Last minute packing of juice, milk and bread was undertaken by one crew, while another crew arranged the packages for easy pick up. The last-minute check of the names and addresses of the recipients was made, delivery teams were organized and "Townie Santa" was ready to go.

Meanwhile, at the head-

quarters of Scalli Caterers on Sackville Street, family members and friends gathered to assist Bob and Carol Scalli in the preparation and packaging of over 120 hot turkey dinners that would be delivered along with the Christmas boxes. Even Mayor Raymond Flynn took his turn in dishing out the mashed potatoes.

Teamsters Local 25 provided its van, and retiree Mel Stillman was the driver. The crew that included Ed Connolly from the ILA, loaded the van and began delivery to recipients in the Bunker Hill Housing Development.

Fifty Years Ago In Charlestown

Fifty years ago, the country was in the midst of World War II. The late Sylvester B. Colbert was service secretary of Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus during this period, and updated the membership with happenings at the Knights Clubhouse on High Street and with fellow Knights stationed around the world.

Here are some of the writings from Mr. Colbert in the K. of C. letter dated December 1942.

· We are in the season of Christmas, and although we knew it was Yuletime, it was hard to realize it. For the first time in our recollection, there were no lights in the houses, no Christmas trees in the windows and with the dim-out regulations, the streets were, and still are, quite. It is a very different Christmas from the one we knew in the "piping times of peace."

· The Clubhouse has become the Charlestown headquarters of the Red Cross, the entire third floor being given over to their

· Joseph F. Monahan goes down in the record as the first member of the Council to make the headlines. If you happened to be listening to the radio one day this month, you would have heard something like this: "During a visit to a hospital in Northern Ireland

a short time ago, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt spoke to a patient from Charlestown, Mass. named Joseph F. Monahan. After the usual introduction, he inquired, "How's Tommy Qualters?" (Qualters is another former Charlestown boy who was an aid to the President, and is now a Major in the Army Air Corps.) Having found a common interest, the President's wife and Private Monahan held quite a conversation." This item was columned in a great many newpapers

throughout the country. · Daniel T. Doyle is now in the Navy. He was formerly one of Boston's Finest. We should say he was one of Boston's Finest Police Sailors, as he was attached to the Harbor Police. It was just a step for Dan from one boat to another.

· Edward J. McGah is a Corporal Technician in the Signal Corps. His address is c/o Postmaster, New Orleans, so your guess as to where he is is as good as

· Henry L. Harper is a Boatswains Mate 2nd Class and is stationed at Dutch Harbor, Alaska. The message to him was: "Your port may be rather lonesome just now, Henry, but if and when your Uncle Sam really starts for Tokyo, it's going to be a very, very busy

· Edward F. Hurley of Bunker Hill Street is a student flyer at the Concord, N.H. Air Field. Eddie was at the Clubhouse recently and he says there is nothing like being "up in the air with yourself at the controls and all alone."

· William J. "Bill" Hunt is somewhere in the South Pacific. It is common gossip around the Club that Bill is now Lt. Hunt instead of Staff Sgt. Hunt. We congratulate him and the Army, too, if the information is

correct.

Chelsea Theatre Company. She has appeared in a number of musical cabaret-style revues in area theatres and on the Spirit of Boston cruise ship.


In addition, McLaughlin says she has a 40-minute act she performs with an accompanist . . . frequently at weddings and other social

School in Charlestown for the first and second grades, and then it was a move to Somerville for the family, She and her mother Eleanor now reside in the town.




His mother, his father, his brothers and sisters, and in later years, his own wife and children were the building blocks upon which these thoughts rested. As an adult, it was his place to do



means, but the tattered sleeves of his old overcoat quickly reminded him of what he had become.

- A report from the Boston Redevelopment Authority on plans by BioTransplant Inc. to renovate Building 75 in the Charlestown Navy Yard in order to expand its facility; and
- A presentation by Tony and Peter Costa on their plans to renovate and open the former J.J. McCarthy's at 256 Main St.

Rezoning Charlestown

The Planning and Zoning Committee meeting, originally set for Monday, Jan. 4, has been rescheduled for Thursday, Jan. 7 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St. According to Chairman Tom Cunha, the committee will look at the zoning of Parcel 2 in the City Square area at this meeting.

Cunha said that there will be a public meeting when the preliminary zoning of the City Square parcels is completed. Residents will be asked to vote on one use for each parcel, which will then go to the members of the Neighborhood Council for their vote.

All residents, especially abutters to the City Square area, are encouraged to attend the committee meetings.

Public Safety/ Police Community Relations

Chairman Mel Stillman has announced

that the Public Safety Committee and the Community Relations Officer of the Boston Police Department will meet with residents on Tuesday, Jan. 12 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St.

The council meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

* 425 Medford Street . . . A formal agreement has been signed between J.M. Cashman Inc., the city of Boston, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the Intervenors in the State Building Code Appeals Board case concerning the removal of glacial till and other Cashman materials presently at the 425 Medford St. site.

The agreement limits Cashman to removing no more than 25 truck loads of material each day between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday only. Each of the trucks containing Cashman material are visually identifiable with a magnetic "C" on the side.

During the week of Dec. 7-11, Cashman removed a total of 92 truckloads of fill from the site.

It is expected that the removal will be completed by Jan. 17. If the materials are not removed by that date, Cashman will inform the Council and the Intervenors.

★ Have A Safe Christmas . . . Boston Fire Commissioner Martin E. Pierce Jr. wishes the residents of his hometown, Charlestown, a Happy Fire Safe Christmas and urges all to follow a few simple rules to ensure the safety of themselves and their families during the holiday season.

Pierce offers the following suggestions:

- Place your Christmas tree away from fireplaces, radiators and electric heaters.
- Do not place the tree where it might block a door or an exit.
- Do not use candles or other open flame on or near the tree.

 Use only lighting sets approved by a national testing laboratory such as Underwriter Laboratories and Factory Mutual.

 Check the lights before using them, and look for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Discard the lights if defects are found.

- Make sure that electrical circuits are not overloaded and avoid plugging too many cords into one outlet. Use no more than three strands of lights on a single extension cord to avoid overloading outlets.
- Do not use flammable decorations on your tree or elsewhere in your house.
- Make certain that all lights are out when the tree is unattended.
- Remove flammable Christmas wrappings immediately. Do not attempt to burn wrappings or decorations in the fireplace.
- Do not run extension cords under rugs.
 They may overheat and cause a fire.
- Do not allow smoking near the tree.
 Use care when placing decorations which use bulbs, especially in windows where curtains could easily ignite.
- Remove the tree as soon as possible after the holidays. Every day that a tree remains indoors, it becomes a little bit drier and more of a hazard.
- Electric-powered space heaters should not be placed near combustible material.
 Liquid-fueled space heaters are illegal for indoor use in Massachusetts.
- Fireplaces should be inspected and cleaned once a year to clear out soot and creosote that can ignite and burn.

The best way to protect your family from a fire tragedy during the Christmas season, as well as throughout the year, is to make sure that your smoke detector is working and practice exit drills. Pierce states: "Remember . . . the best gift of all is a "fire safe" home.

★ Travel Safety . . . MassPike Chairman Allan R. McKinnon urges holiday travelers to drive carefully, observe the speed limit and use seat belts.

In addition, he encourages drivers to take a break and not drive while tired. Supporting this effort, the Marriott Corporation will offer free coffee, tea, hot chocolate and sodas at all Travel Plazas along the Massachusetts Turnpike from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve.

★ Street Reconstruction Update . . . Susi is still working on the installation of the new gas light poles. The tops have been shipped and they will be installed next.

Susi is also buying stock to hook up the roof drains and a survey is being done to determine the specific types of materials to be used. Work will continue on these items as weather permits.

On the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights), the Middlesex Corp. has gotten upper and lower Mead Street partially completed and installed temporary sidewalks for the winter. The final paving will be done in the spring. The trees and ground cover are being planted and the area is being cleaned up. The railings are due to arrive in a few weeks, and will be installed as weather permits.

We ask your cooperation in not using the stairs as they are not safe for the general public as yet. The site will be fenced off until the railings are installed.



· We received a very fine card from Gerard E. Mulranan who is putting in his time at present at Portsmouth, Va. with the Coast Artillery.

· Of course, this is a tough war and we are all in it in some way or other, but for you boys in the Service, wherever you may be, we would like to draw your attention to the terrible sufferings of the "boys" on the homefront.

Picture, if you can, "good old 62" the day before Christmas 1942 - the place, the pool room and

To The Charlestown Neighborhood Council:

The Charlestown Preservation Society (CPS) is extremely disappointed that the Charlestown Neighborhood Council has excluded CPS from the Council. CPS was a founding member of the Council and has participated actively ever

CPS has been in existence for nearly 30 years and has a current membership of over 400. Its goals are to help preserve the important historic character of Charlestown and to contribute to maintaining the quality of life in the community. With this in mind, our activities - which began with saving certain buildings from destruction - have covered a broad range. The biannual Charlestown House Tour and the annual Preservation Week (including lectures, Charlestown Artists Exhibits, park cleanups, etc.) are our chief fund-raising activities. These highlight the history and character of the community for hundreds of people. The fund raising success of these events provides CPS with the opportunity to contribute to other community activities, such as Townie Santa and the elderly Thanksgiving dinner, as well as to:

· develop a tree planting program;

provide funds to restore the paintings in the library;

· help to fund the repair of the piano at St. Mary's; purchase a historical Bunker Hill flag now on display

in the Charlestown Cooperative Bank; sponsor the annual Christmas concert at St. Mary's;

provide seed money to the Friends of Doherty Park;

· start a "friends of the gravevard" group.

Our members, individually and through committees such as Design Review, have provided input to discussions on many planning and development projects over the years. Many of our members are professionally involved in planning and design and bring their expertise to the community. Finally, joining together with other community groups, CPS has helped in developing and implementing major projects such as the Main Street restoration, City Square park,

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council is a forum for various groups in the community to work together on important issues in Charlestown. Our Council representatives over the years, John Tobin, Kathryn Downing and Dan Kovacevic, have been active and contributing members. They have worked diligently for the betterment of the community.

It is hard to understand that an organization with such a large membership and active involvement in the community would not be elected to the Council. 


