In anticipation of completing the major work of the reconstruction effort, punchlists are being formulated on each street by the Boston Redevelopment Authority and Bryant Associates. These punchlists will accommodate uncompleted contractural items like roof drain connections and list remedial work such as damaged sidewalks. Therefore, once the remaining streets such as Prescott, Prospect, Ludlow and Monument Square (lights only) are completed, Susi will be back to each street, accomplishing punchlist work.
On the Forty Flights, the Middlesex Corporation has been provided with its punchlist and is working toward completing the project within the month. Last week, upper Mead Street was paved and the contractor has been working on concrete wall finishes, railing paint and tree pits. Besides completing certain work items and repairs, only street signs and pavement markings remain to be installed.

## CNC Approves Benefit Grants Hears Plans For Building 104 <br> Cunha also asked McIn-

There proved to be a full agenda for the members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) to consider at its monthly meeting on June 1. Vice Chairman Tom Cunha was in charge of the gavel in the absence of Chairman Peter Looney for part of the meeting.
Those present included Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, Treasurer Nancy Keyes and members Jeanne Davis, Bob Scalli, John Dillon, Tom Pitts, Jim Conway, Bill Galvin, Dennis Collins. Ken Stone, Judy Brennan, Bill McCabe, Edna Kelly and Moe Gillen.
Keyes, chairman of the Benefits Committee, read the report of the allocation of $\$ 50,000 \mathrm{in}$ community benefits money as part of the mitigation agreement with the Massachusetts Wa ter Resources Authority (MWRA) and the community. She told the CNC that $\$ 5,200$ was designated for the Charlestown Emergency Fund under a prior council vote. The remaining $\$ 44,800$ was divided among the 24 organizations that submitted applications as follows:

- Andy Puopolo/Charlestown Pride - $\$ 300$
- Bunker Hill Museum $\$ 3,555$
- Teen Council - \$1,500 - CHAD Junior Bowling League - $\$ 2.650$
- Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club - \$3,521
- Christmas Walk - $\$ 50$ - Charlestown District Court - $\$ 1,850$
- Charlestown Interagency Elderly - \$800
- Charlestown Little League $-\$ 3,142$
- Charlestown Pop Warner - \$2,421
- Charlestown Working Theater - $\$ 4,350$
- Charlestown Athletic Association - $\$ 850$
- Charlestown Youth Hockey Association - \$1,442 - CYO Gym Hockey $\$ 900$

Since there is no land surrounding the building, plans include a solarium, an outdoor patio within the frame of the building, and a roof-top and outdoor decks. The facility would house a building manager, and would have two elevaors and a recreation room.
McIntyre stated that the organization has bee working with the city, state and federal governments to fund the project primarily with tax credits purchased by several companies who, in turn, become limited partners. He said that tax credits have been purchas ed by Houghton Mifflin, NYNEX and the Boston Company. The remaining money necessary for construction, about \$2 million which he called an "end mortgage," has been committed by the AFL-CIO for $\$ 1 / 2$ million and $\$ 500,000$ in linkage money from the city. He said that the zoning permits and Boston Redevelopment Authority designation are in place and they are "getting close to making a welcome addition to the Charlestown Navy Yard," adding that if the finances fell into place, con struction could begin as early as July 1 .

McIntyre was asked about the rent and it was tated that it would be $\$ 500$ per month. However, it was noted that 23 of the units will be under a project based Section 8 certificate with 30 percent of the eligi ble person's income alloca ted for rent.
Since the law on designa ting a specific number of units for the community has changed since the lottery or the affordable units on 3th Street, members ask ed that local residents be allowed to fill out applica ions prior to a citywide ad vertisement. They also ask ed that the housing office be located in Charlestown. McIntyre agreed to both of these requests.

will contain trees and shrubs, with a cost estimaled at $\$ 250,000$.
The committee had asked, and Massport agreed, that a community meeting would be held to solicit input into types of plantings. Gillen said that they hoped that persons interested in gardening would get involved.
Cunha stated that the information obtained on the five City Square parcels at the Planning and Zoning Committee meetings have been turned over to CBT/ Childs Bertman Tseckares \& Casendino Inc. to develop drawings on the parcels and it is expected they will complete the task by approximately the second week in July.
He went on to say that there will be two proposals for each of the five parcels and then the committee will reduce them to one proposal for each parcel. The committee will then come to the CNC for approval, with the next step being the submission of the proposal to the BRA.
Cunha added that when the City Square parcels have been completed, the committee will meet with the rest of the community on a precinct-by-precinct basis to discuss zoning of

that particular area.
Brennan, chairman of the Environmental Committee, handed out the Massport plan for the maintenance dredging of the Mystic River at the Moran Terminal as prepared for the interim report to MEPA
Brennan, who has attended several hearings on the project, said the dredging would reopen the depth at the Moran Terminal to its original depth of 40 feet in order to accommodate a shipping firm that requires the additional footage. She reported that by all accounts there should be minimal noise from the dredging, no odor, limited impact on marine life and, although lead, arsenic and PCB's will be dredged, they are not at a

"Knowing only too well the many valuable municipal services provided to our citizenry, I am proud to add my voice in support of the added revenue for municipalities. Based on the lottery distribution formula, I tery distribution formula, 1 realize a fair share of these realize a fair share of these
new monies," said Voke.
Voke pointed to other areas of the budget that cal for returning more state funds to cities and towns. He stressed his strong advocacy for a $\$ 5$ million community policing grant program designed to empower neighborhood groups to fight criminal activities
around their homes. Voke said the program would be particularly helpful in keeping kids away from drugs.
Charlestown's Representative also indicated additional funds would be channeled to local housing authorities earmarked for their fight against drugs and the violence that surrounds their trafficking. Along with the anticipated adoption of school aid and the recently affirmed plan to allow many school health clinics to access federal reimbursements, Voke said the Beacon Hill action was "the best news municipal budget writers have had in a long time."
"The people of Charlestown have sent me to the State House to look out for their best interests. Happy to receive such a charge, I am pleased to be able to deliver on these areas of local importance," concluded Voke.

(continued from page 7) justice system to ensure that justice is served. Our police officers must be trained to be problem solvers. They must work with neighborhood residents to identify the biggest problems as well as design innovative ways to prevent crimes from hap pening. Fll work for strong er sentencing. However, will never forget that most of all we need to prevent our youth from embarking on a life of crime in the first place. We need to give them good education and good jobs.
Salerno addressed the concerns of small businesses in Boston. "I will be proposing a $\$ 10$ million Small Business Equity fund which will enable small businesses to create over

700 jobs and help up to 200 businesses.'
She continued, "I will work to encourage manufacturing firms such as paper mills, plastic processors and de-tinning plants to locate in Boston after we have built our citywide recycling facility next summer. The companies that use recycled materials from this facility could create up to $\$ 750$ million annually and 2,000 jobs."
Salerno also promised to make city government more efficient by rewarding those city employees and agency heads who cut costs and improve services. She added "I will also work tirelessly to increase state and federal support for Boston. Bostor does not get a fair shake from the State House and cities across the country have not gotten a fair shake from Congress. I'll fight like a tiger for Boston at the State House and the White House, but I'll also say thank you."
She also outlined her vi sion for a clean, liveable Boston. Calling for a clean Boston Harbor, free from
raw sewage and industrial waste, she pointed out that ratepayers must not bear the whole burden of cleaning up the harbor. "I will join forces with the Boston business community and fight at both the state and federal levels for real rate relief. I have already introduced into the city council several proposals that would cut rates by up to 20 percent. The cleanup of Boston Harbor must proceed but not on the backs of Boston ratepayers.'

Salerno, in closing, emphasized her belief that integrity in government is essential in order to bring about real change. "I will promote respect. I will promote individual responsibility. And I will bring a new style of leadership to City Hall, where everyone gets a seat at the table but where everyone plays by a tough set of rules: cronyism, patronage, privilege, perks and payoffs are officially OUT. Justice and fairness, integrity and honesty in government are officially IN," she said.
