Neighborhood Council Votes Approval For Increase In Navy Yard Luxury Housing

"In a perfect world, everyone's concerns would be taken care of at the outset of any project . . . but it's not a perfect world. It may not be the best deal the community could get, but is it something for the community," said John Tobin. president of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council at a special meeting on June 23, prior to a roll call vote concerning proposed construction in the Navy

The Council met so that residents could discuss the Immobiliare of New England's proposal to increase the number of luxury condominium units to be built on Pier 5 and in Building

197 from the previously Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) approved total of 220 units to a total of 322 units.

Tom Cunha reported to the approximately 100 people in attendance that some Council members felt that there had not been enough discussion or public input (continued on page 3)

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

on this proposal at the June 17th meeting of the Housing and Development Committee and that the Council was opening up the discussion because of concern by the BRA about the public process.

Jim English of the BRA said this project proposed by Immobiliare included the 322 condo units, parking spaces and retail spaces.

According to the BRA, the \$35 million structure on Pier 5 will create 175 permanent jobs and 529 construction jobs. The proposed 110 residential units will total 195,000 square feet and 118 parking spaces will be provided.

John Weigel, vice-president of The Architects Collaborative, Inc. and the architect for Immobiliare said that the Pier 5 building would stand 84 feet high and be broken into two separate parts, one measuring 100 feet and the other 400 feet long. A 20 foot public promenade area would surround the Pier and a 50 foot set-back at the end of the Pier would serve as an open space public plaza.

The BRA said Building 197, which already stands in the Yard, should cost \$61 million for development, and create 200 permanent and 1,127 construction jobs. There would be 212 residential units with 460 parking spaces provided in a

total of eight garage levels. Weigel said that three levels would be above ground in the building and five levels would be underground at the front of the building.

Presently, Building 197 stands 93 feet tall and the BRA wants a 110 foot restriction. Weigel said that Immobiliare is negotiating the implications of the height restrictions." The Immobiliare proposal called for building mechanics to be placed on the top of Building 197 and called for a height of 123 feet. A question exists as to whether the mechanics are included in the 110 foot restriction or are in addition to it, said Weigel.

Tied into the request for approval of the proposed additional 102 condominium units is a contribution to the Bricklayers and Laborers Non-Profit affordable housing development slated to be constructed on Parcel 4A located on Thirteenth Street in the Navy Yard

English stated that the BRA, Immobiliare and the Bricklayers Non-Profit have negotiated the terms for land and a construction financing contribution. He said that the figure of \$1 million for a land contribution for the affordable housing was a "guestimate" of what would have been realized for a development at fair market value on the

P-4A parcel, but the land has been donated at no cost by Immobiliare. The Bricklayers Non-Profit will construct the 48 units and also receive an \$866,000 Immobiliare contribution for construction financing.

English said that the \$866,000 represented the difference between the amount needed to construct the units less the moderate sale price.

A lottery will distribute the affordable housing. English said of 1,700 applications that were "picked-up," more than 720 were filed. Seventy percent of the units will go to Charlestown residents, while 30 percent will go to other Bostonians.

Although Weigel was at the June 23 meeting, a presentation on the proposed development was not made. However, Weigel did present the proposal at a June 17 Committee meeting with approximately ten residents in attendance.

The Committee voted 6 to 4 to recommend approval to increase the number of residential units, to keep the design of the structure open to discussion and have the BRA meet with the Coun-

cil and the Committee to keep track of the number of Charlestown jobs.

Some controversy developed because the issue was addressed by the Committee the night before Immobiliare was slated to go to the BRA Board on June 18. (continued on page 6)



At the June 23 meeting, residents who spoke before the Council's discussion expressed opposition, but the majority supported the proposal even though they had not seen the plans for the development. Issues raised by residents included traffic, jobs, housing for young families, community control on future projects.

Resident Ellen D'Ambrosio questioned English as to what would happen if the requests for this development were refused. She added, "Would all our hopes and dreams [for affordable] housing get flushed down the drain?"

English stated that the BRA desires that the affordable housing project continue. He said that the Bricklayers "need an infusion of money and the land for nothing . . . if those numbers [sought by Immobiliare] are not agreed upon, then we would have to begin the negotiation process anew."

Board member Kathryn Downing questioned English as to whether any of the 322 units were affordable, to which English replied "No."

She noted that at the going sales prices of condominiums in the Navy Yard. just the sale of four units at \$500,000 each would subsidize the developer's contribution to the community.

Charlestown resident Bob Wallace said, "I would like to see the community stay on top of it and demand more, not only of the people down the Navy Yard, but also from the BRA. At least Immobiliare is giving us something back when no one else has done that."

Various union personnel spoke in favor of the proposed expansion. Tom Harrington and David Dow, carpenters; John Fitzgerald, electrician; Joe Nigro, Boston Building Trades; and Peter Looney, metal worker, all echoed the sentiment that the development would create jobs.

Resident Gloria Conway said she feared the precedent this development was setting for the future. She said that the community is supportive of affordable housing but "I hope this is not a precedent for other developers by attaching affordable housing to 322 units that a 'Townie' can't

afford. Is there going to be an attachment to every vote that comes along . . . because affordable housing is probably the prime interest of . . . this community? I'm very sad that this is so closely attached and we are not able to look at the number of units and the questions that it [this development] raises in and of itself."

Elaine McCarthy expressed her concern about the increase in traffic that this project would generate. Cunha countered, "Anything that comes before this board always reverts back to traffic . . . if we don't supply housing, no one will care about traffic because they won't be living here to care."

Several Navy Yard residents, while supportive of affordable housing, expressed concern over the change in plans. One resident noted that "Immobiliare is taking advantage of the situation . they are just steam rolling along."

Council member Steve McHugh prefaced his remarks by stating, "I am in favor of affordable housing - there should be a great deal in the Navy Yard and the sooner the better."

McHugh reminded the Council that when they met in closed session with the BRA, they were given binders with descriptions of the Navy Yard parcels. In the description of Building 197. there was a notation for 210 units, including 40 affordable. He said, "Now we are talking about 322 units and what seems to be is that 40 units of affordable housing have been dropped out of this development."

McHugh noted that the community has heard about the Bricklayer's proposal for almost a year and any "economic distress on this parcel" was not widely known. He questioned as to whether the \$2 million set aside by Immobiliare for affordable housing was "too small an amount of money" especially in light of the fact that 40 units of affordable housing are being dropped. He said, "Is making up the difference on the Bricklayers housing enough? There may be good reason that we are having a short time to discuss this and few facts."

Speaking in support of the proposal, Dennis Mc-Laughlin said, "We are

talking about places for people to live. We're not talking about the dream house, they're talking about any house [for people] to call their own. When Gloria talked about people attaching this to that, if that's the way the money is raised then that's the way the money is raised."

Kathryn Downing spoke of the long-term affects this development could have on the whole of Charlestown by relating it to the development that changed the North End. She said, "When the North End waterfront was empty, the way the Navy Yard has been for years and years, that was handed over to developers who built a lot less in the North End then they're asking to be built here. Those condos on the piers in the North End have changed not just the waterfront, but also the North End.'

Council member Moe Gillen, while supportive of the proposed expansion. noted, "Rather than let the BRA off the hook tonight. there should be a clear understanding by the BRA and developers that we are not going to be the carrot and donkey for their developments . . . Let us say yes, we support this, but we hold them to commitments

The Council voted 16 to 2 to accept the recommendation to approve the increase in the total number of units for this development from 220 to 322. The two dissenting votes were cast by Kathryn Downing and Steve McHugh.

The second portion of the Council's meeting consisted of reports given by Committee chairmen.

Moe Gillen, chair of the Human Services Committee reported on the linkage money distributed among organizations in the Town. He said the linkage money should amount to approximately \$345,000 and the committee seeks input into its distribution.

According to Chairman Tom Cunha, the Housing and Development Committee will meet next Monday, June 29 to continue discussion with the BRA on the Navy Yard development. The Proposed Land Use and Planning Committee was established as per a suggestion by BRA Director Stephen Coyle. Dennis McLaughlin will resign as chairman of the Public Safety Committee to accept this new chairmanship.

Gillen said that this Land Use Committee will oversee future zoning in Charlestown on both sides of the wall. Input will be requested from residents who have been involved with zoning issues.


Winner In License Plate Lottery

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Board Of Appeal Denies 127 Main Street Development

The City of Boston Board of Appeal has told Dick Held to go back to the ol' drawing board for the proposed development of his vacant lot at 127 Main Street and "redesign the whole project.'

Dick Held, who owns the Charlestown Liquor Store at Thompson Square and the adjacent vacant lot, planned to construct 21 condominium units, two retail stores and parking spaces for each residential unit. The proposed four-story, 44 foot structure would extend between Main and Warren Streets. The project was denied without prejudice at the request of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council's Housing and Development Committee which wanted to give the abutters time to meet with Held to voice their particular concerns.

Chia-Ming Sze, a member of the Board of Appeal, said four specific areas had to be addressed before any construction can begin.

The four points discussed at the June 23 Board of Appeal hearing were:

- · the fire escapes are not adequate;
- · the building is not safe in design:
- the garage layout does not work; and
- · the density is cramped. Held has up to one year to come back to the Board of Appeal with a new de-

Prior to the Board hearing, three meetings were held, including the Design Review Committee of the Charlestown Preservation Society on June 3, the Housing and Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council on June 17 and one between Held and the abutters

on June 22. When Held and his attorney, Michael LoPresti, first presented plans to the Preservation Society Design Review Committee, a number of questions were raised regarding parking spaces, room for truck deliveries, the metal garage doors, the 12 foot 8 inch alley behind the liquor store, the exposed dumpster and the height of the build-

Changes proposed at the Housing and Development meeting included:

- · covering the dumpster and placing a wrought-iron fence around it for "asthetic" appearances with trash removal occuring one to three times a week;
- · an average of 15 truck deliveries per week would be done by small trucks around a curb cut 12 feet wide, so with a wider cut drivers could make "smaller swings;"
- · to prevent trash pile-up and loitering, the alleyway would be butted to the first floor level of the Main Street building located ad-

jacent to the proposed building; and

· the centered, metal garage doors would, instead, be separated by a window and be wooden.

The parking spaces and the height remained unresolved issues. Abutters and community residents opposed a four-story building in the area.

The height measurement given at the Committee meeting was 42 feet, as opposed to a 44 foot figure presented at the Preservation meeting. Other Warren Street building sizes given by LoPresti included: 40 feet for the building next to the lot; 36 feet for the building across on Warren Street; 16 feet for the Liquor store; and 30 feet for the Gable House.

At the Committee meeting. Joe Cefalo said that "the highest building on Warren Street is 36 feet." He added that he has "no other opposition" to Held's proposal other than not wanting a building higher than 36 feet.

LoPresti said that the four-story height comes at the request of the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA). Jean Hamilton of the BRA was present at the Committee meeting and said that there was a June 12 meeting between Held and the BRA. She added that "the BRA did not mandate a four-story building" at that time - it is "still under

review."

Housing and Development Committee Chair Tom Cunha said that if a two-car family moved into a unit, one member would have to search for a space along nearby streets because Held only offers one space per unit.

Resident Helen Burns asked LoPresti what consideration would be given for condominium guest parking so that neighborhood residents would not loose their spaces.

"To answer you honestly, we have no plans" (for guest parking) said Lo-

Abutters and neighbors in the Main and Warren Streets area held a meeting on June 22 with Held, his partner Paul Kelly and architect Dom Valente to address specific problems.

Approximately 20 people met for an hour before the developers arrived. Some of the problems discussed repeated those concerns expressed on June 17 including: sunlight loss, parking, the height of the structure, and the "dull" Warren Street side of the building.

The abutters were in full agreement with Fred Cefalo of 3 Cordis Street who said, "He (Held) does have a right to develop (the lot)."

"But, not at the expense of his neighbors," added Carol Bratley whose business is nearby.

LoPresti said that an ear-

lier proposal presented at the June 17th Housing and Development Committee meeting to separate the garage doors on Warren Street "did not please people." Instead, the developer's "new concept" was to put the entrance on Warren Street and the exit on Main Street.

He also said that the distributors who deliver to Held's liquor store have "agreed to do so" with small trucks to enable easier deliveries and parking.

Valente presented a more detailed proposal saying that the Warren Street side of the building would have one garage door, one retail store opening, the elevator, and the ramp down to the lower level. The Main Street side would have the garage door to six spaces on the ground floor on the left side of the building, windows in the middle and the commercial space on the right side.

The question of a shadow study relating to sunlight loss after the construction of the proposed buildings was introduced by Fred Cefalo. Although, LoPresti said no study had been done, he had said at the Committee meeting that "no one will be deprived natural sunlight." He also distributed Polaroid pictures taken the week of June 7 to back his point.

At the meeting with the abutters, Valente said a study "could be done" and "would be done if required." He added that it is based on assumption and not an exact science.

"No one can say the sun will be here at 3 o'clock on January I," said Valente.

The abutters said that they appreciated the changes and effort made by the Held group, but they were not ready to endorse the

The abutters requested a future meeting with Held so he may present a more detailed plan of his proposal.



New Housing Planned For Washington Street

A plan for five new units of housing to be located on Washington Street was presented to interested residents at a public meeting on Monday, June 22 at the Mary Colbert Apartments.

Charlestown resident Timothy O'Connell of Gate 5 Associates, described the housing, which will be located between Washington and Lynde Street, and numbered 88, 90 and 92 Washington Street. O'Connell stated that a total of five condominiums will be constructed in three attached buildings. Two of the buildings will house two twobedroom condos, and the

three bedroom single.

O'Connell pointed out that the four two-bedroom condos will contain between 1,100 and 1,200 square feet each, while the single family will be approximately 1,700 square feet. There will also be five

deeded parking spaces at the back of the houses.

"We will duplicate 86 Washington Street [the last row house currently on the street] as closely as possible," stated O'Connell. "The three structures will be brick with no setbacks

O'Connell stated that they are prepared to begin construction as soon as permits are secured and they are prepared to start during this building season.

Reaction to the proposed housing, by those in attendance, was unanimously favorable.

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
