## Pet Regulations At The Bunker Hill Monument

The National Park Service (NPS), the city of Boston Code Enforcement Police and Animal Control Divisions are intensifying the enforcement of pet regulations, in response to growing city-wide community concern over an increase in unleashed pets and pet waste.

The increased enforcement, by the NPS at the Bunker Hill Monument and the city of Boston throughout Charlestown, is aimed at the few irre-

sponsible pet owners who repeatedly fail to obey existing animal leash and waste disposal regulations and ordinances.
The NPS, the city of Boston and the Charlestown community encourage all pet owners to help us protect the historic Bunker Hill Monument and Charlestown by obeying the following regulations:

- Pets must be leashed at all times on a leash not over six (6) feet in length. Among many concerns, unrestrained and uncon-
ous safety risk to people (especially small children and the elderly) as well as to other pets.
- Pet owners mus clean up after their pets. Animal waste that is not cleaned up poses serious health risks, especially for children.

Pets running-at large or unattended may be impounded. Pet owners may be charged for kennel or boarding costs, veterinary fees, transportation costs and disposal ex penses. Unclaimed animals will be turned over to

* Licensing Board Hearing . . The petition of Angelo and Sippio Trodella went before the city of Boston Licensing Board on April 12 seeking to obtain a 7 -day malt and wine license for their new Italian restaurant, Cafe Luna, which will be located at the site of Blossom's restaurant in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Bill Galvin, chairman of the CNC Basic Services Committee, held a meeting of the committee on April 10 to review the application. The members of the committee approved the petition with the following restrictions:

1. The Luna Cafe will not serve malt and wine after midnight; and
2. There will be no television in the cafe.

Galvin reported on the meeting to the CNC Executive Board that voted to support the recommendations and a letter was
forwarded to the Licensing Board
Manager Angelo Trodella made the presentation at the hearing. Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, brought with her the letter from the CNC, noting the two restrictions. She told the board that the Mayor's Office supported the petition with the provisos. She added that "at the community meeting on Monday, the petitioner offered his site to non-profits four times a year to be used for fund raisers. I commend them on their good neighbor policy."

Also speaking in support of the license was Amy Chardavoyne, aid to Boston City Councillor Diane Modica, and Robert E. Kenny Jr. Richard E. Dolby from the Nary Yard Association presented a letter that included two additional provisos Entertainment would be limited to background music with no live entertainment or disco, and the outdoor seating area on Second Avenue would be cordoned off and controlled by restaurant staffing.

Capt. Ron Conway, commanding officer of Area A of the Boston Police Department, submitted a letter in opposition to the petition.

The board was due to act on the petition later on Wednesday.
$\star$ Public Improvement Committee The Public Improvement Committee held a hearing on April 6 in Boston City Hall relative to the change in name of " A " Street, Charlestown. Attomey George Bachrach made the presentation before the committee which was chaired by Department of Public Works Commissioner Joseph Casazza. It was a unanimous decision by the committee to name the street Bunker Hill Industrial Park

* 390 Main Street . . . The Boston Fire Department (BFD) was called to the elderly housing at 390 Main St. at 5 p.m. on April 6. David Walsh, BFD spokesperson, reported that an electrical wall furnace unit overheated and the insulation was ignited causing a short circuit. He said that the damage was estimated at $\$ 500$.
$\star$ CNC Approves City Square Zoning Zoning for the City Square Neighborhood District has been approved by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC). Members of the CNC have requested that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) vote on the proposed zoning at the next BRA board meeting.

Members of the CNC have worked

with planning consultants and the state's Division of Capital Planning and Operations for over two years to ensure that neighborhood concerns were properly addressed.
"In many ways the end of the zoning process represents a beginning for the planned development for City Square," noted Marisa Lago, BRA director. "The BRA will see that zoning is adopted as quickly as possible so that the community can move forward with other developments planned for City Square. A strong, community-súpported zoning plan is a real plus to any development project to ensure community goals and objectives are addressed. BRA staff is looking forward to continuing work with Charlestown residents."
The BRA is scheduled to vote on the zoning this month and will recommend approval to the city of Boston Zoning Commission for final adoption.

* Board Of Appeal Hearings . . . The city of Boston Board of Appeal held hearings on April 11 relative to Charlestown properties:
- Bennett Development Inc. (by Bruce Daniel) sought a variance from the Boston Zoning Code to establish legal occupancy of 288 Bunker Hill St. as a three-family dwelling. There is no record of occupan-
cy in the Building Department.
Evers from the Mayor's Office spoke in favor of the petition "since it has been an existing condition for many years." The board approved the petition.
- Bunker Hill Ltd. Partnership petitioned to change the legal occupancy of 340 Bunker Hill St. from a school to two apartments and erect a gable roof structure for a second floor. Chardavoyne stated that Modica supported the proposal with updates to the community. Tom Jones from Carpenter's Local 218 supported the plan as long as it means work for residents in the area. 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## Kerasiotes And Coxe Officiate At Groundbreaking For New City Square Park

Secretary of Transportation James J. Kerasiotes and Secretary of Environmental Affairs Trudy Coxe participated in a groundbreáking ceremony for a new City Square Park in Charlestown last week. The park was made possible by the opening of tunnels under City Square to traffic that formerly used the elevated ramps between the Tobin Bridge and Route 93.
"Here is the promise of the Central Artery/Tunnel Project," said Kerasiotes. "By removing those ugly, decrepit ramps from over City Square, we have restored Charlestown's link to the waterfront, given the community several acres of new parks and provided for a new lease on its economic future. Meanwhile, in Boston, we have begun construction of the underground expressway that will someday allow us to remove the elevated central artery and re-knit the North End, Waterfront and Chinatown back to the downtown."
"Urban parks like this
one bring open space to our neighborhoods and make them accessible to veryone as part of thei daily experience," according to Coxe. "Charlestown has waited a long time for City Square to be reclaim ed as its civic center and restored as a gateway to Boston. This groundbreaking represents the first signifi cant step in the redevelopment of City Square for the enjoyment of all the resi dents."
"This is a great day for a neighborhood that has lived for decades under the shadow of elevated rapid transit tracks, highway and off-ramps," said Richard Voke, the State Repre sentative whose district includes Charlestown. "This park is the beginning of a new future for Charles town and gives the rest of he region a glimpse into he future once the elevated central artery is removed from downtown Boston,"

Kerasiotes, Coxe, Department of Environmental Management Commission er Peter C. Webber, Centra Artery Project Director

Peter Zuk and Mass. Highway Department Commissioner Laurinda Bedingfield gave reporters a brief tour of the site, pointing out where the pedestrian paths will enter the park and bring visitors to a central plaza area. They noted that the park will feature a sculptured fountain, an open lawn area, seating, a wide variety of trees, shrubs and seasonal flowers, as well as an exhibit on early Charlestown residents and buildings.

The design of the park was done by the awardwinning Boston architectural firm, The Halvorson Company, in collaboration with sculptor David Phillips of Somerville. McCourt Construction of South Boston was awarded the construction contract with a low bid of $\$ 1.9$ million.
The Friends of City Square Park and the residents of Charlestown have worked with both MHD and DEM throughout the reconstruction of the Central Artery/North Area project.

## City Square Must Be Policed

Dear Editor:
Recently, I was almost killed by a speeding highway truck at 9 a.m., while crossing Chelsea Street in the new City Square Park development.

Granted, I was crossing against the light. When I left the curb, no vehicles were in sight. Then out of nowhere came this speeding highway truck. Its driver never braked. He just glared at me. The truck's velocity was so great it literally knocked the cap off my head.

Already we have had one fatality in the City Square development area - Tony Mellino, a neighbor who was struck by a truck during construction several years ago. Who knows how many unreported near misses there have been?

Just a week later, as I stood on the curb at Chelsea Street and the North Washington Street bridge, several cars ran a red light at that heavily traveled intersection. They completely ignored the red light and several pedestrians who were attempting to cross.

The Route 92 and 93 MBTA buses also discharge passengers at that intersection. Public safety is risked apparently for the driver's convenience. This bus stop should be moved to Chelsea and Warren streets. There the driver on half the runs would have to make a sharp left turn, but at least his passengers would have a chance to get across the thoroughfare alive.

The police should start patrolling the City Square Park area for speeders like the proverbial blanket. Our elected officials at the State House, City Hall and on the Charlestown Neighborhood Council should assert this public safety issue before another person is killed there. One fatality is one too many in Charlestown's much heralded new "gateway area."

## Marathoner Giberti Pledges, 'This Run's For You'

I was running recreationally," explains John Giberti of Charlestown. "T've always wanted to run the Boston Marathon, and now I've moved to Boston." This month, Giberti is running the Boston Marathon, his first marathon, and has also set a goal to raise at least $\$ 1,000$ for the National Spinal Cord Injury Association (NSCIA), a Cambridge-based nonprofit organization that helps people with spinal cord injuries achieve independence and personal fulfillment.

Giberti is one of 20 runners who are able to officially race without a qualifying time through a special arrangement between NSCIA and the Boston Athletic Association. But for him, the arrangement provides more than the opportunity to officially race in the nation's oldest marathon. "When people find out you're crazy enough to run a marathon, they're willing to pay you for it," Giberti continues, "when they see you making that major commitment, they are pretty willing to give to a cause. Running for the National Spinal Cord Injury Association has also really been opening my eyes to the whole world of
spinal cord injuries.
Spinal cord injuries almost always result in permanent paralysis. At least 7,800 people in the United States survive spinal cord injuries each year - people like Teresa. She was 22 when a car accident paralyzed her from the waist down. She called the NSCIA hotline desperate for help. For a year Teresa had to bump herself down the stairs on her seat, pulling her chair down behind her. NSCIA staff connected her with vocational rehabilitation services and with a state agency to buy her a porch lift. Working together with NSCIA, Teresa can get out of her house on her own and is now attending college. Teresa now shows others that having a spinal cord injury does not mean your life is over.
The funds raised by Giberti and other runners in the Boston Marathon will help NSCIA to expand its national hotline services, which currently provide 1.200 people a month with much-needed information and referrals. Funds will enable NSCIA to add another phone line and to hire additional information specialists to help people with spinal cord injuries especially ones who are newly

injured, as well as those NSCIA's goal is to encaring for them. To sponsor Giberti and help NSCIA in its outreach efforts, call him at 241-9261.
"It's one thing to work out. It's another to run a marathon," Giberti concludes, "Id do it again, but I don't know if I'd do it again without also raising money for charity. My knees are starting to ache. If you're going to run a marathon, you might as well do it to raise money for people who need it."
