

CA/T To Present Bridge Design **Review Committee Recommendation**

Representatives of the Central Artery/Tunnel Project will hold an open house from 7 to 9 p.m. on Monday, March 30 at the upper hall of the Knights of Columbus, 75 West School St. Assistant Secretary of Transportation Stanley Durlacher will present an overview on the Bridge Design Review Committee process and its recent vote.

The committee has voted unanimously to endorse the state's current design for the Charles River Crossing and its list of outstanding issues that need to be resolved. The proposal uses a cablestayed bridge and reduces the number of looped ramps needed on the north bank of the river through the use of tunnel connections. The State Executive Office of Transportation is now in the process of securing approvals.

The overview will be immediately followed by an open house where community residents can view the design and ask questions.

★ Medford Street... Massachusetts Water Resources Authority Community Relations Coordinator Carrie Fuchs has informed the Patriot that work being done at the former Revere Sugar Refinery on Medford Street is nearing completion.

Fuchs stated that the heavy equipment on the site was used for the demolition phase of the project which started Feb. 16. Five buildings on the site were leveled and debris cleared away, she said. Steel and metal from the demolition have been recycled, according to Fuchs.

"Basically," she stated, "we are following the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). Rehabilitation of Building 6 for personnel on the pier has begun and the contractor will start driving piles for the construction of the pier as the next phase of the project."

Fuchs said that MWRA is waiting for the contractor to submit landscaping plans for the Medford Street portion of the parcel. According to Fuchs, these plans will be presented to the community in early May.

★ Neighborhood Council . . . The Charlestown Neighborhood Council will hold its monthly meeting on Thursday, April 2 at 7 p.m. at Bunker Hill Post No. 26, The American Legion Hall at 23 Adams St. Please note change in date and location.

★ City Square Park . . . The Boston Landmarks Commission (BLC) heard testimony from Charlestown residents on the Commission's possible impact on the development of the City Square Park at a hearing held on March 24 in City Hall.

Among those speaking were Judy Evers, community liaison with the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services; Ken Stone, chairman of the City Square Park Committee; and Charlie Clabaugh, aide to Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini.

Evers informed BLC that community residents had put in a lot of hard work over a long period of time to create a park design. She requested that BLC not set this design aside when determining whether to include historic interpretations in the park.

Evers added that the community would welcome the involvement of BLC in determining a suitable historic dedication to the Great House, once the construction of the park is completed.

Stone echoed Ever's comments, and added his request that the BLC not interfere with the process already underway to develop the park in City Square. "We don't want a delay that would create difficulties in the schedule," he said.

Clabaugh added his support to the park design that had been prepared under the direction of the City Square Park Committee.

BLC Acting Director Michael Cannizzo said that its was not the Commission's intent to design the park. He informed those

at the hearing that their comments would be taken under advisement, and the Commission would discuss the City Square Park and make a ruling in the near future.

Residents who were unable to attend the hearing but would still like to comment, should write to Cannizzo at the Boston Landmarks Commission, Room 805, Boston City Hall, Boston, Mass. 02201. The deadline for the submission of comments is Friday, March 27 at 5 p.m.

★ Ward 2 Election Recount . . . The Boston Election Commission, at the request of Ward 2 Democratic Committee candidate Bill Galvin, held a recount of the Ward Committee vote on March 24. Galvin requested the recount after losing his bid for a seat on the 21-member Ward Committee by 12 votes.

The unofficial tally from the recount showed some changes in the vote, moving the positions of some candidates. However, Galvin's vote was six under his nearest opponent.

The Commission's Board of Election Commissioners will meet on Friday, March 27 to certify the recount results. Galvin has petitioned the Board to consider his request to hear his concerns on the election prior to their vote on the matter.

Following the certification of the official recount, the vote will be published in the **Patriot**.

★ Public Hearing On Water And Sewer Charges... The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority will hold a public hearing to seek comments and feedback from elected officials, residents, representatives of industries and other interested parties concerning the Authority's Fiscal Year 1993 budget, including wholesale water and sewer charges.

New charges will take effect July 1, 1992. Preliminary wholesale rate announcements were released in February.

Charlestown's Bunker Hill Council # 62. Knights of Columbus, the first council to be chartered in Massachusetts, celebrates the 100th anniversary of its institution on April 10. Acclaimed by historians of the Knights of Columbus as the "Pioneer Council" that brought Columbianism to Massachusetts, its history reflects a steadfast adherence to its founding principles in spite of a century of change.

100 Years Ago

One hundred years ago, life in Charlestown centered upon the family and the Catholic church, two sacrosanct institutions to a burgeoning Irish-American population that had firmly taken hold in Yankee Charlestown. Symbolic of the growth of the Irish population and the sheer force of numbers was the sight of Catholic school children filling the brand new St. Francis de Sales Parochial Grammar School to capacity on its inaugural day, while Irish surnamed politicians represented Charlestown at virtually every level of local and state government.

Across the North Washington Street Bridge, 95 daily and weekly newspapers served as the only means of mass communication. The soon-to-be-hated "El" had yet to be constructed; on April 10, 1892 it was nothing more than an urban planner's vision. The first American-made automobile had just been perfected by its inventors, the Duryea brothers. That meant the typical journey into downtown Boston was negotiated on foot over cobblestoned streets or by horse-drawn trolley

In the nation, Ellis Island in New York Harbor opened as the point of entry for immigrants. After The Ball was the popular sheet music of the day, selling millions of copies. Milk sold for 27 cents a gallon; bread, five cents a pound; a three-bedroom home listed for \$2,000.

Against this backdrop of what was a worknear-the-home era, local men joined labor unions, political ward clubs and social organizations to provide for the needs of family, advance one's standing and serve the community. This compelling force of fraternalism that characterized social life 100 years ago also led to the birth of the Knights of Columbus in Charlestown.

The Beginning of Bunker Hill Council

The story of how the Knights of Columbus came to be in Charlestown begins with an early 1892 trip to Providence, R.I., where a group of Charlestown men visited the quarters of Tyler Council # 45. There, the Charlestown delegation sought an explanation of the workings of this new Catholic men's fraternity and, sufficiently enthused, returned to Charlestown to call for the formation of a local council.

That call was voiced at a March 1892 meeting held at Mishawum Hall, then located at 11 City Square near the old YMCA. The meeting featured the remarks of John T. Phelan of Bridgeport, Conn., then Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus who, with his National Secretary Daniel Colwell of New Haven, Conn., traveled to Charlestown to outline the principles and objectives of the Knights of Columbus. As reported by William O'Neill, a Cambridge historian, in his 1897 book History of the Knights of Columbus, Phelan and Colwell were enthusiastically received, evidenced by an immediate agreement to organize a council upon conclusion of the meeting.

Dunn of 25 Medford St. called the meeting to order, though is was chaired by James E. Conley of 31 Mystic St. Conley was a prominent businessman, owning an interest in a steam laundry known as Munroe and Conlev at 14 Dunstable St. O'Neill's History profiles Conley as a "leading personality of the Archdiocesan temperance movement" and noted his active membership in the Catholic Total Abstinence Society of Charlestown.

Also present at that meeting and further indicative of the caliber of men who had agreed to undertake the founding of a Council was 36-year-old Atty. James E. Hayes, a resident of 20 Everett St. Hayes had just been elected one of Charlestown's representatives to the Massachusetts Legislature and would later ascend to the Massachusetts Senate. His affiliation with the charter members of Bunker Hill is worthy of extra attention as he would become the first State Deputy of the Massachusetts State Council in 1893 and, in 1897, become the first Knight outside of Connecticut to gain election as the Order's Supreme Knight.

Upon his untimely death in 1898, a grateful Charlestown would honor Hayes by designating the intersection of Bunker Hill, Vine and Moulton streets as Hayes Square.

At the organizing meeting, a nominating committee of six recommended Conley's appointment as the first Grand Knight and Hayes' designation as Deputy Grand Knight. As for a name, Dr. John Duff, a local physician, proposed to commemorate the bravery of Irish patriots at the Battle of Bunker Hill by naming this new Charlestown organization Bunker Hill Council, Knights of Columbus

Brothers Conley and Hayes joined 23 other charter members (O'Neill's history lists 33 charter members) at Charlestown's Knights of Pythias Hall, 2 Main St., on the afternoon of April 10, 1892. There, Supreme District Deputy John Drury of Tyler Council # 45 led a large delegation of members from Tyler, San Salvador, Roderego, Delaney and LaSalle Councils in overseeing the institution of the first Massachusetts council.

Knights of Columbus Comes To Massachusetts

Exactly 10 years and 12 days after the Governor of Connecticut signed legislation incorporating the Knights of Columbus in Connecticut, the order had its foothold in Massachusetts. Brother Conley, who would serve only two months of his inaugural term before resigning the Grand Knight's chair to Brother Hayes, joined his successor and Thomas H. Cummings in promoting the order across the state. Their combined efforts led to the institution of 72 Massachusetts councils by 1897, accounting for onethird of all councils and one-half of the order's total membership. Cummings was so successful he was appointed National Organizer in 1894.

With charter in hand, Grand Knights Con-




tributions to the endowment of a "Knights of Columbus bed" at Carney Hospital and assistance to the State Council in its underwriting of a Chair of Secular History at Washington University.

As a matter of regular practice, support efforts for the surviving families of deceased members were routinely undertaken. The practice of extending use of the council's meeting rooms for the charitable needs and purposes of other Charlestown organizations a tradition that continues to characterize the council's service to Charlestown today began with authorizing the use of Bunker Hill's meeting room by the Charlestown Lodge of Workmen. Decoration of deceased members' graves occured routinely each year; support of Catholic orphan children was promoted as a community concern and a council project; and the underwriting of a disabled members' relief fund was accomnight and an annual grand ball to the roster plished.

These acts of charity set a precedent that would be followed yearly by each succeeding Grand Knight and his council officers. Each generated the goodwill that translated into an expanding roster of membership which, in turn, enabled the council to accept the Warren Institute of Saving's offer to sell the former and socially exclusive Charlestown Club at 44 High St. to Bunker Hill in the early fall of 1907. With a membership emboldened by the consolidation of the Charlestown and Federal Councils, the adoption of the Daughters of Isabella as an auxiliary and now its purchase of a permanent quarters, Bunker Hill Council was well on its way to becoming the pre-eminent social and men's fraternal organization that it would be for decades to come.

Members of the Charlestown-To-Charlestown Committee, sponsors of the race, had tallied the votes that evening as family and friends of the candidates waited anxiously for the announcement.

The final tally ended over two months of campaigning during which time the candidates sold votes for \$1 each. The money realized from the election provides prizes for the Mayor and the other candidates; helps to defray the expenses incurred in the Mayor's race and for the Charlestown Rose Contest held in June; provides trips to Ireland for the Rose, her escort and the Mayor; funds the trip to Ireland drawn on election night from the ballots cast for the candidates; pays for

the parties and receptions related to the Mayoral and Rose Contests; and provides funds for various charitable donations within the community.

Charlestown-To-Charlestown Committee Chairman Arthur Hurley told the audience that when the committee was formed 10 years ago, its members had no idea how it would develop. He noted that they were very proud to have established two institutions in the town - the Charlestown Mayor and the Charlestown Rose.

Hurley introduced John Curran, host of the Sounds of Erin radio program, who acted as Master of Ceremonies.


Voke Supports Girl Scout Cookie Sale
