rep. Richard Voke hailed the initial success the House of Representatives has enjoyed by increasing local aid for the 351 communities of the commonwealth. Included in the House's budget recommendation is a \$46 million increase in lottery funds distributed to municipalities.

"Knowing only too well the many valuable municipal services provided to our citizenry, I am proud to add my voice in support of the added revenue for municipalities. Based on the lottery distribution formula, I am confident Boston will realize a fair share of these new monies," said Voke.

Voke pointed to other areas of the budget that call for returning more state funds to cities and towns. He stressed his strong advocacy for a \$5 million community policing grant program designed to empower neighborhood groups to fight criminal activities around their homes. Voke said the program would be particularly helpful in keeping kids away from drugs.

Charlestown's Representative also indicated additional funds would be channeled to local housing authorities earmarked for their fight against drugs and the violence that surrounds their trafficking. Along with the anticipated adoption of school aid and the recently affirmed plan to allow many school health clinics to access federal reimbursements, Voke said the Beacon Hill action was "the best news municipal budget writers have had in a long time."

"The people of Charlestown have sent me to the State House to look out for their best interests. Happy to receive such a charge, I am pleased to be able to deliver on these areas of local importance," concluded Voke.






