Candidates must have registration fee and birth cer tificate with them at the time of registration. All players, old and new, must register.
All applicants must be born before August 1, 1970 (9 years old) and born after August 1 , 1965 (13 years old). Weight limits are 65 pounds minimum and 130 pounds maximum. 14 year olds are eligible if born between January 1, 1965 and July 31, 1965 and weigh 105 pounds or less. The woman was enjoying a day off as she glided her car to a stop Comply with the red signal at columbia and Washington．So， lside her，tail wagging face gainst the window against the window

The major federal funding source of social services for the elderly，Title 20 of the Social Security Act，is intended to assist low income seniors．Un－ fortunately，those most in need of these services are not receiving them．
＂We know there are many Older Bostonians who may be eligible for Supplemental Security income（SSI）but wh have not applied because they lack information on eligibility or who feel there is a stigma at tached to receiving benefits，＇ Mayor Kevin H．White said．

Where was Millerick ten years ago? Ten years ago when there wasn't any grant money or city money or any of the workers that are around the town today. At hat time, we had to depend on knocking on doors to get funds for the town in order to keep diferent organizations going. You mentioned the Kent Community Council. When the Community chool first got started, no one was sure it would survive. The first two workers under the Community School got their first paychecks through the Kennedy Center because the Community School Program hadn't received their funding.
Talk to Matty O'Neil, Bernie Kelly, and other men in town. These are the people that started these youth organizations. Today, many organizations receive federal, state, and city funds to operate numerous programs for young residents, but not back then.
Do you think you are the first person to help exceptional children in Charlestown? No doubt you are the first being paid
for such services, but people like myself, Cecilia Wagner, Phyllis Bryant, and Mae Simenson worked for years with these children for no pay, but out of love and compassion for these youth. We ran field trips for
them--busses were either donated them--busses were either donated or paid for out of our pockets. Outsiders were needed then to bring money into the town. If we didn't have people like John Gardiner, Bob O'Brien, and other non-residents working in the town over the years, then these "Johnny-come-lately's" would not be working today.
I have been a member of the Kennedy Center Board for six years over an eight-year period. I and other people in the town were esponsible for the establishment of the Pop Warner Football eague. I am past member of the Kent Community Council, present member of the Kennedy Center Board of Directors, and present chairman of the Tenants Task Force. If you need proof of he work done in past years, I will show you the records.
People who want to and do things for the town, just do it, without expecting notoriety, a pat on the back, or a paycheck.

Visitors and Bostonians can view the city and harbor anew, and break from the marathon walk to Charlestown where they can board "Old Ironsides," take a hard-hat tour of the Navy Yard, and climb the Bunker Hill Monument.
