

Chief Marshal Bill Foley Leads 1998 Bunker Hill Day ~ People's Parade





CHIEF MARSHAL William J. "Bill" Foley, chief of interpretation for the Boston National Historical Park, gave the command "Forward March" to start the 1998 Bunker Hill Day Parade . . . The People's Parade from Hayes Square through the streets of Charlestown on June 14. This year's parade marked the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and was dedicated in honor of the Boston

At the annual "Nite Before" banquet on June 12, 1998 Bunker Hill Day Parade Chief Marshal William J. "Bill" Foley told

the gathering that it would not rain on his parade. This brought some laughter from the audience and much disbelief as the rain had begun. Over the weekend, Foley was tagged with the grand title of the "Rain Chief Marshal of the People's Parade."

The complications created in postponing or cancelling an event, such as a parade that has taken some nine months to put together, are tremendous. It can't simply be moved to the next weekend as most of the musical units are committed for parades, competitions and celebrations months in advance.

After much thought and consultation with some members of the Parade Committee, Jim Conway, who serves as the parade chairman/adjutant, made a decision to go forward with the parade.

On Sunday morning, Mayor Tom Menino called Conway at 9:25 a.m. to tell him that the parade had been cancelled because of the state of emergency that he had called in the city where, in some areas, roads were flooded.

Conway informed the mayor that he had been on the telephone with bands, drum corps, etc., since 6:30 a.m. assuring them that the parade would go on - as it has in the past - rain or shine. Conway also told Menino that he had faxed all television stations as well as the Boston Sunday Globe and Sunday Herald the fact that the parade would go on rain or shine.

In light of all this and since the musical units were under contract, the Parade Committee would be financially responsible for (continued on page 6)



Older Is Student Speaker







The mayor informed Conway that because of the state of emergency, the city would not be able to provide adequate police support and could send only a minimum assignment of police. Conway mentioned that there would not be any problems with crowd control because of the weather.

Mayor Menino then stated that because of the state of emergency, he had to cancel the parade and revoke the parade permit.

Conway then respectfully told the mayor that, in his opinion, this was not the city of Boston's parade - not Jim

Conway's parade - not the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee's parade - it was the people of Charlestown's parade. The people had worked too hard to raise the necessary funds to support the many bands that had been invited. To Charlestown this annual parade is like Christmas and the Fourth of July all wrapped up together - it's the biggest day of the year for the people of our Charlestown community.


Conway further stated that he had gone over the route and there was no flooding or safety hazards on any of the streets on the parade route.

He told the mayor that the parade would go forward, but Conway said he completely understood the mayor's decision in light of his declaring a state of emergency to cancel the parade.

He told the mayor in a jocular fashion that if the media presses him as to why Charlestown is going forward with its Bunker Hill Day Parade, "just tell them there is a crazy b who is parade chairman, and he is going forward with the parade!"

Then the telephone conversation was completed amicably with both the mayor and Conway thinking that they were both acting responsibly and were both right.

As for Chief Marshal Foley, he led the parade - the people's parade under sunshine through the dry streets of Charlestown to the cheers and good wishes of parade watchers. It certainly did not rain on his parade!

AN OPEN LETTER FROM JOHN O'CONNOR TO THE PEOPLE OF CHARLESTOWN ON THE MYSTIC POWER PLANT

Dear Friends,

Like many of you, I am deeply concerned by the presence of a polluter in our midst.

Thanks to loopholes in laws made by people who don't have to live with the consequences, the Mystic Power Plant, one of the five dirtiest power plants in the state, continues to threaten our health.

When an orange-brown haze visible across Boston oozed out of the plant last summer, there was little doubt as to the identity of the culprits. Plant officials have chosen to save money by using cheap, low-grade oil and can get away with it because the plant is exempt from current emissions standards. Thanks to this loophole, the Mystic Plant is free to produce the same level of pollution as 50.000 cars and add to soaring asthma rates.

I demand that our elected officials and the plant's owners, New York-based Sithe Energies, Inc., take immediate action on the following points:

Switch to Natural Gas

The plant must stop burning cheap oil and switch to natural gas, a much cleaner technology.

Limit Energy Production

Sithe must put a cap on the level of energy produced at the plant.

Respect Local Democracy

Officials must implement a Good Neighbor Agreement to ensure good faith bargaining with residents impacted by the plant. Residents must be given veto power and plant workers must be protected.

Repeal Deregulation Law

The problems at the plant would not have arisen had a more consumerfriendly deregulation bill been enacted which puts more money back into families' pockets.





This Dream Has Captured The Hearts Of Americans

Dear Gloria,

Thank you for your excellent coverage of the issue concerning the future deployment of USS Constitution. By publishing the entire April 14th press conference, you enabled everyone to become familiar with all the facts, not just what other media outlets highlighted.

We were very concerned about official pronouncements that the tests conducted during the 21 July 1997 sail and on the 20 May 1998 sea trials were being touted as final proofpositive that no structural problems existed.

It should be noted that the sea and the wind conditions in both cases were exceptionally mild. For the test in May, the Navy would only allow the test to be conducted in weather that was even milder than it was on 2l July 1997, so it came as no surprise that there were no indications of stress because under the testing parameters they set, the ship was never really stressed. The results of this very controlled test could only reflect how the ship might perform under exactly the same conditions.

During the April 14 press conference, we said we were confident that once all deficiencies with the structural integrity of the ships hull and keel were brought to the attention of responsible naval authorities, they would do the right thing; and they did. The real danger was, is and will always be the unpredictability of weather conditions.

The Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Jay Johnson, recognized this point, above all others, and made the right decision. It is now time for all of us to put aside any differences we have on this matter and work together to continue to preserve and protect USS Constitution.

I want to thank all your readers, everywhere, who took the time to send me words of encouragement and the many that, on their own, made their views known to decision makers. It was the many people of this grass-roots effort, started in Charlestown and spread out all over the country, that deserve great credit for speaking out. The bottom line is "Old Ironsides" will remain safe.

Remember, however, there is nothing that will prevent her from sailing within the confines of Massachusetts Bay when conditions permit. So, once again we can look forward to seeing our nation's greatest ship, with at least nine sails set, leading the parade of tall ships into Boston Harbor in the year 2000. That was what was planned and agreed to when the Pennies Campaign first started in January 1996. It is still a wonderful plan. There is no reason why this dream, which has captured the hearts and souls of all Americans, can not be fulfilled. Let us all pull together to make this happen.

BE SMART WITH YOUR VACATION HOME

Owning a vacation home can give both enjoyment and a break on your taxes. But the rules are complicated, so you have to plan carefully to get the tax benefits that are available.

If your vacation home is only for personal use (i.e., you don't rent it out), you're allowed to deduct your property taxes. And you can usually deduct 100% of the mortgage interest.

The rules are different if you also rent out the vacation home. In this case, your tax situation depends on whether the IRS considers your vacation home a rental property or a second residence.

Your vacation home will be considered a rental property if your personal use of the home is less than 15 days a year or 10% or less of the amount of time the home is rented to others. For example, say you rent your vacation home for 240 days and use it personally for 20 days. Since your 20-day personal use is less than 10% of the total rental days (which would be 24 days), the IRS considers your home a rental property.

If your vacation home is considered a rental property, you may deduct depreciation and other rental expenses, even if you show an overall rental loss. However, your loss may be limited by the passive loss rules.

If your vacation home is rented out for at least 15 days during the year and it is used by you for more than 14 days or more than 10% of the number of rental days, whichever period is greater, the property will be treated as your second residence and the deduction will be limited.

You should be aware of one surprising tax break: if you rent your home for less than 15 days during the year, the IRS lets you pocket the cash tax-free.

How often should you personally use your vacation home? Are you better off if your home is treated as a rental property or as a second residence? Unfortunately, there are few rules-of-thumb in this complex area. Give us a call. We can help.
