May 14 Meeting

To Save Our Libraries

The Charlestown Friends of the Library will hold a special meeting on Thursday, May 14, at 7:00 at the Charlestown Branch Library to discuss the severe budgetary crisis facing the Boston Public Library System. The Boston Public Library budget has been cut almost in half, from \$10.3 million this year to a working budget of \$5.5 million for the fiscal year beginning July, 1981.

Representative Richard Voke and Arthur Snyder, President of the Boston Public Library Board of Trustees, will address the meeting and will answer ques-

tions concerning efforts to restore funding and the implications for our library system if these efforts fail. It is important that as many Charlestown residents as possible attend this meeting to inform themselves of the issues and to demonstrate their concern and support for the public library system.

At the meeting a petition to Save Our Libraries will be presented to Mr. Snyder and Rep. Voke. After being in circulation for only one week, the petition has more than 500 signatures and many more are expected before the May 14 meeting.

Among the comments Charlestown residents have added to the petition are the following: "It would be devastating for me if the library closes. A senior citizen"; "I need access to books for my 3 year old"; "As a teacher, I know this service is needed"; "A library is essential to produce thinking people."

Angered Over Decision To Keep Stations Closed

Members of the Boston Firefighters' Support Committee, who occupy the Winthrop Street Fire Station, are angry over Mayor Kevin H. White's decision to reopen fire and police stations in East Boston and South Boston only.

Comments on the re-openings from committee spokeswoman Judy Hickey were laced with contempt following the announcement Tuesday evening.

"I think Charlestown was left out because it's the Mayor's way of punishing us because we originated the idea of takeovers," said Hickey.

"I don't think it's fair," said Lois Gallagher, another committee member. We have as much need here for a fire station and police station as East Boston.

We're just as much of an island." At a Tuesday news conference,

White said South Boston and East (continued on page 8)

CAUTION

It has come to the attention of the Patriot that local youngsters have been playing dangerous games in the vicinity of Community College and Sullivan Square MBTA Stations.

At the Community College Station, the youth have reportedly been climbing on the third rail and playing ball inside the fence that borders the tracks. At Sullivan Square, they have been climbing through a hole in the fence and crossing the B&M tracks to reach Sullivan Station.

These youngsters are flirting with serious injury or death. According to MBTA officials, the third rail is electrified 24 hours a day, whether or not the trains are running. Contact with this rail will result in serious burns and possible death from electrocution.

The fence which is topped with barbed wire was installed, along with caution signs, to keep people off the tracks.

Parents are advised to caution their children of the dangers involved in playing on the tracks - do it now, don't wait until a tragedy occurs!

The City Scene

AN ENGLISH HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER IS BLOWING THE WHISTLE ON "STUDENTS" WHO COME TO SCHOOL ONLY A FEW DAYS A MONTH TO QUALIFY FOR FINANCIAL AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN.

The teacher, a guidance counselor, said he got fed up with "having to sign welfare atten-

dance papers for men and women 'students' whose rare attendance at English High tends to be disruptive and without any academic redeeming features."

Lest you think this is one of those Washington Post "without attribution" Pulitzer Prize winners, let me assure you I am giving each of my editors a phone number and person at EHS where the story can be con-

firmed.

The English High educator says he decided to take action after a social worker came to him and DEMANDED he sign a certificate of attendance for a woman whose attendance is almost non-existent. The teacher, who understandably seeks anonymity, called the attention of Governor King to the situation, informing him:

"I have heard you speak many times of eliminating welfare fraud. The problem I wish to address is not outright fraud, but distortion of what I believe is the

intent of the law.

"Parents receive payment under FADC if the child is enrolled in a full time school, but the number of days they must attend is not specified. State law requires 180 days of school. Minimum attendance for passing mark in Boston is 75 percent unless there are extenuating circumstances. The rules for receiving welfare should reflect the above.

"I believe the cities, state and Federal government could save billions of dollars if the wording of the law were changed to

require a minimum percentage of attendance to be entitled to benefits . . ."

So there you have it, fellow Bostonians. The School Department overspends its budget by millions of millions of dollars and we continue to subsidize MEN and WOMEN — that's what the teacher said — "students" who come to school only a few days a month and only to qualify for financial reward.

 Think about it: you never get a second chance to make a first impression.

Barrels In Street Illegal

We have received numerous complaints about residents placing barrels in front of their homes or in front of someone else's home to insure a parking space.

This is illegal, I repeat illegal. The problem area seems to be along High Street, Green Street, Russell Street and the adjacent streets. Residents do have a right to park close to their homes, however, you have no right to place barrels in the street to protect a parking space.

To insure this practice will not become a contagious situation, citations will be written to those residents disregarding the law.

For your protection please take advantage of the Resident Parking Sticker Program available at the Little City Hall. This will protect you from the two hour parking limit that will be enforced for non-resident parking.

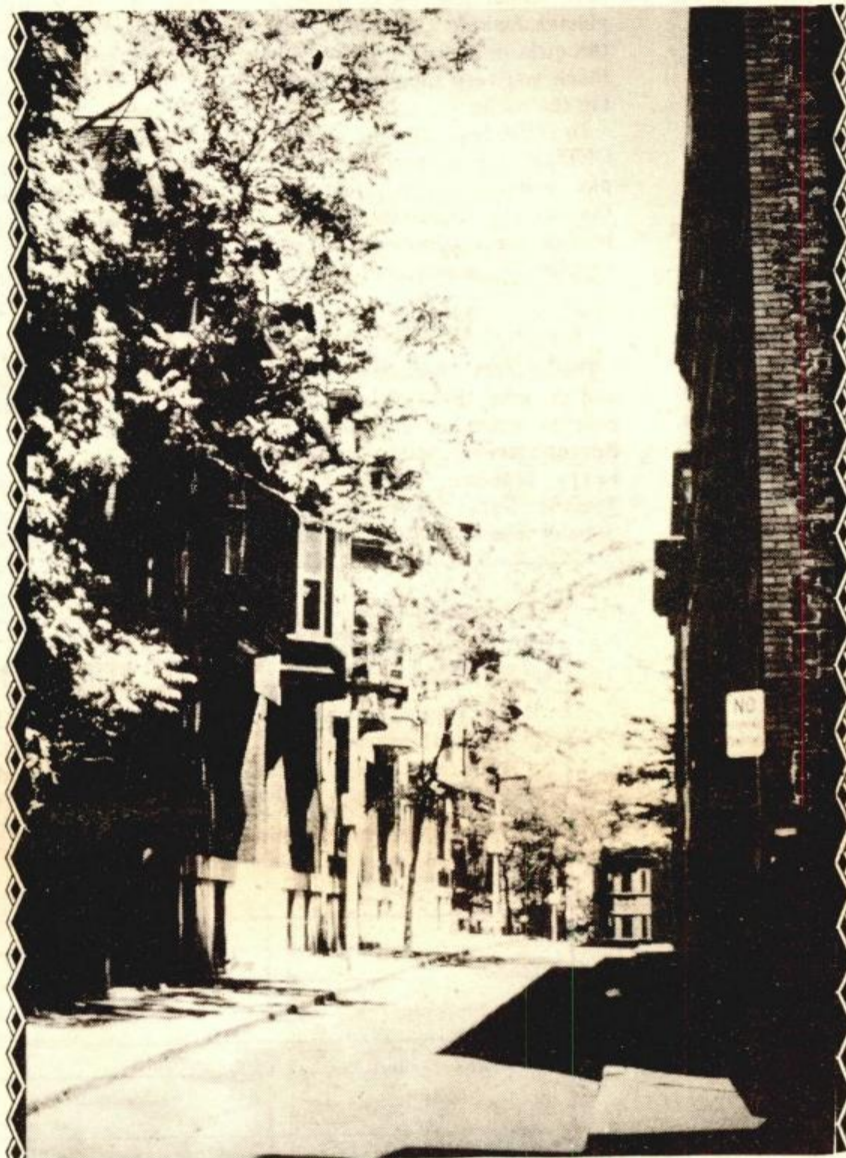

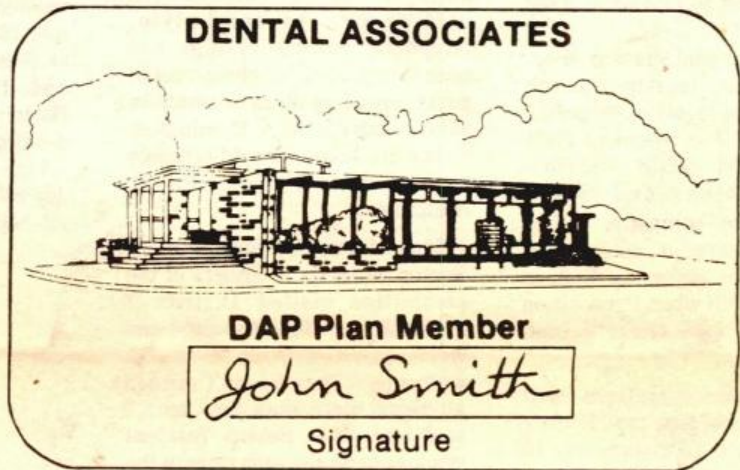

Angered Over Decision To Keep Stations Closed

Boston were selected for immediate relief because he was convinced of their isolated nature.

This corresponded to comments from Police Sgt. Jeremiah Manfra who conducted Tuesday night's Community/Police Relations Meeting at the Boys' Club. Although Manfra said he was not privy to why some stations were open and others not, he suggested it was probably due to Charlestown's close proximity to District 1 and that response time was short, except for rush hour.

According to a Boston Globe report, public safety adviser, Stephen Dunleavy expects "a number of" other fire companies to be restored but could not identify them. He did not know about whether the police stations would reopen as well.

However, in an interview last week, White said: "If I took \$3 million out of the \$9 million, I could open up every fire and police station that's been closed, hire back every cop and firefighter who's been laid off, and keep all the parks and swimming pools open all day and all night this summer." White was referring to the \$9.4 million in state funds, which at that time, were pending on Beacon Hill but were released by Governor King Monday.

Hickey also said she was skeptical of the decision which suspended the layoff of 800 police and firemen and reopened East Boston's and South Boston's police stations and South Boston's fire company. "They still only have a sub-station. Now, what's going to happen after June 30th when Proposition 2 1/2 goes into effect?" said Hickey.

Traffic demonstrations will continue according to Hickey who met with approximately 10 other committee members to decide future strategy, following the mayor's announcement. According to her, a surprise demonstration is planned for this morning (Thursday) and will take place in downtown Boston. However, at this printing, further details were withheld. "I'll tell you this," said Hickey, "we're going to do a lot more."

Traffic was also stopped intermittently Wednesday morning as approximately 40 Charlestown residents picketed in the City Square area, stopping cars on Rutherford Avenue and off ramp traffic from the Mystic-Tobin Bridge. Demonstrators blocked traffic for approximately 20 minutes as they walked in a circle across inbound lanes at City Square, cutting traffic off from the Washington Street Bridge.

Following the blockade they grouped on a nearby traffic island, holding their banner and signs, allowing traffic to flow. However, another blockade was made before departing.

This strategy was similar to a demonstration held last Friday morning which seemed to receive support from drivers who honked and waved to demonstrators as long as they allowed cars to pass.

"We want them to know that we're not there to harrass them but we have to make our point somehow and show our outrage," said Hickey.

Community support continues for the committee who have dubbed the Winthrop Street station "People's Firehouse No. 2." Residents generously donate a night to sleep over in the fire house, helping to keep it occupied on a 24 hours basis. An emergency, pyramid-style, telephone calling system has been designed for firehouse occupants, enabling them to summon 40-50 residents with 15 minutes, to the fire house, should officials try to remove occupants or equipment.

Support was also found in East Boston when six members of the committee visited District 7 Police Station Tuesday night and were greeted with a warm welcome. "They haven't opened anything more than the doors," said one East Boston resident who has been sleeping over in the police station since its takeover three weeks ago. "We're behind you. We haven't given up the fight yet."

Attendance is steady, at approximately 40 persons, at the weekly Thursday night meetings held by the committee to update residents on their activities and to announce demonstration times

and dates.

The "People's Fire House No. 2" kitty has grown to approximately \$800 benefitting from the sale of T-shirts, ribbons, cakes, personal donations, and an initial donation from the Death and Welfare Fund of the Firefighters Union. This will be held in contingency for law fees if needed. The committee has stressed that their books are open for review at anytime and also ask that any donations be made out to Nancy McCaffrey, pending the opening of a bank account under an appropriate name.

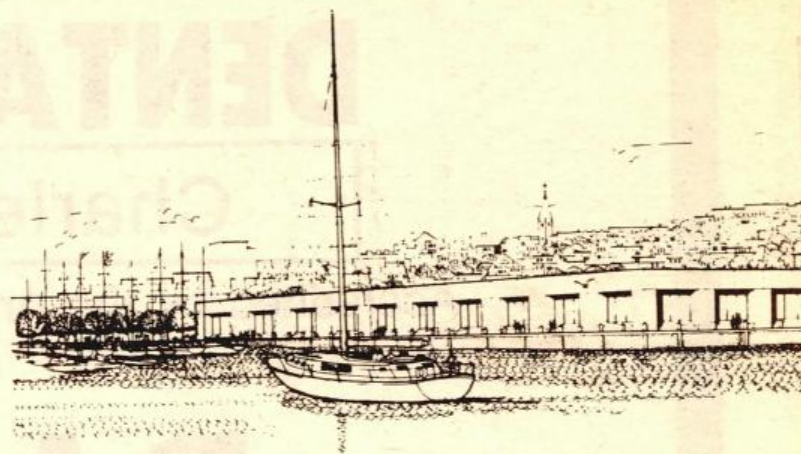

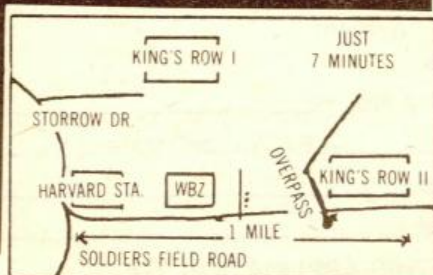

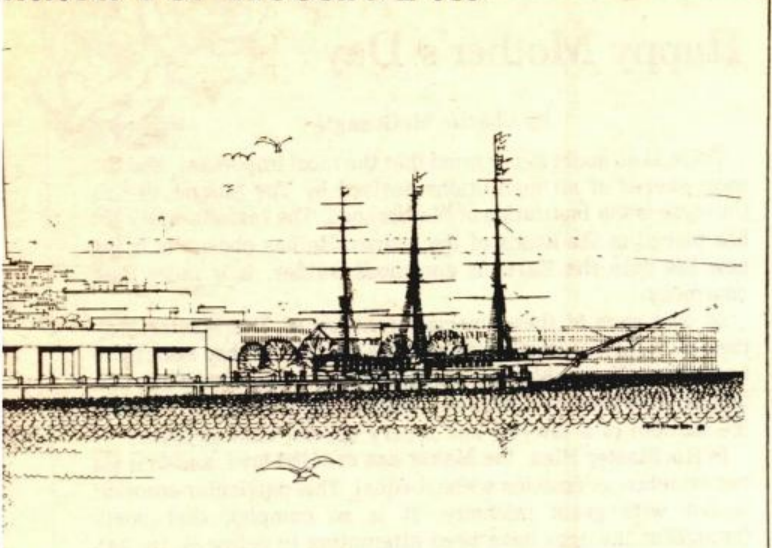

A Tale Of Two Cities - Boston And Chelsea React To Proposition 2 1/2

by John W. Sears

"Boston and Chelsea," said Councillor John Sears, "are the two highest taxed cities in the state, and now that they have both had time to react to Proposition 2 1/2, it is interesting to see how different their attitudes have been. Boston's mayor has won the Drama Critics Award. He has wailed and gnashed his teeth, and laid off 400 police officers and firefighters, closed the pools and is discharging over half the Park Department employees, shut down elderly recreation programs, inspired pink slips for half the city's teachers. There is

even an unsubstantiated rumor alleged by an official source close to the mayor who asked not to be identified, to the effect that the city flag has been half masted because five of the Mayor's press secretaries have been handed their -30-, and some precinct captains have been shocked to find themselves in genuine city departments with actual work to do. Even the Mayor has put in some overtime lately. There is as yet, however, no real Budget for 1982.

Chelsea has done it differently. Operating from a tax rate which

is higher than Boston's - the only one in the state- the City has cut 15% out of next year's Budget, as required by Proposition 2 1/2. The Mayor has found it possible to avoid layoffs of Police, Fire, or teachers, although there are some dismissals among employees.

Here is how Chelsea Mayor Joel Pressman lost his chance to win the Oscar, and settled instead for doing a good solid managerial job:

First, he takes advantage of new revenues resulting from development. We in Boston have done a good job or bringing in new developers too, but because of certain arrangements and negotiations, the lion's share of the benefits seem to end up in campaign chests.

Second, Mayor Pressman raised city fees and fines - to the tune of one quarter of the amounts cut. Boston could have done something like this too, I've

been poking departments, even circulating actual proposals, since last year. One department head mislaid the proposal. When one such idea actually reached the Council, it failed of passage by one vote because the chairman of the committee which reported it out couldn't be bothered to attend the session where it was voted down.

Thirdly, Chelsea took a long second look at the productivity of its workers. Some board members agreed to forego their pay, and the firefighter's union gave up a mandatory manning provision.

Not in good old Boston, where the Mayor and Councillors dealt themselves a 60% pay raise last year. My proposal to cut that back has not been given a hearing. No real effort to recruit voluntary help is in progress. And the unions have given up absolutely nothing - the teachers have a brand new no-cut con-

tract, and the police insist on their extra dozen days off and two officers in every cruiser. I, they offered to abandon these plush practices even temporarily, we could save enough to rehire all the lost young officers.

Fourthly, Chelsea made service cuts - but for real, not for the Academy Awards. Their library is now to be open two nights a week, instead of every night. The Mayor has given up his city car. In Boston, we hear no talk of split shifts, or of letting volunteers staff branch libraries. The Mayor has a home, the limousines room, and the precinct captains are in play every day.

Many sacrifices must be made, and all of us must work harder and do more", said Councillor Sears, "but in the meantime I wonder if we could borrow the Mayor of Chelsea or acquire him for a first-round draft choice and a bit of cash? I'd even throw in a councillor or two.

Pretty Maid Favored

In Wonderland's Rich Stake

Pretty Maid celebrated her second birthday by breaking a nine-year-old 7/16ths of a mile record at Wonderland Park and firmly established herself as the dog to beat in the current \$100,000 World Marathon which moves into the third round on Friday night, May 8.

Her daddy, Yankee Clipper, also sired Wonderland's only two-time All American greyhound Malka.

Owned by Adam Bushman's Ryan Kennel, Pretty Maid's clocking of 44 seconds flat was all the more amazing since it was her first official start over the gruelling Wonderland Course. It knocked two-tenths of a second off Lillie Monteen's mark which had stood since May 18, 1972. Pretty Maid's overall record now is 16-4-3-5-2.

There are 45 different sires in this marathon field of 64 which will be cut down after the third round for the Tuesday night (May 12) semifinals. Points continue to be awarded on a 16-8-5-3-2-1-0-0 basis and the eight top point getters move into the championship final on Saturday night, May 16. The consolation will be raced the same night for the next leading point getters.

House Champ and Yankee Clipper each have four off-springs in the marathon field with Downing and Kelly Jones three each. GH's Melissa, racing in the Paul Discolo Kennel, has been impressive to date. Icy Time, winner of the \$120,000 Floridian at Hollywood Park, and Seabrook's ace CF's Ike also remain very much in contention.

Other early winners include Chris Randles's Go Feet; another Discolo entrant K's Love; Dick Andrews' Misty Sands; Dan Ryan's Proud Prissy; Karolitz Corp.'s Tikita and Fred Pace's Kwik Pamela.

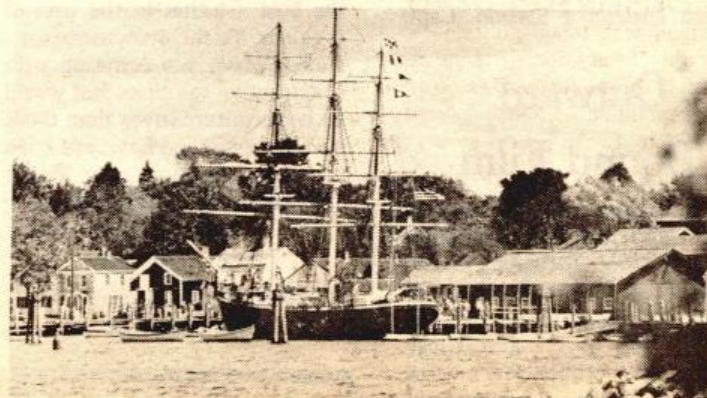

Sentenced To Six Years On Drug Charges

On Monday, April 27, 1981, Judge Robert J. Hallisey sentenced Daniel Mehigan, 21, of 7 Hancock Street, Charlestown, to six (6) years M.C.I. Concord. Mehigan was found guilty by a jury on Friday for distributing one (1) joint of Angel Dust (Phencyclidine, a Class B Substance) to Philip Smith, also of Charlestown, on November 6, 1980, at Bunker Hill and Elm Streets in Charlestown.

The Judge, when imposing the sentence, agreed with Assistant District Attorney James J. Larkin that the distribution of

Angel Dust had reached epidemic proportions in Charlestown, and hoped the sentence would deter others from using this dangerous drug.

The jury was out 2-1/2 hours. The defendant was represented by Attorney Gordon Oppenheim.

Hooley. Mrs. Hooley called an ambulance and the boy was rushed to the Massachusetts General Hospital where he died the following day of a fractured skull. Medical testimony indicated multiple blows were administered with a blunt instrument. A broken broom handle found by Police at the scene appeared to have been the murder weapon.

The defendant had recently married the victim's mother and

resided with her at the Monument Street apartment.

The case was prosecuted by Thomas J. Mundy, Jr. of District Attorney Newman Flanagan's Staff.

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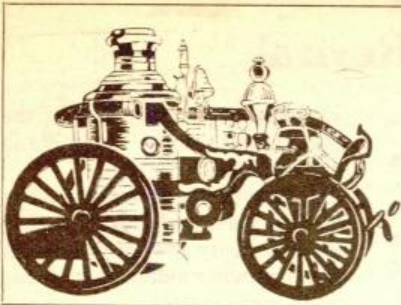
