WHY CROATIA? HAVE YOU **EXPERIENCED CULTURAL SHOCKS?**

I didn't choose specifically because of the country but because of the project. My goal was therefore what the association offered, the use of non-formal education and the learning experience it could provide. Obviously without neglecting, though in the background, the opportunity to live abroad with all that that entails.

The truth is that I have experienced many cultural shocks on a daily basis but the ones I remember now concern especially the low awareness of climate change. While it is true that they use their bicycles a lot, on the other hand, they hardly recycle and consume meat almost every day.

WHAT DO YOU DO AS A **VOLUNTEER?**

My volunteer work with the Outward Bound Croatia association is divided into two. On the one hand we collaborate in the administrative part by helping in the creation of Erasmus+ projects or "youth exchanges" for example with the reception of participants. On the other hand, in the more practical part, we participate in expeditions organized by the association and we offer logistic support at the same time that we do other activities with the public we are addressing, which varies from 10 years old to adult age, depending on the projects to be carried out.



WHAT IS IT LIKE TO VOLUNTEER IN THE MIDDLE OF A PANDEMIC LIKE COVID-19?

Fortunately, in general, the situation has been relaxed compared to other countries because the borders were closed very soon, an advantage that was also helped by the fact that it is a small and predominantly rural country. Although the situation is now getting worse because of tourism, the change as a volunteer has not been dramatic.

Despite being in quarantine we were able to develop our administrative work and it served to get to know us with the rest of the volunteers, as we shared accommodation. I would be lying if I said that it was not hard at some point but at the same time I know that it was an unexpected event that would contribute to the long term in my life.

WOULD YOU RECOMMEND THIS **EXPERIENCE?**

Definitely, yes. Despite finding some shortcomings, such as lack of clear information before I arrived in Zagreb regarding what was expected of me as a volunteer, I am happy with my decision. It is wonderful to be able to work from a non-formal education after so many years focused on formal education, with people, moreover, with a great desire to learn and share in a more than enriching outdoor environment.

Getting lost in Exarcheia



If you are planning to go to Athens and you don't want to spend your time in touristic, crowded and mainstream places, you can't absolutely miss the chance to get lost in Exarcheia: the coolest and most alternative neighbourhood in town!

Exarcheia is located in central Athens, close to the historical building of the National Technical University of Athens.

The name of the district comes from a 19th century businessman called Exarchos who opened a large store there.

Very politically active and full of intellectual circles, Exarcheia is often considered the anarchist quarter of Athens. It's also a very popular student area in the Greek capital, despite the increase of the rent prices in the last few years.

Symbol of the resistance during the colonels dictatorship in the 70's, Exarcheia is a place the tourists hardly visited, but in the recent past things have changed.




Now it's one of the most trendy areas in Athens but still maintaining its own style and atmosphere. If you are looking for a bohemian and arty vibes area, then Exarcheia is the place you are looking for!

Its streets are full of beautiful street art and graffiti, lined with cool bars, alternative cultural centres, bookstores, squats, important social centers and small artisan shops.

As said before, Exarcheia has a long tradition of resistance. In 1973 the famous Great Demonstration against the regime took place; the military tanks crashed into and broke down the gates of the Athens Polytechnic where law students barricaded themselves. The uprising in the district contributed to the fall of the dictatorial regime in Greece.

Exarchia is based on solidarity, exchange, direct democracy and self-management. It's where you can take free yoga classes or where you can learn how to play guitar in exchange with other things that maybe you can do or teach. Abandoned buildings become squats or places to welcome refugees and/or people with fewer opportunities.

Nowadays Athens is living its moment of gentrification, like other cities in Europe, and Exarcheia has not been spared. For example, the number of the AirBnb in the area has increased a lot, causing an important increment of the prices. Despite that, Exarcheia is still a cool place where to live, get lost and breathe the air of one of the most authentic and iconic neighbourhoods of the greek Capital.



SERUINGS

COOK TIME

10 mins

PREP TIME

15 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 350 grams of spaghetti (or mezzemaniche, like in the picture)
- 2 egg yolks
- 120 g of guanciale (cured pork cheek)
- 80 g of pecorino romano (or parmigiano)
- 80 g of pecorino romano (or parmigiano)
- Extra virgin oil to taste
- Salt to taste
- Black pepper to taste

PROCEDURE

- 1.**Start from the** *guanciale*: Cut the *guanciale* into small chunks and gently brown it in a large pan (it's recommended to not use olive oil in the pan and let the *guanciale* cooking in it's own fat).
- 2. **Switch to the eggs**: Crack the eggs into a deep dish, mix in the cheese and a pinch of salt.
- 3. **Cooking the pasta**: Boil the spaghetti in plenty of salted water. Drain when *al dente* and pour into the pan with the guanciale.
- 4. Mix it all together: Remove from the heat and stir well, add the beaten eggs, then a generous amount of ground black pepper. Stir quickly so that the eggs become creamy, cooking only with the heat of the pasta to obtain a perfect carbonara sauce.

FORGOTTEN WOMEN OF HISTORY

Artemisia I of Caria (5th century BC)

Queen of Halicarnassus (now Turkey) and adviser to the Achaemenid Emperor Xerxes I, she distinguished herself so well at the battle of Salamis that the emperor would have cried out: "My men have become women, and my women men!"

Theano of Crotone (546 BC)

Member of the Pythagorean School, together with at least 17 other women, she wrote several treatises on mathematics, on numbers, on polyhedrons, on proportions, on order, on harmony and on aerial proportion. She was the first person to consider the existence of the golden number, a number with infinite decimal numbers (1.61803398874989...), a very advanced thought for this time.

Hydna of Scione (480 BC)

Trained in swimming since childhood, just before the Battle of Artemisium, she swam at night, with her father, 16 kilometers to break the moorings of Persian ships, causing considerable damage.

Aglaonice of Thessaly (1st or 2nd century BC)

One of the first female astronomers, she was regarded as a sorceress for her ability to make the moon disappear from the sky, which has been taken to mean she could predict the time and general area where a lunar eclipse would occur. A Greek proverb makes reference to Aglaonice's alleged boasting: "Yes, as the Moon obeys Aglaonice".

The Trung sisters (39)

They gather an army made up largely of women to fight against Chinese domination. They manage to liberate the north of the country. The history of these heroines would attest to the existence of a pre-Chinese Vietnamese society based on matriarchal power.

Diving into a plastic ocean

Have you ever been to a crystal clear water beach with the hope to go snorkelling and enjoy its fauna and suddenly find a seabed covered in trash? If your answer is yes, we are on the same boat.


For the past three years I have lived in la Costa Brava, a beautiful region to the east of Spain with plenty of spectacular coves and lots of natural sites to explore... idyllic right? Except that every time I go to the beach and dive in with my goggles I see the most unheard-of fauna around me: plastic bag "jellyfishes", soda can hermit "crabs", shoe "sharks", fishing net "algae" and microplastic "plankton".

Being able to live in such a stunning region and seeing how human waste turns up in the most unusual places has made me realize that we (people) expect a lot from nature but care less and less about it. We love going on a Sunday hike to a beautiful mountain or sitting at a virgin beach (alone, if possible) but when it comes to reducing our usage of plastic most of us find it so complicated. Don't dare suggest the idea of collecting trash at the beach - another person's trash, to be more specific.

Mahatma Gandhi said once "If you want to change the world, start with yourself" and that is what I try to do. Small actions like taking our own cloth bags to the supermarket, carrying a reusable cup and a straw for our take-away *freddo cappuccino* or buying produce in bulk can help reduce the amount of plastic waste we use every day.


Between scrolling down our feed and running errands for our daily life we need to find some time to take this slight effort for the planet if we don't want plastic in the oceans to outweigh fish as a report from Ellen MacArthur Foundation predicts for 2050. We humans, as all the other animal species, are one with the world. If we don't find our own way to live a more sustainable life and synchronize with nature we will soon be living in a planet short on resources and full of plastic.

Think about it. What small changes can you implement for a more ecological lifestyle?



The origin of the legend

In the 5th century, in Brittany (across the Channel) the Romanized people were in conflict with new (Saxons, Scots or even Angles). The legend says that among these resisters, There is a certain Artus. Lord of Camelot, accompanied by some brave knights around a certain «round table». does that ring a bell? Of course, its existence is not proven but in the year 1066, during the invasion of Great Britain by William the conqueror, a certain Raoul II de Montfort, lord of Gaël, hears these warrior's tales.Back in his lands of Paimpont, the knight echoes these legends and these war adventures continue to spread and inspire medieval writings.





In medieval arthurian novels

Brocéliande is quoted as early as the twelfth century in the writings of Wace, an Anglo-Norman poet, where he quotes the Breton knights who took part in the conquest of England including «Ceux de Brecheliant (sic) dont les bretons disent maintes légendes...». 20 years later, Chrétien de Troyes evokes Brocéliande as a wonderful forest in his book «Le Chevalier au Lion». In 1230, Robert de Boron was the first to associate Merlin with Brocéliande.

Etymology

The etymology of Brocéliande is uncertain, Indeed, the oldest known form is «Brecheliant», which could come from the Celtic «Brec'h» meaning «hill» followed by a man's name. The Brocéliande form, later, could be based on «Bro» (meaning country in Breton) but it is necessary to wait for Chrétien de Troyes to this variant. A popular etymology breaks down the word in «Broce» for forest and «liande» for heath.





Location

Most of the writings mentioning Brocéliande do not specify location, for Wace, the latter is in Armoricaine while for Brittany Chrétien de Troyes, it is on the other side of the Channel. Today following the Breton lords claiming to be part of the Arturian myth, the Brocéliande forest is located in the Paimpont forest, where Merlin's tomb, the fountain of Youth and many other sites of legends would be located...

In Occitania we have different landscapes: mountains, sea & countryside. Our mountains are called the Pyrénées.


Where to stay?

lowlands to highlands) is a must-do(in june). Visit a berlingo store in Cauterets, to witness their fabrication.




FOR THE SEA LOVERS THE COUNTRYSIDE AFICIONADOS

At the South-East of the region is the Mediterranean Sea. There is many cities to stay or visit(Collioure, Sète...) with beautiful sceneries. Check out their wineries, beaches, farmer's market. I have many favorites. It is hard to pick. I will let you explore.

If you want to visit the countryside, let me present to you the area where I live, this is the one I know the best, however it's beautiful everywhere.If you are a foodie:

Visit the "Foie Gras" museum and the fine wineries in the Cahors area. Try the "Quercy des Îles" a blend of wine from "Chasselas" & liquor.Since I just mentioned it, let me talk to you about "Chasselas".

A grape from Moissac part of the UNESCO immaterial heritage. A lot of places offer a gourmet market. We also have this amazing goat cheese called "cabécou". Try as well the Toulouse specialty: the violet flower.

MONTHLY RECOMMENDATION: SODA STEREO

Soda Stereo: a true legendary band

Soda Stereo started in 1982 and the trio was formed from Gustavo Cerati (lead singer and guitar), Zeta Bosio (bass guitar) and Charly Alberti (drums). Gustavo was also the songwriter and lyricist of most of their songs.

When in the first 80's New Wave music was starting to spread all around Europe (born from the ashes of Post-Punk) thanks to band like New Order, U2, The Cure or Depeche Mode and many others; in Argentina a band called Soda Stereo was starting a phenomenal musical career that will bring three guys from Buenos Aires to be one of the best (or probably the best) band of all times in Latin America.

Their fans say (and I totally agree), that if they would have sung also in English, they would have probably been recognized all over the world as much as other bands from Europe or USA. Despite that I'm quite sure that we all agree that Spanish is a fantastic language, and it sounds wonderful under the alternative notes and chords played by Soda in over 20 years of incredible career. They said more than once that they were influenced by artists like David Bowie or bands like "The Police". Soda really sounded like an alternative European band, but singing in Spanish...nothing than more great, in my opinion.

They also opened the road to other gorgeous bands and artists from other countries in Latin and South America. Soda represented a true real big revolution! Those were the years of the dictatorial regime of Pinochet in Chile, and people felt a sort of freedom listening to the music of that band who was wearing Goth clothes and very European 80's hairstyles.

They are considered in Latin America as the best "spanish rock" band ever, and there is no one, youngsters or elder people that don't know at least one of their songs. I recommend everyone to listen to all their albums and not only the mainstream and most famous songs. Through the years they were able to experiment a lot of kinds and genres of music; from new wave to post punk, from rock to alternative, from shoegaze to electronic. So, in Argentina and Latin America, Soda was making history, and in Europe, we didn't even notice. After their separation in 1997, they reunited once for their last big tour in 2007, called "Me verás Volver". In parallel and after their divorce Gustavo Cerati started a fabulous solo career. He sadly died in 2014, after four years of coma because a cerebral accident occurred after his show in Caracas. Venezuela. He's still considered the best Latin American artist of all times.
