

Presentation Of Symbolic Check Kicks-Off Barrett's And Boys & Girls Club Fund Raiser



BARRETT'S ON BOSTON HARBOUR restaurant celebrated its 10th anniversary in Charlestown on Sunday with an all-you-can-eat lobster dinner for \$10. Restaurant owners Frank and Richard Barrett took this occasion to kick-off a cooperative fund-raising venture between Barrett's and the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, which has the potential for the club to raise \$10,000. A symbolic check in the name of the club and signed "Richard Barrett and the people of Charlestown" was presented to Board Chairman John Iacoi and member Rob Ferris, marking the start of this venture. A dollar will go to the club for every special lobster dinner sold by Barrett's this week, through July 17. In addition, certificates will be sold by club board members and staff for \$10, good for that amount off any check per party at the restaurant, and the entire \$10 will go to the club. Weekday Hours At Clougherty Pool Extended By One Hour

An animated, yet productive meeting on July 11 at the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force office brought together some 25 residents who had concerns relative to the Clougherty Pool in the Doherty Park on Bunker Hill Street with Charlestown Community Centers (CCC) staff and board, which has the responsibility of running that facility.

CCC Administrative Coordinator Bob McGann spearheaded the discussion, supported by Assistant Coordinator Jeff Mc-Gann, CCC Board members and staff, and Boston Community Centers Assistant Director Charlie Clabaugh.

The meeting opened with an exchange of information. Bob McGann told the residents that he has been getting concerns on the pool brought to his attention second- and third-hand, and he wanted an opportunity to look at the options together with the residents.

He stated that the pool is currently open seven days a week from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. and is closed to the youngsters from 5 to 6 p.m. to allow for adult lap

Tennis Camp July 18-29

A Tennis Camp, sponsored by CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD), will be held July 18-22 and July 25-29 at the tennis courts behind the Charlestown High School athletic facility.

The camp, which will be run by David Burns, will start every weekday morning at 9 a.m. and run until noon. Youngsters between 7 and 17 who are interested in playing tennis are encouraged to attend. swim.

There was agreement among the residents that the hours of operation should be extended. One suggestion was that the pool open one hour later, which Bob McGann said was impossible because of the number of youth groups and campers using the facility. Another recommendation was that the hours of the staff be staggered, with half coming to work at 11 a.m. and staying until 7 p.m., while the remaining staff members begin work at noon and end at 8 p.m.

Yet another possibility

was to raise funds to pay staff for the extra hour each day. McGann stated that the cost for the pool to remain open one more hour for seven days amounts to \$484. This represents pay for the lifeguards and pool manager – money, he related, that was just not in the CCC budget.

As suggestions were brought forward, ranging from fees to fund raisers, Bob McGann stated that "almost anything was possible as long as it didn't jeopardize public safety or the limited budget."



TAX BREAK FOR PEOPLE WHO CHIP IN TO SUPPORT A RELATIVE

Brothers and sisters often chip in to provide financial support for an elderly parent. Even though none of the children individually may provide more than half the support (one of the requirements to claim someone as a dependent), as a group they may contribute more than 50%. One of the children, therefore, may be entitled to claim the parent as a dependent on his or her federal tax return.

Under the federal tax rules, it is possible to claim the dependency exemption when two or more persons together provide over one-half of a person's support. The exemption may be taken by any one of the individuals who contributed more than 10% toward the support during the year. Each person, of course, must otherwise be entitled to the dependency exemption except for the support test.

Support payments include outlays for food, clothing, housing, medical and dental care. The actual dollar amount you spend, however, may not necessarily reflect your total support. If the needy relative happens to live in your home, you can include the fair market rental value of the room furnished in calculating your total support.

Before filing your return, determine which person will take the exemption. Then, have the others sign IRS Form 2120, Multiple Support Agreement, which states that they will not claim the exemption for that year. Attach Form 2120 to the return of the individual claiming the exemption. You can rotate the dependency exemption each year, assuming you continue to meet the requirements.

Claiming a needy relative as a dependent could slash your tax bill even more if you contribute heavily toward his or her medical expenses. Combining your relative's medical expenses with yours may help boost you over the 7.5% threshold you must exceed in order to deduct your medical outlays on your federal return.


Tonight, Thursday, July 14, a Ball Hockey Skills Competition for both boys and girls will take place at the Eden Street Park at 7 p.m.

Foster Parents Needed In Charlestown

According to Bill Gilligan of the Mass. Department of Social Services, there is dire need for foster parents in Charlestown. Gilligan shares the story of how one Charlestown family became involved.

Colleen Costa of Charlestown went on vacation in 1989 with her family and little did she know that during her vacation at Hampton Beach, she was to make a decision that would change her life and the lives of her children. She would become a foster parent.

Today, Costa is a foster parent for the Department of Social Services and has been a foster parent since 1989 when she was involved with Catholic Charities. While on vacation five years ago, she met a foster parent who touched her very deeply by the love that the foster parent gave to the children she had taken into her home

At that time, Costa began to think that she could also help children in need and began to make inquiries. After the initial inquiry, Costa took the 10-week training program which is called Mass. Approach to Partnership in Parenting, known also as M.A.P.P. She welcomed her first child in 1989 and her sec-

ond child soon after that. Since that initial placement, she has had eight children and provided excellent care to all of them.

Sitting in her beautiful home, Costa had time to reflect on her years as a foster parent. Asked why she continues to be a foster parent, she said, "I really don't know, except that when a DSS worker calls and asks if we can take a child, my heart literally breaks and I say 'yes'." She shared an experience she had in the DSS office in Chelsea and said that while there, she saw a young girl waiting for a home and was told that it was the child's birthday. This reinforced her desire to become a foster parent.

Asked what types of challenges she has had, Costa said that there are many challenges, one of which is the fact that some children do not want to leave their families, even if there is a history of abuse or neglect, and another is to give the child a warm, loving and safe home. For the older children who come into her care, one of the biggest challenges is to help them and encourage them to stay in school, since much of their education has been problematic and many foster children

move from one section of the city to another.

When asked about types of support for her as a foster parent, Costa said that the Department is very supportive of her and her family and each child has a social worker and she has a family resource worker. Support is also available within the school system and counseling is there for the children through Medicare. Costa also said that she is very appreciative for the support from her neighbors and that she never feels alone.

When asked about time for herself, she said that she needs time to "step away and look at things objectively" as this is very important for her and her family. She also stated that there are a lot of children in Charlestown who need homes and that families should see their commitment to foster care as not only giving something, but in receiving children who are gifts in themselves. That is the joy of being a foster parent.

Living History Tours Of Historic Burying Grounds

The Boston Parks and Recreation Department's Historic Burying Ground Initiative is proud to sponsor its second summer of Living History Tours of the three historic burying grounds located on the Freedom Trail: King's Chapel (1630), Granary (1660) and Copp's Hill (1659).

The tours are artfully conducted by regionally recognized historical interpreter, Donna LaRue who entertainingly guides visitors through the historic sites donning the character and costume of Mistress Elizabeth DeLaRue, a late 18th century Bostonian woman, widow of the sea captain Elias DeLaRue (fictional). Mistress DeLaRue colorfully addresses the historic personages buried in Boston's hallowed grounds paying careful atten-

tion to accurate, factual representation embellishing with a King's English tongue. Mistress DeLaRue also captivatingly teaches about the symbolism and colonial iconography for which Boston's burying grounds are widely known.

The King's Chapel burying tour begins at 1 p.m. in the Tremont Street historic site. The Granary tour begins at 3 p.m. at the Franklin monument in the Tremont Street site. The Copp's Hill tour begins at 4:30 p.m. in the North End site, which is located at the corner of Snowhill and Hull streets just up from the Old North Church. A \$1 donation is respectfully requested from patrons. Attendees are welcome to walk the entire tour route with Mistress DeLaRue or attend site tour(s) of

their choice. The Living History Tours will be offered every Saturday in July and August at these times, weather permitting.

Boston's 16 historic burying grounds are the final resting place of such notable figures as Paul Revere, Samuel Adams, John Hancock and Mother Goose. The markers and tombs, some highly omate and others more plainly carved, are widely believed to represent some of the finest examples of funerary art in the country.

The city's Historic Burying Ground Initiative is a public/private venture whose mission is to restore all of the city's cemeteries. For further information, contact Elizabeth Shepard, project manager, at 635-4505, ext. 6516.

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Voke Cancels Check Bill

Rep. Richard Voke announced that the Mass. House of Representatives voted to reject legislation which sought to eliminate the practice of banks returning cancelled checks to their customers. The results of the vote, which kills the controversial bill, were greeted with cheers from Voke and his fellow consumer advocates in the House.

"This is a terrific victory for the Commonwealth's consumers," stated Voke. "I was glad to help lead the efforts to defeat this anticonsumer measure. It clearly was not in the best interests of checking account holders, especially

the elderly, who unfortunately are so often the target of the crime that this requirement is in place to stop."

The proposal, which received strong backing from the banking industry, called for Mass. to legalize check truncation. Voke said that if these agreements were allowed, banks would only be required to supply their customers with a minimum of information on a statement of account, and not the cancelled check. Many feared this would make it very difficult to catch forgery or unauthorized and altered checks. For countless others, a cancelled check is documented proof

of a payment.

Consumer groups hailed the vote and expressed optimism with the momentum that pro-consumer efforts, led by Voke, are gaining on Beacon Hill. Coming on the heels of much-welcomed medigap insurance reform, this action will ensure that appropriate protection is available to all who use checking accounts.

"Consumer protection has been and remains a top priority for me. Whether it be the banks, the utilities or the insurance giants, I will continue to take on any industry or company that seeks to infringe on the rights of Mass. consumers," concluded Voke.





★ Update From Leo . . . Leo Boucher of the Boston Parks Department offers the following update on several parks projects in the community:

 The portion of the new slide in the Doherty Playground that was damaged by vandals who cut out a section has been ordered by the Parks Department and should be installed shortly.

• The baby sprinkler pool at the Doherty Playground that was tarred in an early summer maintenance project will be painted when the temperatures get a bit cooler. In order to paint the pool, it would have to be closed for a day and a half. Boucher said the parks painting crew would be called in to do the task in the early morning, and the pool could be opened on the following afternoon.

Boucher reports that the engineer who would be responsible for drawing up the specifications for installing the sleeves to hold removable poles for a tennis net at the park at Old Rutherford Avenue and Union Street is currently on vacation.

★ "Thunderfest" Raises Questions And Concerns... The proposed "Thunderfest" that would see 70 to 100 powerboats docked in the Charlestown Navy Yard is less than two weeks away, and questions raised at a meeting with District One Boston City Councillor Diane Modica on June 8 have yet to be publicly addressed. Jerry Kilpatrick of Boston International Sports Promotion, sponsors of the event, reported at a Charlestown Business Association (CBA) gathering that the Coast Guard has issued a permit for these boats to race in the outer harbor. Spectators would not be able to view the race from the Navy Yard, but this was the site proposed for docking, servicing and events for the racers and their guests. The boats would be arriving in the city on Wednesday, July 27, with the racing finals on Saturday, July 30, and a Sunday, July 31 departure.

It has been rumored that meetings with various city departments have been taking place with reports surfacing that some permits are have been or are about to be issued. Questions have been raised on traffic and parking restrictions and parking arrangements within the town; public transportation; police and fire department details; a refuelling location, rumored to be at "Montego Bay;" limited vehicular access to the Navy Yard for the five days; sanitation facilities; trash containment and disposal; the location of a "pit" or boat repair area, rumored to be at the Yard's End; noise; pollution; and the locating of a "beer garden" on Pier 4 - to name a few of the concerns. The questions are evident but the answers forthcoming from various departments have been vague.

So once again, residents lack information and have had almost no input in preparations and plans for this five-day event that has been estimated to bring thousands of people into the community and at a location which Kilpatrick told the CBA members has been under consideration for nearly two years.

★ Assessing Department To Hold Meeting Tonight... The city of Boston Assessing Department will hold a community information meeting at 7 p.m. tonight, Thursday, July 14, in the fifth floor Piemonte Room at Boston City Hall. The meeting is being held in cooperation with the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services and is part of a city wide series to provide basic information regarding the assessment process, exemption programs and the Fiscal Year 1995 revaluation. It will give neighborhood taxpayers in Charlestown and the North End the opportunity to meet members of the district-based assessment team working in Wards 2 and 3 who are familiar with real estate market activity in each neighborhood and provide full-service valuation operations on residential, commercial and personal property.

For Fiscal Year 1995, which began July 1, each of the over 125,000 parcels of property in Boston will be re-assessed. The new assessment will be indicated in the FY 1995-Third Quarter bill which will be issued at the end of this year. Information will also be presented on both residential and personal exemptions. Renewal applications for personal exemptions will be sent out in late summer.



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Enjoying The Outdoors And Avoiding Lyme Disease

Summer is here. School is out and children are spending long, hot days outdoors. Since it is also deer tick and Lyme disease season, it is important to protect yourself and your family on the beach, in the woods, in the park or in your own backyard.

Out on trails and in the field, Mass. Audubon Society staff often meet people worried about getting Lyme disease after they see ticks on family members or pets. In fact, the ticks they can see are not usually Lyme deer ticks at all, but rather larger dog ticks. Deer ticks carry Lyme disease and immature deer ticks are about the size of the period at the end of this sentence. Adults are slightly larger and all ticks swell when they bite, filling with the blood of the host.

Lyme disease is an infectious disease caused by bacteria spread by the tiny infected deer ticks, which can neither jump nor fly. The disease has been detected all over the US. In Mass., the ticks are most often found on grassy dunes in coastal areas, on islands and in the Conn. River Valley.

Lyme ticks cling to plants near the ground in brushy, wooded or grassy places and are most active during the summer. They climb onto unsuspecting animals and people who brush against the plants. Watching out for and removing ticks promptly are the first steps in preventing infection. Fortunately, not all ticks carry the bacteria and the tick has to be attached for at least 24-48 hours to pass it on to the host.

Since deer ticks are most common in areas frequented by deer, one precaution is to avoid walking off trails and through long grass, brush or woods.

If your plans involve bush whacking or trail blazing in high risk areas, it's wise to guard against tick bites. Ticks are easier to detect against light colored clothing. Tucking long pants into socks and shirts in at the waist makes it more difficult for ticks to reach exposed skin. Using repellents that contain DEET on your ankles may stop a tick from crawling up your leg. To avoid potential health hazards, use products containing less than 30 percent DEET on adults and less than 15 percent DEET on children. Wash thoroughly when you come indoors if you have used repellent.

Check your body and clothing frequently and carefully for ticks. At the larval and nymphal stage, deer Actual size of Deer Tick is shown above with an enlargement shown below



ticks are often mistaken for freckles. They are most often found on the thighs, arms and underarms, behind the ears and along the hairline.

To remove a tick, grasp it with tweezers and pull firmly but gently until the mouth parts are released from the skin. Don't use matches, alcohol or acetone to coax a tick out of the skin. This may kill the tick and make it impossible to remove the mouth parts, and could lead to an infection. Put antiseptic on the bite, and drown the removed tick in alcohol or kerosene.

If you are bitten by a tick, watch for the single most important symptom of Lyme disease – a red, ringshaped expanding rash that develops several days to a month following the bite. If this rash appears, see a doc-

tor immediately. Unfortunately, only 75 to 80 percent of all victims develop the rash. Other initial symptoms include weakness, dizziness, headache, stiff neck, fever, muscle aches, general malaise, sore throat and swollen glands.

If untreated, the symptoms of Lyme disease often go away by themselves after a few weeks, but the person remains infected. Without antibiotics, about half of Lyme disease victims will develop the rash again in other places on their bodies, and many will develop more serious problems later.

In its later stages, Lyme disease affects major organ systems including the joints and nerves. Symptoms usually show up within four to six weeks, but can take up to two years to emerge.

It's easy to diagnose Lyme disease by the bullseye-shaped rash, but it's harder to pinpoint the disease without the rash because the symptoms mimic other ailments. Prompt treatment can prevent later and more serious problems.

Lyme disease is locally common in Mass, and its risks should be taken seriously. With a few precautions and knowledge of the symptoms, however, we can all enjoy the outdoors safely.

Weekday Hours At The Clougherty Pool Extended One Hour

McGann explained that the centers took a budget cut this year of some \$3,500. He said that in past years, the pool has opened before July 4th, but he felt that he "had stretched the money as far as he could this year and still maintain public safety."

He reminded the residents that a 20 to 1 ratio of swimmers to lifeguards must be kept, and lunches and days off must be considered in the scheduling. He noted that this year's staff includes one manager, an assistant manager and eight lifeguards. He added that certified staff was difficult to obtain this year.

Other questions included the elimination or the reduction of hours of the adult lap swim which McGann said was traditional and should continue to be offered. Another question concerned the utilization of the indoor pool at the Charlestown High School athletic facility. He responded that the pool was used and, in fact, some reduction in hours had occurred to extend staff time to the Clougherty Pool.

In pointing out the need for the Clougherty Pool remaining open another hour, residents spoke of returning home from work and not being able to take advantage of cooling off in the pool with the 7 p.m. closure.

Another complaint was that the pool was closing 15 to 30 minutes before the 7 p.m. closure to allow the lifeguards to clear the pool. McGann said he would make arrangements with the staff for two to arrive at work 15 minutes later and stay the 15 minutes at closing time so the pool would be cleared right at 7 p.m.

What was encouraging about this meeting was the enthusiasm and willingness of the residents to involve themselves in a solution to the problems at the pool. It was decided to form the Friends of the Clougherty Pool to work with McGann and the CCC to address problems that may arise at the facility and undertake fund-raising efforts directed toward extending the pool hours and possibly the pool season, if not for this year then for next.

Joanne Sindoris Doherty volunteered to chair the Friends committee and will be holding a meeting very shortly to look at fund-raising possibilities. In fact, Doherty's husband, Michael, said he would look at recruiting some volunteers to fill in lifeguard spots for next year.

Some residents were fearful that if the city saw that there were community fund-raising efforts, the pool budget would be cut even further. McGann assured them that this would not be the case.

McGann promised to work on a solution to extending the pool hours and get at least an initial plan set by July 13.

McGann was true to his word and on Wednesday he told the Patriot that beginning on Monday, July 18, the pool would be open from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday with the adult lap swim from 5 to 6 p.m. remaining. He stated that staggered work hours were not the solution, and BCC came up with some money for the extended hours. He related that they are still short and will be asking community organizations such as CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD) and the newly formed Friends for assistance.

McGann said the CCC would be absorbing the cost of swimming lessons which begin this coming Monday at 10 a.m. and are serving a record number of 73 young-sters.

The pool is still slated to close on Aug. 28, and an additional \$4180 would be needed to keep it open another week. This cost, plus a potential staffing problem as young people return to college, said McGann, make this additional week an almost impossible situation.

McGann promises to update the community on plans and changes in the pool schedule. For information on the pool, give a call to 635-5173.

BHCC Offers One Year RN Program For LPNs

LPNs may become RNs in one year in a program which will start at the Chelsea Campus of Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) in January, 1995.

In order to qualify for the option, students must apply for acceptance to the Nursing program through the admissions office at the Charlestown and Chelsea campuses before the start of the fall semester in September, fulfill the admission requirements; successfully complete the Nursing semester I Challenge in the fall of 1994 and the required general education courses.

Menino Announces Three Point Reform Of Zoning Process

Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently announced a three-point program to reform the Zoning Board of Appeals procedure that would substantially streamline the development process. The three-point program is the result of months of study by a task force appointed by Menino to implement reforms that would deliver zoning relief to homeowners and small businesses within 60 days.

The Three Point Program calls for the following:

The creation of a Hearing Officer Process.

The process will include restructured scheduling to allow case "batching" for expedited hearings for certain categories of projects including: finishing a basement, enclosing a porch, building a deck, adding a dormer, increasing the number of dwelling units from one to a maximum of three, and small improvements to commercial properties that do not involve entertainment, alcohol or common victuallers licenses. Applications that increase the gross floor area by more than 25%, increase the existing building height or require relief from any aspect of a restricted or historical district, will remain under the current process.

 When an application is refused by ISD for zoning relief, ISD apprises the applicant that the request falls under the category of the hearing officer process.

 The applicant applies for the hearing officer process at ISD. These applications are specially earmarked and the Board of Appeals is quickly notified.,

 The Board of Appeals assigns the case to a hearing officer. Public notices are sent out scheduling both a hearing officer hearing and a Board of Appeals final hearing.

 The application goes before a hearing officer. The hearing officer generates a full report along with a recommendation for action by the Board of Appeals.

 The hearing officer schedules expedited hearings on these "batched" applications. At the beginning of each scheduled meeting, the Board of Appeals votes final approval on these "batched" applications.

2. Limit Design Review.

Presently applications are routinely referred to the Boston Redevelopment Authority for design review which causes an unnecessary back log and an undue burden on both applicants and BRA staff. Menino has directed the BRA to examine the design review process and develop criteria that would limit the need for BRA design review on all projects.

Implement a User Friendly Application Process.

In the past applicants have gone before the Board of Appeals with incomplete applications because materials concerning the process are confusing and outdated. Therefore, Menino has directed the task force to implement a user friendly application process along these lines:

 A streamlined application process at ISD and the Board of Appeals.

 Improved communication between ISD and the Board of Appeals, including computerization and an interfaced system.

 Develop and promulgate regulations for practices and procedures before the Board of Appeals.

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

Governor Has Backed Funds For Camp Bunker Hill

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham has announced that Gov. William Weld has signed into law the funding for Camp Bunker Hill and for other items that will benefit Charlestown residents. Under a budget provision backed by Birmingham, Camp Bunker Hill will receive a good portion of a \$25,000 appropriation for Department of Mental Health camp programs.

"With these funds, Camp Bunker Hill can continue providing quality service to the area's emotionally needy children," said Birmingham.

He reported that the budget law also includes an increase over the current fiscal year of \$3.9 million in unrestricted local aid for Boston and a \$14.9 million increase in education aid. More MWRA rate relief will also be available from the state; the Chelsea Soldiers Home will receive a \$100,375 increase over last year's level; a lead paint removal loan program receives \$4.5 million; and a 3 percent Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) on pension income for state and municipal retirees is fully

As an author of the budget document, Birmingham was pleased with the governor's support for much of the plan.

"Due to annual increases in aid for education, in particular, Charlestown's young people may finally be offered the educational opportunities they deserve. I am pleased that both the legislature and the governor have kept their commitments to funding the Education Reform Act." Birmingham was a chief author of the act.

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



At St. Catherine's Parish, we have been deeply grateful to those who support us in so many ways and enable us to financially exist. Your generosity is subsidized by fund raising, tuition payments, our parish subsidy and our weekly

We now are a vital part of our interparish school, Charlestown Catholic, and have a solid responsibility, along with St. Francis de Sales and St. Mary's, to support the school.

With the economy down, the fund raising efforts have been curtailed at the parish level. We continually pursue tuition payments that may be late. Our parish subsidy has just been cut once again, and our weekly bingo players have decreased in number.

These things don't depress me, they challenge and energize me. My dream is that we may once again be a self-sufficient parish, able to pay our own bills and continually be proud of our accomplishments.

We truly appreciate the women and men who play bingo each week at our parish hall. Unfortunately, we now range between 100-120 players a week. We really need about 140 players to make the money we need for the parish and to continue our payments to the school.

For the past 25 years, our bingo was run very efficiently, but our chief operators needed to have some time for themselves and have retired. Luckily, two beautiful women, who love St. Catherine's very much, Julie Quinn and Susan Cannizzaro, have volunteered to run the bingo for the summer. This is not an easy undertaking, but they have succeeded in keeping things running smoothly. They have been supported by our regular bingo workers who volunteer their time each week because they, too, love the parish. We are also indebted to our school parents who work 10 bingos a year to help them with their children's tuition.

Believe it or not, Labor Day is Monday, Sept. 5, and we need to have a new "boss" for our bingo. We need a person who is willing to work each week to make our bingo all it can be and continue to give our people a chance to socialize on Tuesday evenings and possibly win a few dollars.

We are asking around for a new bingo coordinator but have not been able to find the person. It can be male/female, single/married, school parent/non-school parent, resident/ non-resident, younger/older, Catholic/other beliefs or none of the above.

We want to continue our bingo and to watch it grow. We need a person to come forward who likes being with people and wants to do something special for St. Catherine's.

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Warren-Prescott Students Learn History By Exploring Local Sites



JUST AROUND THE CORNER, a program that incorporates local history into the school curriculum, was enjoyed by students of the Warren-Prescott School during May and June. This visit to the Bunker Hill Monument was led by Historic Neighborhoods staff member Mica Pollock.

Every morning of the school year, buses arrive at the Warren-Prescott School in Charlestown. They bring children from across the city to learn in a common space. This May and June, students took time to learn about their common space neighborhood of Charlestown.

Domenic Amara, principal of the Warren-Prescott School had approached Nina Meyer, a Charlestown resident, who heads the Historic Neighborhoods Foundation of Boston. He asked about the possibility of implementing a local history curriculum in his school.

After several months of developing a curriculum on local history and architecture, which was named "Just Around the Corner," Historic Neighborhood staff member Mica Pollock spent May and June in partial residence at the school.

Students learned about the rich history of Charlestown, largely through a study of Charlestown's architecture and landmarks. On field trips and "treasure hunts" through the neighborhood, students, teachers and some supportive Charlestown residents learned to appreciate the offerings of the school's neighborhood. Most importantly students began to consider the rich history of all of Boston's neighborhoods.

This project was sponsored by the Mass. BioMedical Research Corp., and it enabled 400 students to learn history.

Amara plans to continue this local history curriculum and is looking for increased community involvement and support for this innovative way to make learning history fun. Students were asked to write short comments on their experiences. One wrote: "When we walked it was fun and gave us exercise. People that don't live here learned a lot about houses, people who lived there and about the Monument. We took pictures and it was a nice day."

Another said: "What I liked about the trip was that I got to learn about building materials, our city and I even got to take pictures. I never knew they made a wood monument and then a rock one. I learned how old a lot buildings are."

Yet another related: "I feel that the walk we took on Friday was very exploring and educational. I never knew buildings could be connected together. When I saw the Monument I was amazed at how big it was. I was really ready to climb it for the first time! I think the people who fought for our country were very brave. On the walk, I learned how old the homes were that people lived in who were in the war. We saw the Bunker Hill Monument and the statue of William Prescott. Next time I hope we can got to the Navy Yard.

And one student said: "My favorite thing along the tour was the Monument. I really wanted to go upstairs. We took pictures of everyone standing next to the statue of William Prescott. It was a very interesting thing to learn.
