Harborpark Day Returns To The Charlestown Navy Yard

The seventh annual Harborpark Day will take place this Sunday, Sept. 15 between noon and 6 p.m. in the Charlestown Navy Yard. This year's event will be held in conjunction with the ninth annual "Chowdafest," and will coincide with the "Vinland Revisited" celebration being staged by the Scandinavian community to commemorate the 1000th anniversary of Leif Eiriksson's voyage to North America.

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn stated: "Harborpark

Day has become a Boston tradition in a relatively short period of time. Each year more and more people join in this celebration of our harborfront. This is our way of bringing attention to the great asset Boston has in its harbor. And it's a way of helping people view the progress that's been made in making the harbor more accessible to people while increasing opportunities for new housing and job growth on the waterfront."

Harborpark Day festivities will take place at Dry Dock 2 and Pier 4 and run

simultaneously with the "Vinland Revisited" events on Pier 1, adjacent to *USS Constitution*. (The full schedule can be found on page 10.)

Horizons For Youth will benefit from the Bud Light "Chowdafest" which this year will feature a local entry vying for the honor of "1991 Chowda Champ." The Deli at Store 24 in the Charlestown Navy Yard will enter its chowder in hopes of being chosen champ from votes cast by the thousands of samplers

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The Vikings Have Landed

The Charlestown Navy Yard is hosting "Vinland Revisited — One Thousand Years of Discovery" through Monday, Sept. 16. The festival began yesterday, Sept. 11, with the arrival of three replica Viking ships, *Gaia*, *Oseberg* and *Saga Siglar* at Pier 1, adjacent to *USS Constitution*. The ships will be open to the public daily between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Activities planned as part of the commemoration of Viking explorer Leif Eiriksson's historic landing on North America 1,000 years ago, some 500 years before the landing of Columbus, are sponsored by Terje Korsnes, Consul of Norway, the Consuls of Sweden and Denmark, as well as the local Scandinavian community. *Vinland Revisited* is funded by the governments of Norway and Iceland with the help of the Norwegian Broadcasting Company and World City Discovery A/S.

The mission of the replica ships is to gain respect for the environment and to continue

the spirit of discovery to help build a common future on the planet earth.

A two-day celebration of Scandinavian life will be held on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 14 and 15. Events, free to the public, will include:

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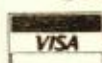

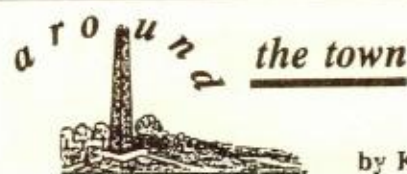

Neighborhood Council Gets Back Into Full Swing

Information on the long-awaited street reconstruction contracts brought residents from the 26 neighborhood streets scheduled for work to the Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting on Sept. 10 only for them to leave in frustration after waiting two hours for a Boston Redevelop-

ment Authority representative to arrive to answer their questions.

Council Chairman Dennis McLaughlin voiced anger at the lack of cooperation from the BRA in responding to inquiries on the status of the contracts and the feasibility of including other streets in the contract area. McLaughlin

informed the residents that he would personally chair a meeting on the subject within the next few weeks that would include a full accounting from Paul Barrett, BRA assistant director for Harbor Planning and Development, on where the contracts stand and the possible target date for work to begin.

Barrett, scheduled on the council agenda to make a presentation on the reconstruction project, arrived at the meeting at 9:20 p.m., long after the residents had left the hall, apologizing for his being unavoidably delayed, making it impossible for him to arrive in time for the presentation.

The council meeting was the first such gathering since July, and as a result of a diminished number of meetings over the summer, there were very few committee meetings to be reported.

Basic Services Committee Chairman Peter Looney reported on a meeting held on July 26 to discuss a rodent problem in the community. He informed the council that flyers were dis-

tributed to residents living around the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project in City Square, advising them how to avoid a rodent problem. He also stated that information on rodent control or assistance in alleviating an existing problem can be obtained by calling the Inspection Services Department at 442-4216.

Kate McDonough, chairperson of the Election Committee, announced that an election will be held on Saturday, Oct. 26 for the seven precinct seats on the council. The location of a site and the hours of the election are still to be determined. McDonough stated that a notice will be publicized in next week's edition of the **Patriot** with all pertinent information.

MWRA Community Relations Coordinator Carrie Fuchs introduced herself to the council and requested a meeting with the Mitigation Committee to outline a proposed landscaping plan for the agency's Medford Street property and the signing of the Memorandum.

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Murray Seeks Election To Boston City Council — Citywide

James M. Murray of Jamaica Plain has announced his candidacy for one of the four At-Large seats on the Boston City Council in this year's municipal election.

A Vietnam veteran and parent of a child in the Boston Public School system,

Murray has worked in public service in Boston for more than 20 years. In his most recent position as executive assistant to the Boston Commission on the Affairs of the Elderly, Murray developed the Senior Town Meeting and the "Cool It Now!" Heat Stress Preven-

tion programs for elderly Bostonians.

Prior to his service with the Elderly Commission, Murray worked in the city's Office of Neighborhood Services as coordinator for Mission Hill and Jamaica Plain where he responded to constituent concerns and worked with community groups on a variety of city service and neighborhood development issues.

A product of the Boston Public Schools and the state college system, Murray holds a master's degree in public affairs from the John W. McCormack Institute at

the University of Massachusetts at Boston, a bachelor's degree from Boston State College and a diploma from Jamaica Plain High School.

An active member of the community, Murray has served on the Board of Directors for the Boston Center for Blind Children in Jamaica Plain since 1981 and belongs to several civic and veterans organizations, including the Brookside Neighborhood Association, the Mission Hill American Legion Post No. 327, the Irish-American Veterans

Post No. 1 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 144, North End.

A lifelong tenant in Boston, Murray is an advocate for the concept of "housing as a basic human right" and a supporter of special needs housing, particularly for the elderly, the infirmed and

the disabled.

This is Murray's first attempt to seek elective office. "The people I talk to in the neighborhoods tell me that they are ready for change," said Murray. "It's time to try something new. We can do better."

The Recycle Center at the Harvard-Kent School, 50 Bunker Hill St. will reopen for the 1991-92 school year on Thursday, Sept. 17. This center has been open since 1988 and has been used by many organizations and schools in the Charlestown area. The center will be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. and is located in

Hall Makes Proposal To Protect Fishing Rights In Charlestown

Boston City Council candidate Jackson Hall proposed legislation which would

protect access to popular fishing hotspots in Charlestown and across the city. Hall's proposal would guarantee that fishermen have the right to fish from virtually all city and state property located on fresh and salt water in Boston, including the MDC locks and "Fish Ladder" as well as the popular Pier II in Charlestown.

Hall said: "This legislation will open dozens of spots which are not currently accessible to the angling public. It will also protect fishing rights on other public property where those rights are currently ambiguous."

"In Charlestown, there are a number of excellent spots for blue and bass fishing which have previously been accessible and are currently restricted. I believe those locations can be opened again by enforcing historic rights of way under state law," said Hall.

Hall's legislation would guarantee anglers access to "real property owned or controlled by the Commonwealth, or any of its political subdivisions including authorities, which is located both in the city of Boston, and next to any body of water." 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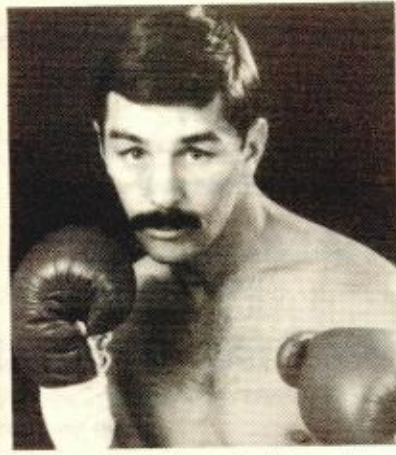

son, commissioned at the Navy Yard in Boston in 1980, carries a crew of 166 under the command of Cmdr. Timothy J. Dull. The ship's crew will also be entering their own chowder to be judged in the "Chowda-fest" competition.

Nova Scotia's nautical heritage will be represented by a visit of the **Bluenose II**, a 161-foot-long schooner. The vessel is an exact replica of the original **Bluenose**, which during a 20-

year racing career represented the Canadian fishing port of Lunenburg against a succession of challengers from Gloucester. The **Bluenose** never lost a race series from 1921 until 1939. She will be open to visitors on Pier 4 between noon and 5 p.m. on Harborpark Day.

Events for children and the entire family will take place — free of charge — at Shipyard Park, sponsored by the Conroy Development Corp. They will include

two Moon Walks from noon to 6 p.m.; face painting from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m.; and barn yard animals between 1 and 5 p.m. There will also be free balloons for the children.

In addition, over 20 local merchants will be setting up shop on Pier 4, offering an assortment of handmade items, foods and unusual gift ideas.

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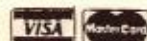

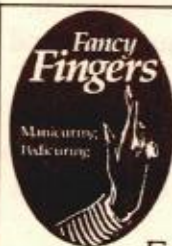
